This meeting will be conducted in accordance with the Brown Act, Government Code Section 54953 and applicable Executive Orders as issued by the Governor that are currently in effect. Any member of the public may attend this meeting. Questions regarding public participation may be addressed to the City Clerk Department (510) 981-6900. The City Council may take action related to any subject listed on the Agenda.

Pursuant to the City Council Rules of Procedure and State Law, the presiding officer may remove, or cause the removal of, an individual for disrupting the meeting. Prior to removing an individual, the presiding officer shall warn the individual that their behavior is disrupting the meeting and that their failure to cease their behavior may result in their removal. The presiding officer may then remove the individual if they do not promptly cease their disruptive behavior. "Disrupting" means engaging in behavior during a meeting of a legislative body that actually disrupts, disturbs, impedes, or renders infeasible the orderly conduct of the meeting and includes, but is not limited to, a failure to comply with reasonable and lawful regulations adopted by a legislative body, or engaging in behavior that constitutes use of force or a true threat of force.

### **Preliminary Matters**

#### Roll Call:

Land Acknowledgement Statement: The City of Berkeley recognizes that the community we live in was built on the territory of xučyun (Huchiun (Hooch-yoon)), the ancestral and unceded land of the Chochenyo (Cho-chen-yo)-speaking Ohlone (Oh-low-nee) people, the ancestors and descendants of the sovereign Verona Band of Alameda County. This land was and continues to be of great importance to all of the Ohlone Tribes and descendants of the Verona Band. As we begin our meeting tonight, we acknowledge and honor the original inhabitants of Berkeley, the documented 5,000-year history of a vibrant community at the West Berkeley Shellmound, and the Ohlone people who continue to reside in the East Bay. We recognize that Berkeley's residents have and continue to benefit from the use and occupation of this unceded stolen land since the City of Berkeley's incorporation in 1878. As stewards of the laws regulating the City of Berkeley, it is not only vital that we recognize the history of this land, but also recognize that the Ohlone people are present members of Berkeley and other East Bay communities today. The City of Berkeley will continue to build relationships with the Lisjan Tribe and to create meaningful actions that uphold the intention of this land acknowledgement.

**Ceremonial Matters:** In addition to those items listed on the agenda, the Mayor may add additional ceremonial matters.

**City Manager Comments:** The City Manager may make announcements or provide information to the City Council in the form of an oral report. The Council will not take action on such items but may request the City Manager place a report on a future agenda for discussion.

**Public Comment on Non-Agenda Matters:** Persons will be selected to address matters not on the Council agenda. If five or fewer persons wish to speak, each person selected will be allotted two minutes each. If more than five persons wish to speak, up to ten persons will be selected to address matters not on the Council agenda and each person selected will be allotted one minute each. Persons attending the meeting in-person and wishing to address the Council on matters not on the Council agenda during the initial ten-minute period for such comment, must submit a speaker card to the City Clerk in person at the meeting location and prior to commencement of that meeting. The remainder of the speakers wishing to address the Council on non-agenda items will be heard at the end of the agenda.

Public Comment by Employee Unions (first regular meeting of the month): This period of public comment is reserved for officially designated representatives of City of Berkeley employee unions, with five minutes allocated per union if representatives of three or fewer unions wish to speak and up to three minutes per union if representatives of four or more unions wish to speak.

#### **Consent Calendar**

The Council will first determine whether to move items on the agenda for "Action" or "Information" to the "Consent Calendar", or move "Consent Calendar" items to "Action." Three members of the City Council must agree to pull an item from the Consent Calendar or Information Calendar for it to move to Action. Items that remain on the "Consent Calendar" are voted on in one motion as a group. "Information" items are not discussed or acted upon at the Council meeting unless they are moved to "Action" or "Consent".

No additional items can be moved onto the Consent Calendar once public comment has commenced. At any time during, or immediately after, public comment on Information and Consent items, any Councilmember may move any Information or Consent item to "Action." Following this, the Council will vote on the items remaining on the Consent Calendar in one motion.

For items moved to the Action Calendar from the Consent Calendar or Information Calendar, persons who spoke on the item during the Consent Calendar public comment period may speak again at the time the matter is taken up during the Action Calendar.

**Public Comment on Consent Calendar and Information Items Only:** The Council will take public comment on any items that are either on the amended Consent Calendar or the Information Calendar. Speakers will be entitled to two minutes each to speak in opposition to or support of Consent Calendar and Information Items. A speaker may only speak once during the period for public comment on Consent Calendar and Information items.

Additional information regarding public comment by City of Berkeley employees and interns: Employees and interns of the City of Berkeley, although not required, are encouraged to identify themselves as such, the department in which they work and state whether they are speaking as an individual or in their official capacity when addressing the Council in open session or workshops.

**Recommendation:** Refer to the City Manager to issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) for the development of the city-owned West Berkeley Service Center, (1900 Sixth Street), to permit site acquisition and construction of a 100-percent affordable housing project with the following key features: -Space on the ground floor of the building for administrative offices, community space and supportive services as currently provided by the City; -Maximizing the number of units under the existing zoning Mixed Use-Residential (MU-R) in conjunction with state law AB 1763 (2019); -A mix of unit sizes, including studios, one-bedroom, and two-bedroom units; -Require RFP applicants to include a plan for services provision and integration for the population(s) they propose to serve; -A preference for serving seniors and adults with mental health conditions while maintaining flexibility to serve other populations based on availability of funding.

The City Manager should also consider the feasibility of the following elements in the program design: -Universally designed housing for older adults with a portion of the units for assisted living and memory care; -A board and care facility with a minimum of 20 beds including space for staff and services; -Explore available federal, state, regional, local and private funding sources to finance the construction of a housing project, including with the potential target populations.

The issuance of an RFP should be timed to happen soon after funding for the development has been identified.

Refer to the FY2025 Budget Process \$50,000 to support the installation of fixed or purchase of portable public chess/game tables on Telegraph Avenue, including at or near the intersection of Telegraph and Haste Streets, and potentially elsewhere in Berkeley to support development of a citywide chess & games facility.
  - 2. Refer to the City Manager to explore the potential development of a parklet at or near the Telegraph/Haste intersection, potentially near the South/West corner (beyond the yellow loading area on Haste Street) and other potential locations for a parklet that could accommodate chess/game tables and the volume of community participation this activity generates. Staff should consider who is the appropriate entity to finance such an improvement.
  - 3. Refer to the City Manager the development of a city-wide chess and game facilities program to integrate permanent chess/game nodes into park, curtilage, and/or sidewalk areas throughout Berkeley in a manner that encourages broad participation in and enjoyment of games and supports the building of community around these activities. Consider appropriate locations for nodes, installation of Cityowned facilities, rules and regulations for use, and maintenance.
  - 4. Direct the City Manager to explore entering into negotiations with the property owner at 2454 Telegraph Avenue to achieve an agreement that would result in upgrades and improvements to the building exterior/facade, create a landscaped perimeter around the exposed entry area, improve maintenance, and/or similar terms, in exchange for a reduction/waiver of accumulated fees.

The public may comment on each item listed on the agenda for action. For items moved to the Action Calendar from the Consent Calendar or Information Calendar, persons who spoke on the item during the Consent Calendar public comment period may speak again during one of the Action Calendar public comment periods on the item. Public comment will occur for each Action item (excluding public hearings, appeals, and/or quasi-judicial matters) in one of two comment periods, either 1) before the Action Calendar is discussed; or 2) when the item is taken up by the Council.

A member of the public may only speak at one of the two public comment periods for any single Action item.

The Presiding Officer will request that persons wishing to speak line up at the podium, or use the "raise hand" function in Zoom, to determine the number of persons interested in speaking at that time. Up to ten (10) speakers may speak for two minutes. If there are more than ten persons interested in speaking, the Presiding Officer may limit the public comment for all speakers to one minute per speaker. Speakers are permitted to yield their time to one other speaker, however no one speaker shall have more than four minutes. The Presiding Officer may, with the consent of persons representing both sides of an issue, allocate a block of time to each side to present their issue.

Action items may be reordered at the discretion of the Chair with the consent of Council.

#### Action Calendar - Scheduled Public Comment Period

During this public comment period, the Presiding Officer will open and close a comment period for each Action item on this agenda (excluding any public hearings, appeals, and/or quasi-judicial matters). The public may speak on each item. Those who speak on an item during this comment period may not speak a second time when the item is taken up by Council.

### **Action Calendar – Public Hearings**

Staff shall introduce the public hearing item and present their comments. For certain hearings, this is followed by five-minute presentations each by the appellant and applicant. The Presiding Officer will request that persons wishing to speak line up at the podium, or use the "raise hand" function in Zoom, to be recognized and to determine the number of persons interested in speaking at that time.

Up to ten (10) speakers may speak for two minutes. If there are more than ten persons interested in speaking, the Presiding Officer may limit the public comment for all speakers to one minute per speaker. Speakers are permitted to yield their time to one other speaker, however no one speaker shall have more than four minutes. The Presiding Officer may with the consent of persons representing both sides of an issue allocate a block of time to each side to present their issue.

When applicable, each member of the City Council shall verbally disclose all ex parte contacts concerning the subject of the hearing. Councilmembers shall also submit a report of such contacts in writing prior to the commencement of the hearing. Written reports shall be available for public review in the office of the City Clerk.



This land was and continues to be of great importance to all of the Ohlone Tribes and descendants of the Verona Band. As we begin our meeting tonight, we acknowledge and honor the original inhabitants of Berkeley, the documented 5,000-year history of a vibrant community at the West Berkeley Shellmound, and the Ohlone people who continue to reside in the East Bay. We recognize that Berkeley's residents have and continue to benefit from the use and occupation of this unceded stolen land since the City of Berkeley's incorporation in 1878. As stewards of the laws regulating the City of Berkeley, it is not only vital that we recognize the history of this land, but also recognize that the Ohlone people are present members of Berkeley and other East Bay communities today. The City of Berkeley will continue to build relationships with the Lisjan Tribe and to create meaningful actions that uphold the intention of this land acknowledgement.

Subject: California For All Animals Grant Award

#### RECOMMENDATION

Adopt a Resolution authorizing the City Manager to receive a \$60,000 California For All Animals grant award from the Koret Shelter Medicine Program at UC Davis and to enter into contract and all necessary amendments with the Regents of the University of California resulting from this funding.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

Approving this recommendation will result in \$60,000 being deposited and expended from the One-Time: Non Capital Expenditure Fund and will be appropriated as part of the Second Amendment to the FY 2024 Annual Appropriations Ordinance.

#### **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

Despite dedicated efforts by the City of Berkeley and Berkeley Animal Care Services, financial barriers continue to hinder adoption and reunification processes, leading to the unfortunate euthanasia of healthy, adoptable animals. These barriers are also evident in the unhoused community, where individuals often find themselves prioritizing animal care over their own needs. To help keep animals out of the shelter, staff completed and submitted an application on September 29, 2023, for \$118,885 in funding to support one year of subsidized fees and target outreach to unhoused animal owners. The narrow time frame between the announcement of this grant opportunity and the application deadline made it challenging to seek Council's permission within the available window.

The City's Animal Care Services team, managed by the Neighborhood Services Division in the City Manager's Office, proposes to work with owners and adopters of animals in Berkeley to eliminate the financial barriers caused by Adoption and Return-To-Owner fees. The goal of this funding is to minimize shelter occupancy, thereby reducing the need to euthanize healthy animals due to space constraints. Additionally, the team is committed to working with the unhoused community, ensuring that their animals receive necessary veterinary care and nutrition.

The City's application was awarded \$60,000 by California For All Animals on December 8, to be fully expended by December 31, 2024. To assist animal owners in Berkeley effectively and meet this deadline, it is crucial for the City Council to swiftly adopt a resolution authorizing the receipt of these funds.

#### **BACKGROUND**

In the FY 2020-21 budget, Governor Newsom proposed \$50 million in one-time General Fund dollars for the UC Davis Koret Shelter Medicine Program (UCD-KSMP) to develop a program that provides expertise, support, and local assistance grants over a five-year period to help local communities achieve the state's policy goal that no adoptable or treatable dog or cat should be euthanized.

On September 15, 2023, California For All Animals, a program initiated by UCD-KSMP, began accepting applications for the More Pets and People Together Grant. This application period, lasting for 15 days, concluded on September 29, 2023. Given the brief duration of the application window, the opportunity to present this matter to the Council for formal approval was limited. However, recognizing the importance and potential benefits of this funding, the decision was made to proceed promptly with the application to ensure that we could capitalize on this opportunity to support our community's animal care needs. The California For All Animals Advisory Council unanimously approved Berkeley Animal Services' grant proposal at their November meeting. The \$60,000 awarded by the Advisory Council is designated as follows:

Subsidized adoption fees \$15,000 Subsidized return-to-home fees \$30,000 Target pet assistance \$15,000

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

Targeted outreach to unhoused animal owners is a crucial step towards mitigating the spread of infectious diseases among animals, especially in encampment areas. By equipping owners with essential resources like proper food storage and animal waste containers, we significantly minimize vector hazards, an essential aspect of public health and environmental care. Moreover, maintaining animals in homes rather than shelters not only promotes animal welfare but also aligns with our environmental goals. This approach substantially reduces the water consumption required for shelter maintenance, which is a critical consideration in our ongoing efforts to conserve resources and address climate impacts.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

Berkeley Animal Care Services is navigating a significant uptick in animal intake, anticipating over 2,000 animals for the first time since 2018. This surge, coupled with a 10% decrease in adoptions from 2022 and a 14% decrease in Return-To-Owners compared to the five-year average, mirrors national trends in animal sheltering. This situation is not unique to Berkeley or the Bay Area; it reflects a broader, urgent challenge

in animal welfare. At this critical juncture, our commitment to the animals in our community is more vital than ever, as evidenced by our endeavors to reduce the euthanasia rate, which, notably, has decreased by 5% this year from 2022 and the five-year average, despite these formidable challenges.

Faced with limited resources to combat overcrowding and prevent unnecessary euthanasia, the urgency of implementing a proactive strategy to keep pets and their people together becomes clear. This urgency, in turn, drives our actions and decisions, emphasizing the need for swift, decisive steps to address this growing concern. Our response, therefore, aligns not only with our commitment to animal welfare but also with the necessity to act promptly in the face of escalating challenges.

#### ALTERNATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED

Alternate city funding could be considered, and/or the subsidization of fees and targeted outreach could be suspended.

#### ACCEPTING THE CALIFORNIA FOR ALL ANIMALS GRANT AWARD

WHEREAS, in the FY 2020-21 budget, Governor Newsom proposed \$50 million in one-time General Fund dollars for the UC Davis Koret Shelter Medicine Program (UCD-KSMP) to develop a program that provides expertise, support, and local assistance grants over a five-year period to help local communities achieve the state's policy goal that no adoptable or treatable dog or cat should be euthanized.

WHEREAS, on September 29, 2023, staff submitted a grant application to California For All Animals requesting funds to keep more pets and people together; and

WHEREAS, staff propose the subsidization of Adoption and Return-To-Owner fees and target outreach to unhoused pet owners; and

WHEREAS, the City's Animal Services will partner with the City's Homeless Response Team and local animal welfare organizations to identify unhoused communities with animals in need of outreach; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager was notified on December 8, 2023, that the city's California For All Animals application will be funded, supporting one year of waived Adoption and Return-To-Owner fees and outreach.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the City of Berkeley authorizes the City Manager to accept and receive an award from UCD-KSMP California For All Animals and to enter into contract and all necessary amendments with the Regents of The University of California for \$60,000 in grant funding, with funds to be appropriated in the Second Amendment to the FY 2024 Annual Appropriations Ordinance.

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#### SHELTER SERVICES AGREEMENT

(Berkeley Animal Care Services)

THIS SHELTER SERVICES AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of the date last signed below by and between THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA ("University") on behalf of its Davis Campus School of Veterinary Medicine on behalf of its Koret Shelter Medicine Program ("Facility") and BERKELEY ANIMAL CARE SERVICES ("Shelter") in connection with the California for All Animals statewide animal shelter assistance program ("Program").

The parties agree as follows:

- 1. **Shelter Services.** Shelter shall adhere to the scope of work described in "**Exhibit A**", attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof (collectively the "**Services**"). University shall reimburse Shelter for costs ("**Expenses**") pursuant to Section 2 below and as outlined in Exhibit A. "**Deliverables**" shall consist of report(s) and photographs, as applicable, as more fully described in Exhibit A. Additional work shall be performed only if authorized in advance by written amendment to this Agreement executed by both parties. To the extent that any provision of Exhibit A is inconsistent with this Agreement, this Agreement shall take precedence.
- 2. **Payment by University.** In consideration of Shelter's Expenses as described in Exhibit A, Facility shall pay Shelter an amount not to exceed \$60,000 upon invoice from Shelter and final signature of this Agreement. Payment questions should be addressed to Nancy Bei at telephone number (530) 754-9183 or at e-mail address nmbei@ucdavis.edu.
- 3. **Term.** Services shall be rendered from January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2024.
- 4. **Endorsement Disclaimer.** Nothing in this agreement shall be interpreted to indicate, imply, or otherwise suggest (i) that University supports, endorses, favors, or advances, any product or service offered, connected, or affiliated with Shelter; or (ii) that University endorses, favors, supports, or opposes, any proposal, measure, program of action, campaign, or public appeal that is advocated, promoted, advanced, or opposed by any other person or entity with respect to the subject matter presented by Shelter.
- 5. **Amendment.** This Agreement may be amended at any time by amendment in writing and signed by the parties, and no other change in any term or condition shall be valid or binding unless made by amendment.
- 6. **Mutual Indemnification.** The parties agree to defend, indemnify and hold one another harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages arising from the performance of this agreement, but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of the indemnifying party, its officers, agents, students, or employees.

- 7. **Insurance.** The parties at their own respective costs shall carry sufficient insurance, or programs of self-insurance (general liability, workers' compensation, and auto liability), adequate to cover any claims arising from their respective activities under this Agreement.
- 8. **Force Majeure.** Neither party shall be liable for damages suffered by the other party because of University's or Shelter's failure to perform if failure is due to any cause beyond that party's control.
- 9. **Relationship of the Parties**. The parties to this Agreement shall be and remain at all times independent contractors, neither being the employee, agent, or representative of the other in their relationship under this Agreement.
- 10. **Use of University's Name.** Shelter shall not use the name or mark of University in any form or manner in advertisements, reports, or other information released to the public without the prior written approval of University.
- 11. **Contract Compliance.** As applicable, if this Agreement is funded wholly or in part with by a grant or contract from an agency of any state or federal government, Shelter shall comply with all terms and conditions applicable to recipients of such funds and their contractors.
- 12. **Notice.** Any notice, request, or inquiry regarding the provisions of this Agreement, its termination, or similar matters shall be directed to the appropriate party at the following address:

- 13. **University's Right to Use Data.** University shall have the unrestricted right to use for its own purposes, including publication, any data or information which may be developed, provided by or arising in connection with the performance of this Agreement.
- 14. **Governing Law.** This Agreement shall be construed pursuant to California law.

- 15. **Federal Exclusion Warranty.** Shelter warrants that it is not excluded from participation in any governmental sponsored program, including, without limitation, the Medicare, Medicaid, or Champus programs (http://exclusions.oig.hhs.gov/search.html) and the Federal Procurement and Nonprocurement Programs (https://www.sam.gov/index.html/##11#1). This agreement shall be subject to immediate termination in the event that Shelter is excluded from participation in any federal healthcare or procurement program.
- 16. Audit Requirements. The Agreement, and any pertinent records involving activities related to the services provided pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, shall be subject to the examination and audit of the California State Auditor and any other duly authorized agents of the State of California for a period of three (3) years after the date of final payment hereunder. Shelter hereby agrees to make all such records available during normal business hours to inspection, audit and reproduction by University and any duly authorized local, state and/or federal agencies. Any and all examinations and audits conducted hereunder shall be strictly confined to those matters connected with the performance of this Agreement, including, without limitation, the costs associated with the administration of this Agreement.
- 17. **Termination.** University may terminate this Agreement at any time by giving Shelter thirty (30) calendar days' written notice of such action. If this Agreement is terminated, Shelter shall retain any funds expended or committed for the purposes of this Agreement and will return any unexpended funds.
- 18. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding of the parties respecting the subject matter hereof and supersedes any prior understanding or agreement between them, written or oral, regarding the same subject matter.

#### Scope of Work

Subject: Contract No. R9710 Amendment: City of Piedmont for Animal Services

#### RECOMMENDATION

Adopt a Resolution authorizing the City Manager to amend an existing contract number R9710 and any amendments with the City of Piedmont for Berkeley Animal Care Services (BACS) to provide animal sheltering and certain animal care services to the City of Piedmont. For these services the City of Piedmont will pay the City of Berkeley an amount not to exceed \$196,572 for services performed from FY2024 through FY2026. This adjustment will result in a revised maximum total contract amount of \$708,388.45.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

The FY2023 budget already includes anticipated revenues of \$88,014 from the City of Piedmont for animal care services. The estimated costs for the City of Berkeley to provide shelter operations to the City of Piedmont are projected at \$57,975 for FY2024, \$65,222 for FY2025, and \$73,375 for FY2026. This amounts to a total not-to-exceed (NTE) sum of \$196,572 over the three-year period, culminating in a new NTE total contract amount of \$708,388.45. The City of Piedmont will reimburse the City of Berkeley for these additional estimated costs, and the revenues will be allocated to the General Fund under account 010-0704-345-4202.

#### CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS

For many years, the City of Berkley has provided specific animal care and sheltering services to the City of Piedmont. The existing contract between the City of Berkeley and the City of Piedmont is set to expire on 6/30/2025, which now gives the City an opportunity to renegotiate the terms of the contract to cover the additional estimated costs.

In the past, the City of Emeryville obtained animal services through their agreement with the City of Piedmont. However, this contract has recently been terminated. This termination altered the service provision to Emeryville, leading both Emeryville and Piedmont to seek direct animal care services from Berkeley Animal Care Services (BACS). The City Council has already approved a separate contract with Emeryville for

these services.

Notably, the City of Piedmont lacks its own facility for animal sheltering and relies heavily on BACS for this essential service. Given these changes and the evolving needs of the involved cities, it has become imperative for the City of Berkeley to renegotiate both the costs and the scope of the services with the City of Piedmont, necessitating an amendment to the current contract.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The City of Piedmont, lacking a dedicated Animal Shelter, requires external assistance in providing care and shelter for animals within its jurisdiction that are in need by reason of accident, sickness or being lost, stray or abandoned. In October of 2023, the Cities of Emeryville and Piedmont ended their mutual contract for animal care services. This termination prompted the need for a revised contract between Piedmont and Berkeley Animal Care Services (BACS), to adjust the scope of services provided. Additionally, on October 3, 2023, Council approved a new contract between Emeryville and BACS. This development reflects the evolving landscape of regional animal care services and the need for tailored agreements to address specific municipal needs.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

The City of Berkeley possesses the necessary facilities, resources, and expertise to provide the aforementioned animal care and sheltering services for the City of Piedmont. This capability is backed by a long-standing contractual relationship between the two cities, demonstrating Berkeley's proven track record in efficiently and effectively delivering these services.

Subject: Extension of Declaration of Homeless Shelter Crisis

#### RECOMMENDATION

Adopt a Resolution extending Resolution No. 70,179 – N.S., extending the declaration of a Homeless Shelter Crisis until January 17, 2029.

#### BACKGROUND

The entire State of California, which has roughly 13% of the nation's general population but half of the nation's unsheltered homeless population, has been grappling with an affordable housing and shelter crisis. In response to the city's shelter crisis and severe shortage of beds, on January 19, 2016, the Berkeley City Council unanimously approved Resolution No. 67,357-N.S., Declaring a Shelter Crisis in Berkeley. Originally set to expire on January 19, 2017, the Resolution has been extended multiple times (most recently Resolution No. 70,179-N.S. on January 18, 2022, extending it to January 19, 2024).

Since the passage of the last shelter crisis declaration extension, there have been several important developments that justify yet another extension of this resolution. The latest federal Point-in-Time homeless count in Alameda County, conducted in January 2022, demonstrated important progress on solving homelessness in Berkeley, including an overall decrease in homelessness of 5%, and a 1% decrease in unsheltered homelessness in particular between January 2019 and January 2022. Nevertheless, the overall proportion of unsheltered homelessness amongst the homeless population in Berkeley increased from 73% to 76% over the same period of time—meaning that while fewer people are experiencing homelessness overall, a growing number of those that do become homeless are unable to access shelter. Since then, the city has returned its congregate shelter capacity—which suffered a capacity loss of roughly 50% during the pandemic to comply with CDC physical distancing guidelines—to pre-pandemic levels, but many of these beds are top bunks, which can be difficult to access for the 33% of the homeless population that reports a physical disability. In response to the overall declining interest in congregate shelter since the pandemic, city staff have capitalized on emerging state funding opportunities and have

brought in close to \$10M in Encampment Resolution Funding grants to establish three new non-congregate shelters for encampments in the last 18 months. This is a noteworthy feat for a city that otherwise is considered too small to receive direct state homeless funding, even though the rate at which people are becoming unsheltered is outpacing the rate of our work to respond to it.

In July 2021, the City Council adopted the All Home Regional Action Plan, committing Berkeley to an ambitious 75% reduction in unsheltered homelessness over three years. Given the extensive remaining need on the street, and in order to meet the spirit of urgency reflected in the adoption of the Regional Action Plan, staff requests another extension of the shelter crisis declaration, which will allow the city to continue our efforts to respond to the crisis. To do so as quickly and efficiently as possible, the proposed resolution would continue the previous flexibilities and waivers (including non-voter approved purchasing and bid requirements). Based on recent experiences and administrative workload increases, it recommends granting the following two additional flexibilities:

- Waiving the City Manager's expenditure authority limit up to \$250,000 for the procurement of homeless services. The vast majority of homeless services contracts in the City exceed this threshold limit, but some flexibility for smaller contracts will increase staff's efficiency in acting quickly.
- Authorizing the City Manager to apply for and accept funding and grants from the County, State, and Federal governments for the provision of homeless services. As the city becomes increasingly competitive for these grant programs—which increasingly have short application windows—waiver of formal Council approval in seeking these funding opportunities will again increase staff's efficiency in acting quickly.

All changes from the current version of the shelter crisis resolution are redlined in Attachment 2, to clearly highlight recommended edits and additions.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Continuing Berkeley's shelter crisis may have the effect of expediting access and use of new and future State homelessness resources. It may also reduce the burden on staff time by streamlining project approvals.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS

Maintaining or increasing interim housing capacity will reduce the impacts of temporary encampments, which in turn helps mitigate the impacts of encampments and unsheltered homelessness on Berkeley's environment, notably its sensitive waterways and fire-prone areas.

## EXTENSION OF DECLARATION OF HOMELESS SHELTER CRISIS

WHEREAS, on January 19, 2016, the City Council unanimously passed Resolution No. 67,357-N.S., Declaring a Homeless Shelter Crisis in Berkeley, which was set to expire on January 19, 2017; and

WHEREAS, on November 15, 2016, the City Council passed Resolution No. 67,746-N.S., extending the previous Resolution to January 19, 2018; and

WHEREAS, on October 31, 2017, the City Council passed Resolution No. 68,206-N.S., placing another extension until January 19, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on June 12, 2018, the City Council enacted Ordinance No. 7,613-N.S., setting forth reasonable local standards and procedures for the design, site development, and operation of homeless shelters and the structures and facilities therein; and

WHEREAS, on November 19, 2019, the City Council passed Resolution No. 69,189-N.S., extending the previous Resolution to January 2022; and

WHEREAS, on January 18, 2022, the City Council passed Resolution No. 70,179-N.S., extending the previous Resolution to January, 2024; and

WHEREAS, according to the last Alameda County Point-in-Time homeless count in January 2022, the homeless population decreased 5% from 2019 levels to 1,057 people, but over the same time period saw an increase of 70% in tent homelessness; and

WHEREAS, this shelter crisis affects Berkeley's citizens disproportionately with more African American, Latino and elderly individuals experiencing homelessness; and

WHEREAS, on November 15, 2016, the City Council passed Resolution No. 67,746-N.S., extending the previous Resolution to January 19, 2018; and

WHEREAS, on October 31, 2017, the City Council passed Resolution No. 68,206-N.S., placing another extension until January 19, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on June 12, 2018, the City Council enacted Ordinance No. 7,613-N.S., setting forth reasonable local standards and procedures for the design, site development, and operation of homeless shelters and the structures and facilities therein; and

WHEREAS, on November 19, 2019, the City Council passed Resolution No. 69,189-N.S., extending the previous Resolution to January 2022; and

WHEREAS, on January 18, 2022, the City Council passed Resolution No. 70,179-N.S., extending the previous Resolution to January, 2024; and

WHEREAS, according to the last EveryOne HomeAlameda County Point-in-Time homeless count in January 20192022, the homeless population has risen to 1,108 decreased 5% from 2019 levels to 1,057 people, but over the same time period saw an increase of 70% in tent homelessness; and

#### RECOMMENDATION

Adopt a Resolution accepting a \$30,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA). The grant will be used to support a new Civic Arts grant program totaling \$60,000 to begin in Fiscal Year 2025 (FY25). The NEA grant will be used to underwrite a new program designed to support the following types of arts and cultural programming in the City of Berkeley:

- Nonprofit (not-art specific) organizations located in the City of Berkeley wishing to produce arts/cultural programming in the City of Berkeley led by a partnering arts organization or teaching artist; or
- Arts nonprofit organizations located in the Greater Bay Area (outside of Berkeley) wishing to produce arts/cultural programming taking place in the City of Berkeley.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

The NEA grant requires \$30,000 in matching funds that were identified, prior to the grant application submittal (February 2023), and therefore requires no new identification of funds. The required one-to-one matching funds totaling \$30,000 from the baseline FY25 budget and are comprised of the following reallocations within Fund 011:

\$20,000	(FY23 and FY24) intended for Theatre First which closed in 2023

There is not an obligation to identify an ongoing financial match beyond FY25 with the

acceptance of this grant award.

#### **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

With an annual budget of approximately \$700,000 from the City's General Fund (011), the Civic Arts Grants Program currently awards funding in three distinct categories: 1) Individual Artist Projects; 2) Community Festivals, and 3) General Operating Support. This new NEA grant funding will allow for the establishment of a fourth Civic Arts Grants funding category – the *Arts Program Grants*, which will be administered in conjunction with the FY25 Civic Arts Grants process. The Arts Program Grants category aims to (1) foster cross-sector collaborations and opportunities for non-arts organizations to hire arts and cultural workers or partner with Berkeley-based arts organizations for programming, and (2) offer the Berkeley community the opportunity to engage in Greater Bay Area programming offered by non-Berkeley arts organizations taking place in Berkeley. Awards will be up to \$5,000 each for eligible program-related expenses. The review criteria for this new grant category are: Program Narrative and Timeline (25%), Artistic Merit and Artistic Excellence (25%), Community Engagement and Impact (25%), and Cultural Equity (25%).

#### **BACKGROUND**

After analyzing data from previous Civic Arts grant cycles, Civic Arts staff identified a gap in the current grant opportunities. Staff found that there are two types of arts programming that have historically not been eligible for Civic Arts Grants funding:

- 1. Berkeley-based non-arts nonprofit organizations seeking funding for their current arts programing, or wishing to start arts programing.
- 2. Arts organizations in the Greater Bay Area wishing to do programming **in**Berkeley, especially those organizations in neighboring communities who already have strong partnerships with Berkeley-based arts facilities.

In order to better support a wide range of arts and cultural activities in Berkeley and to increase equitable access to artistic expression and creativity, Staff sought to create the "Arts Program Grants" category and augment City funding for the arts by pursuing a matching grant from the NEA. Approval for the NEA grant application in accordance with the city's administrative regulation (AR 1.17) was granted February 7, 2023. The City was notified of the award from the NEA on November 9, 2023.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

There are no environmental sustainability or climate impacts associated with this recommendation.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

Accepting federal funding from the National Endowment for the Arts would help the City accomplish one of the five high-level goals articulated in *The City of Berkeley's Arts and Culture Plan (2018-2027)*: "Increase Investment in a Vibrant Arts Community, Strengthen and support Berkeley's inclusive and culturally rich arts sector by expanding funding and marketing opportunities for a broader array of arts organizations."

Additionally, accepting these funds aligns with the City of Berkeley's fiscal policy to leverage City funds to secure matching State and Federal resources for the City of Berkeley.

