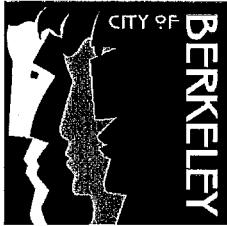

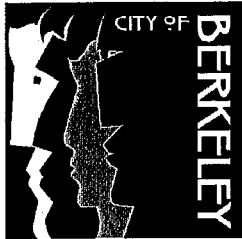

Subject: Request from Bay Area Migrant Welcome Committee for City of Berkeley welcome and contributions to accompany these migrant asylum seekers to the US and specifically to the Bay Area.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve a resolution to approve the expenditure of an amount not to exceed \$250 per Councilmember, including \$150 from Councilmember Cheryl Davila, to the Bay Area Migrant Welcome Committee for funds to be delivered directly to those traveling as part of the caravan with funds relinquished to the City's general fund for this purpose from the discretionary Council Office Budgets of Councilmember Davila and any other Councilmembers who would like to contribute. The funds will support with food, shelter and basic necessities they are detained at ports of entry and those permitted travel to cities for immigration hearings, including the Bay Area.

FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

No General Fund impact; \$150 is available from Councilmember Cheryl Davila's Council Office Budget discretionary account (budget code 011-11-102-411-6).

In support of Berkeley's Sanctuary City status, Berkeley should be in the lead of welcoming the caravan of migrants who departed from San Pedro Sula, Honduras on foot on October 12, 2018 citing persecution, violence and grinding poverty as motivating factors for their collective decision to embark on a courageous journey North. The caravan includes a large number of women, children and LGBTQ participants who are fleeing for their survival and safety.

This caravan has inspired others in Guatemala, El Salvador, and Mexico, fleeing similar situations, to join them thus strengthening their numbers and collective safety en route to the US- Mexico border. The caravan is now 6,000 strong, has departed Mexico City and is headed to various ports of entry along the California border, including San Ysidro and Otay Mesa. When they arrive they are likely to be detained and are without resources to support food, shelter and other basic necessities. Those permitted to enter will travel to various cities for immigration hearings, including the Bay Area. This includes 76 LGTBQ asylum seekers who arrived in Tijuana on November 11, 2018 and are seeking a hearing in the Bay Area.

In anticipation of the the arrival of these asylum seekers, the Trump Administration has radically altered US policy regarding asylum, thus shutting the door to legitimate asylum claims from people fleeing gang violence, extortion and persecution in their home countries. Against this callous act, the Bay Area Migrant Welcome Committee is joining hundreds of thousands of organizations, networks and communities organizing in solidarity with the caravan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council of the City of Berkeley demands that the federal administration recognize, guarantee and protect the legal right of refugees to seek and receive asylum in the United States, a right enshrined in domestic and international law, and develop differentiated care and protection plans for children and adolescents, women, LGBTQ persons, the elderly, persons with disabilities, indigenous peoples, Afro-descendants, and any person who is in a situation of special vulnerability.
