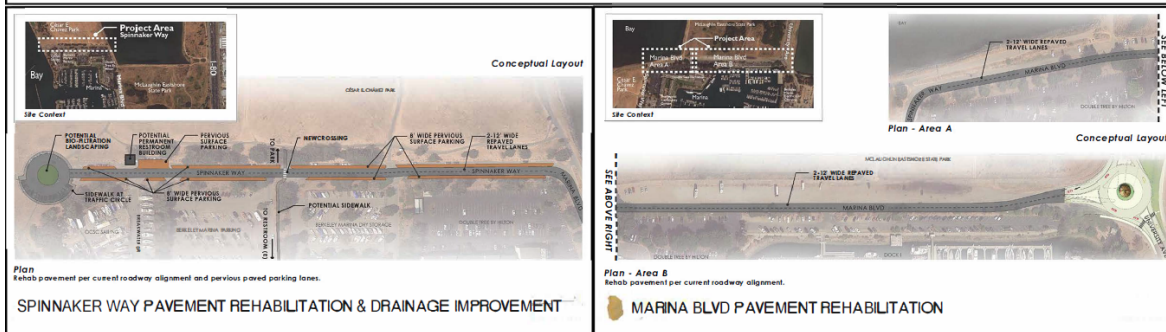

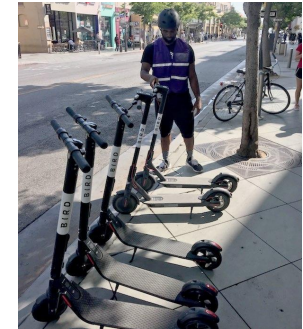
Anyone can report an issue including a damaged vehicle, poor parking and unsafe riding. These reports help identify when additional education or further action is needed

24/7 Support



We are also available for anyone in the community 24/7 via phone and email to help anyone in the community. Integrate complaints through city channels to come directly to Bird.

Bird Watchers



Bird will dedicate **full time Bird Watchers to help monitor the fleet**. These local employees are dedicated to engaging with the community to educate them on safe riding practices, moving Birds that are parked improperly, and ensuring everything is in order.

Case Study: Portland, Oregon

In January, 2019, the Portland Bureau of Transportation (PBOT) released its much anticipated 2018 E-Scooter Findings Report. PBOT concluded that shared e-scooters are just as safe as other modes of transportation.

“

After reviewing emergency department and urgent care clinic data, we found that e-scooters have risks similar to other parts of the transportation system.

We did not find a disproportionate risk that would discourage the city from allowing a scooter ride-share pilot.

Key Findings:

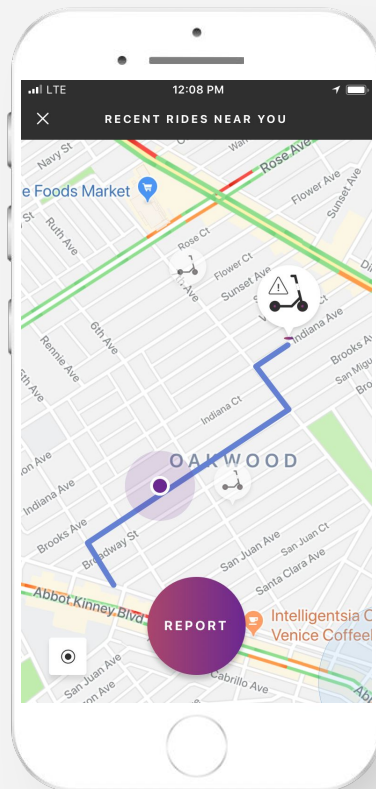
- Sidewalk riding was more than **4x less prevalent** on streets with protected bike lanes
- After more than **700,000 trips**, there were only **2 reports** of pedestrian injury and no indication that either was severe
- As many crashes were linked to driving, Portland highlighted **increased e-scooter ridership would lead to safer streets.**



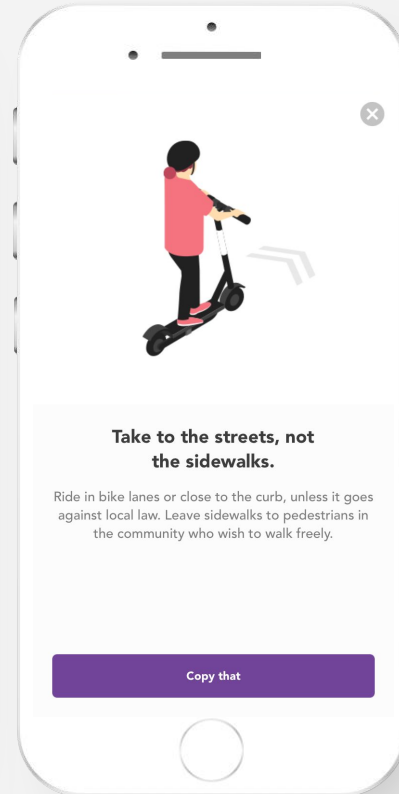
With 34 percent of Portland scooter riders stating they replaced car trips with e-scooter trips, an increase in e-scooter use has the potential to contribute to a reduction in serious injuries and fatalities.

Enforcing good rider behavior

- Allow the community to report riders for irresponsible riding behavior
- Flag riders for sidewalk riding, double riding and underage riding
- Send targeting educational messaging to riders breaking the rules
- Remove repeat offenders from the platform

ATTACHMENT E

Speed-reduction and remote geospeeding capabilities

20% larger wheel size substantially reduces effect of cracks

Semi-pneumatic tires that absorb substantial bumps and don't deflate

50% greater torque for consistent ride speed and redundancy

Requiring kick-start before throttle can be engaged

Always-on blinking red light with increased intervals on stoppage

Side reflectors for visibility from all angles

Non-slip standing surfaces and softened floorbase for improved comfort

Reinforced hardware to prevent failure even during heavy use.

Safety goes beyond just hardware

Our policies help regulate the usage and access of our vehicles to ensure both users and members of the community are able to safely and freely move throughout the city.



Ceasing late night operations, when risk to all road users increases.

Implementing a minimum age requirement and only allowing one Bird to be unlocked per rider account to deter underage riding.



Enabling direct reporting of irresponsible parking behavior through the in-app Community Mode feature.