Adopt a Resolution authorizing the City Manager or her designee to execute a contract and any amendments with Healthy Black Families (HBF) to provide outreach and education activities related to the Housing Preference Policy (HPP) from January 17, 2024 to January 17, 2025, in an amount not to exceed \$70,400.

# FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

This contract term is from January 17, 2024, to January 17, 2025. Funding for the outreach and engagement activities for the Housing Preference Policy (HPP) from the City's General Fund is available in the Housing and Community Services General Fund (Fund 011) budget.

#### **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

On July 11, 2023, the City of Berkeley adopted Resolution 70,960-N.S., to assist people displaced from Berkeley or facing displacement in Berkeley and those impacted by historical injustices to receive priority on a portion of new affordable housing units citywide. The HPP will apply to units created by the City's Below Market Rate (BMR) and Housing Trust Fund (HTF) programs. The HPP becomes effective on January 1, 2024.

Outreach and education around the policy is necessary to ensure potentially eligible applicants understand and apply for preferences. This policy's focus on households at risk of displacement and those already displaced from the community is outside the scope of the City's traditional engagement activities.

Staff seeks to partner with HBF to conduct targeted outreach and education initiatives for potentially eligible households. HBF is uniquely equipped to support this effort on the basis of their history of community engagement on the policy and deep connections with the Berkeley community.

Contract: Housing Preference Policy Outreach and Education

#### Outreach and education efforts will include:

- Building an outreach list of displaced households and organizations who can share information to households who can benefit from the HPP;
- Disseminating information through podcasts, public service announcements, newsletters, social media, and fliers;
- Organizing and hosting information sessions in person and online; and
- Serving as co-collaborator and advisor to City staff by drafting and providing input on engagement/education materials.

# **BACKGROUND**

The HPP is a community-driven policy created through extensive outreach and engagement led by Healthy Black Families. In 2019, in response to Council referrals and ongoing community advocacy for a preference policy, the Department of Health, Housing, and Community Services (HHCS) and the Planning and Development Department worked together to apply for a Partnership for the Bay's Future (PBF) Challenge Grant. The Challenge Grant, which commenced in March 2020, allowed HHCS to support community partners HBF and East Bay Community Law Center (EBCLC) to engage in a community-driven process to make recommendations for the HPP.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

There are no specific environmental sustainability and climate impacts associated with this contract.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

Healthy Black Families was a significant partner in coordinating engagement and the development of the Housing Preference Policy. Healthy Black Families is the only contractor with a deep knowledge of the policy and extensive and trusting relationships with key stakeholders that are critical for successful implementation. Partnering with Healthy Black Families on outreach and engagement is necessary to ensure: 1) potential applicants understand and apply for preferences, and 2) the City is honoring the policy's intent to address the negative impacts of displacement.

#### ALTERNATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED

The City may choose to entertain a competitive bidding process to identify a community outreach partner. HHCS does not recommend that route because Healthy Black Families was so fully involved in developing the policy with community, that a bidding process would both delay the process and yield the same recommendation.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Adopt a Resolution authorizing the City Manager or her designee to execute an amendment to Contract No. 32300203 for \$73,060 and any additional amendments or extensions, with Hansine Fisher & Associates for Targeted Case Management (TCM) consulting services. The contract amendment's not-to-exceed amount will be increased to a total of \$172,600 for the period July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

Hansine Fisher & Associates, a consulting firm, was selected to provide a comprehensive review and analysis of the Targeted Case Management (TCM) and Medi-Cal Administrative Activities (MAA) programs for the Health, Housing, and Community Services Department (HHCS). The current contract has a not-to-exceed amount of \$99,540. The contract amendment will add more services and will increase the not-to-exceed amount by \$73,060, resulting in an amended total not-to-exceed amount of \$172,600. Funds will be added in the Second Amendment to the FY 2024 Annual Appropriations Ordinance from Fund 313.

# **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

The Hansine Fisher & Associates contract scope of work and associated budget will be amended to include an analysis and recommendation for implementation for the CalAIM/Enhanced Care Management (ECM) initiative from the State. ECM is a new statewide Medi-Cal benefit available to eligible members with complex needs, including access to a single Lead Care Manager who provides comprehensive care management and coordinates their health and health-related care and services. This additional scope of work is to determine whether becoming an ECM provider is a sound strategic and financial option when paired with TCM.

Contract No. 32300203 Amendment: Hansine Fisher & Associates for Targeted Case Management

Effective January 1, 2024, Enhanced Care Management will be a statewide Medi-Cal benefit available to select members with complex needs. CalAIM and ECM implementation will have an impact on the TCM program and how it operates in the City. Analysis of the TCM program would not be accurate without considering the impact of ECM beginning July 1, 2024, when new clients who are eligible for the ECM benefit can no longer receive TCM services. Since the City receives funding based on the services provided, reduced services will lead to reduced funding.

HHCS currently operates TCM and MAA programs within the Aging Services Division (HHCS/AS) and the Public Health Division (HHCS/PH). TCM provides a reimbursement for specialized case management services to Medi-Cal eligible individuals in a defined target population so that they can access needed medical, social, educational, and other services. Through MAA, the state reimburses the City for activities it completes connecting Medi-Cal with eligible and potentially eligible individuals and families.

The proposed services will produce a model of case management services that best serves the vulnerable populations that is eligible for TCM and MAA services, maximize reimbursement, and ensure accurate and complete documentation processes to support audit readiness so that services can be provided sustainably.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The City released a Request for Proposals (RFP) in fiscal year 2023 under Specification No. 23-11582-C, and convened a panel of stakeholders to select Hansine Fisher & Associates as the most responsive and responsible bidder for this contract

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

There are no environmental impacts identified at this time.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

Hansine Fisher & Associates is a well-respected consulting firm with demonstrated subject matter expertise on TCM and MAA programs that has provided excellent services to date. Their proposal includes high quality services that align with the intended goals of maximizing program objectives and reimbursement for eligible services.

#### ALTERNATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED

Staff did not identify an alternative action consistent with the City's goals of advancing efficient and financially-healthy City government and public health and social and racial equity.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Adopt a Resolution authorizing the City Manager or her designee to amend Contract No. 32300134 with Bonita House to add \$11,500 of state Crisis Care Mobile Units (CCMU) grant funding for a not-to-exceed amount of \$4,579,500.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

This amendment will add \$11,500 for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$4,579,500. Funding for the Bonita House contract for the Specialized Care Unit (SCU) is available in the FY 2024 budget in State of California CCMU funding in the One-Time Grant Fund (Fund 336), which specifically funds mobile crisis response activities.

#### CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS

The SCU is a Strategic Plan Priority Project, advancing our goal to champion and demonstrate social and racial equity. City Council approved the selection of Bonita House as the SCU service provider on December 13, 2022. Throughout 2023, Bonita House has hired and trained staff for the SCU. The SCU began providing crisis response services to the Berkeley community on September 5, 2023. In order to conduct SCU services, Bonita House has rented vehicles while the team waits for the City-purchased vehicles to arrive. Because the new vehicles are not yet available, the state has approved a budget modification moving funds initially set aside for maintenance of purchased vehicles during calendar 2023 to reimburse costs of rental vehicles from September and October of 2023.

#### **BACKGROUND**

As part of the Re-Imagining Public Safety process, the City engaged in research and planning to implement a 24/7 SCU to respond to and support people who are experiencing a mental health or substance use crisis without direct involvement of the police. The SCU is different than the City's current Mobile Crisis Team that is a partnership of HHCS' Mental Health Division (HHCS/MH) and the Police Department.

Contract No. 32300134 Amendment: Bonita House for Specialized Care Unit Provider

Design for the SCU began in Fall 2020 with contracted consultant, Resource Development Associates (RDA), and the establishment of the SCU Steering Committee, an advisory group of HHCS and Berkeley Fire Department staff as well as representation from the Berkeley Mental Health Commission and Berkeley Community Safety Coalition. After extensive work with the community, the City selected Bonita House as the provider for the SCU and services began in September 2023.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

No environmental sustainability and climate impacts directly associated to this recommendation have been identified.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

The additional funding from the Crisis Care Mobile Units (CCMU) program was initially allocated for vehicle maintenance for City-purchased vehicles. Due to supply chain issues and vehicle customizations, the SCU has rented vehicles to perform necessary program operations in their initial operating months. Repurposing these CCMU funds to support rental vehicle costs aligns with the intent to support SCU vehicles for crisis response operations.

#### ALTERNATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED

No alternative actions were considered because these funds are meant to be used to support vehicle-related costs for the SCU and this aligns with the spend plan approved by the CCMU funder.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Adopt a Resolution authorizing the City Manager or her designee to execute a contract and any resultant revenue agreements and amendments with the Berkeley Unified School District to conduct first aid services at the Berkeley High School Health Center with the projected total amount of \$920,557 for July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2028.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

The City will receive funds in the estimated amount of \$920,557 from Berkeley Unified School District (BUSD) for the period FY 2024 through FY 2028. The contract will be assigned a contract number and the revenue deposited in Fund 324. Funding in the amount of \$184,111 per fiscal year will be subject to the Appropriation Ordinance in the FY2024 through FY2028 budgets for a projected total amount \$920,557 for July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2028. This is BUSD's primary contribution to the Berkeley High School Health Center (BHSHC) services that is otherwise funded and operated by City of Berkeley to provide services such as reproductive health and mental health services.

Spending of these grant funds is subject to Council approval of the budget and the Annual Appropriations Ordinances each fiscal year.

#### CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS

BUSD and the Health, Housing, and Community Services Department (HHCS) have a long-standing partnership in the operations of the Berkeley High School (BHS) Health Center. In addition to first aid services funded by BUSD, the City currently provides reproductive sexual health services, mental health services, and basic needs supports for students at the BHS Health Center. The City leverages Federal, State, and County funding and City General fund to support these services with approximately 6 FTEs to provide reproductive health services and 5.0 FTE to provide mental health services. Through this partnership with BUSD, the City is committed to advancing our goal to create a resilient, safe, connected, and prepared city, as well as champion and demonstrate social and racial equity.

Revenue Contract: Funding from Berkeley Unified School District Health Center for First Aid Services at the Berkeley High School

#### **BACKGROUND**

The High School Health Center was developed in 1991 by concerned parents, School Board/school district officials, the City of Berkeley Public Health and Mental Health Divisions, and other community partners. All services are free to students that access this school-based health center as it has been designed as a safe place where young people not only receive care, but also learn to advocate for their own needs and to express their autonomy. In 2005, the BHSHC expanded its services to include first aid services and has continued to grow the existing reproductive sexual health and mental health services at this school-based health center. The BHSHC has provided services to over 1,000 youth annually with an average of over 5,000 visits per year (based on non-pandemic years).

With the support of BUSD, this funding will support the continuation of first aid services provided at the High School Health Center. The City of Berkeley receives funding from many sources annually to complete activities to improve the health of the community. HHCS' Public Health Division (HHCS/PHD) is committed to providing essential services to the community to prevent the spread of disease and to promote healthy environments.

# **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

There are no identifiable environmental effects or opportunities associated with the subject of this report.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

These funds support vital services related to our mandates as a public health jurisdiction and local initiatives designed to address health inequities in Berkeley and improve the health of Berkeley residents. This contract supports the Department's mission and provides the City with funding to continue working to protect and improve the health of the community.

#### ALTERNATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED

Staff did not identify an alternative action consistent with the City's goals of advancing public health and social and racial equity.

Adopt a Resolution amending Resolution No. 70,993-N.S. and correcting the effective date of the increase in the salary range of select Local One supervisors – namely, Senior Building Maintenance Supervisor, Senior Equipment Supervisor, Senior Public Works Supervisor, and Senior Solid Waste Supervisor – from January 1, 2023 to December 1, 2022.

This Resolution follows Council consideration of this item in Closed Session on November 6, 2023.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

The sole fiscal impact of the recommendation is estimated to be \$7,336, representing one month's equivalent of the salary range adjustments approved by Council for the aforementioned classifications.

#### **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

On July 25, 2023, Council adopted Resolution No. 70,993-N.S. to increase the salary range of the Senior Building Maintenance Supervisor classification by 9.30%; Senior Equipment Supervisor by 13.00%; Senior Public Works Supervisor by 8.53%; and Senior Solid Waste Supervisor by 8.53%, effective January 1, 2023. The effective date was misstated due to clerical error and should have been December 1, 2022, consistent with the agreement that the City had reached with Public Employees Union, Local One.

#### **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

The ongoing project involving the procurement of a new permitting system is a critical initiative for the Planning & Development Department supported by the IT Department and by other Departments that process permits including Public Works and Fire. The primary objective of this project is to streamline and optimize the building and land use permitting processes through the acquisition of suitable integrated software and hardware systems. This is anticipated to be implemented by a Software as a Service (SaaS) model wherein the system vendor provides both software and hardware systems running on cloud-based servers.

Given the increasing complexity of Planning & Development's permitting system procurement project, the addition of process mapping services from ThirdWave is a logical step forward. This contract amendment will enable the Planning & Development Department, the Fire Department, and the Public Works Department, supported by the IT Department, to achieve a more seamless and successful implementation of the chosen solution. Incorporating process mapping, will ensure that the cloud-based software system not only meets the Planning & Development, Fire

Department, and Public Works Department's functional requirements but also integrates seamlessly with department operations. This holistic approach will lead to enhanced efficiency, reduced risks, and improved decision-making throughout the project.

This project is in alignment with the City's strategic goal to be a customer-focused organization that provides excellent, timely, easily-accessible service and information to the community.

#### **BACKGROUND**

ThirdWave's patented RapidWorkflow® Process Modeling (RWPM) workshops have proven to be a critical tool that assisted in the development of prior Berkeley City Council approved projects including the ERP Replacement Project: Enterprise Modules Needs Assessment and the Information Technology Strategic Plan & Cost Allocation Plan. Based on these prior successes, on March 7, 2022, the City signed Contract No. 32200162 with ThirdWave Corporation for CIO Support Services similar in Task 2 to the Professional Services in this amendment.

# **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILTY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

ThirdWave Corporation conducts a portion of their work remotely. When on-site visits may be required for face-to-face meetings, they will cluster those visits over multiple days to minimize travel costs and greenhouse gas emissions related to travel. Additionally, by identifying cumbersome business practices the City is able to maintain an environmentally sound technology infrastructure.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

ThirdWave's RWPM Workshops have proven to be an effective and efficient way of documenting business processes and identifying pain points and areas for improvement. ThirdWave's patented RWPM was a critical tool that assisted in the development of the Citywide Digital Strategic Plan and Enterprise Modules Needs Assessment. Participating in business process mapping with ThirdWave will continue to increase efficiency, consistency, and customer service and will specify requirements for the new Permitting System RFP.

#### ALTERNATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED

Staff considered completing the project without ThirdWave's service. However, doing so would lead to an inefficient allocation of staff resources and less than optimal requirement and process maps due to ThirdWave Corporation's expertise with their RWPM tool.

# **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

The department of Public Works is currently in the process of implementing a new fleet management software, called AssetWorks. As staff progressed through the Discovery phase of the implementation, staff identified a Motor Pool module along with a telematics and EV (Electric Vehicle) integration service that would streamline City operations and increase vehicle safety. These critical features are additions to the scope of the new fleet management system that add significant value to the City.

This AssetWorks implementation is consistent with the City's strategic goal to "Provide state-of-art, well maintained infrastructure, amenities, and facilities."

#### **BACKGROUND**

The City has approximately 700 vehicles and equipment which receive routine maintenance and repair. The Equipment Maintenance division intakes and processes approximately 800 work orders every month. To manage this work, City staff use the Sungard Public Sector solution (FUND\$) as the fleet management solution, originally put in place in 1991. The SunGard system (FUND\$) runs on an IBM iSeries server and utilizes a legacy 5250 green screen user interface. The system is keyed entry menus compared to modern point and click software. Beyond its interface impediments, FUND\$ lacks many of the advanced processing, reporting, data analysis, and granular security features that are readily available in newer software packages. The City has made 2,000 customizations to the Sungard product. As such, it requires heavy support from Information Technology staff to maintain the system.

On October 19, 2018, the City issued Request for Proposals (RFP) #19-11260-C for an improved Fleet Management Software & Implementation Services. The City received three (3) responses to the RFP by the December 18, 2018 deadline. A committee of seven staff members from the Public Works and Information Technology departments conducted a comprehensive evaluation process that included proposal reviews, vendor demonstrations, and reference calls. Staff selected Assetworks as presenting the most comprehensive, user responsive, and effective solution for the City's current and future fleet management needs.

In 2020, with Council's approval, the City entered into a contract agreement (No. 32100080) with AssetWorks, LLC to provide new fleet management software. In March 2021, the implementation started.

# **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

A modern and computerized fleet management system with a mobile application will greatly reduce the City's use of paper. This supports the reduction of carbon footprint and the goals of the City's Climate Action Plan.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

The addition of the Motor Pool module will centralize management of the City's pool of shared vehicles. This will provide a portal for staff to more efficiently reserve vehicles with automated confirmation. Additionally, the electric vehicle integration will allow for accurate electric usage and billing. Lastly, the telematics integration notifies the Fleet division of vehicle errors or warning signs which allow staff to take proactive steps to ensure the City's fleet is in optimal and safe operational condition.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

On January 18, 2024, the City will submit a grant application to the Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Grant Program for the planning phase of the Interstate 80 at Aquatic Park Tide Tubes Renovation Project in the amount of up to \$535,000. The grant program requires a 12% local cash match of \$63,600, which will be funded by the Parks Tax.

#### **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

On October 3, 2023, The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) released the Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25 Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant Application Guide and Call for Applications. A total of \$53.4 million is available for transportation planning projects statewide. Within this program, the Climate Adaptation Planning grant program has \$31.9 million available. The City will submit a grant proposal to investigate feasible methods to renovate the existing failing subsurface culverts (tide tubes) that connect Aquatic Park to the Bay underneath I-80, and to the Model Yacht Basin. This project will increase the resilience of I-80, Bolivar Drive at Aquatic Park, and the adjacent local City roads (e.g., 2<sup>nd</sup> Street) from the impacts of sea-level rise and increased storms due to climate change.

#### **BACKGROUND**

In 2020, the City completed the Aquatic Park Tide Tubes Maintenance Project to evaluate the condition of the existing tide tubes and perform maintenance cleaning.

Grant Application: Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Program for Interstate 80 at Aquatic Park Tide Tube Renovation

The evaluation determined that the tide tubes exhibit signs of cracking and will likely fail within ten years, and therefore need renovation. The projected increase in storms due to climate change will cause more stormwater to flow through the existing tubes, which will lead to accelerated erosion of the roadbed underneath Interstate 80 and a potential failure of the Interstate. This would create significant impacts to the region in terms of traffic congestion, delays in commuter and the movement of goods and services, increased greenhouse gases, and traffic spillover into the local roads of West Berkeley until the Interstate can be repaired.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

All parks improvement construction projects are required to comply with the City of Berkeley Climate Action Plan, specifically in terms of reducing construction waste, as well as environmentally preferred purchasing guidelines to reduce waste and increase the use of renewable resources. This project helps the City meet Strategic Goal 1 – infrastructure.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

This project will increase the resilience of I-80, Bolivar Drive at Aquatic Park, and the adjacent local City roads (e.g., 2<sup>nd</sup> Street) from the impacts of sea-level rise and increased storms due to climate change.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

The grant request is for up to \$3 million for hazardous tree mitigation and education. Although this grant program does not require match, the existence of matching funds and services is a positive factor during the competitive review process and so the City will include in-kind match of City staff as the match component of the proposal. This is a reimbursement grant and projects must be completed by March 15, 2030. Revenue from this grant will be deposited into the One-Time Grants Fund (Fund 336).

#### **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

On November 1, 2023, as part of the Governor's Wildfire and Forest Resilience Strategy, the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE) announced the availability of up to \$117 million in funding for local projects that address the risk of wildfire and reduce wildfire potential to communities, through the department's **Wildfire Prevention Grants** program.¹ Funded activities include hazardous fuel reduction, wildfire prevention planning, and wildfire prevention education with an emphasis on protecting communities, improving public health and safety, while reducing greenhouse gas emissions. The City will submit a grant proposal of up to \$3 million to mitigate the risks of hazardous tree conditions at the three City of Berkeley overnight camps (Berkeley Tuolumne Camp, Echo Lake Camp, and Cazadero Camp).

Additional FY 2024 SAVE 2023 Grant funding will be recommended for appropriation through the second amendment to the appropriations ordinance in Fund 607.

#### CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS

The Berkeley Marina requires regular removal of abandoned boats and marine debris from the harbor waters. Each year, approximately five to ten vessels get abandoned by their owners at the Berkeley Marina. These vessels occupy slips in the Berkeley Marina that could otherwise be used to generate dockage revenue for the City. They are a visual blight on our Marina and harm our reputation. Most often, vessels are abandoned because the owners because they lack funds needed for repairs, for dockage fees, or both. Due to the age and neglect of the vessels, they have no value, are not sea-worthy, and are likely to sink. There are also times when large marine debris such as broken dock sections need to be removed from the Marina. Upon execution of these contracts and subsequent task orders, the contractor will be able to safely remove vessels or debris from the Marina, take them back to their shipyard, and properly dispose of them in accordance with federal and state regulations.

## **BACKGROUND**

Responsibility for derelict and abandoned vessels, unfortunately, often falls on public agencies. For the past 20 years, the Division of Boating and Waterways has provided grant funding assistance to public agencies to properly remove, store, and dispose of abandoned, wrecked, or dismantled vessels or any other partially submerged objects that pose a substantial hazard to navigation, from navigable waterways or adjacent public property, or private property with the landowner's consent.

In 2022, the City received a SAVE grant (SAVE 2023) from the California Division of Boating and Waterways in the amount of \$60,000. In 2023, the City received an additional SAVE grant (SAVE 2024) in the amount of \$60,000.

On October 27, 2023, the City published a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) seeking qualified firms or individuals to provide Derelict Vessel/Debris Removal & Disposal services on an as-needed basis (Specification No. 24-11618-C). On November 21, 2023, the City received Statements of Qualifications (SOQs) from three (3) marine construction firms. A panel of City staff reviewed the SOQs and selected Lind Marine, Power Engineering Construction, and Silverado Contractors as the best qualified firms to meet the City's needs.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

Derelict, abandoned, and sunken vessels pose a navigational and environmental hazard to the Bay waters at the waters and shoreline of the Berkeley Marina. Removal and proper disposal of these vessels contributes to the improvement of water quality of the waters of the Bay.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

The Parks, Recreation, and Waterfront Department has the primary responsibility for removing derelict and abandoned vessels from local waters. This contract will allow the City to safely remove these potential environmental and navigational hazards from the Berkeley Marina.

## **RECOMMENDATION**

Adopt first reading of an Ordinance amending Berkeley Municipal Code Title 13 to add Chapter 13.108 --Prevailing Wage Requirements in the Southside Plan Area to establish prevailing wage requirements for projects exceeding 50 units or 50,000 square feet in the Southside Plan Area.

## FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

The prevailing wage requirements included in the proposed ordinance would be enforced through project sponsor attestation and private right of action. Therefore, the proposed ordinance would not require additional staff resources to administer.

#### CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS

On November 21, 2023 the City Council adopted zoning changes to increase residential development within the Southside Plan Area.<sup>1</sup> The materials considered with the item included a letter from the Planning Commission encouraging the Council to consider the feasibility of prevailing wage requirements.

At its November 21, 2023 meeting, the City Council adopted a motion that included the following language regarding prevailing wage requirements in the Southside:

A development project having 50 or more units, or having 50,000 square feet or more of floor area, that is located in either the C-T District, R-S District, or R-SMU District, is subject to the following prevailing wage requirements:

1. Contractors shall pay all construction workers employed in the execution of the development at least the general prevailing rate of per diem wages as set forth in Section 1771 of the California Labor Code,

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except that apprentices registered in programs approved by the California Division of Apprenticeship Standards may be paid at least the applicable apprentice prevailing rate.

- 2. Contractors shall maintain and verify payroll records pursuant to Section 1776 of the Labor Code and make those records available for inspection and copying as provided in that section.
- 3. Subsections (1) and (2) above do not apply if all contractors are subject to a project labor agreement (or community workforce agreement or similar labor agreement) with the local Building and Construction Trades Council.

The motion included direction to staff to determine the most appropriate location in the Berkeley Municipal Code to include the language. The motion also stipulated that enforcement of the ordinance would be through project sponsor attestation and private right of action.

The proposed ordinance (*Attachment 1*) includes language to effectuate the direction in the City Council's motion.

## **BACKGROUND**

The Berkeley Municipal Code (BMC) currently includes a single reference to prevailing wage for private development projects in the Downtown Mixed Use (C-DMU) District, including hotels, a building over 75 feet in height, or a building with more than 100 units of housing. Pursuant to BMC Chapter 23.408.060 (Green Pathway—Requirements for Large Buildings and Hotels), applicants that apply for the streamlining provisions of Chapter 23.408 must pay prevailing wage, among other requirements. However, no projects have ever been subject to these provisions. Additionally, the Green Pathways streamlining benefits have been superseded by changes to the BMC and State law that provide more streamlining benefits with fewer requirements.

## **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

California Public Resource Code Section 21065 defines a "project" under CEQA as "an activity which may cause either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment." The proposed ordinance pertains to the terms of employment for workers on development projects, and would not result in any changes to the physical environment. The proposed ordinance does not consist of a discretionary action that would permit or cause any direct or indirect change in the environment. The proposed ordinance is therefore not a project under CEQA, and further environmental review is not required.

## **RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION**

The proposed ordinance reflects direction from the City Council at its November 21, 2023 meeting.

## ALTERNATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED

Staff considered including the proposed language in Title 23 (Zoning), as the motion accompanied the Southside zoning provisions that are found in that title. However, staff determined that the proposed ordinance, which pertains to working conditions, was more appropriately located in Title 13 (Public Peace, Morals and Welfare), where similar employment-related regulations are included, such as the Wage Theft Prevention Ordinance and the Helping Achieve Responsible Development with Healthcare and Apprenticeship Training Standards ("HARD HATS") Ordinance.

# ADOPTING CHAPTER 13.108 OF THE BERKELEY MUNICIPAL CODE PREVAILING WAGE REQUIREMENTS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Berkeley as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. Chapter 13.108 is hereby added to the Berkeley Municipal Code to read as follows:

## **Chapter 13.108**

## PREVAILING WAGE REQUIREMENTS IN SOUTHSIDE PLAN AREA

13.108.010	Title and Purpose
13.108.020	Definitions
13.108.030	<b>Prevailing Wage Requirements</b>
13.108.040	Enforceability
13.108.050	Severability

#### **13.108.010** Title and Purpose.

- A. This Chapter shall be referred to as the Prevailing Wage Requirements Ordinance.
- B. The purpose of this Chapter is to ensure that developers or contractors involved in the construction of large projects in the Southside Plan area pay workers at least the general prevailing rate set forth in the California Labor Code.

#### 13.108.020 Definitions.

- A. "Contractor" shall mean a contractor or subcontractor of any tier that has contracted to perform work on the Covered Project.
- B. "Covered Project" shall mean a private development project located in the C-T, R-S, or R-SMU zoning districts that consists of construction or alteration of at least 50 units or 50,000 square feet or more of floor area and which has not received its final approvals (whether in the form of permits, variances, or other entitlements) by the effective date of this Ordinance.
- C. "Covered Construction Worker" shall mean any construction worker employed by a Contractor at any time over the duration of the Covered Project.
- D. "Registered Apprenticeship Program" shall mean an apprenticeship program jointly managed and administered by both a union and contractor or contractor association, and (i) approved by the State of California's Division of Apprenticeship

Standards; (ii) registered with the U.S. Department of Labor; or (iii) registered with a state apprenticeship agency granted authority by the U.S. Department of Labor to register apprenticeship programs for federal purposes, pursuant to 29 CFR Part 29.

## 13.108.030 Prevailing Wage Requirements.

- A. A Covered Project is subject to the following requirements:
- 1. Each Contractor shall pay all Covered Construction Workers at least the general prevailing rate of per diem wages as set forth in Section 1771 of the California Labor Code, except that apprentices participating in a Registered Apprenticeship Program may be paid at least the applicable apprentice prevailing rate.
- 2. Each Contractor shall maintain and verify payroll records pursuant to Section 1776 of the Labor Code and make those records available for inspection and copying as provided in that section.
- B. Subsections A(1) and A(2) above do not apply if all Contractors are subject to a project labor agreement (or community workforce agreement or similar agreement) with the local Building and Construction Trades Council.

#### 13.108.040 Enforcement

- A. Each Contractor must sign a declaration attesting to compliance with this Chapter under penalty of perjury at the time of permit issuance for the Covered Project.
- B. Private Right of Action. A Covered Construction Worker, or a joint labor-management committee established pursuant to the federal Labor Management Cooperation Act of 1978 (29 U.S.C. sec. 175a) on a Covered Construction Worker's behalf, may bring a civil action in a court of competent jurisdiction against any Contractor that violates this Chapter and, upon prevailing, shall be awarded reasonable attorneys' fees and costs and shall be entitled to such legal or equitable relief as may be appropriate to remedy the violation. Nothing in this Chapter creates a private right of action or otherwise authorizes legal action against the City, its officers, agents, or employees.

## 13.108.050 **Severability**

If any part or provision of this Chapter, or the application of this Chapter to any person or circumstance, is held invalid, the remainder of this Chapter, including the application of such part or provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected by such a holding and shall continue in full force and effect. To this end, the provisions of this Chapter are severable.

<u>Section 2</u>. Copies of this Ordinance shall be posted for two days prior to adoption in the display case located near the walkway in front of the Maudelle Shirek Building, 2134 Martin Luther King Jr. Way. Within 15 days of adoption, copies of this Ordinance shall be

## RECOMMENDATION

Refer to the City Manager to issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) for the development of the city-owned West Berkeley Service Center, (1900 Sixth Street), to permit site acquisition and construction of a 100-percent affordable housing project with the following key features:

- Space on the ground floor of the building for administrative offices, community space and supportive services as currently provided by the City;
- Maximizing the number of units under the existing zoning Mixed Use-Residential (MU-R) in conjunction with state law AB 1763 (2019);
- A mix of unit sizes, including studios, one-bedroom, and two-bedroom units;
- Require RFP applicants to include a plan for services provision and integration for the population(s) they propose to serve;
- A preference for serving seniors and adults with mental health conditions while maintaining flexibility to serve other populations based on availability of funding.

The City Manager should also consider the feasibility of the following elements in the program design:

- Universally designed housing for older adults with a portion of the units for assisted living and memory care;
- A board and care facility with a minimum of 20 beds including space for staff and services;
- Explore available federal, state, regional, local and private funding sources to finance the construction of a housing project, including with the potential target populations.

The issuance of an RFP should be timed to happen soon after funding for the development has been identified.

## **BACKGROUND**

Berkeley General Plan Policy H-18 encourages the use of city-owned sites, including parking lots for affordable housing or mixed-use projects: "When appropriate and feasible, use City-owned or controlled sites for affordable housing and/or mixed-use residential projects with a substantial portion of affordable units."

On May 28, 2019, (Attachment #1), the City Council stated the intent for the use of the West Berkeley Service Center property, 1900 6<sup>th</sup> Street, would be used for senior housing with on-site services consistent with Age Friendly Berkeley Plan recommendations and maximizing the number of affordable units on site. They further referred to the City Manager to conduct a basic analysis of the development potential for the site, including build-out scenarios for a three to seven story building on the site that would include amenities, supportive social services, and community space.

Staff returned "Referral Response: Analysis of the Development Potential for the West Berkeley Service Center Site" to Council as a comprehensive Information Report on the September 7, 2023 City Council Agenda. In the report, staff analyzed Zoning Designation, State Streamlining Laws and State Density Bonus to provide considerations for development potential. Current zoning of the site is MU-R. Given staff assumptions as provided in the report (Attachment #2), it could be possible to build 190 units in six stories with AB1763. AB1763 (2019) expands State Density Bonus Laws to housing projects that are 100 percent to low-income households (excluding manager units) with up to 20 percent of units for moderate-income households. Also, projects near transit, such as the West Berkeley Service Center site, are not subject to density limits, may raise height limits by three stories or 33 feet, and are allowed up to four concessions.

Recommendations for Council action included rezoning the site to C-W and allocating funding for environmental review, or referral to the City Manager to develop recommendations to Council that would inform a RFP to develop senior housing on the site under the current MU-R zoning.

