TO PRESERVE AND BEST UTILIZE THE DOWNTOWN BERKELEY MAIN POST  
OFFICE BUILDING

WHEREAS, the United States Postal Service, through its pleadings in *City of Berkeley v Donahoe*, has stated that Berkeley's downtown Post Office at 2000 Allston Way is not for sale, nor are services to be transferred out of that location; and

WHEREAS, the City of Berkeley is no longer engaged in a lawsuit with the United States Postal Service contesting the building's sale; and

WHEREAS, the City of Berkeley, its City Council and its citizens have an abiding interest in preserving their historic downtown Post Office, maintaining and expanding its services and utilizing the space for the public good; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Council of the City of Berkeley that the Mayor and City Council reaffirm their resolution of March 7, 2013, in opposition to the sale of the downtown Berkeley Post Office, and reaffirm that it is not in the best interests of Berkeley's residents that it be sold; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Mayor, City Council, City of Berkeley administration and concerned citizens wish to discuss the future of the downtown Berkeley Post Office with the appropriate United States Postal Service officials; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council instructs the City Manager and/or City Attorney to write a letter to the appropriate United States Postal Service officials, requesting that discussions take place regarding the following non-exclusive topics:

- The return of postal services to 2000 Allston Way, including package pickup of undelivered mail, bulk mail drop-off, and improvements to wait times at this location; and
- The greening of the Berkeley Postal Service, including the return of distribution routes to the downtown facility to save fuel and time, the installation of roof solar panels, and replacing the fleet with fuel-efficient vehicles; and
- The ongoing maintenance and preservation of the building, including needed repairs and an assessment of its structural integrity; and
- The preservation of the landscaping and garden along Milvia Street; and
- Potential best uses of space inside the building that is not needed for Postal Services, including community uses along with revenue-generating tenancies; and

- USPS pilot of a program for Postal Banking, as suggested by the Postal Service Inspector General's report, advocating for and using our locale as an incubator site and hub for a test rollout of the service.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

Refer to the City Manager to update the current paper timesheet payroll system to paperless.

#### BACKGROUND:

Consistent with Berkeley City Council's efforts in adopting paperless programs to increase efficiency and reduce waste, a paperless payroll system will further advance these "green" policy goals. As seen in the Paperless Agenda Packet Program passed in 2013, the council has been able to save around 127,468 pieces of paper (based on 2012 readings) per year. This change will allow for similar savings financially and environmentally.

Upgrading to an online system will also negate the need for retaining many years worth of physical payroll records and prevent accidental misplacements of timesheets. According to Berkeley Municipal Code Section 13.99.060 Notice, Posting and Payroll Records, Section C, the city must retain adequate payroll records for a period of four years and allow the City access to the records, otherwise face possible administrative citation. Online records would eliminate any questions about past timesheet inputs and allow for a more transparent record system.

Many other municipalities have adopted some form of a paperless payroll system. This includes the City and County of San Francisco's ePayroll (CCSF ePayroll) and New York City's Payroll Management System (PMS). Each city utilizes different online payroll programs, but both share similar functions such as the e-Stub feature that makes available electronic pay statements to city employees.

On November 1, 2014, the University of California, Berkeley, moved more than 10,000 UC employees (including students) to CalTime, the campus' automated timekeeping system. CalTime includes extensive training materials available via both online resources and training classes. Video on UC Berkeley's transition to CalTime:

Subject: Refer to City Manager and Planning Commission: Enable Implementation of Council Approved Floor Area Ratio in the Telegraph Commercial District between Dwight and Bancroft by Amending the Zoning Ordinance

### RECOMMENDATION

Refer to City Manager and Planning Commission an immediate implementation strategy to bring the City Zoning Ordinance in compliance with the policy adopted by City Council to increase Floor Area Ratio (FAR) in the Telegraph Commercial District between Dwight and Bancroft.

### BACKGROUND

On April 29, 2014, the Berkeley City Council voted to revise Section 23E.56.070.A.2 of the Zoning Ordinance to allow FAR up to 5.0 in the Telegraph Ave. area between Bancroft Way and Dwight Way.

The motion is currently not being implemented due to conflicting regulations contained in the Berkeley Zoning Ordinance that appear to take precedence over this new policy. Thus, in order to implement the spirit of the council vote, it may be necessary to make adjustments to the Zoning Ordinance to allow for the implementation of this decision.

Housing is desperately needed in close proximity to the UC Berkeley campus, as rents increase and the University population steadily rises. Students, recent graduates, employees of the University and local businesses greatly enrich the community through their presence. Implementing the April 2014 City Council action would provide a place to live for many individuals who would otherwise have to reside elsewhere.

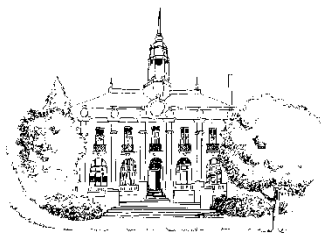

Subject: City Manager Referral: Expanding the City List of Priority Development Areas to Include the Telegraph Commercial District from Dwight to Bancroft

### RECOMMENDATION

Refer to the City Manager a proposal to expand the list of Priority Development Area (PDA) to include the Telegraph Commercial District encompassing the area from Dwight to Bancroft.

