July 10 Public Hearing #1

On July 10, 2021 the Independent Redistricting Commission held its first public hearing. The hearing was focused on educating the public about the redistricting process, soliciting input from the community, and introducing the commissioners to the public.

Despite significant outreach measures and paid advertising, public attendance and participation was fairly limited. During the meeting there were between 15-20 members of the public on the Zoom meeting. There were two public speakers, both of whom only had brief clarifying questions.

While participation was low, general public awareness of the IRC and its work are likely significantly higher than before the hearing due to the following:

- Commission staff sent the public announcement about the meeting with background information directly to over 400 community organizations and groups.
- Prior to the meeting, news items were published in the East Bay Times and the Berkeley Patch.
- Media coverage of the event includes articles in Berkeleyside and the Daily Cal as well as live TV news coverage on NBC News.
- Staff posted paid advertising notices in the Berkeley Voice, Daily Cal, Berkeleyside, Tri-City Post, and East Bay Express.

We are still early in the redistricting process and many people may not have engaged at this time. Summer is also a time when many people are on vacation or engaged in summer recreational activities.

Staff is confident that community interest will increase with the release of Census data in the August-September timeframe, and will increase even more when the IRC starts to consider draft maps for approval. Finally, there will be many more opportunities for public outreach and engagement over the next few months.

Next Steps in the Process

The July 10 meeting was recorded in both English and Spanish. Commission staff has clipped out the presentation portion of the meeting into a 20-minute video. The link to the videos will be sent to the list of 400+ organizations with the Community of Interest Form. Staff will also offer to make individual presentations as requested by community groups.

Staff recently contacted the Ecology Center regarding the status of in-person outreach at the three farmers' markets in Berkeley. Staff was informed that in-person tabling is still not allowed at the farmers markets, but may be reintroduced by the end of July.

The City has executed the contract with Caliper Corporation for the purchase and Implementation of the Maptitude Redistricting Software. Installation, staff training, and configuration is expected to occur in the end of July and beginning of August. The software tools will be introduced to the commission as soon as they are tested and ready for use.

The public submission process is the next significant milestone in the process. The commission will need to begin discussions about the exact dates for the public submission process and the policies governing the submission of maps by the public. Staff is ready to assist in this process.

Subject: Independent Redistricting Commission Budget

The City Charter provides that the City Council is required to allocate funds to the Independent Redistricting Commission sufficient to complete the mandated task of redrawing boundaries including public outreach, staff time, and consultants.

Through the Fiscal Year 2021 Budget Cycle and with the use of internal City Clerk funds, the total adopted budget for the Commission is \$111,750. The attached spreadsheet shows the line items for expected expenditures as well as the total amount spent to date. Some of the amounts in the "Spent to Date" fields have not actually been spent, but are treated as such for budget planning purposes.

On June 9, 2021 a commissioner contact staff and stated that he would decline his stipend for the duration of the process. The \$2,000 in savings was reallocated to the outreach budget in the Paid Advertising line item. A second commissioner has declined the stipend and the resulting \$2,000 savings was placed in the language translation line item to offset interpretation and translation costs. These funds can be moved to other outreach line items if needed.

When evaluating the budget, there are two line items that may yield additional funds that can be allocated to other purposes if the full amount is not spent. The first is the contract with Redistricting Partners. Some funds were saved by conducting Commission trainings virtually instead of in-person, and there are some optional services included in the \$15,000 allocation. However, it is important to note that there may be unforeseen needs and the full amount may be spent for demographer services.

The second area of possible savings is the line item for Maptitude Hourly Services. It is very likely that some of the \$10,000 will be spent for software customization and support services, but there may be some unspent funds in this area that can be used for other needs.

It is important to note that the total budget amount is firmly established at this point. There are possible unknowns in the process that may affect the Commission's budget needs, so it is important to be judicious in the use of funds early in the process to maintain flexibility and an unspent reserve for needs later in the process.

Subject: Status of In-Person Meetings for the Independent Redistricting

Commission

This memorandum provides an update to the status of in-person meetings for legislative bodies in Berkeley. Additional verbal updates may be given at the meeting if conditions change or new regulations are adopted by state or local public health officials.

State and Local Orders

Due to the dynamic nature of the COVID-19 pandemic, it is difficult to predict what the local conditions will be in Berkeley as we move through the summer months. Throughout the pandemic, information from the State has changed rapidly – and often with little notice. The Blueprint for a Safer Economy officially sunset on June 15, however regulations and health recommendations regarding masking and distancing from CalOSHA and the California Department of Public Health remain in place.

Governor Newsom's Executive Order

On March 17, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-29-20. Among other things, this Order waived certain portions of the Brown Act to permit legislative bodies to function safely during the unprecedented pandemic. On June 11, 2021, the Governor issued Executive Order N-08-21 that updated several previously issued Orders. This new order extended the Brown Act exemptions in Order N-29-20 through September 30, 2021. This allows the IRC to continue to meet in virtual-only format through September.

In-Person and Hybrid Meetings

Staff is prepared to hold in-person meetings should local conditions permit. However, hybrid meetings (combining the technology of Zoom with in-person attendees) present unique challenges and are difficult to administer with existing resources. The City would need to address limitations of existing technology, bandwidth at meeting locations, the additional complexity of meeting management for commissioners and attendees, and increased staffing needs to support hybrid meetings. We anticipate the overall experience

will likely result in less satisfactory participatory experiences for the public and the Commission.

As the challenge of hybrid meetings is being discussed not only within the City of Berkeley, but by public agencies throughout California and beyond, we anticipate continued robust dialogue in this area with our peers and will continue to provide information as it becomes available.