## **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

The population of Berkeley residents 65 and older has steadily increased in recent years. Projections from multiple sources, including the Alameda County Plan for Older Adults, show that by 2030 over 20% of Berkeley residents will be over 65. Based on surveys completed by the Age Friendly Berkeley Initiative (2018) older adults increasingly prefer to age in their communities with housing affordability and availability, along with transit access, noted as major areas of concern, especially for

low-income respondents. Wait lists for affordable senior housing units are as long as 8 years.<sup>1</sup>

Board and Care facilities operate under the supervision of the Department of Social Services through a Community Care License and are staffed 24 hours per day, seven days per week. They provide residential care for seniors and/or people with disabilities who need assistance in their daily lives including room and board, meals, a supportive living environment with daily activities for participation and entertainment, and assistance with personal care. There is a critical lack of Board and Care facilities in the state. In recent years, the number of licensed board and care facilities, including Adult Residential Facilities and Residential Care Facilities for the Elderly has been declining largely due to inadequate funding and rising housing construction costs.<sup>2</sup> San Francisco has lost more than a third of its facilities that serve seriously mentally ill people under the age of 60 which is consistent with what other counties report, anecdotally, up and down the state.<sup>3</sup> More housing and mental health resources are critical to address the needs of our most vulnerable low-income adults who are most at-risk of homelessness: older adults, persons with disabilities, and persons with severe mental illness.

Currently, the City's Health, Housing and Community Services Department is utilizing the West Berkeley Service Center to house the West Berkeley Family Wellness Center that provides services such as Women, Infants and Children's (WIC) program, immunization programs, programs offering nursing support, Berkeley Black Infant Health and free yoga classes. Community Development Block Grant ((CDBG) funds have been identified for improvements to the facility and have a five-year requirement for use, once all the funds are drawn down, without a pro-rata repayment. These improvements are scheduled to begin during the first quarter of 2024. During that time, a temporary facility will be needed to accommodate the temporary relocation of these programs to ensure continuation of services and activities during the construction period of any new housing project.

It is, currently, uncertain how this proposed development could be funded. The City of Berkeley Housing Trust Fund and funds from the 2018 Bond Measure O are in short supply or already dedicated to other projects. However, additional resources may become available through a proposed regional housing bond measure<sup>4</sup> or earmarked

funding. Preparing an RFP that would be ready for issuance at the time resources have been identified would expedite development of the West Berkeley Service Center, ensuring critical resources can be provided for the community.

## FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

Staff time required for developing recommendations for an RFP. In addition, a budget will need to be developed for the temporary relocation of the West Berkeley Family Wellness Center services and possibly any pro-rata CDBG repayment.



## RECOMMENDATION

State the intent of the City Council that the West Berkeley Service Center property, 1900 6th Street, will be used for senior housing with on-site services consistent with Age Friendly Berkeley Plan recommendations, maximizing the number of affordable units.

The Berkeley Way Project, 2012 Berkeley Way, is the City's top affordable housing priority. The West Berkeley Service Center, as a City-owned property, to be developed for affordable housing falls under the "High Priority" on the list of housing initiatives passed by Council on November 28, 2017. In light of the above, refer to the City Manager to take the following actions to initiate the process of developing senior housing at the West Berkeley Service Center:

- a. Refer to the City Manager to conduct a basic analysis of the development potential for the West Berkeley Service Center site including build-out scenarios for a three-, four-, five-, six- and seven-story building at the site, using Mixed-Use Residential (MUR), West Berkeley Commercial (C-W), and Multiple-Family Residential (R-3) Development Standards. Each buildout scenario should reflect base project conditions, and conditions if a Density Bonus is granted including waivers and concessions, or if Use Permits are used to modify standards. The scenarios should also incorporate space on the ground floor for resident amenities, supportive social services, and community space. The results of the development scenarios will be presented to the City Council and Planning Commission.
- b. Refer to the Planning Commission to consider any modifications to the underlying zoning at the West Berkeley Service Center site to maximize the production of senior housing, including consideration of an overlay zone.
- c. Based on recommendations from the Health, Housing and Community Services Department, the Housing Advisory Commission, Measure O Bond Oversight Committee, Commission on Aging, and taking into consideration requirements and restrictions associated with potential funding sources, create

- based on more current information, since predevelopment work could proceed immediately after a contract award.
- A Request for Proposals (RFP), as opposed to a Request for Information (RFI), may be the best tool to use for soliciting development concepts from housing developers if Council wishes to use this process to award a contract, such as a Disposition and Development Agreement. An RFI is typically used to collect information from many potential bidders in anticipation of releasing a request for bids, to inform the request. An RFP is an excellent tool to use when the City wants bidders to apply their creative thinking to the proposed project and wants to award a contract. The RFP can ask the bidders to respond to multiple City priorities. Since identifying and analyzing options to develop the site will require an investment of staff time from respondents, developers are more likely to respond with more fully developed proposals if the process is used to award a contract.
- As a precursor to developing an RFP, it would help staff to understand Council's priorities for the site, particularly what project components are most important, such as maximizing the number of affordable units for seniors, providing deeply affordable units, inclusion of community services space, a memory care facility, etc. Understanding the ranking of Council priorities will help staff and bidders evaluate trade-offs and enable more responsive proposals, making the process more efficient for the City and developer alike.

## SUMMARY

In 2019, the City Council referred to the City Manager to conduct an analysis of the development potential of the West Berkeley Service Center (WBSC) site for senior housing and related support services. This memorandum analyzes a range of buildout scenarios under various zoning and permitting options, including State Density Bonus Law, and presents options for Council action.

## BACKGROUND

In 2016, the City Council adopted a referral to identify City-owned properties that have the potential to be used for affordable housing sites (Attachment 1). In 2017, staff identified the West Berkeley Service Center (WBSC) at 1900 Sixth Street, which currently houses a variety of social services, as one of several sites that met selected criteria for housing development suitability (included in **Attachment 2**). In 2019, the City Council adopted a referral that asked the City Manager to further analyze the development potential options for the WBSC to achieve Council goals for that site (Attachment 2).

#### SITE AND SURROUNDING AREA

The approximately 32,550 square-foot parcel is located at the southwest corner of Hearst Avenue and Sixth Street (Figure 1). It currently serves as the location of the West Berkeley Family Center, operated by the Health, Housing, and Community Services Department's Public Health Division (HHCS/PHD). At the site, HHCS/PHD currently offers a variety of public health and social services for low-income Berkeley

residents, such as the Women, Infant, and Children (WIC) program, Black Infant Health, Immunization clinics and services, food and diaper distribution, and public health emergency preparedness. Additionally, there are current plans to create a community garden and co-locate various social, public health, and educational services at the site until future development initiatives can be realized. Public transit accessibility is plentiful, with several high-frequency AC Transit routes and Amtrak located within half a mile. In addition, the 4th Street shopping corridor and community health care facilities are nearby. Adjacent uses on the block consist of a range of commercial uses, including office, retail, personal services and exercise studio in one and two-story buildings.






Figure 3: General Plan Land Use Designation - West Berkeley Service Center and

The parcel is in the West Berkeley Plan area as part of a transition area between the Fourth Street retail district and the residential area to the east. It is zoned for Mixed-Use Residential (MU-R) (Figure 2) and has a General Plan land use classification of Mixed Use (MU) (Figure 3).

## **ANALYSIS OF ZONING OPTIONS**

Consistent with the Council's referral, staff analyzed options to maximize residential density, including affordable senior units, to maintain existing social services, and to introduce supportive housing uses.

Staff analysis considered the impacts of the following variables on development potential:

- Zoning Designation. Maintaining the existing MU-R zoning, amending the zoning designation to West Berkeley Commercial (C-W) or Multiple-Family Residential (R-3), or establishing an overlay district.
- State Streamlining Laws. The relevance of state laws such as SB 35 or AB 2162 that allow for streamlined, ministerial approval.
- State Density Bonus. The use of the Density Bonus Law to increase allowed floor area or building envelope.

The Council referral directed staff to evaluate the development potential for a project containing senior housing with ground-floor resident amenities, supportive social services, and community space. Depending on the type of senior housing desired, the project could include the following (which require different zoning permits):

- A Mixed-Use Residential project, containing dwelling units, incidental residential amenities, community center space, and offices for supportive social services. This would require a Use Permit with a public hearing (UP(PH)) in the MU-R, C-W and R-3 districts.
- A Senior Congregate Housing project, containing group living accommodations occupied by persons 60 years or older who live in sleeping rooms without kitchen facilities, which contains congregate bath and/or dining facilities. This would require a UP(PH) in the MU-R, C-W and R-3 districts.
- A Community Care Facility, consisting of a state-licensed facility for non-medical care and supervision of elderly persons, is allowed with a Zoning Certificate in the C-W district, and a Use Permit in the R-3 district.
   Construction of new community care facilities is allowed with a Use Permit in the MU-R district, pursuant to changes recently adopted by the City Council in July that align the zoning code with State law requirements.

Regardless of the type of senior housing developed, the project would be required to comply with the development standards of the applicable zoning district. Table 1 below lists the development standards for each potential zoning district under consideration.

The R-3 zone provides the most restrictive development envelope. Changing the site's zoning to R-3 would requiring changing the General Plan land use designation of the site from Mixed Use to the lower density Medium Density Residential designation. This change may be inconsistent with the objective of optimizing the site's development potential for senior housing.

Staff also considered an overlay zone, which is typically applied over multiple underlying zoning districts in order to establish additional regulations that serve a particular public purpose (e.g., Hillside Overlay, Civic Center District). An overlay zone typically modifies development standards and administrative processes, rather than allowed land uses. Given these limitations, staff do not recommend rezoning to R-3 nor creating an overlay zone.

## **REFINING OPTIONS**

#### State Streamlining Laws

California has passed laws that allow certain affordable housing projects to undergo streamlined ministerial processes subject only to objective development standards. Use of these laws increases development certainty while reducing project timelines, both of which lower costs and ultimately support the production of affordable units. As shown in Table 2 on the following page, the State streamlining laws relevant to the project are SB 35 (2017) and AB 2162 (2018).<sup>2</sup>

Given the state requirements for affordability levels, workforce benefits, and additional supportive housing requirements, SB 35 is the most likely streamlining mechanism to be used. SB 35 has lower affordability requirements and no supportive housing requirement compared to AB 2162, which requires maintaining services to formerly homeless residents and partnership with a service provider. For these reasons, staff's analysis assumes that the developer would likely opt to meet SB 35 requirements to achieve streamlining.

## **Density Bonus Law**

For housing development projects that provide a certain percentage of affordable units or senior housing, the <u>California Density Bonus Law</u><sup>3</sup> requires cities to grant a density increase over "the otherwise maximum allowable gross residential density" for the zoning district and the General Plan. In addition to a bonus in number of units, State Density Bonus Law provides for incentives and concessions to reduce the cost of providing affordable housing, and/or waivers to development standards (e.g., open space requirements, height limits, setbacks, parking requirements) to achieve the densities allowed by the law.

The amount of the density bonus and the number of incentives or concessions granted generally increases with project affordability levels. At the affordability level required by SB 35 for ministerial approval in Berkeley (currently 50 percent of units for low-income households), a project can receive a 50 percent density bonus and three incentives or concessions.

In addition, AB 1763 (2019) expands State Density Bonus Law to housing projects that are 100 percent to lower-income households (excluding manager units) with up to 20 percent of units for moderate-income households. Projects near transit, such as the West Berkeley Service Center site, are not subject to density limits, may raise height limits by three stories or 33 feet, and are allowed up to four concessions.

#### **Development Potential**

The maximum development potential of the site depends on a number of factors that a developer would take into consideration when designing a project. Staff made a set of assumptions in order to illustrate the relative difference in development potential under the MU-R and C-W zoning district standards, as well as the magnitude of change allowed with State Density Bonus law under SB 35 (50 percent bonus) or unlimited bonus under AB 1763.<sup>4</sup> Specifically, staff assumed an average unit size of 550 square feet<sup>5</sup> and 20 percent common area<sup>6</sup> in both the base and density bonus projects, and 85 percent lot coverage in the density bonus project.

As shown in Table 3 below, State Density Bonus Law allows significantly more units to be built than would otherwise be allowed in the base project. This is especially true for a 100 percent affordable project. With a zoning designation of MU-R, the base project could contain up to 26 units, as the maximum density is limited to one dwelling unit per 1,250 square feet of lot area. Applying a 50 percent density bonus to the base project to facilitate SB 35 streamlining, up to 39 units would be allowed. AB 1763 does not limit the project density, so the limiting factor would be the additional three stories allowed above the maximum of three stories, for a total of up to six stories allowed on the site. Given staff assumptions for unit size and lot coverage, it could be possible to build 190 units in six stories with AB 1763. With a zoning designation of C-W, the base project could contain 105 units, potentially increasing to approximately 150 units in six stories with a 50 percent density bonus, and potentially around 230 units in seven stories with an AB 1763 density bonus.

Table 3 shows that the development potential of the site is greater when subject to the C-W district standards than the MU-R standards under the base and density bonus project conditions. However, because a project under AB 1763 would not be subject to a density standard, a 100 percent affordable project with MU-R zoning results in a development potential that is similar to that which can be achieved under C-W standards. The expanded baseline building envelope allowed in the C-W district provides for a further increase in the number of potential units under AB 1763. Ultimately, the number of units, building envelope and amount of affordable housing depends on a number of factors, such as the availability of affordable housing subsidy and overall economic feasibility. Recently developed affordable housing projects have tended to include fewer than 100 units.

## Zoning Map and General Plan Amendment

The build-out scenarios presented above indicate that a zoning map amendment from MU-R to C-W would maximize production of affordable housing at the site. In addition, the C-W district would allow new construction of community care facilities with a Zoning Certificate while MU-R would require a Use Permit. This action would require a General Plan amendment to change the land use designation from Mixed Use-Residential (MU) to Avenue Commercial (AC). The associated environmental review process would consist of preparing an addendum to the Housing Element EIR, as the site has been identified as a sixth cycle Housing Opportunity Site.<sup>7</sup>

## Fiscal Impacts

Staff estimates that it would take approximately three to six months for staff to work with a consultant to prepare required environmental review documents, which would include required technical studies and tribal consultation. This effort is estimated to cost approximately \$60,000, excluding any additional City contributions from the Housing Trust Fund program that would likely be needed for a 100% affordable housing project (beyond state and federal tax credits) or staff time to manage the rezoning and environmental review. The amendments and resolution would be considered by the Planning Commission, followed by the City Council for approval and adoption.

#### **NEXT STEPS**

The City Council can consider whether to proceed with rezoning the site to C-W and allocate funding for the environmental review, or refer to the City Manager to develop recommendations to Council that would inform a Request For Proposals (RFP) to develop senior housing on the site under the current zoning (MU-R). The RFP would include specifications for the desired amount of housing on site, unit sizes, level of affordability, as well as integration with amenities and services.



#### RECOMMENDATION

#### BACKGROUND

Across the state of California, urban centers are experiencing a crisis in housing availability at all levels of affordability. The crisis is very severe in the Bay Area, Lack of funds and subsidies from the state and federal government has exacerbated the obstacles to developing housing at all levels of affordability. The two senior centers, "North", on MLK and Hearst, and "South" on Ellis and Ashby and the Service Center on 6th Street are all in need of significant renovation. Now is the time to evaluate these properties to determine if it is feasible to create a mixed-use, housing/community center on these sites prior to spending millions of dollars on the current structures.


All City owned properties should be explored and evaluated for their potential as sites for housing development.

Refer to the City Manager to conduct a basic analysis of the development potential for the West Berkeley Service Center site including build-out scenarios for a three-, four-, five-, six- and seven-story building at the site, using Mixed-Use Residential (MUR), West Berkeley Commercial (C-W), and Multiple-Family Residential (R-3) Development Standards. Each buildout scenario should reflect base project conditions, and conditions if a Density Bonus is granted including waivers and concessions, or if Use Permits are used to modify standards. The scenarios should also incorporate space on the ground floor for resident amenities, supportive social services, and community space. The results of the development scenarios will be presented to the City Council and Planning Commission.
- b. Refer to the Planning Commission to consider any modifications to the underlying zoning at the West Berkeley Service Center site to maximize the production of senior housing, including consideration of an overlay zone.
- c. Based on recommendations from the Health, Housing and Community Services Department, the Housing Advisory Commission, Measure O Bond Oversight Committee, Commission on Aging, and taking into consideration requirements and restrictions associated with potential funding sources, create

recommendations to Council regarding levels of affordability, unit sizes, on-site services and other features to be included in a senior housing and social services development, including senior living housing types. These recommendations will be presented to the City Council to inform the issuance of an RFP.

#### POLICY COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

On April 25, 2019, the Land Use, Housing and Economic Development Committee adopted the following action: M/S/C (Droste/Hahn) to send the item to the full Council with a Positive Recommendation. Vote: All Ayes.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The population of Berkeley residents 65 years and older has steadily increased in recent years. In 2017, older adults were estimated to make up 13.5% of our community — an increase of approximately 2% from the 2010 Census (11.7%) and approximately 3% from the 2000 Census (10.2%). Recent projections from multiple sources, including the Alameda County Plan for Older Adults, show that by 2030 one in five residents (20.5%) in Berkeley will be over 65, nearly doubling the current population. Advances in medicine and the spike of 'baby boomers' born after World War II have resulted in a late-twentieth century demographic phenomenon, popularly referred to as the 'silver tsunami', that cities across the country are similarly anticipating.

Based on surveys completed by AARP (2012) and the Age Friendly Berkeley Initiative (2018) we know that older adults increasingly prefer to age in their communities, which tells us we need a continuum of housing options for this growing population, in tandem with services. We also know that housing affordability and availability, along with transit access, are major areas of concern, especially for low-income respondents. In 2014, 23% of Berkeley residents 60 years and older were living under 200% of the Federal Poverty Level, according to the American Community Survey. As of July 2018, there were 738 dedicated affordable units for seniors, with a waitlist of 6-8 years. Amidst the current affordability crisis, low- and fixed-income seniors are struggling just to stay housed, let alone receive the care they require.

In an effort to respond to current and future needs, the Berkeley Age Friendly Continuum was formed out of conversations between residents and those providing and working in aging services across the city. The goal of this work is to strengthen Berkeley as a place to age, and ensure implementation of an integrated, person-centered, replicable, continuum of supports and services for older adults and those with disabilities as they navigate transitions of aging. This effort is now supported by the City of Berkeley, Kaiser, Sutter and AARP, and is heavily informed by the Age Friendly Cities and Communities effort led by the World Health Organization. Their three-year Action Plan will soon be released, focusing on how we can move forward aging standards, and ensure ours is a livable community where all generations thrive.

West Berkeley Service Center (1900 Sixth Street) Site Analysis

While the initial work of the Age Friendly Continuum has been focused on conducting a comprehensive needs assessment, setting priorities, articulating an organizational structure, and developing a 3-year plan, their longer term goal has always included piloting a senior housing and services facility that could be a model for the future of aging in place in Berkeley. One of the recommendations from their soon to be released Age Friendly Berkeley Action Plan under Housing and Economic Security, is to "develop a continuum of affordable, accessible housing options for older adults to age in their community regardless of their health or financial status".

In April 2016, the City Council passed a referral to identify City owned properties that have the potential to be used for affordable housing sites. An information report with the referral response was presented in February 2017, with the West Berkeley Service Center (WBSC) identified as a potential site for future development. In May 2017, Council then passed a budget referral for a feasibility study for the construction of affordable senior housing, specifically mentioning the WBSC along with the North and South Berkeley Senior Centers. Located at 1900 6th Street, the WBSC is an approximately 31,000 square foot parcel situated in a Mixed Used Residential (MUR) zone. Public transit accessibility is plentiful, with several high-frequency AC Transit routes and Amtrak located within half a mile. In addition, the 4th Street shopping corridor, and community health care facilities are nearby. The site is currently home to several tenants that provide a variety of services, including the City of Berkeley Aging Services, the Black Infant Health Program, Public Health Nurses and the Meals on Wheels program. It is also covering services provided by the North Berkeley Senior Center (NBSC) for the next 18-24 months until renovations at the NBSC are completed.

Initial plans were to keep the WBSC under the scope of the Measure T1 process. Measure T1, passed by Berkeley voters in 2016, is a \$100 million bond for rebuilding and renovating the City's aging infrastructure, including City owned facilities. Yet what this site needs is beyond an infrastructure upgrade, and its history as a hub for senior services presents an opportunity. West Berkeley has an extremely limited number of affordable housing units for seniors, despite being in a location that is easily accessible to various medical and aging services. And thanks to the passage of Measure O, a \$135 million dollar housing bond, combined with other funding opportunities, it could now be possible to fund the development of a senior housing and services facility modeled after the work of Age Friendly Berkeley, that becomes the gold standard for aging in place in our community, and the region.

Such a development would be consistent with the West Berkeley Plan, which calls for the residential development of MUR zones to facilitate the activation of such blocks while also maintaining a high level of services for the diverse population of West Berkeley. Additionally, the Plan calls for the development of housing, which provides onsite supportive services, as an explicit goal. However, to fully understand the possibilities of potential development of the site, the Planning Commission will need to consider several zoning options to find the optimal conditions.

After any rezoning is approved and recommendations on the development program are made by relevant City Commissions and the Council, the next step is to issue an RFP for development of the WBSC. We recommend consideration of the following criteria:

- Focuses on universally designed, affordable housing for older adults
- Incorporates the latest in technology and aging
- Functions both as services linked to housing and as a community hub of activity
- Reserves a portion of the units for assisted living and memory care
- Consistency with the recommendations of the Age Friendly Berkeley Initiative
- Maximize sustainability and energy efficiency

Any proposed development could have access to various forms of funding, including but not limited to Measure O (which explicitly mentions senior housing), new markets and low-income tax credits, local/regional/state funding such as U1, A1, and Prop 63/MHSA, along with private foundations.

#### RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

With Berkeley's senior population expected to skyrocket over the next decade, steps must be made to increase housing and services. There is currently a lack of senior housing in Northwest Berkeley, despite being in close proximity to various healthcare, shopping, and transit options. Affordable housing is particularly limited with wait lists for some senior housing projects between 6-8 years. There is also a need for a neighborhood hub for access to information and activities for older people in the area, along with meeting rooms and event space.

In 2017, Council voted to look into the feasibility of developing housing at Berkeley's senior centers, as recommended by the community. There are limitations to providing services at the North and South Berkeley Senior Centers due to their current R-2A residential zoning, and site constraints exist at the North Center due to the proximity of the BART tunnel. The development of WBSC for senior housing and services is consistent with both zoning regulations and the West Berkeley Plan. Such a development is also consistent with the Age Friendly Continuum.

Developing the former West Berkeley Senior Center into senior housing and services would uphold and honor the legacy of elder advocates who championed the creation of the Center to serve the needs of the West Berkeley Community, and would be consistent with its long-standing use.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Staff time to conduct the analysis of development potential at the West Berkeley Service Center site, prepare reports for Council and Planning Commission discussion, and to work with City Commissions to create recommendations on the development program for a senior housing project. According to the staff memo dated March 7, 2019 "Process for Considering Proposals to Develop the West Berkeley Senior Center Site for Senior

Housing", city staff estimate that the analysis of development potential will take approximately 40-60 hours of staff time.

#### SUMMARY

At the request of City Council, the Health, Housing and Community Services Department is providing an overview and update on the Age Friendly Berkeley initiative. Helping Berkeley's older adults remain in Berkeley and live long, healthy and fulfilled lives is the goal of the Age-Friendly Berkeley initiative. It's a collaborative effort between the City of Berkeley, Lifelong Medical Care, the Center for Independent Living, and Ashby Village. This report provides information on the key findings from a community survey that was conducted in March and April 2018 to help plan the work. This report also provides highlights from informational interviews that were conducted with City staff from various Departments to identify projects that City Departments have completed, or are considering, that consider the needs of older adults as they age in Berkeley.

The community survey and the informational interviews are strategies used to inform the development of the City of Berkeley Aging Friendly City Plan. This Plan will include recommended actions to achieve the goal of creating a livable community for all Berkeley residents, and will be submitted to the World Health Organization in November 2018. This report provides Council with information to inform the discussion on better serving our seniors.

The community survey gathered input from Berkeley community members age 50 and over. The purpose of the survey was to identify their priorities as they age in the Berkeley community. Survey results indicate that residents prioritize affordable senior housing, transportation services, and outdoor spaces that are walkable.

#### **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

Many cities are experiencing rapid increases in the proportion of people aged 60 and over. In Berkeley, the population over age 65 is expected to nearly double from 12% in 2010 to 21% in 2030.

The World Health Organization (WHO) recognizes that older people are a resource for their families, communities and economies in supportive living environments. Older

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people in particular often require supportive and enabling living environments to compensate for physical and social changes associated with aging. Thus, in order to retain a vibrant and enriching population of older adults, cities must provide the structures and services to support their wellbeing and productivity. Making cities more age-friendly is a necessary and logical response to promote the wellbeing and contributions of older urban residents and keep cities thriving (Global Age-Friendly Cities: A Guide, WHO, 2007).

The WHO has developed an active aging framework that outlines how cities can improve opportunities for health, participation and security in order to enhance quality of life for elders as they age. In an age-friendly city, policies, services, settings and structures support and enable people to age actively. Active and healthy aging depends on a variety of influences or determinants that surround individuals, families and nations. These determinants are reflected in the eight domain, or topic areas, identified by the AARP in previous research with older people on the characteristics of elderly-friendly communities:

- 1. Outdoor Spaces
- 2. Transportation
- 3. Housing
- 4. Social Participation
- 5. Respect & Social Inclusion
- 6. Civic Participation & Employment
- 7. Communication & Participation
- 8. Community and Health Services

Berkeley must complete an Aging Friendly Plan to be recognized by the WHO as an Age-Friendly City. To develop this Plan, public input was gathered from Berkeley community members through a community survey developed and implemented in partnership with AARP. The survey was distributed by mail to AARP members in Berkeley. Hard copies of the survey were also made available at the senior centers, libraries, and partner agencies such as churches and senior housing facilities. Funding for the development and analysis of the community survey was provided by a grant from the Pilgrimage Foundation.

#### **AGING SERVICES DIVISION**

The City of Berkeley's Aging Services Division aims to promote a dignified and healthy quality of life for older adults by offering connections to community, services & resources through two vibrant senior centers (North Berkeley Senior Center and South Berkeley Senior Center) and a multi-resource center (West Berkeley Service Center). Our programs touch the lives of older adults each year by serving as a resource for recreation, group meals, health & wellness education and other supportive services for adults 55 and older.

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At our senior centers, staff provide local resources and provide individualized assistance to seniors and caregivers. Classes provided through the Berkeley Adult School, and other enrichment activities, are scheduled daily at the Centers. Lunchtime dining for senior center members is provided at a reasonable price (often free) at both senior centers; approximately 200 members are fed each day (over 40,000 meals per year).

Our Social Services staff provides consultation, referral, and case management for seniors in distress. Services include, but are not limited to, transportation, housing, food accessibility, access to healthcare, and legal assistance.

The Division's Meals on Wheels staff and volunteers provides approximately 60,000 home-delivered, well balanced meals to homebound seniors, 60 years of age or older, in Berkeley, Albany and Emeryville.

Berkeley senior centers provide transportation and access to recreational and educational activities in the community. Our paratransit services assist Berkeley residents with disabilities, and those 70 years of age or older, by providing taxi scrip and van voucher programs that enhance access to things seniors need and want. In FY17, over 13,400 taxi rides were provided to taxi scrip users, and over 1,200 van vouchers were used.

Finally, the Aging Services Division provides many opportunities for volunteers to support seniors, and thereby remain engaged in our community. Each year, hundreds of volunteers support the activities and services provided at the North and South Berkeley Senior Centers and help to deliver thousands of meals for the Meals on Wheels program.


#### SURVEY RESULTS

#### Respondent Characteristics


A total of 1416 surveys from Berkeley adults age 50 and over were received and analyzed in April 2018. 30% of the respondents are between the ages of 50-64, 57% between ages 65-79, and 13% age 80 or more. 73% of those surveyed are female.

Approximately 66% of the respondents indicated a post-college level of education.

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


Approximately 60% of the survey respondents reported an income of \$60,000 or more in the previous year.



A majority of the survey respondents indicated that they live in single family homes. One-third of the respondents indicated living in multi-unit housing complexes.

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**Key Survey Findings** 


The community survey included various questions that address each domain. As mentioned previously, survey respondents highlighted concerns and priorities under the housing, transportation, and outdoor spaces domain areas. These findings are summarized below, by domain area:

Housing

The majority of the survey respondents in each income group indicated that Berkeley was an "Excellent" or "Good" city to age in. However, over 30% of respondents reporting an income of \$32,000 or below in the previous year indicated that Berkeley is a "Not so good/poor" place to age.

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# How Respondents Rate Berkeley as a Place to Age by Income Group



When asked about main reasons for their rating of Berkeley as a place to age, respondents indicated that they appreciated the availability of low-income and senior housing in the City. However, respondents also pointed out that the availability of such housing was low, and that housing and property tax costs are too high. These reasons, along with mentions of gentrification and homelessness, support respondents' indication of Berkeley as a "Not so good/poor" place to age.


It is important to note that those survey respondents in the \$16,000-\$32,000 income bracket rate Berkeley the lowest for aging. As income increases, the number of respondents indicating that Berkeley is an "Excellent/Good" place to age also increases. The chart above highlights the income disparities that exist in Berkeley; as mentioned in the Health Status Report, the environments and neighborhoods in which people live, work, learn, and raise their families impact their access to resources such as effective health care, and ultimately affect their overall quality of life.

Additionally, survey respondents were asked about factors that would influence their decision to move out of Berkeley. Over 60% of respondents identified their need for housing to live independently, lowering the cost of living overall, and needing a less expensive home, as their top three influencing factors.


#### **Outdoor Spaces**

Word clouds were created to illustrate the most frequently mentioned positive reasons from those survey respondents who reported the City of Berkeley to be an "Excellent" or "Good" place to age (55% overall):

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Word clouds were also created to illustrate the most frequently mentioned negative reasons from those survey respondents who reported the City of Berkeley to be a be "Not So Good" or "Poor" place to age (11% overall):



While respondents acknowledge that the City of Berkeley is an accessible community that is resource and activity-rich, they also identified affordable housing, transportation services, and safety as significant needs in the Berkeley community.

#### **Transportation**


Respondents were asked how they get around for things like shopping, visiting the doctor, running errands or socializing. While the majority drive themselves, a large percentage rely on walking, and half report using public transit. Fewer than 30% use a taxi or ride service, but they may not know about the transportation and paratransit services that the City, and other City partners, offer.

Survey respondents were also asked about the importance of certain traffic resources:

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Transportation is a high priority for older adults with nearly all wanting more transit enhancements. Approximately 100% state that the following are very important: Public transportation stops are safe and well lit, public transportation is affordable, and special transportation for seniors.

#### **Key Interview Findings**

In addition to the community survey, a total of 18 informational interviews with City staff from 9 City Departments were conducted. Data on projects that have been completed and are currently being planned/pursued that address relevant older adult issues and concerns was collected. The following list summarizes these projects by domain area.

#### Housing

Projects/Elements currently in place

- Senior and disabled home loan rehab program: long term, low interest loans to fix houses of low income seniors so they can age in place.
- Short term rental application support/workshops through Finance Department
- Housing Assistance is available through the Berkeley Housing Authority, Center for Independent Living, ECHO housing (fair house counseling), NID (housing counseling Agency focused on foreclosure counseling) and the Unity Council (foreclosure workshops)
- 738 dedicated, affordable senior housing units in Berkeley, but with wait lists of
   6-8 years

#### Projects in process with Age Friendly Elements

- Disability Commission and Planning Commission considering amendments to ADU's goals is to increase housing stock that is accessible.
- Expansion of City Planning's housing safety program with intent to proactively protect low-income housing stock.

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#### **Outdoor Spaces**

Projects/Elements currently in place

- Recreational programs through the Parks & Rec department now offering more adult classes: painting, yoga, aquatics, Tai Chi, etc.
- 52 Parks as well as trails and community gardens are available
- Sidewalks, curb cuts, street lighting, benches, & traffic calming devices are well developed in most of the city
- New developments & redevelopments, including businesses & housing developments, are required to build or remodel according to ADA standards

Projects in process with Age Friendly Elements

- Parks & Rec Department considering adding paid classes and programs targeting the older adult population
- City Planning Department using "Crime Prevention through Environmental Design" to address safety issues, uncomfortable spaces, dark alleys, etc.
- Measure T1 holding public hearings; goal to improve existing infrastructure and facilities

#### **Transportation**

Projects/Elements currently in place

- Strategic Transportation Plan strives to enable equal access for Berkeley community members of any age, background, and ability to move throughout City
- Paratransit, senior shuttle, and taxi scrip services available through City's Aging Services Division

Projects in process with Age Friendly Elements

- Planning, Public Works Departments developing master pedestrian plan in commercial areas; safety, walkability, lighting, etc.
- Planning, Public Works Departments reviewing sidewalks in poor condition, which have been an issue for people with disabilities and elders who are challenged by broken sidewalks
- Aging Services transportation services to implement mobility management and travel training for seniors

#### POSSIBLE FUTURE ACTION

The recommendations listed below were developed by the Age Friendly Berkeley collaborative. These recommendations align with both the key findings from the community survey and the City staff informational interviews.

