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City of Berkeley Independent Redistricting Commission Guest Trainer: Astrid Ochoa April 15, 2021

Astrid Ochoa is owner of Ochoa Consulting, a boutique firm supporting government and nonprofit organizations develop strategies to connect with their constituents and advance their missions. She is an experienced professional in the areas of democracy, redistricting, civic engagement, and network building. Currently, Astrid serves as lecturer in the area of governance and policy at the Humphrey School of Public Affairs for the University of Minnesota. She is the former Executive Director of Future of California Elections; a nonpartisan network of government and nonprofits working to modernize elections and expand voter participation. Previously, Astrid served as Director of State Election Policy and Redistricting at NALEO Educational Fund, where she led the organization's national redistricting strategy, including civic engagement and advocacy.

Astrid sits on the California Secretary of State's Voter's Choice Act Taskforce and was past Co-Chair of the state Language Accessibility Advisory Committee. In 2020, Astrid served on the California Secretary of State November 2020 Taskforce and the California Association of Clerks and Election Officials Taskforce, both focused on planning election administration during the pandemic.

Astrid's leadership in democracy building work was recognized in December 2020 through a resolution presented by then California Secretary of State Alex Padilla. She was also named one of 76 Influencers in the 2018 election cycle by The Sacramento Bee's 2018 Influencer Series.

Astrid holds master's degrees in public affairs and urban and regional planning from the Princeton School of Public and International Affairs at Princeton University and a bachelor's degree in international relations from Pomona College.

COMMUNITIES OF INTEREST RANKS HIGH IN LIST OF CRITERIA

CHARTER ARTICLE V, SECTION 9.5

- f) Criteria for redistricting. Page 3 of 20
- (1) The Commission shall adjust the boundaries of City Council districts in a manner that complies with the Constitution and statutes of the United States and the State of California, in order that the eight City Council districts shall be as nearly equal in population as may be according to the most recent decennial federal census, except where deviation is required to comply with the federal Voting Rights Act.
- (2) In establishing and modifying district boundaries, the Citizens Redistricting Commission shall take into consideration topography, geography, cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity and compactness of territory of the districts, as well as existing **communities of interest** as defined below, and shall utilize easily understood district boundaries such as major traffic arteries and geographic boundaries to the extent they are consistent with communities of interest. The geographic integrity of a neighborhood or community of interest shall be respected to the extent possible without violating State or Federal law or the requirements of this Section. For purposes of this subsection "communities of interest" shall mean the following: A community of interest is a contiguous population which shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation. Such shared interests include but are not limited to those common to areas in which the people share similar living standards, use the same transportation facilities, have similar work opportunities, or have access to the same media of communication relevant to the election process, as well as neighborhoods, students, organized student housing, shared age, and racial demographics. Communities of interest shall not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.
- (3) Districts shall not be drawn for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against an incumbent, political candidate, or political party.
- (4) The Citizens Redistricting Commission may consider existing district boundaries as a basis for developing new district boundaries. Should the Commission deviate substantially in its redistricting plan from the previous district boundaries in order to reflect population growth, protect communities of interest or better comply with the redistricting criteria in the Charter, it shall issue a report explaining its reasons for doing so.
- (5) The Citizens Redistricting Commission shall not consider the residence of sitting Councilmembers.
- (6) If the Citizens Redistricting Commission adopts a redistricting plan that removes the residence of a sitting Councilmember from his or her then-current district, that Councilmember shall continue to serve on the City Council until the expiration of his or her term.

DEFINITION OF A COMMUNITY OF INTEREST CHARTER ARTICLE V, SECTION 9.5

A community of interest is a contiguous population which shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation. Such shared interests include but are not limited to those common to areas in which the people share similar living standards, use the same transportation facilities, have similar work opportunities, or have access to the same media of communication relevant to the election process, as well as neighborhoods, students, organized student housing, shared age, and racial demographics. Communities of interest shall not include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates.





KEY TAKEAWAYS ABOUT COMMUNITIES OF INTEREST

- Community of interest ranks high in list of criteria.
- Preserving communities of interest ensures representation for that community so they can elect their candidates of choice and get the resources they need to thrive.
- Community members are the experts of their communities of interest.



CHARTER REQUIRES ROBUST PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

The Citizens Redistricting Commission shall establish and implement an open process for public input and Commission deliberation that shall be promoted through a thorough outreach program to solicit broad public participation in the redistricting process. All Citizens Redistricting Commission meetings shall be open to the public unless necessary to convene in closed session under California Government Code sections 54950 et seq. Members of the public shall have the opportunity to provide written and oral comments to the Citizens Redistricting Commission. The Commission's process must be designed to provide the widest public access reasonably possible to draft redistricting maps and to provide ample opportunity for the public to observe and participate in the redistricting process.

PRACTICES FOR PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT AND OUTREACH

- Build an understanding of your audience
- Meet people where they are
- Communicate and connect with the public on the importance of redistricting
- Provide several ways for the public to engage in redistricting
- Develop partnerships to amplify your message
- Evaluate and repeat

BUILD AND UNDERSTAND YOUR AUDIENCE

- Understand your constituents. Certain communities may face unique barriers to participation.
 - What languages are spoke in various communities?
 - What formats do people need for accessibility?
 - Which communities are connected digitally? Which are not?
- Understand the needs of your audience
 - When are people available for public meetings?
 - What platforms are most user friendly for public meetings?
 - Zoom, telephone conference line

MEET PEOPLE WHERE THEY ARE

- Bring messages to where people are already receiving information
 - Existing public events, meetings, festivals (online or in-person as pandemic allows)
 - Social service agencies
 - Government communications, i.e. utility bills, notices
 - Social media
 - Traditional media
 - Phone messages, texting

COMMUNICATE AND CONNECT WITH THE PUBLIC ON THE IMPORTANCE OF REDISTRICTING

- Develop plain language education messages that communicate the importance of drawing districting lines and the importance of having residents define their own communities
- Communicate what factors are needed to develop testimony to inform district lines



 - Social service agencies
 - Libraries

EVALUATE AND REPEAT

- Evaluate who you are hearing from. Are you reaching all your constituents?
 - Identify the communities you are not hearing from and develop strategies to reach specific communities
- Evaluate the testimony you are receiving. Does it have the right information?
 - Fine tune outreach materials to solicit geography
- Repeat this process throughout the redistricting cycle to ensure you hear from all communities
