



Revenue Measure Options

Option #1: Single Measure, \$600M GO Bond \$600 Million General Obligation Bond

\$150 Million - Affordable housing for low-income and homeless residents

\$250 Million - Street repair, traffic and pedestrian safety

\$125 Million - Climate change, sea level rise, wildfire prevention

\$75 Million - Improvements to public buildings and general infrastructure

Option #2: Two Measures, \$300M GO Bond and Parcel Tax (30 cents/sq ft) \$300 Million General Obligation Bond

\$150M - Climate change, sea level rise, wildfire prevention, infrastructure

\$150M – Affordable housing for low-income and homeless residents

Parcel Tax (30 cents per sq. ft., \$28M annually) – Street repair and traffic safety

Option #3: Something different

Something smaller, only one of these measures, separate measures for affordable housing and infrastructure, delay consideration, or something else

Possible Results of Options #1 or #2

- Improve streets to good paving condition with an average Paving Condition Index of 70 or more
- Implement 75%+ of adopted traffic safety plans (bike/ped) and achieve Berkeley's vision of a low-stress bike network
- Complete selected sea level rise projects, and begin to implement undergrounding of evacuation routes and the stormwater/green infrastructure plan
- Assist in advancing the city's park and public realm projects, e.g., Waterfront and Civic Center Renovation
- Address 13-26% of Berkeley's affordable housing need (RHNA) through the addition of 500-1,000 new
 affordable housing units

Scientific Survey #2

- Lake Research Partners designed and administered this survey, which was conducted by live telephone interview and text-to-online.
- The survey reached a total of 500 likely November 2022 election voters from April 28-May 3, 2022.
- The margin of error for the full sample is +/-4.4%.






Scientific Survey #2

The highest priority for Berkeley voters is increasing affordable housing for low-income and homeless residents. Other priorities include repairing deteriorating streets and sidewalks, and undergrounding utilities to help reduce the risk of wildfires.


Most important needs in City of Berkeley






Scientific Survey #2

Option #2 is closest to reaching the 2/3 Yes threshold, with fewer No votes than the \$600M GO bond measure. The 30-cent parcel tax measure is the most popular of these three.



- Based on Institute for Sustainable Infrastructure's criteria
- Based on public input to date
- Recognizes some asset categories don't need more revenue (sewer); others need more time for planning, public process, or engineering
- General guidelines, not binding



- Building on experience with Measure T1
- Review of capital delivery in Berkeley, Oakland, Sunnyvale, and San Diego
- Vision 2050 Team housed at first in Public Works
- 2/3 of street investments into paving, 1/3 into traffic safety





Seeking City Council's Direction

- Move forward with measure(s)? Amounts?
- Priorities represented in measure itself via funding buckets and/or in *Vision 2050 Program Plan*?
 - Commit to non-revenue measure contributions of +\$8M annually to paving maintenance to ensure no deterioration?
 - Commit to floor for General Fund infrastructure investment?
- If GO bond, include 1% dedication to public art, an annual General Fund allocation to public art in lieu of the revenue measure dedication, or something else?
- If parcel tax, should it include an exemption for very low income property owners? Should it include an end date?