#### Housing

- Incorporate universal design into new building codes
- Support efforts to overturn policy that allows people to raise the rent to market when someone in a rent-controlled space moves out
- Create a publicly accessible, understandable database where seniors can see rental opportunities rather than the need to call each establishment individually

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- Allow & promote a mix of uses in buildings and neighborhoods through zoning codes and planning tools to provide access to necessary services (grocery stores, pharmacies, etc.) with multiple transportation options in neighborhoods
- Work with additional personnel and leadership outside government agéncies to help coordinate housing needs along a continuum, from shared housing to assisted living

#### **Outdoor Spaces**

- Include input from older adults while developing the master pedestrian plan for input about cleanliness, wayfinding, safety, walkability, etc.
- Improve park bathrooms and facilities in general for the older population
- Create safe routes to common destinations (e.g., community centers, libraries)

#### **Transportation**

- Advance the affordability, availability, reliability, frequency, and travel destinations for public transit
- Allocate additional funding to improve transportation infrastructure (benches, shelters, traffic signals, and pavement on pedestrian sidewalks
- Extend educational programs to help individuals learn about public transit options

The City's Aging Services Division remains committed to promoting quality services and resources to encourage active aging for Berkeley's older adults. The Division is also committed to working with partners to create sustainable age-friendly elements in the Berkeley community that enable access to resources which support a full and healthy life for everyone. As our older adult population increases, it is important for the city to continue to focus on their needs, and provide accessible and affordable opportunities for them to participate actively in our community.

#### BACKGROUND


To become a member of the World Health Network, the City completed an application that demonstrated Berkeley's commitment to older adults. Through the City's dedicated services to older adults, its robust non-profit sector, and innovative planning, the City demonstrated Berkeley's commitment to the older adult community and was accepted into the World Health Network in November 2016.

#### SUMMARY

On April 5, 2016 City Council requested an inventory of City-owned properties in order to evaluate their potential for affordable housing development. In the past, the City has sold (for example, for Oxford Plaza and Harper Crossing) and leased (in the case of William Byron Rumford Senior Plaza) City-owned property to support affordable housing.

The City owns 119 properties scattered throughout Berkeley. (In many cases, these properties are made up of multiple legal parcels.) Staff reviewed the inventory and assessed each site's development potential, based on criteria prioritizing sites that are mostly likely to accommodate a multifamily rental project and most competitive for affordable housing funding. HHCS staff reviewed the sites' zoning designation, square footage, current use, and whether or not properties were protected as parks or open space under Measure L, the Berkeley Public Parks and Open Space Preservation Ordinance. Six properties were identified citywide that met the basic criteria. One is the Berkeley Way parking lot, currently the subject of an agreement with BRIDGE Housing related to its development as affordable housing. The other five all had other significant challenges to development. All would require more review before taking any further action.

Staff did not review properties for the potential to sell. Oakland's housing plan, Oakland at Home, recommended selling City-owned properties not suitable for affordable housing development and placing 30% of the proceeds in a housing trust fund.

#### **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

This report responds to a referral that originally appeared on the April 5, 2016 Council agenda and was sponsored by Councilmember Wengraf.

For this project, HHCS staff started with a detailed list of City-owned parcels that had been compiled by the Public Works Department from multiple sources, and updated it with information from the Berkeley Municipal Code as well as internal records. The

complete list is attached (see Attachment 3). It is the most comprehensive list that has been compiled to date.

#### Initial Assessment: Selected Properties

HHCS staff identified six properties that met basic criteria for housing development suitability and grouped them in three categories, based on the criteria briefly described above, and described in depth in the Background section of this report. The following describes the six properties which best met the criteria identified. None of these sites were identified as housing opportunity sites in the Housing Element, primarily because of existing City uses and zoning constraints. The City already has an agreement with BRIDGE Housing for the development of Berkeley Way, and the other five have significant challenges to development. These sites are also listed in Attachment 1.

Group 1. Two properties met all basic criteria. They are: 1) located within zones allowing multifamily development; 2) larger than 15,000 square feet; 3) not protected under Measure L; and 4) have no existing structures.

#### Berkeley Way Parking Lot (2012 Berkeley Way):

The City and BRIDGE Housing have a Disposition and Development Agreement for a project on this site that will incorporate affordable housing, permanent supportive housing, transitional housing, homeless services, and replacement public parking. On September 27, 2016, City Council awarded \$835,897 in Housing Trust Funds to support additional predevelopment activities, including architectural work, environmental studies, and planning fees.

#### Elmwood Parking Lot (2642 Russell Street)

Five City-owned parcels could be merged to create a 27,000 square foot lot. The parcels currently form a narrow parking lot situated between a row of shops facing College Avenue, and a residential neighborhood composed primarily of 1-2 story single family homes and small multifamily buildings. This parking lot supports the Elmwood commercial area. At a minimum, this site would need to be rezoned to support multifamily housing development at a large enough scale to make affordable housing feasible.

While the square footage of the parcel initially seemed promising, several of the adjacent residential buildings are situated on the lot lines, and the businesses use the City's property for trash pickup and delivery access. Setbacks would likely be required on one if not both sides. In addition, the lot's irregular shape and proximity to existing commercial and residential uses would constrain its footprint and height to the point at which an affordable development may be infeasible, particularly with replacement parking for the commercial district. Combined, these limitations are likely to make affordable housing development infeasible at this time.

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Group 2. Two additional properties are 1) located within zones allowing multifamily development; 2) larger than 15,000 square feet; and 3) not protected under Measure L; but they have active City uses. A third property, Center Street Garage, also met these criteria but was not considered because it is currently under construction.

- West Berkeley Service Center (1900 Sixth Street). The West Berkeley Service Center is located on a parcel that is 31,000 square feet, in an area that is a mix of commercial, industrial, and residential. Some of the parking spots are currently being used for City vehicles. The neighboring buildings are 1-2 stories tall, but 4-5 story buildings are located one block away along University Avenue. Though the existing zoning (MUR Mixed Use Residential) permits multifamily development, changing the zoning could help maximize the site's development potential. Demolishing and replacing the service center, currently used for senior social services, the Black Infant Health Program, Public Health Nurses and the Meals on Wheels program, would add significantly to the cost of housing development at the site.
- Telegraph-Channing Garage and Shops (2425 Channing Way)
   This six-story parking garage also includes retail spaces on the ground floor. Built in the late 1960s, the garage provides parking for the stores and restaurants along Telegraph Avenue near the UC Berkeley campus. Conceivably, the site could be redeveloped to include replacement commercial spaces and parking with housing over it.

However, since the structure is a key resource for local businesses, the costs of temporary commercial relocation during construction, and the costs of replacing parking and commercial spaces would make development very costly and could be infeasible in combination with affordable housing. In order to also add new residential units, the replacement structure would likely need to be several stories taller than the current structure, which is already among the tallest buildings in the neighborhood. These issues present significant challenges to using the site for affordable housing in the foreseeable future.

Group 3. These properties are both larger than 15,000 square feet and vacant, but would require zoning changes before multifamily housing could be constructed and have constraints from Measure L. The North Bowling Green is protected from development under Measure L, and would require a vote of the people to change its designation and make it legal to develop. The Santa Fe Right of Way requires further analysis to determine Measure L's applicability. Unlike other parcels protected under Measure L, both of these properties are fenced off from the public and not in active use.

North Bowling Green (1324 Allston Way)
 Within the Corp Yard, along Allston Way, the North Bowling Green is a vacant lot of approximately 21,000 square feet that is not actively used by the City. The site

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was used as a lawn bowling green starting in 1929, but has not been maintained as such since 2008. This site, along with the South Bowling Green and clubhouse, is leased to the Berkeley Lawn Bowling Club, though Parks is negotiating a new lease that will not include the North Bowling Green. The site contains elevated levels of pesticides and metals, and the contaminated soil would need to be excavated or encapsulated prior to active use or development, which does not rule out affordable housing development but would add to the cost. The entire Corp Yard site is within an R-2 zone, so the North Bowling Green would need to be split from the Corp Yard parcel and rezoned to allow for multifamily housing. The 150-unit Strawberry Creek Lodge (affordable senior housing) is located within a block of the vacant site, though the immediately adjacent residential units are single-family homes.

#### Santa Fe Right of Way

The City owns six vacant, non-contiguous parcels that were part of the right of way for the former Santa Fe Railroad. The lots cut through the middle of blocks at a diagonal, and are separated by several streets: Ward, Derby, Carleton, Parker and Blake. Collectively, the parcels comprise approximately 75,000 square feet of undeveloped land. The parcels are zoned R-1 and R-2, which do not permit multifamily construction. The neighborhood is primarily single family homes with a few 2-story multifamily buildings. Although it could be possible to combine these sites into a single scattered site project, it would be difficult to achieve the density required to make a scattered site project large enough to be competitive for tax credit and other affordable housing funding.

#### BACKGROUND

The initial data collection resulted in a list of 229 individual parcels, which was reduced to 119 after staff analysis. Several Berkeley Housing Authority and BUSD properties associated with Berkeley 75, former public housing, were removed from consideration, and adjacent parcels were combined into single entries to better assess their development potential. Staff then researched each property for specific data, including zoning and property square footage.

From the list of 119 parcels, some City-owned properties were excluded from further analysis because they were not available or clearly not suitable for development as housing. Sites not considered for future housing development included City offices at Center and Milvia, street segments, sidewalks, fire and police facilities, and sites leased to existing affordable housing projects.

The City owns approximately one acre of air rights to develop over the western parking lot at Ashby BART, which is zoned C-SA. The site was not included in this report because it is being analyzed as part of the Adeline Corridor planning process. The City does not own air rights at North Berkeley BART.

Referral Response: Analysis of City-Owned Property for Potential for Housing Development

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Methodology and Criteria

The remaining 92 properties were then ranked based on a set of criteria established to identify the sites with the greatest development potential (and fewest development barriers). The following criteria were used:

#### Zoning

Given the City of Berkeley's general plan and municipal code, multi-family housing can only be built within certain zones<sup>1</sup>. Properties outside these zones were ranked lower since they would require zoning changes in order to be suitable for higher density development.

Size of parcel/ability to support 50+ units of housing

Staff prioritized sites that can accommodate 50+ units of housing for affordable housing development. In this analysis, we looked at sites of 15,000 square feet as having the greatest potential, and gave consideration to sites over 10,000 square feet. Sites smaller than this are unsuitable for affordable multifamily housing development because:

- Even with greatly reduced or donated land, affordable housing development requires public funding. There are limited funding sources for affordable housing, and most multifamily housing developers pursue Low Income Housing Tax Credits as a significant source. Tax credit funding is highly competitive, and non-tax credit projects can be difficult to finance. California intends to start incentivizing larger developments by awarding higher points to projects with 50 or more units. Staff estimated that sites under 15,000 square feet would not allow for the density required to meet the 50-unit minimum for a competitive project. Sites between 10,000 and 15,000 were included but ranked lower, as they could be combined for a scattered site project.
- The long length of time required for obtaining financing for Harper Crossing (41 units) and Grayson Street Apartments (23 units) are probably at least partially related to their small size. Smaller projects are generally less competitive for housing funds because of their higher per unit costs and, in the case of the Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities program, due to their smaller impact on reducing greenhouse gas emissions.
- Similarly, Oakland's housing plan recommended using sites that can accommodate 50+ units for affordable housing, and selling the others for revenue to support housing.
- One local affordable housing developer, when asked about minimum size, said "we've found that in higher-density areas (like Berkeley) sites should be at least 15,000 sq ft. We will look at smaller sites if there are special circumstances but as a rule of thumb it is hard to create a feasible multifamily rental project on a site

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under that size." Another emphasized the need to look at the development capacity, citing a project on 13,000 square foot plot with 62 one-bedrooms, feasible only because it has 6 stories (typically not possible in Berkeley).

#### Parks and open spaces, restricted by Measure L

In 1986, Berkeley residents passed Measure L, the Berkeley Public Parks and Open Space Preservation Ordinance, ensuring that all existing City open space would be preserved (not developed). Measure L requires a vote of the people to use or to develop a public open space or park for any purpose other than public parks or open space, unless a State of Emergency has been declared. In this context, the Homeless Shelter Crisis declared by City Council in 2016 does not qualify as a State of Emergency, and would not supersede Measure L. Staff consulted with Parks to confirm that 23 properties larger than 10,000 square feet are restricted under Measure L. Staff did not ask Parks to review the following properties in hillside zones due to topographical constraints on development: Grotto Rock Park, Indian Rock Park, Remillard Park, Cragmont Park, and Great Stone Face Park.

#### Current Use

Berkeley is largely built out, and most City-owned properties have buildings and active uses. Staff prioritized properties that do not have any structures, followed by properties that are active City facilities, and finally properties leased to non-City entities. Staff did not review the 21 leases noted in the property inventory, and did not assess the development potential of the sites once the leases expire, as that was beyond the scope of the current analysis.

#### Properties Less Suitable for Development

The remaining 113 properties were considered less suitable for development because they did not meet enough of the priority criteria. More than half of the remaining properties were eliminated because they fell below the threshold of 10,000 square feet (49 properties) or because they are actively used open space or parks and are protected under Measure L (22 properties, excluding the Santa Fe ROW). Other properties were eliminated because of their current use, including a number of City facilities on lots larger than 15,000 square feet. Attachment 2 includes a list of every City-owned property over 15,000 square feet in area.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY**

Any site would require environmental analysis to assess its suitability for development, and identify contaminants or issues needing remediation.

#### POSSIBLE FUTURE ACTION

Staff will continue to work with BRIDGE Housing and the Berkeley Food and Housing Project on the redevelopment of the Berkeley Way Parking Lot. Staff plan to report back to City Council with a recommendation on the disposition of two former

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Redevelopment Agency properties the City owns on 5<sup>th</sup> Street. Staff welcome any additional information that could further update the property information shown in Attachment 3.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS OF POSSIBLE FUTURE ACTION

Fiscal impacts of future action will depend on the course of action identified. Developing new affordable housing on City-owned land will require additional City funding contributions.

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

#### RECOMMENDATION

Request that the City Manager explore the opportunity for the City of Berkeley to build housing on city-owned property: conduct an inventory of city owned properties and return to City Council as soon as possible with an evaluation and analysis of those properties that are appropriate for the development of affordable housing.

#### BACKGROUND

Across the state of California, urban centers are experiencing a crisis in housing availability at all levels of affordability. The crisis is very severe in the Bay Area. Lack of funds and subsidies from the state and federal government has exacerbated the obstacles to developing housing at all levels of affordability. In addition, the scarcity and the high cost of land in the Bay Area and in Berkeley, specifically, is an enormous barrier to producing affordable housing. Berkeley needs to optimize its limited resources now and look to partner with housing developers to build housing on city-owned land.

The City of Berkeley has a unique opportunity. The two senior centers, "North", on MLK and Hearst, and "South" on Ellis and Ashby and the Service Center on 6th Street are all in need of significant renovation. Now is the time to evaluate these properties to determine if it is feasible to create a mixed-use, housing/community center on these sites prior to spending millions of dollars on the current structures.

All City owned properties should be explored and evaluated for their potential as sites for housing development.

In addition, the Berkeley Unified School District owns property that has the potential to be developed as housing. The City of Berkeley should work closely with the BUSD to encourage them to move forward with their own analysis of potential housing sites that are currently under- utilized.

This severe housing crisis calls for all publicly owned land to be evaluated and considered.


As the city moves forward with planning the expenditures from Measure T1, we should be sure that resources used on improving our current facilities do not pre-empt the possibility of future development at these three sites.

#### SUMMARY

The Committee is considering a referral that would direct the City Manager to issue a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the development of the West Berkeley Service Center site (located at 1900 Sixth Street) into a senior housing and services project, consistent with Age Friendly Berkeley recommendations. The Committee discussed this item at its February 20, 2019 meeting and requested that staff come to the March 7, 2019 Committee meeting with additional information.

Specifically, the Committee requested an estimate of the staff time required to conduct a basic analysis of the development potential for the West Berkeley Service Center site. The Committee also requested input from staff on the appropriate procurement process for soliciting ideas and proposals from housing developers for potential future development of the site.

#### STAFF TIME NEEDED:

Land Use staff recommend that the analysis of development potential at the site include build-out scenarios for a three-, four-, five- and six-story building at the site, using Mixed-Use Residential (MUR), West Berkeley Commercial (C-W), and Multiple-Family Residential (R-3) Development Standards. Each buildout scenario should reflect base project conditions, and conditions if Density Bonus waivers and concessions are requested, or if Use Permits are used to modify Development Standards. The proposed analysis would take approximately 40-60 hours of staff time.

#### **PROCUREMENT PROCESS:**

Staff recommends that Council consider:

Complete any rezoning before issuing an RFP. If the zoning changes for the site
are not yet settled, this may inhibit the number of interested developers. This
sequence would also avoid the duplicate time and expense of designing two
projects (one responding to the current zoning, one responding to the revised
zoning). Completing this process first will also mean that the RFP responses are

- based on more current information, since predevelopment work could proceed immediately after a contract award.
- A Request for Proposals (RFP), as opposed to a Request for Information (RFI), may be the best tool to use for soliciting development concepts from housing developers if Council wishes to use this process to award a contract, such as a Disposition and Development Agreement. An RFI is typically used to collect information from many potential bidders in anticipation of releasing a request for bids, to inform the request. An RFP is an excellent tool to use when the City wants bidders to apply their creative thinking to the proposed project and wants to award a contract. The RFP can ask the bidders to respond to multiple City priorities. Since identifying and analyzing options to develop the site will require an investment of staff time from respondents, developers are more likely to respond with more fully developed proposals if the process is used to award a contract.
- As a precursor to developing an RFP, it would help staff to understand Council's
  priorities for the site, particularly what project components are most important,
  such as maximizing the number of affordable units for seniors, providing deeply
  affordable units, inclusion of community services space, a memory care facility,
  etc. Understanding the ranking of Council priorities will help staff and bidders
  evaluate trade-offs and enable more responsive proposals, making the process
  more efficient for the City and developer alike.

Avenue and Proposing Resolution of Concerns at 2454 Telegraph Avenue

#### RECOMMENDATION

 Refer to the FY2025 Budget Process \$50,000 to support the installation of fixed or purchase of portable public chess/game tables on Telegraph Avenue, including at or near the intersection of Telegraph and Haste Streets, and potentially elsewhere in Berkeley to support development of a citywide chess & games facility.

- 2. Refer to the City Manager to explore the potential development of a parklet at or near the Telegraph/Haste intersection, potentially near the South/West corner (beyond the yellow loading area on Haste Street) and other potential locations for a parklet that could accommodate chess/game tables and the volume of community participation this activity generates. Staff should consider who is the appropriate entity to finance such an improvement.
- 3. Refer to the City Manager the development of a city-wide chess and game facilities program to integrate permanent chess/game nodes into park, curtilage, and/or sidewalk areas throughout Berkeley in a manner that encourages broad participation in and enjoyment of games and supports the building of community around these activities. Consider appropriate locations for nodes, installation of City-owned facilities, rules and regulations for use, and maintenance.
- 4. Direct the City Manager to explore entering into negotiations with the property owner at 2454 Telegraph Avenue to achieve an agreement that would result in upgrades and improvements to the building exterior/facade, create a landscaped perimeter around the exposed entry area, improve maintenance, and/or similar terms, in exchange for a reduction/waiver of accumulated fees.

#### POLICY COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

On December 11, 2023, the Health, Life Enrichment, Equity, & Community Committee adopted the following action: M/S/C (Hahn/Bartlett) to send Item 2 and Item 3 on the Committee's agenda to the City Council as revised with a positive recommendation. Proposed revisions include consideration of: financing of improvements; negotiations with property

owner(s); rules relating to the public right-of-way; and support of city-wide program(s). Vote: All Ayes.

This proposal was discussed at the December 12th meeting of the Health, Life Enrichment, Equity & Community policy committee. The Item was advanced with a Positive Recommendation alongside a separate, complementary item submitted by Councilmember Robinson: M/S/C (Hahn/Bartlett)

Vote: Ayes – Hahn, Bartlett, Humbert; Noes – None; Abstain – None

#### **SUMMARY STATEMENT**

In September, Telegraph Avenue's chess tables were shut down for the second time in two years. Tables were removed after the property owner at 2454 Telegraph received a violation notice for "obstructing the public right of way and violating a use permit." The result has been very negative for the diverse community of chess players and presents logistical and other challenges for the property owner whose relatively large entry plaza is contiguous with and open to sidewalks on both Telegraph and Haste streets.

Councilmembers have publicly voiced support for the City to resolve all related challenges in a manner that supports the continuation of chess on Telegraph Avenue – and potentially throughout the City of Berkeley – and improves conditions at the corner of Telegraph and Haste streets. This item proposes a path forward on all of these considerations.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Chess is one of the oldest games in the word and has become increasingly popular in recent years. It is a cross-generational and cross-cultural activity that doesn't even require players to speak the same language – offering an exceptional bridge to friendships and camaraderie.

The chess club that has been operating informally at and around the corner of Telegraph and Haste, on both public and private property, has faced challenges in finding appropriate space and facilities to engage in this very positive activity, without infringing on private property or impeding sidewalk access.

The City should encourage and support activities that build community and bring liveliness to our public realm, all while supporting our sidewalk policies and removing undue pressure from private property owners. The City can balance these needs and relieve pressure on sidewalks and private property by installing a permanent cluster of chess tables at or near the Telegraph/Haste intersection, and in City-designated locations across Berkeley, signaling its support for this important play and community building activity.

New York City's chess tables in Washington Square Park, for example, have been operational for decades, and have attracted chess enthusiasts from all over the city and world, including many legendary grandmasters. Washington Square Park, as well as Union Square and Bryant Park, are regular sites of exhibitions that turn out hundreds of players and spectators. Day-to-

day, these spaces are meeting places for diverse individuals and groups, and create vibrant and important community connections.

These proposed measures will allow the City to create, manage, and maintain facilities that encourage games and community building in a manner that supports both players and other users of the City's public parks and spaces. In addition, the City Council should seek resolution of imposition of fines on the property owner at 2454 Telegraph and improved management of the property, including the publicly-accessible entry plaza – for the benefit of all.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS

Subject: Installation of a 3-way Stop at the Intersection of Hopkins and McGee

#### RECOMMENDATION

Direct the City Manager to install two additional stop signs at the intersection of Hopkins and McGee Streets, transforming the 'T' intersection into a 3-way stop, to be installed as soon as possible, and no later than July 31, 2024.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The intersection of Hopkins and McGee is located in a busy neighborhood commercial district surrounded by residential areas and schools with significant pedestrian traffic. The three-way intersection of Hopkins and McGee makes a "T" directly in front of a preschool and is an important crossing leading to and from a small strip of popular food shops and restaurants. Currently, there is only one stop sign at the intersection, at the end of McGee; traffic on Hopkins Street does not stop in either direction (traveling east or west).

Berkeley Little School, directly across from McGee, is one of three preschools located within a few blocks of McGee and Hopkins, the other two being Mustard Seed School on Carlotta Avenue at Hopkins and Hopkins Preschool on Hopkins between Beverly Place and Josephine Streets. In addition to the large number of toddlers and young children and parents crossing Hopkins at McGee, the intersection is located at the eastern end of one of the busiest shopping blocks in North Berkeley. Families and seniors walk from nearby neighborhoods and drive to the area from throughout North Berkeley - and the entire City and region - to shop at the Monterey Market and other food purveyors including one of the most renown fish markets in the East Bay, as well as a bakery, butcher shop, cheese and coffee shop, wine and liquor store, and a popular pizza restaurant. The century-old Berkeley Horticultural Nursery is around the corner on McGee, also drawing large numbers of patrons as well as semi-trailer delivery trucks and vehicles picking up heavy loads.

Two large schools bring more than 1,500 teen-aged students to the area on a daily basis: Martin Luther King Jr. Middle School, with over 900 students, and St. Mary's High School, with over 600. King Middle School's campus includes a pool, tennis courts, and track that are used both by students and by members of the public of all ages who flock to the area after school hours and on weekends to use the recreational facilities. Ruth Acty Elementary and the Crowden Music Center are also located 3 blocks away, bringing hundreds more students and families to the area.

While there is a pedestrian crosswalk on Hopkins at McGee, residents of the area have long expressed feeling unsafe crossing the street, and described many near-misses. The area is home to many elderly residents, as well as residents who are visually impaired and/or have limited mobility. Residents report that they routinely step out to help neighbors who are elderly or have mobility issues cross the street safely. Residents of the neighborhood have reached out repeatedly over more than fifteen years - the first written communication shared with us is from 2008 - expressing concern for drivers barreling down Hopkins without regard for the existing crosswalk, and the potential of serious injuries.

More recently, in the course of planning for a larger project that has since been put on hold, a crosswalk was programmed for this location, and shown on staff-generated plans. In years leading up to the design of a larger project, verbal representations were made to the Council Member representing the District that stop signs were warranted on Hopkins at McGee; installation was delayed to coincide with an expected larger project. With the larger project now on hold, the previously-promised and independently warranted stop signs still should go forward.

In light of all of the above, this item directs the City Manager to install two additional stop signs on Hopkins at McGee Avenue, to stop vehicles traveling both east and west on Hopkins and allow pedestrians – in particular the many children, youth, and seniors who frequent this location – to cross safely. Simultaneous with installation of stop signs, the City Manager is requested to undertake routine intersection daylighting measures, per the City of Berkeley's existing policy, to further support pedestrian safety.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS

Limited costs and staff time associated with installation of two stop signs; to be accommodated using existing street safety funds, or, if none are available, T1 or other funds previously allocated for improvements to the Hopkins Corridor.

#### BACKGROUND

Proposition 1 is a combination of two bills Governor Newsom signed on October 12, 2023. SB-326 (Eggman) and AB-531(Irwin) are aimed at addressing the State's mental health crisis. The bills are packaged together into Proposition 1 for voters to approve in the Primary Election on March 5, 2024.

The extreme housing shortage coupled with the exorbitant cost of living throughout the State of California has led to our prevailing crisis of homelessness and housing insecurity. California State Proposition 1 will transform our state's mental health system and help to house those suffering with mental and behavioral health issues. This landmark proposition will reallocate billions of dollars to Californians with the most severe mental health needs and addiction issues, including those living in encampments.

In fact, this investment would be the single largest expansion of California's behavioral health treatment and residential settings in our state's history – creating new, dedicated housing for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness who have behavioral health needs. Through a \$6.38 billion bond, tens of thousands of Californians annually will receive mental health and addiction services, more than 11,000 housing settings will be created for residents with the most severe needs, and \$1 billion will be allocated to veterans experiencing homelessness.

The state funding granted by Proposition 1 will directly support Berkeley's work to solve our homeless and behavioral health crisis. However, Berkeley must ensure our State likewise provides treatment and long-term housing for people with acute mental illness and substance use disorder if we are to reduce homelessness. Therefore, we are requesting that the City Council support California Proposition 1 appearing on the March 5, 2024 California primary election ballot to continue working toward a sustainable solution to the mental health and homelessness crises across the State of California, and request that the City Manager issue a press release indicating the City Council's support for Proposition 1: Treatment not Tents.

This historic mental health and substance abuse disorder treatment system transformation comes after months of engagement with stakeholders across the state: people and families with lived experience, health care professionals, children and youth groups, veteran's organizations, schools and school administrators, businesses, labor leaders, mental health and equity advocates, first responders, and local officials.

Subject: Referral: Policies to Accommodate Chess

#### RECOMMENDATION

Refer to the City Manager to explore legislative and policy alternatives for accommodating chess and games in the public right-of-way. Consideration should be given to ensure that use of tables and chairs does not unduly obstruct public sidewalks or complicate existing enforcement of rules relating to the public right-of-way.

#### POLICY COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

On December 11, 2023, the Health, Life Enrichment, Equity, & Community Committee adopted the following action: M/S/C (Hahn/Bartlett) to send Item 2 and Item 3 on the Committee's agenda to the City Council as revised with a positive recommendation. Proposed revisions include consideration of: financing of improvements; negotiations with property owner(s); rules relating to the public right-of-way; and support of city-wide program(s). Vote: All Ayes.

This proposal was discussed at the December 12th meeting of the Health, Life Enrichment, Equity & Community policy committee. The proposal was advanced with a positive recommendation alongside a separate, complementary item submitted by Councilmember Hahn: M/S/C (Hahn/Bartlett).

Vote: Ayes – Hahn, Bartlett, Humbert; Noes – None; Abstain – None.

#### BACKGROUND

Community members have gathered to play chess and socialize on the 2400 block of Telegraph Avenue since 2021. The informal "chess club" that has met on the block is a cherished community space that embodies Berkeley values of non-commercial, organic interactions between people of all ages and backgrounds on one of the most historic and storied blocks in the City. The chess club serves as a space for all to interact in a transaction-free, non-commercialized environment that does not exclude those who are unable to pay.

The chess club has recently been situated on private property, which has created conflicts with the property owner. These activities, however, are not permitted in the public right-of-way. There are steps that the property owner could have taken and could

take now to welcome the chess club's activities at their current location if that is desired, including but not limited to building a parklet or seeking to modify the use permit for the property. And there are steps the city can take to expand space for public recreation, including reactivating the Dwight Triangle and pursuing reforms to the municipal code to enable these activities in the public right-of-way. It is in the public interest to explore all options.

The chess club has revealed some fundamental legal limitations that the Berkeley Municipal Code places on these organic activities — namely, on residents setting up tables, chairs, and other objects on sidewalks to utilize public space for purposes of recreation. In an increasingly commercialized and consumerist environment, free and communal activities such as gathering to play chess are a welcome and necessary use of public space. Moreover, they can serve to connect people of all backgrounds by enabling new "third spaces," or places other than work and school to socialize. It is clear that there is a public interest in encouraging these uses of public space, so long as participants act and operate with respect for their neighbors and surroundings.

There is a notable dearth of public seating available on Telegraph Avenue. Much of the seating in the Telegraph commercial district is behind paywalls, located at businesses and restaurants. There are limited spaces for relaxation and social gathering on Telegraph Avenue. A shortage of publicly available seating creates a particularly hostile environment for the elderly and disabled. The city council has embraced a radical vision for the future of Telegraph Avenue, one of widened sidewalks and beautiful placemaking where the avenue can be transformed into a plaza and embraced as a place for gathering, more so than a thoroughfare. That vision, however, will take time and significant resources. There are strategies, such as allowing chairs and tables provided by community members, that can be welcomed right now to embrace gathering and recreation on Telegraph.

At present, one additional bench has been ordered by city staff to provide for seating at a bus stop on Telegraph Avenue, and the city council has provided direction and referred funding to the budget process to reactivate the Dwight Triangle as an area for recreation and gathering with new seating. All the same, given the severe shortage of publicly available seating and space for resting currently, it is in the public interest to welcome efforts from community members to create additional space for gathering.

Chess club organizers have presented options to our offices proposing Berkeley Municipal Code edits that would loosen limitations on setting up movable tables and chairs on sidewalks. It is our intent, with this legislation, to give staff direction to study and recommend policy options for allowing activities like chess at movable tables and chairs to be set up organically on our sidewalks — so long as an ADA-accessible open sidewalk width is maintained — without applying for a city permit, reducing barriers to creating precisely the organic, transaction-free public spaces we want to see in our city.

Staff are encouraged to review and consider the proposed language submitted by community members in their analysis and preparation of recommendations and legislative alternatives. They are as follows:

#### Proposal 1:

In Proposal 1, a new section (H) is added to code section 16.18.040 Exemptions from permit requirements.

#### 16.18.040 Exemptions from permit requirements.

The following encroachments may be placed or maintained without a permit:

. . .

H. Objects such as, but not limited to, tables, chairs, canopies, and umbrellas that enable members of the public to assemble and engage in legal activities for the good of the community, insofar as:

- 1. All members of the public are allowed to utilize these objects, as long as they are engaged in legal activities such as painting, playing games, protected speech, etc.
- 2. Members of the public are not charged for use of these objects
- 3. <u>The placement of these objects may narrow the public right of way to no less</u> than six feet, where possible.

