

Redistricting is the process and action of drawing boundaries for electoral districts and school districts that represent us (the people). It happens every 10 years after the Census is conducted.

INDEPENDENT REDISTRICTING COMMISSION


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Redistricting is important because...

- It directly impacts communities' access to political power through elections, which then impacts laws and policies that are voted by the people or by their representatives
- It changes the identity, allegiance, political priorities of a district's representative (i.e., on the economy, environment, zoning, schools, jobs)
- Its effects remain at least for the next ten years


Redistricting in Berkeley and the Independent Redistricting Commission

Brief History of Council Districts in Berkeley

- 2010 Census count
- 2011 to 2014 Redistricting conducted by City Council
 - 2011 Redistricting Process 1: Map not adopted
 - 2012 Charter amended to create more flexibility with district boundaries and add better definitions for redistricting terms
 - 2013 and 2014 Redistricting Process 2: Map adopted, despite referendum; voters approved new districts
- 2016 Measure W1 passed to amend the City's Charter, transferring responsibility for drawing electoral boundaries from the City Council to an Independent Redistricting Commission (the "Commission")
- 2021 Selection of district commissioners and alternates for the Independent Redistricting Commission by lottery; commissioners voted for at-large commissioners and their alternates


Creation of the Independent Redistricting Commission (IRC)




Mandates of the Independent Redistricting Commission



- Reasonably equal population
- U.S. Voting Rights Act
- CA Voting Rights Act
- Districts will be geographically contiguous







Commission may also establish additional criteria that complies with the priorities listed above.



The Independent Redistricting Commission...

- Approves new boundaries without bias or discrimination
- Receives input and maps from the public
- Decides final map boundaries
- Receives support from City of Berkeley IT, Legal, and the City Clerk Departments

- 18 years or older






A Community of Interest is a concentrated population which shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation

Communities of Interest are critical in this process


Identifying COI in Berkeley are the key building blocks the Redistricting Commission will use in developing the new district boundaries

Subject: Independent Redistricting Commission Budget

The City Charter provides that the City Council is required to allocate funds to the Independent Redistricting Commission sufficient to complete the mandated task of redrawing boundaries including public outreach, staff time, and consultants.

Through the Fiscal Year 2021 Budget Cycle and with the use of internal City Clerk funds, the total adopted budget for the Commission is \$111,750. The attached spreadsheet shows the line items for expected expenditures as well as the total amount spent to date. Some of the amounts in the "Spent to Date" fields have not actually been spent, but are treated as such for budget planning purposes.

On June 9, 2021 a commissioner contact staff and stated that he would decline his stipend for the duration of the process. This resulted in approximately \$2,000 in savings that was reallocated to the outreach budget. The \$2,000 was placed in the Paid Advertising line item, but it can be moved to other outreach line items if needed. For the public outreach budget, there are approximately \$10,600 in unspent funds for the remainder of the process.

When evaluating the budget, there are two line items that may yield additional funds that can be allocated to other purposes if the full amount is not spent. The first is the contract with Redistricting Partners. Some funds were saved by conducting Commission trainings virtually instead of in-person, and there are some optional services included in the \$15,000 allocation. However, it is important to note that there may be unforeseen needs and the full amount may be spent for demographer services.

The second area of possible savings is the line item for Maptitude Hourly Services. It is very likely that some of the \$10,000 will be spent for software customization and support services, but there may be some unspent funds in this area that can be used for other needs.

It is important to note that the total budget amount is firmly established at this point. There are possible unknowns in the process that may affect the Commission's budget needs, so it is important to be judicious in the use of funds early in the process to maintain flexibility and an unspent reserve for needs later in the process.

Subject: Status of In-Person Meetings for the Independent Redistricting

Commission

This memorandum provides an update to the status of in-person meetings for legislative bodies in Berkeley. Additional verbal updates may be given at the meeting if conditions change or new regulations are adopted by state or local public health officials.

State and Local Orders

Due to the dynamic nature of the COVID-19 pandemic, it is difficult to predict what the local conditions will be in Berkeley as we move through the summer months. Throughout the pandemic, information from the State has changed rapidly – and often with little notice. The Blueprint for a Safer Economy officially sunset on June 15, however regulations and health recommendations regarding masking and distancing from CalOSHA and the California Department of Public Health remain in place.

Governor Newsom's Executive Order

On March 17, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-29-20. Among other things, this Order waived certain portions of the Brown Act to permit legislative bodies to function safely during the unprecedented pandemic. On June 11, 2021, the Governor issued Executive Order N-08-21 that updated several previously issued Orders. This new order extended the Brown Act exemptions in Order N-29-20 through September 30, 2021. This allows the IRC to continue to meet in virtual-only format through September.

In-Person and Hybrid Meetings

Staff is prepared to hold in-person meetings should local conditions permit. However, hybrid meetings (combining the technology of Zoom with in-person attendees) present unique challenges and are difficult to administer with existing resources. The City would need to address limitations of existing technology, bandwidth at meeting locations, the additional complexity of meeting management for commissioners and attendees, and increased staffing needs to support hybrid meetings. We anticipate the overall experience

will likely result in less satisfactory participatory experiences for the public and the Commission.

As the challenge of hybrid meetings is being discussed not only within the City of Berkeley, but by public agencies throughout California and beyond, we anticipate continued robust dialogue in this area with our peers and will continue to provide information as it becomes available.