### BACKGROUND

Priority development areas seek to accommodate growth as mixed use, infill development near transit and job centers, with an emphasis on housing. Areas to be proposed as a PDA must meet all of the following criteria:

- The area must be within an existing community.
- The area must be near existing or planned fixed transit routes
- The area must be planning for the development of more housing

The City of Berkeley has already designated six Priority Development Areas (PDAs) identified in the *Plan Bay Area* regional plan adopted by the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG)

on July 18, 2013. These PDAs include: South Shattuck Avenue, Telegraph Avenue (South),

University Avenue, San Pablo Avenue, Downtown Area, and the Adeline Corridor.

There already exists a PDA that includes south Telegraph Avenue from Parker Street to Woolsey Street.

This main commercial stretch of Telegraph is currently not contained in any PDA, so in order to increase the likelihood that a comprehensive and environmentally friendly growth plan can be developed and implemented for the street, it is necessary to designate the Telegraph Commercial District a Priority Development Area for the City.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

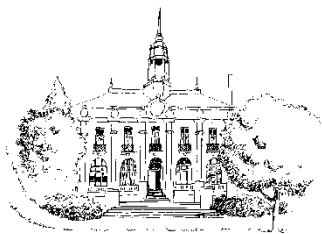
Likely increased revenue for transportation improvements.

Subject: Referral to the City Manager and the Disaster and Fire Safety Commission for Upgrading Gas Generators Currently Being Used in the Community Emergency Supply Program

#### RECOMMENDATION:

Refer to City Manager and the Disaster and Fire Safety Commission (DFSC) to implement upgrades to old emergency supply cache generators to safer and more efficient models.

#### BACKGROUND:

The Community Emergency Supply Program has emergency supply caches in place to help neighborhoods survive during large scale disasters. Currently Berkeley's caches provide a 5000 watt gas generator to citizens in times of emergency. Yet this is neither the safest or most effective form of providing power to people. Gas generators suffer from a shorter shelf life and increased fuel costs, along with a lack of accessibility during power outages due to the potential inability for pumping gas at a station. Furthermore, gas generators are worse for the environment and using propane would be much more sustainable.

This referral proposes that the City replace the current supply of gas generators in the Community Emergency Supply Program with much more efficient and environmentally sound propane generators. This would increase Berkeley's disaster preparedness and allow communities to keep power running even during blackouts. Another option to consider would be implementing a conversion kit allowing the generators to run on gasoline, petroleum, and natural gas. One example: (<http://www.propane-generators.com>).

We request prioritizing upgrades to the existing emergency caches be a high priority for consideration in any upcoming revenue streams

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

Minimal.

ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY:

Propane generators are more environmentally friendly than gasoline generators.

RECOMMENDATION

Forward \$250,000 to Berkeley Unified School District (BUSD) to increase school site programming through the Cooking and Gardening Program in 2015-2016.

FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

\$250,000 of City General Fund will be used to enhance BUSD's Cooking and Gardening Program.

CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS

At its regularly scheduled meeting on 6/3/15, the SSBPPE took the following action:

M/S/C (Scheider/Sinai): Moved that the SSBPPE recommend that the City Council forward \$250,000 to Berkeley Unified School District to ensure that total school site programming offered to students through the Cooking and Gardening Program for 2015-2016 exceeds that which was supported by the District in 2014-2015, with the requirement that the District provide a written year-end report that includes 1) how these funds enhanced the program, and 2) how the nutrition curriculum incorporates the health impacts of sugary drinks.

BACKGROUND

In November 2014 Berkeley voters approved Measure D, establishing a tax on sugar-sweetened beverage distribution in the City. This is the first such tax to be implemented in this country. The SSBPPE is charged with making "recommendations on how and to

what extent the City should establish and/or fund programs to reduce the consumption of sugar-sweetened beverages in Berkeley and to address the effects of such consumption” (BMC 7.72.090).

At Council’s regularly scheduled meeting on 5/12/15 Council approved the following recommendation:

From: Councilmembers Capitelli and Maio

Recommendation:

1. Allocate \$500,000 from the General Fund Reserve to forward fund recommendations by the POE (Sugar Sweetened Beverage Panel of Experts) to healthy child/family community based programs.
2. Request that the POE recommend 50% of this amount (\$250,000) to be forwarded to the Berkeley Unified School District to ensure that total school site programming offered to students through the Cooking and Gardening Program for 2015-16 exceeds that which was supported by the District in 2014-15.
3. Request that the POE establish procedures which will result in recommendations to the council for the expenditure of the remaining funds. Such recommendations to be forwarded to council by October 1, 2015.
4. Funds to be repaid to the General Fund Reserve as revenues from Measure D are collected.

The SSBPPE’s recommendation to allocate funding to BUSD, in accordance with Council’s recommendation, is a first step toward mobilizing City resources to quickly and effectively begin translating this new tax initiative into meaningful impact on community health.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

No specific environmental sustainability effect is anticipated from this recommendation. To the extent that it encourages students to embrace gardening and locally-sourced produce, it may in the long term contribute to sustainable approaches to food and nutrition.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

BUSD’s Cooking and Gardening Program is well-established and this additional support will allow for broader impact of the program and greater benefit for BUSD students.

#### ALTERNATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED

The SSBPPE considered delaying funding recommendations until a process has been established for making those recommendations. This would result in losing the opportunity to supplement the Cooking and Gardening Program in school year 2015-16, which the commission considered unacceptable.



CITY MANAGER

The City Manager has submitted an Action item on the 6/30/15 Council agenda to enter into an expenditure contract with BUSD for FY 2016 in the amount of \$250,000 for the Cooking and Gardening Program.