#### **Proposal 2:**

In Proposal 2, a new section (H) is added to Title 16, Chapter 18, Section 30 entitled Prohibited Encroachments.

#### Title 16, Chapter 18, Section 30 entitled Prohibited Encroachments

Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 16.18.020, the following encroachments are specifically prohibited, and no applications shall be accepted nor permits issued therefor:

. . .

H. Except for tables, canopies, umbrellas, and chairs with acute mobility (e.g. foldable structure and/or able to be disassembled rapidly); assembled for activities that provide a nonprofitable public good; devoid of major encroachment as defined by 16.18.010 Section C

#### RECOMMENDATION

Conduct a public hearing and upon conclusion:

- 1. Adopt first reading of an Ordinance expanding the Elmwood Business Improvement District, amending Chapter 7.84 of the Berkeley Municipal Code (BMC) originally adopted by Ordinance No. 6,164-N.S.; and
- Adopt a Resolution levying assessments in the Elmwood Business Improvement District for calendar year 2025 and giving the City Manager authority to contract with the Elmwood Business Association (EBA) to receive assessment revenue and spend it on improvements and activities authorized in the Ordinance and the Resolution of Intention: Resolution No. 71,099 -N.S.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

Based on the expanded geographic District boundary, projected Business Improvement District (BID) revenue of approximately \$50,000 will be deposited into the Elmwood BID Fund, and expensed from budget code 782-21-208-251-0000-000-446-636110. The BID constitutes an independent funding source that must be targeted to commercial revitalization efforts that are recommended by the Advisory Board. The City of Berkeley operates a parking lot within the district and will thus be assessed \$2,000 annually, paid through the Off-Street Parking Fund.

#### CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS

On August 18, 2023, the Elmwood Business Association voted unanimously to support the expansion of the district boundary. On October 2, 2023, the Elmwood Business Improvement District Advisory Board voted on an expanded district boundary to be implemented in calendar year 2025 (M/S-Han/Hammond; Ayes: (3) Han, Berne, Hammond, Nays: 0, Absent: (1) Stepak. The Elmwood Business Improvement District Advisory Board also voted to increase the assessment rate by \$1,000 for Parking Lot Operators to \$2,000, and decrease the \$250 assessment rate for Hair, Nail and Skin Services (NAICS 81211) to \$200 annually which is reflected in Exhibits A1 and A2 of

Attachment 2 (M/S-Han/Berne; Ayes: (3) Han, Berne, Hammond, Nays: 0, Absent: (1) Stepak.

California Streets and Highway Code Section 36500, the Parking and Business Improvement Area Law of 1989, requires specific actions to create or expand a business-based improvement district including compliance with Section 54954.6 of the California Government Code. Section 54954.6 requires Council to conduct at least one public meeting at which local officials allow public testimony regarding the proposed new assessment in addition to the noticed public hearing at which the legislative body proposes to enact the assessment.

On November 21, 2023 Council adopted Resolution No. 71,099–N.S., which states the intention to expand the Elmwood BID and directed the City Clerk to schedule a public meeting on December 12, 2023, and a public hearing on January 16, 2024 to consider the expansion of the District. The City Clerk's Office gave joint notice of both by mailing Resolution No. 71,099-N.S. to all affected businesses in the proposed (expanded) District, as is allowed by Section 54954.6 of the Government Code.

The proposed (expanded) Elmwood BID would assess businesses an annual fee according to classifications and rates defined in Exhibit A2 to Resolution No. 71,105-N.S., attached. The assessment will be collected at the same time as the annual business license renewal in a special fund, and will be remitted the revenue to the Elmwood Business Association (EBA) which will continue to be the "operating corporation" of the Elmwood BID. Projected revenues of approximately \$50,000 per year will be spent by the EBA on a program of services and activities intended to market, maintain and beautify the expanded Elmwood business improvement district.

#### BACKGROUND

In 2019, the members of the both the EBA and the BID Advisory Board expressed interest in potentially expanding the boundaries of the Elmwood BID to increase capacity and collaboration with unrepresented businesses on the northern and southern ends of the Berkeley's commercial areas along College Avenue. During the course of outreach with impacted merchants; collaboration with the neighboring Rockridge District Association in Oakland was explored and rich opportunities for streetscape improvements and partnerships were uncovered. The goal of expanding the District boundary is to support activities and programing and increase merchant and business owner collaboration in areas along College Avenue that have not previously benefited from BID support. The resolution of intention was adopted on November 21, 2023, the public meeting held on December 12, 2023, and this public hearing (1/16/24) represents the last legislative step in the process for the BID's boundary expansion in 2025.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

By maintaining and enhancing the district, the Elmwood BID creates shopping opportunities for residents and visitors alike while encouraging alternative forms of

transportation. The environmental enhancements contribute to making the Elmwood a more pleasant walking destination. Because the district is served by public transportation and biking infrastructure, these services indirectly support environmental sustainability goals of encouraging alternative transportation choices.

# ELMWOOD BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT AMENDMENTS; AMENDING BERKELEY MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 7.84

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Berkeley as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> That Berkeley Municipal Code Section 7.84.030 is amended to read as follows:

#### 7.84.030 Boundaries of district.

The boundaries of the District are as specified in this section and in the District's Boundary Map attached to the ordinance codified in this chapter and on file with the office of the City Clerk.

Western Boundary. A line connecting the western edge of all parcels fronting on the western side of College Avenue in the C-E and R-2A zoning districts from 2832-2640 College to 2992-3212 College but including parcels facing Derby Street, Stuart Street, Russell Street and the City-owned Elmwood parking lot that is accessed from Russell Street, and 2933 Benvenue Ave, addresses on 2626 Ashby Ave and 2953 Benvenue Avefrom 2629 to 2648. The parcels along the western boundary are as follows:

<u>Section 2.</u> That Berkeley Municipal Code Section 7.84.040 is amended to read as follows:

# 7.84.040 Calculation of assessments.

Businesses, trades, and professions located within the District boundaries shall, commencing on January 1, 20142025, pay an annual benefit assessment to the District in the amounts shown in Table 7.84.040.

No person or business shall be required to pay an assessment based on a residential use of the property within the District. Any business that is classified as a nonprofit (Tax Code N) for business licenses purposes, shall nevertheless pay the assessment at the rate that corresponds to its North American Standard Industrial Classification if it is engaged in the sale of products or services. Any new business established within the District shall not be required to pay an assessment on application for its business license but only on renewal at the end of the year it was initiated.

<u>Section 3.</u> Copies of this Ordinance shall be posted for two days prior to adoption in the display case located near the walkway in front of the Maudelle Shirek Building, 2134 Martin Luther King Jr. Way. Within 15 days of adoption, copies of this Ordinance shall be filed at each branch of the Berkeley Public Library and the title shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation.

LEVYING AN ANNUAL ASSESSMENT IN THE ELMWOOD BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT (BID) FOR CALENDAR YEAR 2025, AND AUTHORIZING A CONTRACT OR CONTRACT AMENDMENTS WITH ELMWOOD BUSINESS ASSOCIATION TO SERVE AS FISCAL AGENT FOR RECEIPT AND EXPENDITURE OF ELMWOOD BID FUNDS

WHEREAS, on November 21, 2023, the City Council by Resolution No. 71,099-N.S described an expanded boundary for the Elmwood BID, and a revised fee structure, and declared its intent to levy an assessment in the District to finance the proposed activities for the calendar year 2025; and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 71,099 -N.S. also scheduled a public hearing for January 16, 2024, to consider levying said assessment and gave notice that interested parties could attend and be heard on the issue, for and against; and

WHEREAS, the City Clerk has notified potential assessees of the public hearing by publishing the Resolution of Intention in a newspaper of general circulation; and

WHEREAS, the public hearing has now been held and there has not been protests by business owners who collectively pay 50 percent or more of the assessment proposed to be levied.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Berkeley that any protests are overruled and the expanded boundaries of the Elmwood BID is confirmed, thereby levying an annual assessment for the Elmwood BID for calendar year 2025.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council authorizes the City Manager to enter into a contract or contract amendments with Elmwood Business Association to receive and spend funds for purposes approved in the Annual Report and Budget and as directed by the Elmwood BID Advisory Board.

## RESOLUTION NO. 71,099-N.S.

DECLARING COUNCIL'S INTENTION TO LEVY AN ASSESSMENT IN THE ELMWOOD BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT FOR 2025; AND DIRECTING THE CITY CLERK TO SCHEDULE A PUBLIC HEARING FOR JANUARY 16, 2024 REGARDING AN EXPANDED DISTRICT BOUNDARY AND ASSESSMENT RATES FOR 2025

WHEREAS, the Parking and Business Improvement Area Law of 1989 (California Streets and Highway Code section 36500 et seq.) authorizes cities to establish parking and business improvement areas for the purpose of imposing assessments on businesses for certain purposes; and

WHEREAS, on November 19, 2013 the Berkeley City Council established such an area known as the Elmwood Business Improvement District (the "District"); and

WHEREAS, the City Council established the Elmwood Business Improvement District Advisory Board (Advisory Board) to act in compliance with State law to oversee the activities of the District; and

WHEREAS, on October 2, 2023 the Advisory Board voted to approve an expanded boundary map of the District, to update the assessment rates, and to submit the proposed rates and map to the City Council as required by the California Streets and Highways Code Section 36500; and

WHEREAS, the proposed district map is clear and complete and found to comply with the interests of Elmwood BID assessees; and

WHEREAS, the process for modifying the boundaries and assessments in Business Improvement Districts requires that cities adopt a Resolution of Intent that declares their intent to modify the boundary and the assessment and then set a date for a public hearing where interested parties may be heard on the issue.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Berkeley as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> Pursuant to the provisions of Section 36500 et seq. of the California Streets and Highways Code (the "Act"), the City Council declares its intent to modify the district boundary map and levy an annual assessment for the parking and business improvement area known as the Elmwood Business Improvement District.

<u>Section 2.</u> The boundaries of the District are set forth in Exhibit A1 to the Resolution of Intent which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>Section 3.</u> The improvements and activities proposed for the District will utilize funds designated for activities and improvements in the Elmwood area. Council explicitly intends that funds generated through this BID shall not be used to pay for activities routinely paid for by the City. The improvements and activities proposed for the District

are to promote, maintain and beautify the Elmwood Commercial District and include maintenance and capital improvements targeted for the area. Funds must be used for designated activities and improvements in the Elmwood BID commercial area. Funds generated through this BID shall not be used for activities routinely paid for by the City.

<u>Section 4.</u> The City Council intends to levy assessments on businesses located within the boundaries of the District shown Exhibit A1 and according to the business classifications and rates set forth in Exhibit A2 which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. Any past due business license tax and related assessment fees will correspond to the rate currently in place. Any past due business license tax and related assessment fees not in the assessment boundary prior to January 1, 2025 will not be subject to the assessment.

Section 5. A public hearing shall be held before the City Council at 6:00 p.m. on January 16, 2024 at 1231 Addison Street, Berkeley, California. Following the hearing the Council will consider adoption of a resolution approving the District boundary map and levying an assessment as recommended by the Elmwood Business Improvement Advisory Board. At this hearing the Council will hear all interested persons for or against the expanded District boundary map or the levying of such an assessment. A public meeting will be held December 12, 2023 at 6:00 p.m. at 1231 Addison Street, Berkeley, California regarding the proposed expansion as required by Government Code Section 54954.6.

Protests may be made orally at the public hearing, or in writing by any interested person. Written protests shall be filed with or mailed to the City Clerk Department, 2180 Milvia Street, First Floor, Berkeley, California, 94704. Written protests must be received by the City Clerk at or before 3:00 pm on January 16, 2024. Written protests may also be filed in person at the public hearing, prior to the close of the hearing. Written protests will not be considered valid unless signed by the owner of a business located within the boundaries of the proposed District. This signature shall be accompanied by the name of the business owner (printed) and the date of the protest. Additionally, written protests shall contain a description of the business sufficient to identify the business, such as business name (printed), business address (printed), and City Business License Tax Registration number (or, if no Business License Number, Financial Institution name). Protests must also state if they are protesting against the furnishing of a specified type or types of improvements or activities within the District.

If the person so protesting is not listed on City records as the owner of the business, the protest shall be accompanied by written evidence that the person subscribing the protest is the owner of the business.

Any protest pertaining to the regularity or sufficiency of the proceedings shall be in writing and shall clearly set forth the irregularity or defect to which the objection is made. If written

protests are received from the owners of businesses in the District which will pay fifty percent (50%) or more of the assessment proposed to be levied, no further proceedings to levy the assessment shall be taken for a period of one year from the date of the finding of a majority protest by the City Council. If the majority protest is only against the furnishing of a specified type or types of improvements or activities within the District, those types of improvements or activities shall be eliminated.

<u>Section 7</u>. The City Clerk is directed to give notice of said public hearing by publishing the Resolution of Intention in a newspaper of general circulation.

<u>Section 8.</u> The City Clerk is directed to give notice of said hearings as provided in section 36623 of the Act and section 54954.6 of the Government Code, which requires that the agency shall give notice by mail to the record owner of each identified business and financial institution. The public hearing shall be held not less than 45 days after the adoption of this Resolution.

Exhibit A1: Proposed Elmwood Business Improvement District Boundary Map - 2025



# RECOMMENDATION

Adopt the Resolution of Intention and first reading of an Ordinance to amend the contract between the Board of Administration, California Public Employees' Retirement System, and the City Council for the City of Berkeley (a) pursuant to California Government Code Section 20516 to eliminate the cost share contributions made on behalf of the City by PEPRA members of the Unrepresented Employees group, and (b) pursuant to California Government Code Section 20434 to add the Paramedic and Limited Term Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) classifications under the Safety category.

## FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

Based on this action, the additional cost share contributions made on behalf of the City by Unrepresented Employees, originally scheduled for gradual reduction through FY 2026-27, will be eliminated upon amendment of the City's contract with CalPERS, and the City will begin making those contributions on the affected employees' behalf.

There are approximately 75 Unrepresented Employees who are PEPRA members of CalPERS and affected by this resolution, and the total cost to approve the ramp down for Unrepresented Employees is approximately \$247,957.

## **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

Council adopted Resolution #70,156 N.S. at its December 14, 2021 meeting authorizing the FY 2021-22 amendment to the City's CalPERS Miscellaneous contract. Council must now pass another Resolution of Intention to approve the FY 2023-24 contract amendment between the City and the Public Employees' Retirement System Board of

Administration. (See Cal. Gov. Code § 20516.) The contract amendment process includes the following steps:

- The City shall provide CalPERS with the Resolution and a cover letter indicating the exact percentage of change, total cost-share percentage, and who it is applicable to – completed October 2023;
- CalPERS will contact the City to establish the Anticipated Schedule of Agency Actions and send the required documents;
- Over a time period specified by CalPERS, the City will:
  - Conduct an employee election whereby a simple majority of the affected PEPRA members in the Unrepresented Employees group must vote in favor of the proposed cost-share terms – completed September 2023;
  - The City shall adopt a Resolution of Intention;
  - The City shall approve the final reading of an ordinance or final resolution and complete certification forms;
- Once the documents are received and approved, the contract amendment becomes effective and is updated with the effective date in MyCalPERS;
- CalPERS sends a fully executed contract to the City.

# ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACT

There are no identifiable environmental effects or opportunities associated with the subject of this report.

# RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

In order to eliminate the additional cost share contributions made on behalf of the City by PEPRA members of the Unrepresented Employees group, Council must now pass another Resolution of Intention to approve the FY 2023-24 contract amendment between the City and the Public Employees' Retirement System Board of Administration.

The recommendation to add Paramedic and Limited Term EMT job classifications as Safety Members of CalPERS is consistent with California Government Code Section 20434, which defines "Local firefighter" to include employees of a fire department dedicated to emergency medical services.

# ALTERNATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED

Continue with the reduction as scheduled, which will lead to inequity between represented and unrepresented employees.



Subject: Consideration of Options for Berkeley High School Staff Parking

## RECOMMENDATION

Receive information on several options for providing additional parking for Berkeley High School staff. Provide feedback to staff, which will then be shared with 2x2 Committee with the goal of identifying a mutually agreeable solution for both the school district and the City.

# FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

Potential fiscal impacts will vary by option, as described in the following sections.

## **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

Representatives of Berkeley High School state that Berkeley High School teachers use breaks in their schedule to move their vehicles around within the time-limited parking spaces near the school, for the purpose of avoiding parking tickets. For these reasons, the District has requested that the City issue Preferential Parking Program permits for use by Berkeley High School teachers in both the zone where the school is located, and the zones immediately adjacent to the school.

According to the District, the recipients of permits issued to Berkeley High School are already parking on the streets in the vicinity of the school, and therefore the issuance of these permits would have a negligible impact upon parking conditions in the area.

## **BACKGROUND**

The Preferential Parking Program (Chapter 14.72) creates various categories of parking permits that may be issued by the Department of Finance and establishes various criteria for issuance of those permits. In addition to residential parking permits (14.72.090) and local business permits (14.72.100), parking permits may be issued to Neighborhood-serving Community Facilities, such as "churches, schools, senior centers and alcohol and drug rehabilitation facilities." (14.72.110.B.). The criteria for issuance of permits to Neighborhood-serving Community Facilities is enumerated at Section 14.72.105.B. as follows:

- 1. An enterprise for which there is inadequate off-street parking and no financially feasible way of creating adequate off-street parking on the site of the enterprise;
- 2. An enterprise for which there is no off-street parking available nearby for lease or rental;
- 3. The total number of permits issued does not exceed the number representing 60% of the enterprise's employees;
- 4. The total number of permits issued to a Berkeley Unified School District (BUSD) school that is not within 1/2 mile of a Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) Station, and not within 1/4 mile from a rapid transit bus stop, and not within 1/4 mile from two bus routes that run at a frequency of 20 minutes or less does not exceed 70% of the enterprise's employees;
- 5. Distribution of permits shall be through a designated representative of the enterprise who will be responsible for allocation of the permits to employees, or in the case of the senior centers, to users of the enterprise; and
- 6. Degree of impact on parking conditions for residents and merchants in the area.

Berkeley Unified School District asserts that it meets the criteria for issuance of permits. Berkeley High School currently lacks adequate off-street parking on its campus.

The City operates a parking garage nearby, and while the district has expressed a willingness to analyze options for funding of spaces, they have also noted that the current cost quoted for the needed number of spaces (approximately \$150,000 per year) is likely not fiscally feasible.

# 1. Quantity of Permits

Whereas businesses and residents have a limit of between one (1) and three (3) permits per address, the only limit for schools is set forth in 14.72.105.B.3.: the total number of permits issued for a Neighborhood-Serving Community Facility cannot exceed 60% of Berkeley High School Preferential Parking Permits Page 3 the enterprise's employees, unless the facility is a BUSD school that is located more than ½ mile from BART or more than ¼ mile from a bus rapid transit stop. Berkeley High School is located well within ½ mile of the Downtown Berkeley BART station, so the operative limit is 60% of the school's employees.

Without any amendments to the ordinance, the City can issue a number of permits equal to 60% of the employees of Berkeley High School. At the November 2x2 Committee meeting, Berkeley Unified School District Facilities Manager John Calise indicated that there are approximately 400 employees at the school, which would result in 240 permits utilizing the 60% figure.

# 2. Location of permits

There is no area restriction applicable to Neighborhood-Serving Community Facility permits. In drafting and passing the Preferential Parking Program, Council chose to impose geographical limitations for certain kinds of permits but not for others. Residential permits can only be issued for a vehicle that is registered with the DMV to an address within the zone. (14.72.090.B.3.) Local business permits can only be issued "for a motor vehicle regularly used in the business activity of such commercial establishment for parking such motor vehicle in such designated local business parking subarea." (14.72.100.B.) However, for Neighborhood-Serving Community Facility permits, the only geographical limitation is a broad consideration of the "Degree of impact on parking conditions for residents and merchants in the area." (14.72.105.B.6.)

It is reasonable to assume that the lack of criteria for the location of NSCF permits is intentional, but City staff is seeking Council feedback as to whether or not to issue a substantial number of permits in this area (and potentially others). There may be many facilities located on a boundary of a designated parking area and so they intent may have been to spread the permits around to multiple areas. Moreover, the Department "shall issue permits such that they will not unduly be concentrated on a specific block front in any given residential permit parking area." (14.72.080.B.) Where a facility such as Berkeley High School is located on the border of a residential permit parking area, this undue concentration requirement can more readily be met by dividing the permits between adjacent permit areas.

For additional context, a staff report from October 17, 2017 entitled *Referral Response:* Additional Neighborhood Serving Community Facility Parking Permits for Berkley Unified School District Facilities is attached.

# **Options for Council Consideration**

The following five options for addressing the request for additional parking for Berkeley High School staff are being presented for Council to review, discuss and provide feedback to staff. This feedback will be shared with 2x2 Committee, with the end goal of identifying a mutually agreeable solution for both the school district and the City.

As part of this exercise of developing options, opportunities for increasing access to parking for City employees are also noted, as City employees are experiencing challenges with finding parking similar to Berkeley High School staff.

 Option 1: Provide an increased number of permits to Berkeley High School staff and City staff

As previously noted, under the current ordinance, the City can grant up to 60% of the employees of Berkeley High School. One option would be to amend the ordinance to

allow for more permits to be provided to High School staff. It would be beneficial for the City if a similar approach could be applied to City of Berkeley staff (City staff are currently ineligible for permits under the Preferential Parking Program), perhaps under a new, similar program. As previously noted, City staff are also having significant difficulty finding sufficient, inexpensive parking around the Civic Center area.

If the desire is to pursue this option, it should also be clarified whether the increase in permits will be within the existing parking permit area, or will be spread across neighboring parking permit areas.

# Option 2: Amend parking hours around Berkeley High School/Civic Center

Another option would be to amend the parking hours in the parking permit area around the High School/Civic Center from two (2) to four (4) hours. While this option would likely result in staff still needing to move their cars at least once during the work day, it would reduce the total number of times they would need to do so.

A related, alternate option would be to remove parking time limits entirely, which would allow staff that are able to find a spot to remain in that spot all day. However, that option would require further study, as the purpose of parking time limitations is to encourage the circulation of vehicles (thus increasing the available spaces at any given time) and eliminating restrictions could reduce the use of the Center Street garage, which was funded via interest bearing bonds with specific performance obligations.

# • Option 3: Permits based on criteria, coupled with changes to parking hours

A hybrid of the above two options would be to provide permits to only those High School and City staff who aren't able to move their cars throughout the day due to the need to remain in the classroom or at their assigned working space. For example, teachers in classrooms and City positions that are public facing, and so may not be able to readily leave their desks during the day. Additionally, the City could issue these permits in several adjacent zones, to deconcentrate impacts and spread vehicles farther than under current conditions.

For those employees not eligible for permits under the hybrid option criteria, there could also be consideration of making an increase of parking times to four (4) hours on everyother block throughout adjacent zones within two (2) to twelve (12) blocks from the High School and Civic Center. To illustrate, starting one block away from the core area, one side of the street would be two (2) hours and the other is four (4). This would help avoid the majority of vehicles being right next to the High School and Civic Center and distribute parking a bit further out. (Note that in this scenario, blocks immediately next to the Civic Center would remain two (2) hours on both sides in order to serve shorter term visitors.)

# Option 4: "Swap" use of garage by Berkeley High staff for City Council use of the School Board Chambers (or other swap options)

Currently the City Council has an agreement with the Berkeley School District to use the School Board Chambers for Berkeley City Council meetings. One suggested option is to explore amending that agreement to "swap" a number of spaces in the Center Street parking garage for use of the chambers. Additionally, there may be other options for a swap that could be explored.

# Option 5: Discount Parking at Center Street garage

Another option for consideration would be to continue exploring whether the High School could lease a certain number of spaces at the Center Street garage at a discount. As noted previously, the district has expressed a willingness to look at options for funding of spaces for BHS staff, but has also expressed that the current cost quoted of approximately \$150,000 per year would be too costly. Further, the City is limited in terms of the amount of discount that can be provided, given that the parking revenues have been pledged to bondholders and the City is not currently meeting its revenue ratio covenant. If the District is able to make funds available for this type of expense, the City and District could explore further how many spaces at what cost they could be made available.

# **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY AND CLIMATE IMPACTS**

There are no identifiable environmental effects, climate impacts, or sustainability opportunities associated with the subject of this report.

# RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

These options are being provided for the Council in response to the school district's request for additional parking spaces for their staff and subsequent discussions by 2x2 Committee members (see attached 2x2 Committee minutes). Additionally, several of the options provide an opportunity to provide increased parking for City staff, which is also a significant need expressed by various labor groups and also aligned with the City's Employer of Choice Initiative.

## ALTERNATIVE ACTIONS CONSIDERED

Staff considered a number of options, all of which are presented in this report.

# RECOMMENDATION

To implement the policy change requested by a February 28, 2017 Council referral, adopt first reading of an Ordinance amending Berkeley Municipal Code section 14.72.105 to increase residential preferential parking permits for Berkley Unified School District schools from a maximum of 60% to a maximum of 70% of total Berkley Unified School District staff (including teachers), for schools more than one half mile from a BART Station, more than one quarter mile from a Rapid Transit Stop, and more than one quarter mile from two major transit lines.

# FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

Based on current Berkley Unified School District (BUSD) staffing levels, City staff expect to generate \$621 annually for the General Fund from the sale of nine additional residential preferential parking (RPP) permits.

## **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

At the January 19, 2017 2X2 Committee meeting, two Council members and BUSD Staff proposed increasing the limit on Neighborhood Serving Community Facility (NSCF) permits from 60% to 70% for schools outside areas well served by transit. This report responds to referral #2017-35 that originally appeared on the agenda of the February 28, 2017 meeting, sponsored by Councilmember Maio and Mayor Arreguin, where City Council approved a referral to the City Manager formalizing that requested increase. Individual schools have requested additional permits because they have staff that drive who don't have NSCF permits, and who are subject to limited transit service or a lack of access to reasonable parking choices. Those employees often park in Residential Preferential Parking (RPP) areas with two-hour visitor time limits, and subsequently move their cars every two hours. This proposed ordinance would codify an increase in the number of available permits in the Berkeley Municipal Code (BMC), and will allow staff to implement the requested change.

## BACKGROUND

Every September, NSCFs apply for permits for RPP permits for staff subject to the following guidelines:

- Per BMC 14.72.105, the number of permits may be no more than 60% of the number of employees at each facility.
- Only K-12 Schools are eligible for NSCF Permits.
- Part time staff (under 30 hours/week) count as one half of an employee for purposes of determining 60%.
- Off-Street Parking available to NSCF staff is subtracted from 60%.
- The BMC also takes into account the parking impact on residents. This has caused a cap on the number of permits allocated in area E, as the blocks bounded by Cedar, MLK, University and Shattuck are particularly impacted.
- The City does not issue permits to NSCFs in area I due to severely limited RPP parking availability in that area.
- Permits are allocated to staff by the facility administration using whatever criteria they choose.

The primary purpose of RPP is to ensure adequate on-street parking availability for residents of a neighborhood when parking demand from employees and visitors of nearby businesses may otherwise exceed the supply of on-street parking spaces. When parking supply is particularly low or demand is particularly high, issuing too many NSCF permits in the area may impact the ability of residents and other permit holders to find available parking spaces.

Although the RPP program is intended to discourage use of single occupant vehicles by visitors and employees of nearby businesses, staff acknowledges that for some BUSD employees it is difficult to commute to work by means other than personal vehicles for reasons including limited access to transit services in their commute area. Thus City policy allows issuance of NSCF permits to minimize some of the impacts to BUSD employees.

# **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY**

Using current BUSD staffing levels, this change would result in the issuance of approximately nine more permits. Because this increase would apply only at those schools where commuting by public transit is a less feasible option, there could be a very small decrease in greenhouse gas emissions associated with fewer BUSD staff who would move their cars every two hours.

# RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

BUSD has expressed a need for more permits for staff who cannot easily commute by public transit. The proposed changes would have minimal impacts to residential parking.

## ORDINANCE NO. #,###-N.S.

AMENDING THE RESIDENTIAL PREFERENTIAL PARKING ORDINANCE, BERKELEY MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 14.72.105, TO INCREASE ALLOWABLE PERMITS TO 70% FOR BERKELEY UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FACILITIES OUTSIDE THE TRANSIT RICH ZONE

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Berkeley as follows:

Section 1. That Berkeley Municipal Code 14.72.105 is amended to read as follows:


# 14.72.105 Neighborhood-serving community facility permits.

- A. The Department of Finance may issue neighborhood-serving community facility enterprise permits with a term not to exceed one year subject to the requirements set forth in this section and in administrative rules and regulations issued pursuant to this chapter.
- B. A neighborhood-serving community facility parking permit may be issued to representatives of the following neighborhood-serving community facilities: churches, schools, and senior centers. The issuance of permit can occur no sooner than 30 days after implementation of a residential permit parking area and the following criteria shall be used in establishing eligibility of an enterprise and the number of permits to be issued any enterprise:
  - 1. An enterprise for which there is inadequate off-street parking and no financially feasible way of creating adequate off-street parking on the site of the enterprise;
  - 2. An enterprise for which there is no off-street parking available nearby for lease or rental;
  - 3. The total number of permits issued under no circumstances does not exceeds the number representing 60% of the enterprise's employees;
  - 4. The total number of permits issued to a Berkeley Unified School District (BUSD) school that is not within ½ mile of a Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) Station, and not within ¼ mile from a rapid transit bus

stop, and not within ¼ mile from two bus routes that run at a frequency of 20 minutes or less does not exceed 70% of the enterprise's employees;

- 45. Distribution of permits shall be through a designated representative of the enterprise who will be responsible for allocation of the permits to employees, or in the case of the senior centers, to users of the enterprise; and
- 56. Degree of impact on parking conditions for residents and merchants in the area. (Ord. 6762-NS § 4 (part), 2003: Ord. 5972-NS § 1, 1990: Ord. 5803-NS § 2 (part), 1987)

<u>Section 2.</u> Copies of this Ordinance shall be posted for two days prior to adoption in the display case located near the walkway in front of Council Chambers, 2134 Martin Luther King Jr. Way. Within 15 days of adoption, copies of this Ordinance shall be filed at each branch of the Berkeley Public Library and the title shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation.

## **RECOMMENDATION:**

Request the City Manager to increase the guidelines used to grant residential permit parking to BUSD schools from 60% to 70% of the number of BUSD staff (includes teachers) for schools more than 1/2 mile from a BART Station, or 1/4 mile from a Rapid Transit Stop, or 1/4 mile from two (2) major transit lines.

## **BACKGROUND:**

This recommendation will be able to address serious parking impacts for Emerson School as described by its Principal (Susan Hodge) at a recent 2x2 Committee meeting. John Muir School would also be eligible for allocation increase from 60% to 70% under the proposed policy (see below). The recommendation was discussed at the 2x2 Committee, attended by City transportation staff and the City Manager. The 10% increase will amount to an addition of approximately five additional parking permits.

Given that there are parking issues at most of the BUSD schools, the 2x2 Committee will continue to work within the 2x2 structure, along with City staff, on ways in which we can address the parking needs of our schools while also being sensitive to neighborhood impacts. In addition, staff will be looking into allowing the acquisition of some commercial yellow zone permits for BUSD maintenance staff. It was also requested, as we pursue parking issues, that the Superintendent will share with us the District's program(s) for incentives staff to utilize public transit.

Neighborhood Serving Community Facility (NSCF) Process

- Every September, NSCFs apply for permits for staff. Per Berkeley Municipal Code, the number of permits may be no more than 60% of the number of employees.
- Part time staff (under 30 hrs./week) count as ½ of an employee for purposes of determining 60% figure.
- Off-Street Parking available to NSCF staff is subtracted from the 60% figure.
- BMC also requires that we take into account the impact on residents with respect to parking. This has caused us to effectively cap the number of

- permits allocated in area E as the blocks bounded by Cedar, MLK, University and Shattuck are particularly impacted.
- We also do not issue permits to NSCFs in area I due to severely limited RPP parking availability in area I.
- Permits are allocated by the facility administration using whatever criteria they choose.

BMC 14.72.105 Neighborhood-serving community facility permits.

- A. The Department of Finance may issue neighborhood-serving community facility enterprise permits with a term not to exceed one year subject to the requirements set forth in this section and in administrative rules and regulations issued pursuant to this chapter.
- B. A neighborhood-serving community facility parking permit may be issued to representatives of the following neighborhood-serving community facilities: churches, schools, and senior centers. The issuance of permit can occur no sooner than 30 days after implementation of a residential permit parking area and the following criteria shall be used in establishing eligibility of an enterprise and the number of permits to be issued any enterprise:
  - 1. An enterprise for which there is inadequate off-street parking and no financially feasible way of creating adequate off-street parking on the site of the enterprise;
  - 2. An enterprise for which there is no off-street parking available nearby for lease or rental;
  - 3. The total number of permits issued under no circumstances exceeds the number representing 60% of the enterprise's employees;
  - 4. Distribution of permits shall be through a designated representative of the enterprise who will be responsible for allocation of the permits to employees, or in the case of the senior centers, to users of the enterprise; and
  - 5. Degree of impact on parking conditions for residents and merchants in the area. (Ord. 6762-NS § 4 (part), 2003: Ord. 5972-NS § 1, 1990: Ord. 5803-NS § 2 (part), 1987)

## Possible actions for Council to consider:

- 1. Allow distribution of a limited number of visitor passes to substitute teachers (number based on previous years substitute days).
- 2. Increase permit allocation to 70% of staff only for BUSD locations not ½ mile from a BART Station or ¼ mile from Rapid Transit Stop or ¼ mile from 2 major transit lines.

## **Public Comment:**

The following public comment was heard by the committee:

Cordell Hinder spoke regarding an upcoming event in Contra Costa County on March 2, 2023. He also spoke regarding the parking item and encouraged the school and city to work together to promote more sustainable transportation and good parking.

Mati Teiblum spoke regarding parking and noted that BUSD and City of Berkeley should work collaboratively to tackle the issue.

Damien spoke regarding parking and the various hurdles.

Liza Lutzker spoke regarding the need to get the data from the transportation survey and a detailed analysis of cost. She also expressed that she hopes there will be more regular meetings around student safety. She shared that on March 8<sup>th</sup>, there will be an Oxford elementary school meeting. She also spoke regarding need for workforce housing for teachers.

Douglas Legg spoke about the opportunity for the use of the existing City garage and using the bond dollars to support needs of children.

Ken talked about using bond dollars for classrooms.

Cielo Rios expressed thanks to the City and BUSD staff and noted that the parking space options should be put on pause.

Dietmar Lorenz spoke about need for workforce housing and classrooms. Expressed shock regarding the parking structure, and that it is not needed, particularly in that location.

Cielo Rios thanked the District and City for working together to pursue creative options that reserve bond money and physical space for our kids instead of cars. Help remedy challenges for elementary and middle school staff, who use cars as primary forms of transit due to Berkeley's unaffordable housing crisis and challenges the comprehensive public transit to school sites.

Rachey Lee expressed excitement about new solutions. Agreed with completely eliminating the parking structure project. Offered to help or serve on a committee, to move new efforts forward.

#### **5.** Discussion Items

# 5.1 - Partnership to Mitigate Ongoing Vandalism Around School Sites, and Fines Imposed by Code Enforcement

Director Calise presented. He spoke about commitment from Board and Council Members to create a partnership for ongoing issues with vandalism. He stated that BUSD's walls are tagged heavier and it requires BUSD to paint windscreens each time - typically 15 hours overtime on a Saturday and within 24 hours, 75 to 85% of the graffiti is back. He mentioned that BUSD has been issued fines by code enforcement. They are looking for additional solutions, such as windscreens with preprinted murals.

Councilmember Hahn commented that this goes in the broader context of how the City should prioritize the needs of our sister organizations and sister agencies. She mentioned that they had created a program to prioritize BUSD's Public Works requests, which would include dealing with city signs that had graffiti on it and keeping curbs and crosswalks painted -- Bright Streets. The referral to have the City establish a form to have BUSD's Public Works requests jump the line has not been implemented. At recent City Council meeting, it was asked that this be treated as a short-term referral.

Peter Radu who oversees Neighborhood Services for the City provided an update on BUSD's property at 1222 University with the windscreens. He clarified that no citations have been issued to BUSD in the past three years. He also stated that after looking into issue more closely with the City Attorney, the determination was reached that the City does not have authority to enforce Graffiti Ordinance against BUSD - BMC 1398. The City team will halt current and future enforcement of BMC 1398 against BUSD properties and will rescind any outstanding notices or citation warnings. He further expressed genuine interest in being collaborative in working with property owners.

Director Calise stated that fines were never paid during COVID and no refunds are required. He further commented that PD indicated that the repeat offenders, particularly at West Campus, are the ones tagging the majority of the City and with talking PD, they were willing to put officers on overtime overnight in hopes of apprehending repeat offenders.

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President Babitt commented that support is needed for making sure the graffiti stops as it is costing the District a lot of money to constantly address graffiti.

Deputy City Manager Cardwell stated that the City will touch base with Police Chief on the overtime issue.

PW Director Garland advised that the City Manager issued an off-agenda memo in August 2022, updating the community on the progress with the Bright Streets initiative. He also advised that in advance of start of school year, Public Works circles all schools (about a block radius) to make sure that signage, curb painting, pavement markings, etc., are all updated and refreshed.

Vice President Vasudeo commented that at a previous 2x2 meeting the discussion regarding Bright Street was to follow the same model that SFMTA with SFSD which is to reach out to principals. Do you know if that's being followed?

PW Director Garland advised that they will share department update at next 2x2 meeting.

Vice President Vasudeo stated she would like to coordinate with the principals regarding traffic safety concerns of the parents within the three blocks.

PW Director Garland stated that principals who have traffic safety concerns can reach him directly and get prioritized.

Councilmember Hahn commented regarding clarifying two things. One, giving priority to Bright Streets before the school year begins along perimeter of school and kids' routes to school. Two, ongoing, all year requests and having a system for those making sure they get to head of queue.

#### 5.2 - Update on the Milvia Street Project

The committee received a PowerPoint presentation from Director Calise regarding Update on Milvia Street Project. This was followed by committee members asking questions.

Vice President Vasudeo asked clarifying question regarding why TDM survey is being done separate from the staff survey and why the different timelines.

Director Calise responded that the TDM survey is a robust survey much bigger than what can be done in house. There is a need to know how many people are driving and why; and how many spots are available in the neighborhood. TDM is forthcoming; but there is limit on what can be produced.

Vice President Vasudeo asked who is doing the TDM survey, the timeline and how is the District incentivizing staff to use sustainable means for transportation.

Director Calise responded that the District has not picked a consultant to do the TDM. The District currently incentivizes staff with the Cafeteria Plan; but could not speak as to whether the District has additional money to incentivize.

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President Babitt asked for next steps to solve teachers' need to move cars every two hours and if there were different policy issues to work on in interim for more parking permits.

PW Director Liam Garland commented that the plan is to take the presentation to the City's technical experts in parking program, do some further analysis, especially the pros and cons of different policy options in front of the USD and the City and return with analysis and alternatives at next 2x2 meeting.

Councilmember Hahn requested clarification regarding placement of proposed new building and tennis courts.

Director Calise responded that four tennis courts, the new building, and additional parking will be on the main campus.

Councilmember Hahn stated she was looking forward to having data about how many parking permits are desired and what the City will decide to do.

Director Calise stated the intent to have results regarding how many people are driving by next meeting.

Director Vasudeo spoke about the conversation needed for TDM and how are we incentivizing staff to travel more sustainably.

# 5.3. - Update on Berkeley Youth Equity Partnership

Director of Health, Housing and Community Services, Dr. Lisa Warhuus, along with Nina Goldman, Katie Cobian presented on Berkeley Youth Equity Partnership. The presentation covered the New Name, Impacts of Berkeley's 2020 Vision; Lessons Learned; YEP's Framework and Key Activities. This was followed by committee members asking questions.

President Babbit thanked HHCS for presentation and expressed BUSD goal for partnership with the City to support students. President Babbit acknowledged the work and asked for a moment of silence for Hon. Karen Hempfield, former BUSD Board Member and President.

Director Vasudeo commented about having targeted outreach to Umoja and Puente program participants for an opportunity to be a part of the panel. She also spoke about learning how the City is working with CBOs.

Nina Goldman responded that the City funds almost every CBO in Berkeley, in Umoja and Puente, as well as connecting with the three community-based organizations that are serving the Black Lives Matter Resolution. Everyone will be invited to apply in the Fall for next round of funding.

Councilmember Hahn commented about the need for crisper goals in terms of metrics.

President Ford Morthel mentioned a lot of the partners are not clear on metrics around what the program does or what they are trying to accomplish. President Ford Morthel also commented

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about how to first get clear on what District goals and outcome goals are for students, then working with partners on what their role is in supporting goals. The other discussion was creating clear metrics as partners on the quantitative measures and qualitative measures.

Nina Goldman added that one of the things learned is the complexity of the numbers – collecting data and how it interacts with each other - programs are doing amazing things with kids; but looking at the community measures, there's a disconnect. Expertise is needed in data analysis.

#### 6. Action Item

# **6.1 - Develop and Prioritize Future Agenda Items**

President Babitt asked the committee to have an agreement to prioritize issues for next meeting: 1. Giving more time to resolving parking permit issue; 2. Getting updates on Milvia project; and 3. focusing on next steps on YEP.

Vice President Vasudeo expressed that there are priority topics that come up at 2x2 meetings – 1. Transportation -- Bright Streets and Milvia project; 2. Closing opportunity gap and agencies collaborating; and 3. Safety in our schools.

Councilmember Hahn commented about having 2x2 meetings every month. Other topics of interest are seeing zero waste in plastics, including issues around recycling, composting, reusables at BUSD and how the City can support; interested in shared facilities and expanding shared facilities for more accessible spaces for the rest of the community.

Committees collected list of topics for future meetings: 1. YEP; 2. Safety Task Force; 3. Milvia Street Project; 4. Shared equitable recreation; 5. Transportation – traffic around school; 6. Zero Waste; and 7. Meeting regularly.

Committee agreed on upcoming Special Meeting on May 17, 2023 at 11:00 am and Regular Meeting on June 16, 2023 at 1:00 pm. Further discussion is needed for proposed dates of September 8 at 10:30 am -12:00 pm, November 9 and/or possible date in October.

# Called to Order

Meeting commenced at 11:02 am

# Approval of Special Meeting Agenda for May 17, 2023

President Laura Babitt moved to approve agenda for meeting. The motion was seconded, and passed.

#### Roll Call

Director Jennifer Shanoski, BUSD; Councilmember Sophie Hahn, City of Berkeley and President Laura Babitt, BUSD were present. Councilmember Terry Taplin, City of Berkeley was absent. Director Shanoski was the alternate for BUSD Board Member, Director Ana Vasudeo.

#### Others Present

Matt Meyer, President of Berkeley Federation for Teachers for public comment; Regina Chagolla, Vice President of Berkeley Federation of Teachers for public comment; Ramonda Clarke, City of Berkeley; Anne Cardwell, City of Berkeley; Enikia Ford Morthel, Superintendent BUSD; John Calise, Executive Director of Facilities BUSD; Tom Lent, President of Walk Bike Berkeley for public comment and Jessica Lopez, Executive Assistant BUSD

# Approval of Minutes for April 28, 2023

Councilmember Hahn moved to approve minutes of April 28, 2023 meeting. The motion was seconded, and passed.

#### **Public Comment**

Matt Myers commented about the parking situation at Berkeley High for staff around commuting with their children with different drop off locations and unable to use ebike for this purpose and

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lack of available parking for school day. He also expressed support of Director Calise's alternatives and the need for the City's collaboration.

Tom Lent commented about the BUSD survey that was shared with staff members and the need for a TDM survey to evaluate needs for BHS staff.

Liza Lutzker expressed appreciation of new flexible approach. She also commented about the survey to staff and suggested District collaboration with City transportation for more accurate data.

Cielo Rios commented about the need for a survey design to create an unbiased and comprehensive analysis of how staff get to work, the distance they travel and where they live.

# <u>Discussion Item – 5.1 Update on Milvia Street Project</u>

Director John Calise presented. The objective of presentation was to review high level findings of the parking study. Director Calise clarified that the internal survey is different from a TDM survey and that the District will bring in a consultant to do a TDM survey and then, engage 2x2 in discussion about possible next steps. The internal survey has been shared with City staff.

Parking study survey has been finalized. There was 40% participation in survey. Out of the respondents 80% drove to work out of necessity; 85% are able to use the staff lot; 5% parked in city or private parking garages; and 14% use surface street parking in the neighborhood.

President Babitt requested clarification of which lot, and if the 220 permits all go to Berkeley High School staff.

Director Calise responded that there are approximately 220 BHS parking permits issued for the 144 spaces, lot on Milvia between Bancroft and Durant. The spaces are first come, first serve with permit.

President Babitt stated that there are zero permits offered to staff by the City.

Director Calise thanked Babitt for clarifying stating that there are no RPP permits issued for anyone who works at BHS.

Director Calise further stated the study showed that if a financial incentive was offered, would driving to work change, 75% said no.

Director Shanoski asked about timeline for TDM survey.

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Director Calise advised they anticipated putting out an RFP sometime this summer.

Director of Public Works, Liam Garland advised that the City is still digesting presentation and introduced parking policy team members Gordon Hansen and Hamid Mostowfi.

Gordon Hansen of Public Works advised that the City manages parking via RPP permits for the purpose to protect parking for residents. The area around BHS, Area C, where John's team did the parking survey was established in 1986. BHS is located within Area I, which covers the southside and downtown area. RPP permits are intended for residents only. The City has several other programs that allow different classes of users to be able to park in our different areas. One of those programs is the neighborhood serving Community Facility program or NCF that allows employees of schools, churches and rehab centers to be able to purchase permits for the areas in which the facilities are located. The City also has a program for local merchants that allows them to get permits for certain commercial districts.

Under the current program, facilities apply every year using the same standard process. By using a standard formula, we look at the number of full-time staff, multiply that by 60%, that gives us the top line of parking permits that can be issued at the facility. Off-street parking available to that facility is also taken into account.

Historically BHS and other schools and churches in Area I have been excluded from eligibility for that program due to Area I being quite compacted. The other reason for this is that the City is guided by the Berkeley Municipal Code that staff must consider the degree of impact on parking conditions for residents and merchants in the area where we would consider extending eligibility for these community facility permits. Because of the unique constraints and pressures in Area I, BHS and other facilities have been excluded by administrative regulation in keeping with the direction from the code.

The question is, how do we move forward from here from the city's perspective. These are high level for discussion purposes, not proposals or plans. One idea, we say we will allow Berkeley High School to apply for these permits in Area I. That would be a departure from our past practice and would raise a lot of concern for the City for major impacts on existing permits holders.

Area C borders Berkeley High School. BHS is not actually within the boundaries of Area C where John's team did the parking survey analysis. Area C is a little more tricky and requires additional conversation, it may actually require council action to change the location of RPP area boundaries.

If we wanted to say, allow BHS to apply for community facility permits for Area C. The other piece is changing boundaries of Area I and Area C could disproportionately impact the existing RPP Area I parking, that's located on the periphery of Berkeley High School. Further reducing

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opportunities for residents in the downtown area to find Area I parking. Those are two potential ways forward that we can discuss.

President Babitt interjected to allow Q & A on what was heard thus far.

Councilmember Hahn thanked Gordon for helpful information. She further commented that the reason for this conversation is because City Council referred it 2x2 saying we don't think it's optimal to have a parking garage in the middle of the downtown and please help problem solve hand in hand with the district. In that spirit, we need a well-developed plan to go to council.

Councilmember Hahn also stated that Area J and Area E, along with Area C should be looked at. From a regulatory perspective, we would need council action to say Berkeley High is special and we will allow them to apply for permits in these other areas, or we would have to put them in another area.

Councilmember Hahn commented that surveys are helpful but definitive. What is more important even without a study is, putting programs and incentives in place at all our schools, i.e., electric trikes that have a big cargo and enhancing programs BUSD already has in place.

Councilmember Hahn expressed understanding and sympathy of people having complicated lives and being at different stages of life, and some have the need to drive for different reasons and some can take an ebike or other transit. Hahn also stated that they are trying to find solutions and personally thinks getting permits will be part of that solution, and is committed to all of the above.

Director Shanoski appreciated problem solving approach and the City partnering with the school district regarding issue of parking for teachers and staff and concerns about building a parking structure. Further comments about the big issue of subs and part-time teachers parking on city streets and if it would be possible to alleviate some of the city concerns if those folks were prioritized with the city street permits, to minimize the impact on city streets.

Councilmember Hahn clarified that once BUSD has the permits that it is up to District to allocate them.

Director Shanoski confirmed Hahn's statement and advised that she was just voicing it as a possibility and that in collaboration with labor partners, they can figure out how to prioritize the permanent spaces and we use the permits in a more flexible way

Director Calise provided feedback that Berkeley High is the only school with a parking lot. The lottery is done now for subs, part-time and full-time teachers, but the itinerant staff aren't considered in lottery - special ed folks who roam school to school, do not get into that lottery and

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are stuck looking for a spot. The reason is to try and maximize lot to make sure every spot is filled for the entire day.

Director Shanoski questioned if those included in the survey, includes the subs and part-time teachers because of the need to understand the impact to all.

Director Calise advised that subs were not included, as they are not part of BHS council.

President Babitt agreed with colleagues regarding being in problem solving mode. Babitt further commented about the fact that people are driving and parking in the neighborhoods from 8:00 am to 4:30 pm every day, and moving their cars every two hours. This is extremely disruptive for the city's educational program. The district needs help eliminating the fact that teachers are moving every two hours and to use the spaces that are already being used in a more efficient way.

Councilmember Hahn asked if the survey taken of Area C that showed 73% of spaces taken, included all the BHS staff, etc., on a school day.

Director Calise responded majority parked in the west in Area C because that's where most spots are available and why the area was studied.

Councilmember Hahn expressed to Deputy City Manager Anne Cardwell that no matter what, the City is going to have to take a look at this. BUSD has not taken action on the alternative plan, etc.; but feels like this needs to get in front of council in some fashion – maybe by writing a discussion item that President Babitt and Councilmember Hahn could write it together with support from Public Works, BUSD, to lay out all these great "ha-has" we have, with imperfect information.

Councilmember Hahn suggested a general outline of a path forward for the City's piece. The city's piece would be to consider a special dispensation for a certain number of permits to be allowed in one, two, or three adjoining areas by a possible ordinance change to see if we can get a certain number of permits in the three outlining areas. The second thing that should be looked at jointly is a robust electric cargo bike program. Teachers and staff can help us understand what would work for them. Maybe there's some grant funding out there for a pilot of a really well thought through program, either loaners; maybe we give some kind of an incentive to purchase one. Let's have a broad dive into an innovative program. The third is to look at what are the transit incentives that BUSD has in place.

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Director Calise responded that BUSD currently has a cafeteria plan for all staff members who use public transit that they show their receipts and that amount is pre-taxed out of their check.

Councilmember Hahn asked if there is something we can do that is better or a way to design this so that more people take advantage of it. Is there any other thing that we should put in the council's idea box?

President Babitt said that she heard Gordon say that permits are offered at a cost and asked what is the portion that BUSD in the current structure of these neighborhood community service programs would have to pay.

Gordon Hansen responded the NCF permits? Yes, I believe it's \$82 a year.

President Babitt responded \$66 and then \$185? We will need that information.

Director Calise advised that it comes come out of a different fund. The way that the permits are paid for is out of the site funds. The sites are allocated x amount of dollars of general fund dollars to use discretionary. Those permits at the sites are actually paid for by the sites.

Councilmember Hahn would like to explore allocating permits in the three nearby areas, some kind of cargo bike program, reevaluating the effectiveness of the transit incentive and whether that can be enhanced in some way. The possibility that some portion of the vehicle parking need might be handled in some way with a shared cost or something at the new half empty parking facility downtown. Hahn would invite BUSD to present at meeting and having the conversation about BUSD and the City of Berkeley's piece with council.

President Babitt asked where are we landing on the need for additional surveys or the TDM and what are the outcomes we expect a TDM to help offer, giving the framing that we have come up with to solving the immediate problem.

Gordon Hansen first confirmed the permit cost is \$83 year. He further commented BUSD already provides a pretax commute benefit which allows employees to set aside funding from their paycheck to be used for any type of transit that they use. Other options to consider an AC Transit Easy Pass program. It offers bulk discounts typically used by either large institutions. What it does is provide a discounted transit pass for use on transit at a much lower cost to the employer than a normal monthly or yearly pass would be.

Director Babitt responded that it sounds like the results of the TDM would be to basically let us know how to advocate for more of the public transit uses, the funding sources, the discounts or any kind of offerings we could partner with mass transit.

Gordon Hansen responded yes, that's definitely one approach.

Councilmember Hahn responded to Gordon saying that the question is, do we really need to spend money to do a special study; or with your expertise, would we be able to just potentially show a menu of things that could help reduce driving? Or do we need to spend the money on a study?

President Babitt said she thinks the study would help us negotiate with AC transit or BART.

Gordon Hansen responded not necessarily. To the first question, we could start with a list of TDM policies that already exist in Berkeley or that we have studied in the past in a parking pilot the city did about 10 years ago. He further stated that there is value to pursuing some external support given we are not always aware of what new programs or policies might be available so there is some research that could be valuable from a consultant.

Director Babitt thanked Gordon for feedback and asked if anyone else had anything pertinent to the solutions that we are moving towards that they would like to add before we adjourn.

Councilmember Hahn asked if we should take some action for the City team to work with the BUSD team to put an item together, a discussion item to bring before the city council so that the city council can engage in a preliminary discussion of how the city can participate in solving this problem.

# Approval of Motion for City Team to Prepare Discussion Item for City Council

Councilmember Hahn moved for a Motion to request that the City team prepare a discussion item for City Council to begin exploring the City's options to help solve the parking garage question.

The motion was seconded and passed

Director Calise asked if there was a timeline. He further advised that per the Board's direction, they are completing the CEQA and it is almost ready to publish. He further indicated that they are supposed to be writing and releasing the RFP for the design build of the garage project in July. He again asked if he can ask for a timeline, so he understands the direction to look for from the Board as to whether or not to postpone, pause, etc.

Director Babitt asked if there is a difference between pause and terminating.

Director Calise responded there is. But what he is asking is, does the 2x2 have a timeline to work with the City or when would this action or discussion be brought to the City?

Councilmember Hahn responded that it is about putting the item together which includes a little bit of background of everything Gordon laid out about our existing rules and explain what it would take to work around them and maybe some pros and cons of the different workarounds.

Director Calise advised that he can make July work and that it is helpful to understand from a planning perspective when we would begin. If we can do it in July, I think it's helpful cause it informs their work and what needed from team.

Councilmember Hahn advised that she is not prepared to give a timeline due to it not yet being an action item. She suggested that by the end of September, she hoped to have had a discussion and an indication of the general direction that council would like to move in.

Director Babitt advised that her concern is money continuing to be spent on this \$27 million parking garage.

Director Calise responded we are but not continuing. The EIR and the bridging documents contracts are already in play and in the finalization stage. The dollars have been encumbered and expensed for that. For those particular contracts, is why he asked if there was a timeframe so not to put staff time and dollars or any public dollars, as far as bond dollars into moving this project to the next phase, until we understand. To not encumber or expense more dollars on this project, he'll need to update the Board. He further stated if this is where we are with project, they are pressing pause since the 2x2 has indicated is a willingness to partner and that it will go before city council for a conversation.

Deputy City Manager Cardwell advised that she will have internal meetings and then update on timing.

President Babitt thanked everyone and advised the next meeting is scheduled for June 16<sup>th</sup> and advised if any other meeting dates had been finalized.

Deputy City Manager Cardwell advised that Jessica and Ramonda are working on getting those on calendars and double checking that it works for everybody's schedule.

# **Approval of Minutes for May 17, 2023**

President Laura Babitt moved to approve minutes of May 17, 2023 meeting. The motion was seconded, and passed.

#### **Public Comment**

Jeff Jue made comments regarding appreciation of work relating to teacher parking issue; as well as BHS students looking forward to getting tennis courts back at BHS.

Peter Wright echoed Coach Jue's comments about tennis courts, as well as commented regarding being encouraged by bond measure that passed with tennis courts and parking.

Ray Yep commented regarding need for tennis courts to return to Berkeley High and offered support and assistance for same.

Cordell Hindler invited 2x2 Committee members to Contra Costa Mayor's Conference on July 6<sup>th</sup> hosted by the town of Moraga.

Martha Cain commented regarding zero waste and discussion of reusable dishes in some BUSD cafeterias. Applauded the effort to get it launched in 23/24.

#### <u>Discussion Item – 5.1 BUSD Presentation on Zero Waste Efforts</u>

Superintendent Ford-Morthel presented on BUSD's Zero Waste Efforts. The presentation included Reusable Foodware Pilot Project which included challenges/barriers and where additional support is needed. BUSD would like City's input around the implementation of the single use ordinance. Sofia Peltz and Stephen Collins of BUSD presented slides for discussion item.

# Questions and Answers following Discussion Item 5.1 Presentation

Councilmember Hahn stated excitement that efforts are in pilot mode. She also talked about advocacy at schools and districts for these types of programs and the work that Deborah Moore did on the Green Schools initiatives in hopes to get schools to go to reusables, recycle and other changes for zero waste. BUSD is the only one that Moore was never able to get to move forward. Zero waste has been a longstanding goal of the community.

Councilmember Hahn talked about a couple of ideas:

- Using the City's compostable list. Solution is reusables, any disposables are not a good solution
- Services that service corporate dining rooms like Google and contract with them to pick up/wash dishes
- Hotels and restaurants in Berkeley; kitchens are closed at night; dishwashing capacity in Berkeley that could be available.
- Labor there are programs in Berkeley to partner with to provide entry level jobs and job training opportunities. The City has formerly homeless individuals who are ambassadors downtown.
- Motivated parents that are willing to volunteer.

Councilmember Taplin commended the District and recognized the work being done.

Director Vasudeo expressed thanks for updates. Further comments regarding the current use of a dishwasher at Cragmont, the Green team and use of reusable cutlery at the school.

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Director Vasudeo requested more information regarding which campuses do not have a dishwasher, more specifics around cost and what it would take to make sure this is available to all our campuses or what a shared model could look like and, on the labor side, staffing numbers. Expressed curiosity of how a homeless ambassador program would work, as mentioned by Councilmember Hahn, from an equity perspective.

President Babbitt stated excitement to take it to next level and expressed confidence that it can be done. She expressed need to understand the cost benefit analysis of the services available to District to contract work out. Acknowledged significant challenges with hiring staff to do this type of work and we also the added layer of being on the school campus and clearances needed. Further suggested that the District partner with Cal Berkeley or Berkeley City Community College and find out how they are washing their dishes. Also, looking into how BHS can be a spot for Vessel, as mentioned by a student at Climate Fair.

President Babbitt asked what was the plan for the next school year 23/24.

Stephen Collins advised that a plan was not currently in place.

Superintendent Ford-Morthel stated this meeting was one of the things to get a plan in place. The challenges are getting people, facilities having dishwashers and funding. Would like to work with executive team, work on a plan and discuss further at next 2x2 meeting.

President Babbitt summarized that the District will come back with a plan and agreement for a target date of 24/25 school year, which also meets BUSD sustainability plan goals. Babbitt asked to understand what is involved in a pilot program of washing dishes?

Stephen Collins responded that it is having the people to wash the dishes. Money is needed to fill the positions.

Councilmember Hahn suggested having as part of the plan -- recruitment and retention for this classification and look at you whether increasing pay, different working conditions, bonuses, referring friends.

Councilmember Taplin asked if a union gets brought into the project, who do they bargain with.

Stephen Collins responded staff is unionized. The partner organization called the Merit Commission controls all of the recruiting.

President Babitt summarized that staffing is the current challenge. Would also like to understanding costs, possibly partnering with Cal Berkeley or Berkeley Community College or bigger entities.

# **Prioritize Future Agenda Items**

President Babitt mentioned continuing the conversation around the parking structure and the permits.

Director Vasudeo mentioned Bright Streets and that there are specific requests from district principals around public works projects at the school sites. Would like to know if there are public works requests that district needs to collaborate on. There are also pending safe routes to school safety assessments and need collaboration with planning staff at the city to implement some of the recommendations.

President Babbitt commented about needing updates around the 2020 vision (YEP) and how those funds are being allocated. RFP needed, Grants. Collaborate more with being able to expand things that are working and just simplifying that process in general.

Anne Cardwell advised that Dr. Lisa Warhuus (Director of HHCS) requested that YEP be a standing item on agenda.

Councilmember Hahn commented about Bright Streets and asked regarding status of work from Public Works.

Subject: Referral: Neighborhood-Scale Commercial

#### RECOMMENDATION

Refer to the City Manager and Planning Commission to consider and develop policies to permit neighborhood-scale retail uses in residential zones to increase economic opportunity, vitality, and walkability in Berkeley neighborhoods. Changes may include zoning alterations or modifications to use permit requirements.

In order to inform any potential policy changes, staff should conduct analysis and outreach to understand the market demand for neighborhood-scale commercial uses and consider best practices from other municipalities.

Staff and the Planning Commission should consider conditions and development of performance standards to avoid detrimental impacts on surrounding residential uses and neighborhoods, including but not limited to limitations on noise, odors, smoke, waste generation, operating hours, signage, loading/unloading activity, setbacks, tenant protections, limitations on selling alcohol for on-site consumption, considerations for ADA compliance, restricting applicants to businesses with fewer than three locations, and establishing different permitting requirements depending on square footage, proposed use, or other factors.

# POLICY COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

On December 4, 2023, the Land Use, Housing, & Economic Development Committee adopted the following action: M/S/C (Robinson/Harrison) to send the item as revised to the City Council with a positive recommendation. Vote: All Ayes.

This proposal was discussed at the November 6th and December 4th meetings of the Land Use, Housing, & Economic Development committee. At the December 4th meeting of the policy committee, the proposal was advanced as amended with a positive recommendation: M/S/C (Robinson/Harrison)

Vote: Ayes – Robinson, Harrison, Humbert; Noes – None; Abstain – None.

# **BACKGROUND**

Small, locally owned businesses are an integral part of the City of Berkeley, contributing to its lively, eclectic atmosphere and its economic development. As the city has evolved, so too has the environment for small businesses. Across Berkeley's residential

neighborhoods, there are sites, often on corners and at intersections in neighborhoods, that once hosted commercial activities on parcels where such commercial activities would no longer be legal. While some remain, many have been converted into residences.

Starting a small business can be rewarding, but there are barriers to entry for aspiring business owners who do not have the capital to start their own businesses in our current environment. Opening a small business can require heavy upfront costs and risks — especially given the cost of renting and furnishing a traditional commercial space. Small business owners often face significant risks when starting their businesses, as they may need to rely on personal savings or loans, or even use their homes as collateral to cover the upfront costs of starting a business.

Changes to allow neighborhood-scale commercial uses in residential zones would enable Berkeley residents to create new and more affordable commercial spaces, increasing economic diversity, walkability, and neighborhood vitality. Allowing residents to create new spaces for micro businesses within residential spaces like garages will allow more people to contribute to the economic growth and diversity of the City and create opportunities for businesses that would otherwise be economically infeasible in traditional commercial spaces.

This referral contemplates exploring zoning changes that would enable property owners to reactivate formerly commercial spaces in neighborhoods for active commercial uses or to enable new neighborhood-scale commercial uses in residential areas. Nothing in this referral shall be interpreted to pre-determine the level of permitting necessary for any proposed improvements or for any particular use type.

Put simply, this referral seeks to *legalize neighborhood corner stores*, and similar gentle commercial uses.

# One Potential Framework: "Accessory Commercial Units"

In some localities where these sorts of reforms to legalize neighborhood-scale commercial uses have been explored, advocates and policymakers have proposed the development of "Accessory Commercial Units," or ACUs. ACUs are likened to the business equivalent of Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) and are commercial spaces on residential property for a small business.<sup>1</sup>

The City of Raleigh, North Carolina recently legalized ACUs. The City approved a zoning change in 2022 to allow residents who live in neighborhoods currently zoned exclusively for residential uses to start a business on their property. The zoning change makes it so residents no longer have to first go to the Board of Adjustment (the equivalent of our Zoning Adjustments Board) to obtain a special use permit to create an ACU and instead require a city staff-issued permit as long as the guidelines are met.

Such guidelines are constraints on the type of business, operating hours, and square footage, among others. Examples of approved ACUs in Raleigh are hair salons, music studios, health clubs, eating establishments, and more.<sup>2</sup> The city council cited climate-related goals and reducing car-dependency as a primary motivation for approving these changes to make it easier for property owners to open a small business in their home.<sup>3</sup>

Similarly, ACUs are permitted in Pomona, California under its proposed new zoning ordinance, which provides guidelines for owners of single-family homes to convert their garages into ACUs.<sup>4</sup> The ordinance provides constraints on the type of business, noise and odors, and who can operate it; only owners of the residential property may operate an ACU on their property. This approach has some drawbacks, however, as it limits potential occupants substantially and may reduce the total number of ACUs built. Nonetheless, legalizing ACUs will make neighborhoods more sustainable and vibrant in Pomona and represents a huge step forward.

Advocates from Portland, Oregon are leading the way in trying to re-introduce retail into residential neighborhoods. Specifically, the advocacy group Portland: Neighbors Welcome in the City of Portland, Oregon is seeking to legalize corner stores (ACUs) citywide.<sup>5</sup>

In developing policy options to permit neighborhood-scale commercial uses in residential zones, staff should consider the benefits and drawbacks of practices in other jurisdictions, such as creating a pathway for permitting neighborhood commercial uses as "accessory commercial units."

# **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

As commercial rents in the City of Berkeley increase, it becomes more and more difficult for small business owners to pay for their commercial spaces. Increasingly, businesses that can afford to do business here will be more likely to be corporate chains, crowding out small businesses.

Making it easier to use residential spaces for non-disruptive, neighborhood-scale commercial uses would create new opportunities to generate intergenerational wealth for people of color, addressing systemic wealth inequities. In the Bay Area, only 29% of businesses are owned by people of color.<sup>6</sup> Small businesses in the Bay Area have struggled during the COVID-19 pandemic, especially POC-owned small businesses. The impacts of the pandemic have helped spotlight the systemic racism and wealth

inequality in the region. We can help address this through policy reforms that create economic opportunity for those who have been left behind by the market.

The new work-from-home reality presents an opportunity for neighborhood-scale commercial spaces to thrive. Many Berkeley residents remain in their homes throughout much of the week, working from home. 35 percent of Bay Area residents still work from home, one of the highest rates in the country. Residents should be given the option to be able to walk to a neighborhood grocery to buy a few ingredients for lunch or to walk to a neighborhood coffee shop to work in a distraction-free environment for the afternoon. These objectives can be achieved in a way that complements, not detracts from, neighborhood character.

Berkeley's neighborhoods supported neighborhood commercial units in the past—and they still support a select few grandfathered units that still remain, such as the neighborhood retail space shown below. As Berkeley's neighborhoods densify and more people continue working from home, the demand for nearby walkable access to groceries, coffee shops, daycares, bike repair shops, and other amenities will only continue to grow.



Previously, there were numerous corner storefronts throughout residential neighborhoods in Berkeley that made it easier for many residents to get their needs met by walking rather than driving. But rezonings over the years changed the zoning of many neighborhood parcels that previously permitted small retail, prohibiting commercial activity. While existing shops were grandfathered in, many have since been converted to residential units; when storefronts closed, many building owners converted them into apartments. Once these commercial units were converted into apartments, they lost their grandfathered status, and it has become impossible for them to be converted back to commercial uses.

Reactivating previous neighborhood commercial units and creating opportunities for new ones would harness Berkeley's historical resources to increase livability for residents. These resources include our walkable urban fabric and residential buildings that previously included commercial spaces. Berkeley has a relatively dense and walkable street grid with an abundance of residential lots that used to accommodate commercial activity. Neighborhood commercial units would blend right into their neighborhoods and harness our historical resources, not compromise them. And notably — there may be meaningful grant opportunities available to proposals that seek to renovate and revive historic properties and reintroduce previously existing uses.

For residents who currently live in neighborhoods without walkable access to groceries and other amenities, neighborhood-scale commercial uses can make it possible and safer for residents to meet daily needs without walking across a major arterial or relying on vehicle access. And further, there may be placemaking and livability benefits to enabling neighborhood-scale commercial uses particularly around city parks.

Beyond increasing the accessibility of shops to local residents, neighborhood commercial units would create new gathering spaces for neighbors. Many Berkeley neighborhoods—especially those in lower income areas including South and West Berkeley—have very few parks. Cafes and similar establishments serve as "third spaces," or places outside of home or work for friends, colleagues, and acquaintances to meet. They add vibrance to neighborhoods and bring pedestrian activity during the

day. Increased pedestrian foot traffic and street lighting<sup>8</sup> from neighborhood retail can improve public safety<sup>9</sup> and health outcomes.<sup>10</sup>

# REVIEW OF EXISTING PLANS, PROGRAMS, POLICIES, AND LAWS

Under existing law, residents may set up a "home occupation" (HO) registered to their home address. There are three different classes of HOs – each with different intensities of use and different permitting requirements. Some HOs can be set up with a Zoning Certificate or AUP, while others require a public hearing.<sup>11</sup> In 2021, HO regulations were amended to allow HOs as an incidental use within a Dwelling Unit, Accessory Dwelling Unit, Accessory Building, or Group Living Accommodation room.<sup>12</sup> However, the relatively strict requirements on HOs prevent them from enabling the sorts of vibrant neighborhood-scale commercial uses like cafes that this referral seeks to address.

Additional policy changes could build on successful COVID-era policies to allow residents the freedom to run businesses from their homes without disrupting the surrounding neighborhood. While existing law does create some narrow opportunities for residents to run businesses out of their homes, it is too restrictive to allow for the light retail and cafe uses that this item proposes, and which previously have existed in Berkeley's neighborhoods.

Berkeley already permits general retail in some residential districts — R-4, R-5, R-S, and R-SMU — with a public hearing,<sup>13</sup> and some general retail is permitted with an AUP in the MU-R district.<sup>14</sup> However, the general retail uses permitted in MU-R and MU-LI districts are arbitrarily narrow and do not fully achieve the goals of this legislation. In both districts, general retail uses permitted with an AUP are food product stores and building materials and garden supply stores. Arbitrarily, arts and crafts supplies stores are also permitted in the MU-R zone, but not MU-LI. In other words, existing law permits general retail in some narrow cases but is too restrictive to allow for the economic opportunity and neighborhood benefits provided by broader adoption of commercial uses in residential zones.

Outreach and analysis to inform any zoning changes to permit neighborhood-scale retail uses ought to include studying the market demand for new neighborhood-scale commercial units. This could include surveying small business owners of current commercial uses in neighborhoods to understand their needs and surveying participants of the home occupations program. One can theorize that some residents may have been interested in the home occupations program, but did not follow through with becoming permitted if they decided that their dream business was beyond the scope of the existing HO process.

# FISCAL IMPACTS

Costs include staff time for outreach, analysis, and implementation. Staff and the Planning Commission should consider whether an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) must be conducted to effectuate any associated zoning changes. If so, costs would include any environmental review.

Implementation of neighborhood-scale commercial zoning reforms could increase sales taxes and permit revenue.


#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY**

By providing access for more commercial amenities within walking distance from residents, many vehicle trips can be eliminated. Having more walkable communities contributes to encouraging people to prefer alternative forms of transportation that do not involve an automobile, reducing greenhouse gas emissions. And further, small businesses are more likely than large corporations to be motivated to maintain environmental sustainability.<sup>15</sup>

Vote: All Ayes.

# CURRENT SITUATION, EFFECTS, AND RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDATION

Golden Gate Fields is one of the last remaining tracks in the Bay Area and has widereaching economic and institutional power. Unfortunately, Golden Gate Fields (GGF), spanning both Berkeley and Albany, remains a disturbing display of sanctioned animal abuse in our City. So far in 2023 alone, 16 horses have died at its facility. The horses at GGF have succumbed to a range of causes of death including broken legs, abdominal issues, head injuries, sepsis, and neurological problems. Many fatalities in the horseracing industry are euthanizations after horses suffer non-fatal injuries, cutting their lives unnaturally short. When CBS Bay Area reported on the most recent horse death at GGF in May of this year it cited the fact that "domesticated horses live into their 30s, but the average age of active racehorses is [only] three to five years old".<sup>2</sup> Some

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data, however, shows that domesticated horses can live until their mid 40s if they have access to healthy living conditions.<sup>3</sup>

As horse deaths continue to rise at the horse racing tracks within City limits, it is overdue that the community ensure the well-being and safety of racehorses. Half of Golden Gate Fields deaths happen on the Berkeley side of the facilities. As a charter city, Berkeley has the authority to establish regulations and the jurisdiction to protect and promote the public health, safety and welfare by establishing safeguards for horses as long as they do not conflict with or duplicate state and federal law. It is in the public interest to adopt an ordinance prohibiting inhumane or abusive treatment of horses held, owned, used, exhibited or otherwise kept for sport, entertainment or profit within the City limits.

# **BACKGROUND**

In just the last three months, two nationally recognized racetracks have shut down because of the increasing number of horse deaths at their tracks. Churchill Downs, home to the Kentucky Derby, is suspending racing at its primary location following an investigation by the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission<sup>4</sup> after twelve horses died in two months. Just one month before Churchill Downs halted racing, a trainer was barred from participating in any further events at Churchill Downs or related tracks after two of his horses suddenly collapsed. At GGF, three horses have died under the same trainer this year, but Golden Gate Fields remains business as usual.

Baltimore's Laurel Racetrack also suspended horse racing indefinitely. In 2023, 13 horses died at Laurel Racetrack in 2023 and the two most recent euthanizations occurred after racing injuries.

Of the physical problems that lead to regular stable deaths, the three most common causes are (1) colic, (2) laminitis, and (3) pleuropneumonia, all of which are worsened by excessive confinement. According to Dr. Nathaniel White, Professor of Surgery at Marion DuPont Scott Equine Medical Center, one of the three primary situations that present a higher-than-normal risk factor for colic in horses is being confined to a stall for more than 12 hours per day.<sup>5</sup> VCA Veterinary Hospitals reports that "severe colic pain can cause a horse to roll and throw itself about in an uncontrolled and dangerous manner.<sup>6</sup> In extreme cases, the confined horse can violently lunge its body or head into

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a wall or other solid object...the horse might also 'throw itself' to the ground." Horses likely will incur serious self-injury during these explosive episodes, leading to the severe injury and blunt force trauma that cause many of the stable deaths.

In contrast, providing a turnout in which a horse can graze helps reduces the chance of colic, reduces stress and stable vices/behavioral issues, and reduces the chance of respiratory system illness among other benefits.<sup>8</sup>

Beyond the severe physical problems that stabling causes, are the severe psychological problems. When a horse's special, dietary, and social needs are thwarted, so-called stereotypies, or repetitive behaviors that do not have an apparent goal or function, occur. In horses, the classic stereotypies are including cribbing, wind-sucking, bobbing, weaving, pacing, stall-circling, digging, kicking, bucking, spinning, headshaking, or self-mutilation. Through these repetitive activities, endorphins are released which reinforce the behavior as a habit. These are the same symptoms of deep psychological distress commonly seen in other animals in captivity, such as circus elephants and bears.

According to Dr. Nicholas Dodman, Animal Behaviorist and Professor Emeritus at Tufts University:

"[t]he longer horses are confined per day the more stall vices/stereotypies they will exhibit. Racehorses are the prime example of that with long periods of confinement (up to 23 hours per day), so they exhibit an unusually high prevalence of stereotypies. The suffering can be described by referencing the suffering of people in solitary confinement. A recently released man who had spent years in solitary said he sometimes felt anxiety, paranoia, panic, hallucinations etc. The only way he could help suppress the dysphoria was to walk back and forth in his cell until the line he walked was soaked in his sweat. That's what equine stall walkers do - walk endlessly in circles (or in the case of weavers, walk to and fro)."<sup>10</sup>

Confining a 1200-pound animal to a 12x12 stall is akin to confining an elephant to a box car or a killer whale to a swimming pool. Equine veterinarian, Dr. Kraig Kulikowski, compared this to locking a child in a 4x4 closet for 23 hours a day, abuse punishable by law.<sup>11</sup> The United Nations deems solitary confinement as "cruel and unusual punishment." Prison reserves solitary confinement for the most violent criminal as the worst punishment.

Our office has edited the ordinance to be in accordance with the recommended edits from the November 13 HLEEC Committee Meeting.

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- Changed the term racehorse to horse to encompass a wider breadth of animals
- Included a definitions section to specify the meanings of: "Full turnout," "Horse," and "Overwork"
- Included all grammar revisions
- Deleted the felony stipulation under the "Penalties" section
- Changed the enforcement role of the City Manager to only be responsible for enforcing provisions under section 12.75.030 C
- Deleted the language around regulating all animal abuse to protect from state and federal preemption and duplication.
- Deleted "mental and physical abuse" to just say, "abuse"
- To ensure the penalties do not unjustly do legal harm to low-wage workers, who
  may also be subject to unhealthy work and housing conditions. The Ordinance
  penalizes the owner of the horse and/or the facility where the violation occurred,
  not the stable-hands, jockeys, or trainers.

#### **Ordinance Overview**

This proposed ordinance:

- 1. Makes it illegal to confine a horse to a stable for more than 10 hours per day and;
- 2. Requires every horse access to a full turnout with access to a minimum of 1,000 square feet of pasture, where the horse can freely roam, unrestricted and untethered.
- 3. Prohibits manual, electrical, mechanical, or other devices, implements, instruments or any method or modality that can cause injury, pain, suffering, overwork, and death, except as otherwise authorized by state or federal law.

This legislation is designed to govern only those areas not already directly covered by State and Federal laws. It specifically focuses on a limited set of conditions to supplement the existing regulatory framework.

Enforcement of the ordinance would be carried out by City officials, including police officers and the City's Animal control officers. The City Attorney is also empowered to conduct inquiries or investigate complaints of violations of this Ordinance, and may seek injunctive relief in the courts or otherwise. Private parties may bring a private action for injunctive relief, penalties, or both, to prevent or remedy a violation of this Ordinance after the prospective plaintiff has (1) provided the City and the prospective defendant at least 30 days prior written notice of the alleged violation; and (2) the City has failed to initiate enforcement proceedings, or after initiation, has failed to diligently prosecute. In any action prosecuted under this Ordinance a court may award attorney's fees to a prevailing party.

# FISCAL IMPACTS OF RECOMMENDATION

Staff time will be necessary for implementation and enforcement.

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# **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY**

Horse breeding is extremely resource (including food, water, and medicine) and environmentally intensive. The senseless waste of precious animal life currently associated with horse racing also results in needless waste of limited and precious environmental resources.

# ADDING CHAPTER 12.75 TO THE BERKELEY MUNICIPAL CODE TO ESTABLISH PROTECTIONS RELATING TO HORSES HELD, OWNED, USED, EXHIBITED OR OTHERWISE KEPT FOR RACING OR OTHER SPORT, ENTERTAINMENT OR PROFIT

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Berkeley as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. That Chapter 12.75 of the Berkeley Municipal Code is added to read as follows:

#### Chapter 12.75

#### HORSE PROTECTION POLICY

#### Sections:

12.75.010 Findings and Purpose 12.75.020 Horse Protection Policy 12.75.030 Enforcement, Private Right of Action 12.75.040 Penalties 12.75.050 Severability 12.75.060 Effective Date

# 12.75.010 Findings and Purpose.

The Council of the City of Berkeley finds and declares as follows:

A. Article XI, section 7 of the California Constitution recognizes the police power of cities to "make and enforce within [their] limits, all local, police, sanitary, and other ordinances and regulations not in conflict with general laws."

- B. The home rule provision of the California Constitution authorizes a charter city to exercise plenary authority over municipal affairs, free from any constraint imposed by the general law and subject only to constitutional limitations.
- C. The City of Berkeley, as a Charter City, has authority to make and enforce all ordinances and regulations in respect to municipal affairs.
- D. California provides laws and regulations for the licensing and associated operations of horse racing tracks, which preempt the City's authority to impose laws and regulations that conflict with such state laws and regulations or intrude into the state's regulatory scheme.
- E. The humane protection and care for horses is a matter of local concern essential to the public health, safety and general welfare of Berkeley residents and is a proper

subject of regulation by the City acting pursuant to its police powers separate and apart from issues of licensing and racetrack operations preempted by the state or federal government. To the extent that state and federal laws and regulations implicate the health and safety of horses, those provisions are limited in scope and overly narrow, necessitating additional safeguards adopted pursuant to the City of Berkeley's police power.

- F. According to the American Association of Equine Practitioners, as pasture provides additional health benefits to horses, allowing them to move and exercise and regular pasture turnout should be part of a horse's daily routine.
- G. The UC Davis Center for Equine Health indicates that horses should not be "confine[d] ... to a stall unless absolutely necessary for medical reasons." The UC Davis Center for Equine Health defines "Abuse and Cruelty" to include "use of excessive restraint such as tethering or confining movement for long periods of time" and/or "failure to provide adequate feed, water, care or protection."
- H. The City of Berkeley desires, within its jurisdiction and authority, to establish regulations that protect health, safety, and welfare by prohibiting abusive treatment of horses held, owned, used, exhibited or otherwise kept for sport, entertainment or profit within its jurisdiction and authority.
- I. This Ordinance aims to protect and promote public health, safety and welfare by establishing safeguards, protections and assurances for horses held, owned, used, exhibited or otherwise kept for sport, entertainment or profit within the City's jurisdiction and authority and, to the fullest extent feasible and consistent with federal, state and local law, to prevent and deter infliction of any and all abuse, overwork, and injury and death.

# 12.75.020 Definitions

A. "Full turnout" means the practice of giving a horse unfettered access to a dedicated paddock, pasture, or other safe and fully fenced outdoor space in which it can roam freely, graze, and socialize with other horses.

- B. "Horse" has the same meaning as in California Code of Regulations Title 4 Part 1420(g), i.e. "horse" means an equine and includes a stallion, gelding, mare, colt, filly or ridgling and includes mule, jack, jenny, ginnet, and hinney.
- C. "Overwork" means to push a horse uncomfortably past its physical capacity such that it becomes exhausted, overheated, or otherwise distressed. Indica of overwork can include but are not limited to a strained or slowing gait, a lolling tongue, strained breathing, a slowing pace, decreased responsiveness to aids, and reduced coordination.

# 12.75.030 Horse Protection Policy

- A. Except as otherwise authorized by state or federal law, it shall be unlawful to use on any horse, manual, electrical, mechanical, or other devices, implements, instruments, or any method or modality that can cause injury, pain, suffering, overwork, and death.
- B. It shall be unlawful to confine a horse to a stable for more than 10 hours per day.
- C. During the remaining hours of the day, it shall be required to provide every horse with a full turnout with access to a minimum of 1,000 square feet per horse of pasture where the horses can freely roam, unrestricted and untethered. Where a facility houses more than one horse, pasture shall be shared amongst all horses at the facility via one contiguous shared pasture equal to 1,000 square feet or greater per horse.

# 12.75.040 Enforcement, Private Right of Action

- A. City officials shall have the power and authority to enforce the provisions of 12.75.030 C and perform all duties imposed by, or as reasonably necessary to implement, the provisions of this Section.
- B. The City Attorney may conduct inquiries or investigate complaints of violations of this Ordinance. The City Attorney may seek injunctive relief, penalties, or both, or any other type of relief, in the courts or otherwise to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance. In any action prosecuted under this subdivision, the court may award reasonable attorneys' fees to the City.
- C. Any resident of the City may bring a private action for injunctive relief, penalties, or both, to prevent or remedy a violation of this Ordinance. No action may be brought under this Subsection C. unless and until the prospective plaintiff has provided the City and the prospective defendant at least 30 days prior written notice of the alleged violation. In any action prosecuted under this subdivision, the court may award reasonable attorneys' fees to any prevailing party.
- D. Nothing in this chapter shall be interpreted as authorizing a right of action against the City.

#### 12.75.050 Penalties

Any violation of this Chapter shall be deemed a violation by the owner of the horse and/or the facility where the violation occurred. Agents or employees of the owner of the horse or the facility where the violation occurred, such as but not limited to stable-hands, jockeys, or trainers, shall not be deemed to have violated this Chapter. A violation of this Chapter is a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for a period of not less than 30 days and not exceeding six months or a fine of not less than \$1,000 per animal, per violation, per day. Any subsequent violation of this Chapter by the same actor is a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment for a period of not less than 60

days and not exceeding six months or a fine of not less than \$1,000 per animal, per violation, per day.

# 12.75.060 Severability

If any section, subsection, paragraph, or word of this Ordinance, or any application thereof to any person or circumstance, either on its face or as applied, is held to be invalid, the invalidity of such provision shall not affect the other sections, subsections, paragraphs, sentences or words of this act, and the applications thereof; and to that end the sections, subsections, paragraphs, sentences, and words of this act shall be deemed to be severable. The City Council of the City of Berkeley hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each and every section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, and word not declared invalid without regard to whether any other portion of this Ordinance or application would be subsequently declared invalid.

#### 12.75.080 Effective Date

This Ordinance shall become effective immediately for immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety, containing a declaration of the facts constituting the urgency and is passed by a two-thirds vote of the City Council. Otherwise, this ordinance shall become effective 30-days after its final passage.

<u>Section 2</u>. Copies of this Ordinance shall be posted for two days prior to adoption in the display case located near the walkway in front of the Maudelle Shirek Building, 2134 Martin Luther King Jr. Way. Within 15 days of adoption, copies of this Ordinance shall be filed at each branch of the Berkeley Public Library and the title shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation.

#### INTRODUCTION

This budget update presents the preliminary Fiscal Year 2023 (FY 2023) Year-End financial status. The FY 2023 Year-End budget summary covers the period starting July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023 (FY 2023) and is based on unaudited estimated actuals. The information is considered preliminary and subject to change as the citywide financial statements and annual comprehensive financial report are being finalized.

# **CURRENT SITUATION AND ITS EFFECTS**

# FY 2023 Year-End Summary

#### General Fund

On June 28, 2022, the City Council adopted the FY 2023 budget (Adopted Budget)<sup>1</sup>. The FY 2023 adopted General Fund revenues totaled \$258.6 million. The unaudited estimated actual FY 2023 year-end General Fund revenues generated \$275.1 million.

The FY 2023 Adopted Budget included General Fund expenditures totaling \$280.7 million. During the fiscal year, two Adjustments to the Appropriation Ordinance occurred totaling \$27 million, which increased the total FY 2023 General Fund expenditure budget to \$305.6 million<sup>2</sup>. As part of the FY 2023 year-end process, encumbrances, or planned expenditures for services and goods that did not materialize by June 30, 2023, are carried forward to the next fiscal year. This process results in two outcomes: (1) the FY 2023 year-end expenditure budget is adjusted to \$289.1 and (2) the FY 2024 Adopted Budget increases by \$16.8 million. However, due to underspending, the FY 2023 year-end unaudited General Fund expenditures totaled \$258.2 million.

#### Revenues

At FY 2022 year-end, unaudited actual General Fund revenues generated \$275.1 million, or \$16.5 million more than the adopted budget of \$258.6 million.

During FY 2023, General Fund revenue and transfers decreased \$9,377,271 or 3.30%, from \$284,519,452 in FY 2022, to \$275,142,181 in FY 2023. Notable declines were the following:

Property Transfer Taxes	\$20,023,414
2. Measure P Property Transfer Taxes	10,391,733
3. Transfers In	10,508,338

- The declines in Property Transfer Taxes and Measure P Property Transfer Taxes were especially troubling because they appeared to be due to a collapse in the real estate market in Berkeley in the third and fourth quarter of FY 2023.
- The decline in Transfers In was due to a decline of \$10,947,306 in transfers from the American Rescue Plan Fund.

Attachment 1 includes a detailed chart on General Fund Revenues and Transfers in FY 2022 compared to FY 2021 to accompany the narrative below.

#### **Expenditures**

Unaudited actual FY 2023 General Fund expenditures total \$258.2 million, or \$22.5 million more than the initial adopted budget of \$280.7 million and \$30.9 million less than the adjusted budget of \$289.1 million.

In the end, the General Fund personnel budget finished under budget by only \$606,822. Non-personnel savings totaled approximately \$30.3 million, primarily due to delays in projects. Funding for several ongoing projects was requested to carry into FY 2024 as part of the FY 2024 AAO#1 presented and adopted by Council on December 12, 2023.

The chart below summarizes unaudited expenditures compared to the budget by department.

# Significant General Fund Variances

- City Manager's Office (+\$690,013) due to non-personnel savings
- Finance (+\$1,278,634) due to salary savings from vacant positions (\$1,184,494).
- Health, Housing and Community Services (+\$6,822,773) due to staffing vacancies during the year close to \$2.3 million in FY 2023. The remainder was due to unspent non-personnel funds. Some of the non-personnel funds for critical priority projects were carried over to FY 2024 as part of AAO#1.
- Planning (+\$3,401,450) was due to salary savings from vacant positions (\$100,624) and unspent non-personnel funds (\$3,300,825) most of which were project funds carried over to FY 2024 in AAO #1 including \$1.5 million for the Just Transition project.
- Public Works (+\$8,199,145) primarily due to non-personnel and capital project funds not being completely spent in FY 2023. A significant amount of these funds was carried over to FY 2024 as part of the AAO#1 for the following projects:
  - □ Cameras in Public Right of Way (+\$1,293,889)
  - EV Charging Stations (\$1,450,000)
  - □ Southside Complete Streets (\$1,000,000)
  - □ AC-Durant Transit Lane Project (\$330,120)
  - West Berkeley Senior Center Improvements (\$163,306)
  - □ Traffic Calming (\$153,200)
  - □ Fire Safety Prevention (\$109,894)

- □ \$100,000 Dwight Triangle Traffic Circle
- Police (-\$4,646,880) began FY 2023 with a General Fund salary savings deferral target of \$3,738,019, which was deducted at the beginning of the fiscal year. During the year, salary savings from vacant Sworn Police Office positions generated \$2,757,238. However, overtime expenses were almost \$2 million over budget due to maintaining essential public safety service with vacancies. In addition, at the end of FY 2023, Accounting made a correction related to the FY 2023 Police PERS costs that added an additional \$2.7 million in expenditures. In total, the personnel budget finished over budget by \$4.4 million. The Non-Personnel budget finished over budget by \$231,915 with most of the overage due to actuals for internal service charges being higher than the budgeted amounts, especially for fuel and other vehicle costs.
- Fire (\$342,931) is projected to be under budget by \$80,984 in personnel costs. Salaries were over budget by almost \$1.1 million and overtime was over budget by \$1.2 million. Similar to the Police Department, Accounting made a correction for FY 2023 Fire PERS costs that resulted in a reduction of \$2.6 million in expenditures. Other benefits finished over budget by \$236,257. All this combined for the personnel savings of \$80,984. Non-personnel line items finished under budget \$261,948 and resulted in the total savings of \$342,931.
- Non-Departmental (\$10,495,588) was due to savings for Reimagining Public Safety personnel and non-personnel allocations, Tier 1 personnel positions, Tier 1 operations costs, and Council allocations made during AAO #1 not being fully spent in FY 2023. Some of these allocations were carried over to FY 2024 in AAO #1.

### **General Fund Reserve**

The General Fund Reserve is distinctly separate from the General Fund Balance (Excess Equity). On January 24, 2017, the City Council established Resolution No. 67,821 – N.S., a policy for the General Fund Reserves. The General Fund reserves are comprised of two elements: (1) a Stability Reserve and (2) a Catastrophic Reserve:

- The Stability Reserve was established to mitigate the loss of service delivery and financial risks associated with unexpected revenue shortfalls during a single fiscal year or during a prolonged recessionary period. The purpose of the Stability Reserve is to provide fiscal stability in response to unexpected downturns or revenue shortfalls. Fifty-five percent of the General Fund Reserve is allocated to the Stability Reserve.
- The Catastrophic Reserve was established to sustain the General Fund operations in the case of a public emergency such as a natural disaster or other catastrophic event. The Catastrophic Reserve may be used to respond to extreme onetime events, such as earthquakes, fires, floods, civil unrest, and terrorist attacks. The policy was revise to include public health emergencies and

pandemics. Forty-five percent of the General Fund Reserve is allocated to the Catastrophic Reserve.

When the City Council adopted the General Fund Reserve Policy the target level established for the Reserve was set at a minimum of 13.8% of Adopted General Fund Revenues with an Intermediate Goal of a minimum of 16.7% by the end of Fiscal Year 2020, if financially feasible. In addition, the Council adopted a Long-Term Goal of 30% of General Fund revenues, to be achieved within no more than 10 years. The Council demonstrated their commitment to these policy goals by assigning 50% of the General Fund Excess Equity above the first \$1 million to the Stability and Catastrophic Reserves (Reserves). Additional Excess Equity may be allocated to Reserves by a majority vote of the Council.

During the FY 2023 & FY 2024 Biennial Budget process, the Council allocated a prefunding amount of \$1.5 million in FY 2022 Excess Property Transfer Tax revenues to the reserves plus \$1.5 million from projected FY 2023 & FY 2024 Excess Property Transfer Tax revenues. This funding was in addition to the budgeted baseline amount of \$2.5 million each fiscal year to the reserves.

In June 2022, the Council also revised their fiscal policies and added the following language that 1/3 of any additional revenue earned from investments that is over the annual (fiscal year) baseline of \$6 million is allocated to reserves (with 1/3 allocated to the Section 115 Trust and 1/3 allocated to capital needs).

The chart directly below illustrates the current status of the reserve funds after adding \$1 million in revenues over the interest investment baseline and the FY 2023 year-end excess equity amount of \$10.8 million and shows a reserve percentage resulting in an actual Reserves level of 18.22%<sup>3</sup>.

### Unfunded Liabilities- Section 115 Trust

Council held a Worksession on April 4, 2017 on the Projections of Future Liabilities - Options to Address Unfunded Liabilities Tied to Employee Benefits. The City's outside actuary provided options for Council's consideration to help reduce the City's unfunded liabilities tied to post-employee benefits including the following recommendations:

- Investing for the long-term to generate more earning to meet long-term funding targets,
- Increase annual contribution by approximately \$4.5 million per year and fully pre-fund the plans, and
- Establish an irrevocable supplemental trust for CalPERS to stabilize the increasing employer contribution rates.

On June 26, 2018, Council authorized the City Manager to establish an IRS Section 115 Pension Trust Fund (Trust) to be used to help pre-fund pension obligations. On May 14, 2019, Council authorized the City Manager to execute a contract with Keenan Financial Services to establish, maintain, and invest the pension Section 115 Trust.

In June 2022, the Council added a policy that 1/3 of interest investment over the annual baseline of \$6 million be allocated to the Section 115 Trust up to \$5.5 million per fiscal year, or as advised by the City's actuarial and staff. Approximately \$2.0 million will be allocated to the Trust in FY 2024 as a result of this policy and augment the \$2.0 million that has already been included within the Adopted FY 2023 & FY 2024 Biennial Budget.

The Section 115 Trust currently has a balance of \$19,133,331 as of June 30, 2023.

## All Funds

On an All Funds basis, the City is projected to finish FY 2023, \$198 million (23%) under the adjusted budget of \$849.4 million. These fund balances are largely due to uncompleted projects and personnel cost savings. The chart below summarizes unaudited expenditures compared to the budget by department.

## Significant All Funds Variances

- Library (+\$4,257,680) due in large part to salary savings from vacant positions and underspending of non-personnel funds in FY2023.
- Information Technology (+\$8,227,797) was due to FUND\$ Replacement Funds and the IT Cost Allocation Fund not being fully spent in FY 2023.
- Health, Housing & Community Services (+\$40,536,275):
  - Of this amount, \$11.2 million in state grant funds designated for specific public and mental health activities. These funds were unspent due to vacancies throughout the Mental Health and Public Health Divisions, including both existing difficult-to-fill positions and new positions budgeted for the full year but not filled until later in the fiscal year.
  - □ The next largest cluster of funds are the \$15.3 million in federal, state, and local funds designated for affordable housing activities.
- Parks Recreation and Waterfront (+\$15,269,634) had unspent funds due to personnel savings and unexpended project funds in the Playground Camp Fund, Parks Tax Fund, Measure T1 Fund, and the Marina Fund. Only certain unspent project funds will be carried over to FY 2024.
- Public Works (+\$95,958,457) were largely due to the following:
  - State Transportation Tax (+\$3.3 million): \$2.6 million in continuing projects for completion in FY 2024

- □ Measure BB Local Streets & Roads (+\$9.3 million): \$5.9 million in continuing projects for completion in FY 2024
- □ Capital Grants State (+\$10.2 million): \$2 million in continuing projects for completion in FY 2024
- □ Capital Improvement Fund (+\$14.8 million): \$11 million in project fund carryover for transportation, street, facilities project funds in FY 2024
- □ Measure T1 (+\$6.6 million): \$6.2 million in continuing projects in FY 2024
- Sanitary Sewer (+\$14.1 million): \$1.7 million in continuing projects in FY 2024 were carried over in AAO #1
- Clean Storm Water (+\$3.2 million): \$2.7 million in continuing projects in FY 2024

## **Next Steps**

Staff will present second-quarter revenue and expenditure projections as part of the FY 2024 Mid-Year Update in February/March 2024.

General Fund revenue and transfers decreased \$9,377,271 or 3.30%, from \$284,519,452 in FY 2022, to \$275,142,181 in FY 2023. Notable declines were the following:

1.	Property Transfer Taxes	\$20,023,414
2.	Measure P Property Transfer Taxes	10,391,733
3.	Transfers In	10,508,338

- The declines in Property Transfer Taxes and Measure P Property Transfer Taxes were especially troubling because they appeared to be a collapse in the real estate market in Berkeley in the third and fourth quarter of FY 2023.
- The decline in Transfers In was due to a decline of \$10,947,306 in transfers from the American Rescue Plan Fund.

The large declines in Property Transfer Taxes, Measure P Property Transfer Taxes and Transfers were cushioned by increases in the following revenue sources: Secured Property Taxes (+\$8,182,716), Utility Users Tax (+\$2,884,500), Transient Occupancy Taxes (+\$1,750,865 net of rebates), Business License Taxes (+\$1,449,796), Other Taxes (+\$2,287,823), Vehicle in Lieu Taxes (+\$1,111,737), Ambulance Fees (+\$1,309,390), Interest Income (+\$5,422,903), IDC Reimbursements (+\$1,683,882), and Other Revenue (+\$1,504,957).

Excluding Transfers, General Fund revenue increased \$1,131,067 or .4%, from \$257,164,529 in FY 2022, to \$258,295,596 in FY 2023.

Clearly, the City General Fund has, at least for the near term, lost two of its three primary drivers of annual growth (Property Transfer Taxes and Measure P Property Transfer Taxes). This will make it difficult for significant overall growth in General Fund revenue.

Before getting into the FY 2023 General Fund revenue details, I also want to point out that the City's General Fund revenue challenges will not end when the Fed stops raising short-term rates and starts lowering them, for two reasons:

- 1.The Fed's monetary tightening includes a program to sell \$95 billion/month (or \$1.14 trillion per year) of Agency and Mortgage-Backed securities from its Balance Sheet, which increases the supply of these securities and puts additional upward pressure on long-term rates, including mortgage rates. Prior to the monetary policy change, the Fed was the major purchaser of these long-term securities; and.
- 2. The proposed \$1.8 trillion federal budget deficit for the upcoming fiscal year will require the issuance of an additional \$1.8 trillion in Treasury Bonds to fund the deficit.

The additional huge supply of bonds from these two macroeconomic factors will overwhelm demand for long-term bonds and continue to put upward pressure on long-term interest rates, including mortgage rates. In addition to reducing consumer spending and slowing down the economy, it has already pushed mortgage rates up from around 4% to 8%.

The other unknown is how the war in the Middle East will impact the economy, the oil market which is already volatile will probably see more volatility which might put more pressure on inflation.

Bottomline from a Macro Economic view is we are in for a turbulence environment and we need to be prudent in our financial decisions in the near to mid-term.

As you meet this evening, please keep the following information in your hearts and thoughts. 2 more young horses have died at Golden Gate Fields in the past 2 weeks, making 19 needless deaths so far. The Stronach Group's racetracks are the deadliest in California, with Santa Anita's 27 deaths so far this year.

Please, do whatever you can to stop this needless abuse of these poor animals in our town. It goes against everything that we value and hold dear, and everything that the city council works for daily. Thank you.

December 2<sup>nd</sup>, "Its Happy Hour," a 2 year old thoroughbred bay colt, broke down during his second race from <u>musculoskeletal</u> injury, meaning broken bones. He was subsequently unnecessarily euthanized to avoid the cost of rehabilitation, dragged into a van by his neck and his body taken offsite. Since he had only been put into 2 races, the total industry profits from his young life were only \$3,250. He was bred by Larry Ogbert, and owned by the syndicated investment group Jimmy Rex Robinson Trust, Mayo, Tom and Sherman.

November 26<sup>th</sup>, "<u>Promise Me Paradise</u>," a 3 year old thoroughbred chesnut filly, died during training from "sudden death," meaning a heart attack, internal hemorrhaging, or complete bodily system failure. She had only been entered in 3 races so far, and the industry profits from her short life were \$5,657.

# Re: Anti-Horse Racing Proposed Ordinance

Dear Mayor Arreguin and Councilmembers:

My name is Scott Chaney and I am the Executive Director of the California Horse Racing Board (CHRB). The CHRB is the state agency tasked with regulating the horse racing industry. Of the CHRB's many mandates, the one most important is advancing the health, safety and welfare of equine athletes participating in this sport. We take this mandate seriously and are very proud of the advancements this industry has made in promoting the health, safety and welfare of the horse and rider. While the CHRB continues to seek ways to promote the health, safety and welfare of equine participants, I became concerned when I learned of the proposed ordinance to add Chapter 12.75 to the Berkeley Municipal Code relating to racehorses.

While I appreciate that this ordinance may be well intended, its impact will be dangerous for the horses and devastating for the hundreds of people who care for these horses every day. Additionally, I have serious concerns about the legality of this ordinance as matters involving horseracing in California are solely within the authority of the CHRB. Consequently, should the ordinance pass, the CHRB would consider legal action in order to preserve our authority in this area.

# I. The Ordinance Is Illegal

As written, the proposed ordinance unlawfully encroaches on the State of California's jurisdiction which preempts the area of horse racing and provides its oversight with the California Horse Racing Board (CHRB).

By the adoption of Section 25a of Article IV of the Constitution in 1933, the people of the State of California enacted the controlling principle that the legislature could provide for the regulation of horse races and horse race meetings throughout the

state and wagering on the results thereof. The Legislature complied by passing the California Horse Racing Act<sup>2</sup>, which "contains a full and comprehensive legislative treatment of legalized horse racing in this state which is a clear and complete plan for the state-wide control of the subject matter."

Pursuant to the Horse Racing Act, supervision over horse races where wagering occurs is vested in the CHRB.<sup>4</sup> As such, the CHRB's authority is plenary.<sup>5</sup> Of its many responsibilities, the CHRB is tasked with adopting rules and regulations that protect and advance the health, safety, welfare, and aftercare of racehorses.<sup>6</sup> In furtherance of this mandate, the CHRB has adopted numerous equine welfare regulations requiring frequent veterinary checkups.<sup>7</sup> Additionally, the CHRB prohibits any licensee from abandoning; injuring; maiming; killing; administering a noxious or harmful substance to an animal, or depriving an animal of necessary care, sustenance, shelter or veterinary care.<sup>8</sup> It also prohibits any conduct which causes any animal to suffer any form of cruelty, mistreatment, neglect or abuse.<sup>9</sup> Separately, the CHRB determines the number of useable stalls that each association or fair shall make available and maintain in order to conduct the racing meeting.<sup>10</sup> By issuing a license, the CHRB has determined that the stalls available to house the horses are sufficient for the horse population on track and that the issuance of a license is in the public interest.<sup>11</sup>

By purporting to arrogate to the City the authority to regulate the stabling, pasturing, and overall treatment of racehorses, the proposed ordinance both directly conflicts with this careful regulatory regime and invades an area fully occupied by state law. <sup>12</sup> Moreover, given the constitutional dimension of horse racing in California and the fact that "[t]he racing industry greatly affects the public interest," <sup>13</sup> the proposed ordinance addresses a matter of statewide concern, not a municipal affair. It is consequently preempted. *See Ruegg & Ellsworth v. City of Berkeley* (2021) 63 Cal.App.5th 277, 310–311.

The ordinance is also illegal because it seeks impermissibly to exercise a "local option" with respect to horse racing. Because there is simply not enough land to both comply with the ordinance and house all the horses needed to fulfill the race meet as required by Bus. & Prof. Code Section 19535, the ordinance would effectively prohibit further horseracing in Berkeley. This appears to be the intent of the ordinance; the

ordinance's author identifies Golden Gate Fields as a "disturbing display of sanctioned animal abuse." <sup>14</sup> But the California Court of Appeal has held in *Desert Turf Club v*. *Board of Supervisors of Riverside County* that a local government could not, on moral grounds, exercise a "local option" with respect to horse racing. As the court explained:

The query to be answered is: can a Board of Supervisors overrule the act of the people of the state in adopting a constitutional amendment and the legislature of the state in passing a full and comprehensive plan for the licensing and control of horse racing by forbidding on moral grounds what the state expressly permits? There is no escape, in our opinion, from a negative answer.<sup>15</sup>

Here, too, there is no escape. While the ordinance's author may not like horse racing, the fact remains that horse racing was legalized by the California Constitution and codified by the Legislature. The proposed ordinance, which seeks to satisfy a moral objection, is not sufficient to overcome the State's Constitution and Statutes and, as written, would be preempted.

Furthermore, as members of the Berkeley City Council may know, Congress passed the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Act of 2020, creating federal oversight with regard to certain areas of thoroughbred horse racing in the United States. <sup>16</sup> You should be aware that I spoke with the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Authority's ("HISA's") outside General Counsel, John Roach, who shares similar preemption concerns to the extent that Congress passed legislation in 2020 that recognized HISA for the purposes of developing and implementing a nationwide horseracing anti-doping and medication control program and a safety program for thoroughbred horses and racetracks.

### II. Factual and Evidentiary Insufficiency

In addition to the legal shortcomings of this proposed ordinance, I would be remiss in not pointing out that the supporting documents are riddled with inaccuracies and exaggerations. First, the supporting documents cite a CBS Bay Area report that allegedly states that "domesticated horses live into their 30s, but the average age of active racehorses is [only] three to five years old." Clearly the journalist and author of the ordinance have conflated "lifespan" and "average age." While it is true that horses generally race between the ages of 3 and 5 years old, that is not the average lifespan of a racehorse. Like other domesticated horses, racehorses often live well into their 30s. In fact, nearly all racehorses lead heathy lives well past their careers in racing.

Second, it's important to note that approximately 8,000 unique horses reside at CHRB regulated facilities each year and the statement that horse deaths continue to rise is misleading. At worst the rate has remained essentially the same from June 2023 to date compared to the same period last year (8 v. 10). But to be accurate, the fatalities

that this proposed ordinance seeks to address (non-Musculoskeletal/non-racing/training) are exactly the same compared to the same period last year (6 v. 6). While any horse death is troubling, the CHRB has led the nation and the world in regulatory reform regarding racehorse welfare. While our work is not complete, the implication that health and welfare of racehorses doesn't improve every day in California denies reality and ignores the effective regulatory oversight CHRB exercises.

Third, the materials supporting this ordinance not only state outright, but also imply that two racetracks in other states — Laurel Park in Maryland and Churchill Downs in Kentucky — have permanently closed due to a rise in catastrophic injuries. <sup>18</sup> In fact, Churchill Downs just concluded its fall meet and Laurel Park is in the midst of its winter meet.

Next, the justification for this ordinance relies heavily on the work and research of Dr. Nathaniel White, whose research in colic at Virginia Tech's Marion Dupont Equine Clinic is world-renowned. I have communicated with Dr. White. He has relayed that his studies do not support using time of confinement alone as a risk factor for colic at racetracks. He wrote—"[a]lthough several studies report stall confinement as a risk factor for colic, the risk is very low and because there is systematic error in these studies, the associated risk cannot be used to predict causality. Additionally, based on the average number of horses stabled at California racetracks during 2023 the mortality rate due to colic is 0.46 deaths/100 horse years. This is less than the results from other epidemiologic studies in which horses were kept in varied environments including most horses having access to turnout in pastures or paddocks. The epidemiology of colic in various populations should not be used to support the proposed ordinance."

Next, the ordinance's supporting documents claim that the UC Davis Center for Equine Health indicates that horses should not be "confine[d] ... to a stall unless absolutely necessary for medical reasons," and that the Center defines "Abuse and Cruelty" to include "use of excessive restraint such as tethering or confining movement for long periods of time" and/or "failure to provide adequate feed, water, care or protection." Fortunately, the current Chairman of the California Horse Racing Board is Dr. Greg Ferraro, who is not only a globally respected equine veterinarian and surgeon but was also the Director of the Center for Equine Health at UC Davis from 1997 to 2017. Dr. Ferraro stated that none of the above-mentioned concerns apply to horses at Golden Gate Fields nor any CHRB regulated facility in the state.

Next, the supporting documents make outlandish arguments and analogies that, sadly, have no basis in reality. The author attempts to equate horses housed in stalls to solitary confinement, locking a child in a closet or putting a killer whale in a swimming pool. While evocative, these comparisons miss the mark by a wide margin. Horse stalls are not closed, provide an appropriate amount of space, and actually give horses a sense of security and protection. Additionally, racehorses leave their stalls every morning in order to exercise, bathe, walk to cool out after exercise, and often walk again later in the day. There are, at any given time, 5-10 attending and regulatory veterinarians at Golden

Gate Fields that provide excellent veterinary care and racehorse diets are carefully managed to provide balanced and healthy nutrition.

Furthermore, the actual language in the ordinance itself is unclear, impractical, and similar rules already exist under the state regulatory structure. The ordinance does not explain how many hours a horse should be left to occupy this ½ acre parcel of land nor how many horses are permitted to occupy said parcel. Golden Gate Fields houses approximately 1200 horses, meaning that the property would need to be 600 acres to comply. More to the point, the American Horse Council estimates than there are approximately 7.2 million horses living in the US which, according to the proposed ordinance, would require 3.6 million acres to adequately house horses alone—or an area roughly the size of Connecticut. Additionally, horses in a field together or even roaming around on their own does not make for a safe, risk-free environment. In fact, I would hazard to aver that horses living outside are far more likely to suffer injury than a racehorse in California.

In addition to the practical implausibility of this proposed ordinance, some of the actual language already exists in the CHRB regulations. Specifically, the ordinance seeks to prohibit:

- 1. Forms of animal racehorse mental or physical abuse, drive, overwork, overload, injury, harm, hurt, or torment; and
- 2. Manual, electrical, mechanical, or other devices, implements, instruments or any method or modality that can cause injury, pain, suffering, overwork, and death.<sup>20</sup>

CHRB Rule 1902.5 (Animal Welfare) currently states:

No person under the jurisdiction of the Board shall alone, or in concert with another person, permit or cause an animal under his control or care to suffer any form of cruelty, mistreatment, neglect or abuse. Nor shall such person abandon; injure; maim; kill; administer a noxious or harmful substance to; or deprive an animal of necessary care, sustenance, shelter or veterinary care.

CHRB Rule 1890 (Possession of Contraband) currently states, in part:

No person shall have in his possession on the premises during any recognized meeting any electrical stimulating or shocking device commonly known as a battery, or any mechanical stimulating device, or any other appliance, which might affect the speed or actions of a horse.

The CHRB has already regulated in this area and will continue to do so in the future.

Along with Bayer, Wareham Development is writing today to alert you to the intolerable rising number and increasing intensity of safety issues occurring in our West Berkeley neighborhood.

In just the last few weeks, our West Berkeley tenant companies and their staffs, our employees, vendors, and neighbors have been put at risk from random acts of bodily harm and downright violence.

- Shooting two weeks ago at Ninth and Grayson Streets.
- A Bayer employee groped in the last two weeks walking from Amtrak to their job.
- A Berkeley Humane employee accosted outside their offices on Carlton.
- An RV burned to the ground two weeks ago on Grayson Street.
- An automobile stolen in broad daylight from our 2600 Tenth Street parking lot, which is directly across the street from Kaiser's West Berkeley facility to which hundreds of patients travel each day.

Perpetrators are ever more emboldened by the lack of police presence and other deterrents. We are aware of the policy and resource constraints on the City's ability to act on some of these issues. However, we at Wareham and Bayer spend a material amount in security with personnel and technology in deterrents and safety for our tenants and our businesses. Historically, West Berkeley has been the stepchild of police presence, often neglected given its contribution to the City. With police staffing materially diminished, Wareham, Bayer and others are eager to brainstorm on strategies that take into account the City's constraints and still advance our agenda of ensuring the safety of our tenants, their employees and ours, and the security of our properties and the vital research occuring there.



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



Pedestrian Danger Crossing 6th St at Page St

Hello Rashi & Berkeley City Council,

I would like to bring to your attention the dangerous situation that is crossing 6th Street at Page Street - especially after dark as a pedestrian. Since the time change, the problem has worsened because the intersection is poorly illuminated and lacking signage of pedestrians, plus cars drive fast and aggressively on 6th.

On weekdays I'm crossing twice between 5:15pm and 5:35pm with my 2 little kids and a stroller picking up my 4 year old from Ducks Nest Preschool. Fast moving traffic is flowing both ways on 6th and cars seem to be travelling over 10mph above the 25mph limit. Cars can be so aggressive here that they swerve past each other into the pedestrian crosswalk to get around cars stopping for families on foot (this has happened to us, and in a separate incident, to another family copied on this email). The intersection is dark and poorly marked with just a little white painted crosswalk and one single pedestrian sign (that's unlit and only visible for cars traveling in one direction).

There are about 200 families that attend Ducks Nest preschool (between Page and Camilia on 4th Street) and the vast majority of families live on the other side of 6th Street. Many of us are concerned by the dangers at this crossing and I have copied a few of those I know here. We often have a stroller, many have multiple kids with us and use various strong bike lights and reflectors to illuminate ourselves only to find traffic STILL doesn't stop.. or even slow!

Furthermore a few years ago a neighbor and friend of mine on 6th and Page took the necessary steps to formally request a traffic study by the city but the speed of traffic on 6th was never evaluated and all that was done as a result was add some red paint. Plus the additional red paint to prevent parking seems to have actually made the problem worse because it allows drivers on 6th to perceive more space, a greater line of sight/visibility, and as a result they drive FASTER. This is not just my opinion but a known phenomenon proven in traffic studies. I want to stress that cars SPEEDING on 6th is the primary cause of the danger here, not parked cars.

Given how early it gets dark, this is an urgent problem that needs to be addressed before someone is seriously injured or worse. It needs illumination like a lighted pedestrian crossing signal, and maybe cones and reflectors as a temp fix (as mentioned, we have tried all sorts of bike lights without success).

I apologize for the lengthy email! Pedestrian safety is something I'm very passionate about! I would be happy to discuss on the phone and can make some suggestions as someone who's studied the topic and is familiar with this particular space.

Dear Finance Department,

Thank you for taking the time to review and provide feedback on our SAFE STREETS initiative petition. We appreciate the attention to detail and thoughtfulness of the review, and wanted to share our thoughts and request additional feedback if necessary.

The first recommended technical change was moving the start date of the tax to July 1, 2025 to coincide with the tax year. We chose January 1st to follow existing practices set by other parcel tax measures, such as 2020 Measure FF, and to ensure funding is available at the soonest possible opportunity to address the longstanding critical issue of fixing Berkeley's streets. We recognize that there may be logistical challenges and hope that those can be prepared for in advance, in an effort to ensure the first collection is a 6 month increment, not 18 month.

The second recommended technical change was adding a definition of "dwelling unit", and other supporting definitions. This omission was an oversight on our part. Unfortunately, due to noticing requirements with The Daily Californian, updating our language would delay signature collection by as much as a month, jeopardizing our ability to get this measure on the ballot. Our measure permits Council to make certain amendments to the chapter, and we will request that they add a definition of "dwelling unit" that is consistent with other City parcel taxes, along with other definitions as needed.

The third recommended technical change was to Section 7.11.090, which states that it is the duty of the City Manager to collect and receive all taxes, and referred to BMC 7.56.060 which makes it a duty of the Finance Director. The Finance Director is not a position referenced in the City Charter and, under the Charter, the City Council is only authorized to direct the City Manager. The City Manager has the authority to delegate responsibilities to other positions, including the Finance Director. Our language assigning this responsibility to the City Manager is consistent with other more recent chapters of the BMC, such as 7.81.050 and 7.83.050. If amendments to this language are required, our measure allows Council to make this type of change.

The fourth recommendation was to clarify whether the funding timeframe and subsequent period in which the tax cannot be imposed if the City fails to maintain the \$15.3 requirement is a fiscal or calendar year. We defer to the City to determine whether one approach is logistically more feasible to implement if needed, but hope it will never need to be determined. A specific selection may be amended into the measure by City Council in the future if specificity is required.

Please let us know if you find any other errors or have additional recommendations. Thank you again for your time and consideration - we appreciate everything you do to help keep the City of Berkeley running smoothly.

Thanks so much for getting back to me. Do you know when this campaign with the flyers and officers and enforcement will begin? I just had an incident where I was crossing the street at Hearst and Oxford, and I was in the crosswalk, crossing when it was my turn, and a scooter rider narrowly missed hitting me from behind. I appreciate that people are thinking about solutions to these problems, but when will the solutions arrive? When will there be actual enforcement of the traffic laws in downtown Berkeley? I rarely see any kind of police presence, and have never seen a car or scooter be pulled over or given a citation in my recent memory. It seems the streets of downtown Berkeley don't have anyone enforcing the rules.

One suggestion. The scooter companies should be required to install a button on the scooter that you can press to report that it is improperly parked or is breaking the rules. The system where the pedestrian is required to send them an email with a screenshot puts too much responsibility on average pedestrians. The scooter companies should provide a technological solution to this problem, not the other way around.

Looking forward to hearing more about the launch of the campaign.

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with these Veo and other branded scooters nearly running me over daily. I am writing to find out what the council is doing to address the safety of our pedestrians? I have lived in Berkeley since 2008. In the last few years I have become

increasingly concerned about pedestrian safety in Berkeley. I don't ever see anyone enforcing traffic or scooter laws, and the city becomes more and more unsafe for pedestrians every month.

I am also writing because as I understand it, the scooter companies are required to remove scooters that have been reported for safety of accessibility issues. Below you can see, that I reported a scooter, and got a response about 12 hours later. There is a building on my street that they often leave the scooters out on the sidewalk, blocking them completely. This same building is also home to a person who is hard of sight, and there are multiple wheelchair users on the block. I have reported to VEO that there is a blind woman who lives in that building at least 5 times, and still just about every week or two someone leaves a scooter or two right there on the sidewalk outside of the blind woman's building.

I noticed that in the last few months the response from Veo to my reports have lagged more and more, commonly responding 12 hours later.

What can we do to make sure the scooter companies are following the rules? How can we report them if they are not following the rules? What are you supposed to do if you get hit and run by someone on a scooter? There is no license plate or way to report them.

I am writing to voice my concern about the possible termination of the 65 bus line along Grizzley Peak Blvd in the Berkeley Hills. For many residents in this neighborhood, including my own children and wife, the 65 serves a primary mode of transportation. Terminating this service will significantly limit their ability to conduct their every day lives.

In addition to my family, many people in this area rely on the 65 bus service. High School and Middle School aged children rely on the 65 to get to and from school on a daily basis. Individuals who have physical limitations or are unable to drive for other reasons also rely on this service. In an attempt to limit my carbon footprint, I have taken the 65 many times and am a witness to those who depend on this service. I have never been on the 65 without nearly every seat occupied. This neighborhood has had to adjust to the 65 no longer operating on weekends. The consequence of that has been a significant visible uptick in car traffic along Grizzley Peak Blvd and Marin Avenue. By terminating or limiting 65 service, AC Transit is failing at achieving its mission of delivering "safe, reliable, sustainable transit service that responds to the needs of our customers and communities."

The bottom line is that it is inconceivable that a large swath of Berkeley could be left without any transit options. It is imperative that public transportation equitably serve all residents of Berkeley. The residents of the Berkeley Hills should not have to bear the full burden of AC Transit operational cuts. AC Transit should maintain—or improve—bus service in this area.

## Greetings:

I'm thankful that my Councilmember Kate Harrison asked me on Friday if I was attending the open house reception for Berkeley High's Wellness Center scheduled the next day. I had no idea it was occurring and I've been inquiring about the status for months, as recentjy as last Tuesday during City Council. We are now learning that the \$350,000 allocated by council May 2022 that was submitted by the 5 students cc'd here was used to pay the salary for 2 years of a new Director to run the center that officially opens today.

The attached guide of mental health resources was created by the 5 BHS grads in their senior year - it is also translated into Spanish. Dr. Warhuus offered on Saturday to distribute the guide and make it available at the center if I dropped by copies (but I gave my last glossy copy to the new director at the grand opening tour and a copy of the Spanish translation). Also, I've been working for months to secure funding to make copies- without success.

Fred Fasset, the owner of Minute Minute Man Press kindly approached me and offered a year ago to prepare the layout and print copies at a discount. The students raised funds to print a small batch. Fred can be reached to order thousands of copies. The BHS student authors hoped that this guide would have been distributed last fall after their friend's tragic death - they worked weekly for months on the research, drafting, editing and design to ideally provide a copy to all 3,200 families in the high school- and copies in offices where youth are served such as Berkeley Youth Alternative (shout out to BYA ED Kevin Williams who coordinated internship stipends to the 5 BHS students who did the work without pay but I wanted to model the importance of people being rewarded for quality and vital work).

We are happy that the Wellness Center opens officially today. I was very disappointed, however, that many community orgs were unaware of the grand opening. mostly a few dozen white parents and a diverse group of students and campus groups were tabling.

Principal stakeholders like Healthy Black Families and others were not informed or invited. I had to search the BUSD website to find the details. The audience should have been ten times larger to celebrate this huge development.

Apparently Dr. Warhuus also learned late that the school had not listed the city as a principal partner.

Please make sure that all BHS families and all youth in Berkeley are aware of services and free mental health resources available. Just a few weeks ago - another BHS student considered suicide but was fortunately located and rejoined safely with his family. Many suffer in silence. We must connect with them now, before it is too late.

Greetings Council, City Manager and Dr. Warhuus:

Please advise when the BHS 'Wellness Center' is opening, and what services and resources are available now for youth in mental crisis. A student recently went missing for hours and expressed an intent to die by suicide. I saw the alert and walked arihnd and saw him as 2 nice police officers escorted him — but I thought that was a moment for a mental health specialist, but the SCU closes at 4 pm and the city's Mental Health mobile crisis unit was also closed at 6pm.

I submitted a Public Records Act request to the Clerk last night seeking a copy of the May 2022 budget of \$350,000 approved for emergency response to an April 18th suicide of a student who jumped from the 5th floor of the city garage a block from the school during lunch. Other tragedies happened that year increasing the trauma levels at BHS.

Students who created this magazine/guide provided this guide as a resource as students suffer also in silence. How was the \$175,000 allocated from 2022-23? What is the line item uses of the other \$175,000 starting 5 months ago to today in FYv2024? I submitted a Public Records Act request last night at Council.

Did the city follow up on the youth leaders suggestion in public testimony, written proposals and other pleas to hire Cypress Resiliency to conduct a Mental Health First aid class for teachers and staff who confirmed a need for training. And youth described teachers mistaking signs of depression as laziness. The students i mentored shared their stories including anxiety and suicide attempts.

Thank you in advance for your anticipated reply.

In response to a students death by suicide on April 18th 2022, two deaths of Berkeley High students by gun violence on October 1st 2022, and the rising mental health crisis among youth across the world, five BHS alumni have come together to create a resource packet for struggling youth. Teens are in need of mental health assistance, whether this means individual therapy, group counseling, or even a guide to healthy habits, this resource packet can help.

#### MISSION

We strive to provide Berkeley youth with accessible mental health resources. Mental health impacts thoughts, behaviors, and emotions. By learning healthy coping mechanisms, and ways in which you can improve your mental health, your outlook on life may improve drastically. This mental health guide is a starting point for those seeking care or to improve their overall well-being.

# Common Mental Illnesses and Symptoms

#### MENTAL ILLNESS

A wide range of disorders that impact emotional and mental wellbeing. Many mental illnesses consistently affect mood and emotion.

#### ANXIETY

## Symptoms:

- 1. Feeling restless, wound-up, or on-edge
- 2. Being easily fatigued
- 3. Having difficulty concentrating
- 4. Being irritable
- 5. Having headaches, muscle aches, stomachaches, or unexplained pains
- 6. Difficulty controlling feelings of worry

#### DEPRESSION

## Symptoms:

- 1. Feelings of sadness, tearfulness, emptiness or hopelessness.
- 2. Angry outbursts, irritability or frustration, even over small matters.
- 3. Loss of interest or pleasure in most or all normal activities, such as sex, hobbies or sports.
- 4. Sleep disturbances, including insomnia (sleeping too little) or hypersomnia sleeping too much.
- 5. Tiredness and lack of energy, so even small tasks take extra effort

#### TRAUMA

A distressing experience that has lasting effects on mental, emotional, and sometimes physical wellbeing

# Signs of Emotional Distress

- Struggling to get out of bed in the morning because of mood
- Having low or no energy
- · Difficulty concentrating
- Appetite changes that result in unwanted weight changes
- Having unexplained aches and pains, such as constant stomach aches or headaches
- Feeling helpless or hopeless
- Excessive smoking, drinking, or using drugs, including prescription medications
- Worrying a lot of the time; feeling guilty but not sure why
- Lack of interest in schoolwork, chores, or other responsibilities
- · Crying spells or bursts of anger
- · Loss of interest in things you usually find enjoyable
- Inability to perform usual daily functions and responsibilities
- Thinking of hurting or killing yourself or someone else

# Trauma From Gun Violence

Violent deaths (homicide, accidents, suicide) can trigger unique qualities of traumatic grief. With the prevalence of gun violence occurring and shown in the media, it's crucial to understand the effects of these events. The mental health toll does NOT only affect those closest to gun violence.

# Some mental health effects of gun violence:

Depressive episodes, anxiety, trauma, post traumatic stress disorder, intrusive thoughts, sleep problems, substance abuse, self harm, and personality changes.

# Advice to Parents/ Caregivers Acknowledge what is happening

- -Silence can communicate the idea that its not ok to talk about hard things
- -Ask questions like "did you hear about the shooting, what questions or worries do you have?
- -Make sure not to stereotype the perpetrator/make assumptions about the person (Mental health is a good example: 1 in 4 adults experience mental health issues, the majority are not violent.
  - -Remind child that there is compassion and care in the world:

    Emphasize the amount of people who care ex. who took care of the victims.

# Provide a sense of safety and security

-Remind them that the adults in their lives are doing everything they can to keep them safe and protected.

Watch out for signs of emotional stress listed above.

# Tending to Your Mental Health

# **Taking Care of Your Body**

- Regular Exercise (30 minutes of walking)
- Stay Hydrated:
  - 8x8 rule: drink eight eight ounce glasses of water(even if you don't feel thirsty)
- Eating healthy
  - Eat plenty of fruits and vegetables along with foods rich in omega-3 fatty acids, such as salmon. Dark green leafy vegetables in particular are brain protective. Nuts, seeds and legumes, such as beans and lentils, are also excellent brain foods.
- Sleep (9 hours per night)
  - · Create a sleep schedule.
    - Go to sleep and wake up at the same time every night.
  - Lower your usage of screens before bed.
  - Save your bed for sleeping (don't study or work in your bed)

# Take Time to Relax

- Meditation
- Breathing exercises
- Yoga
- Reading



# Advice to Parents

- Listen to your child. Don't brush their feelings or concerns off.
- Respect your child's boundaries. If they don't want to talk about something at that moment, don't force them to.
- Find a good time to bring up the topic.
- Consider suggesting therapy as an option.

# Advice to Teachers

- Remind students that their worth doesn't depend on academic performance.
- Try and provide breaks or give extensions on work if asked.
- Remember that not every student is the same. Students are going through different things and can't always work at the same pace.

# Types of Therapy

#### COGNITIVE BEHAVIORAL THERAPY

A form of psychological treatment that is especially effective for substance abuse, anxiety, depression, eating disorders and other severe mental illnesses. Treatment usuaplly involves efforts to change thinking patterns, increase awareness of thought patterns and behaviors, and establish coping mechanisms. Goal-oriented, typically lasts a few months to a year, 'symptom-focused'.

#### PSYCHODYNAMIC THERAPY

Treatment focuses on the psychological roots of emotional suffering, through self-reflection and self-examination. Explore past difficulties and relationship patterns, understand how personal history influences current mindset, and establish positive relationships.

#### DIALECTICAL BEHAVIORAL THERAPY

A type of psychotherapy that focuses on mindfulness, distress tolerance, emotion regulation, and interpersonal effectiveness. It balances acceptance and change, and emphasizes the importance of validating individual's experiences while encouraging personal growth.



Dear Mayor and Councilmembers,

I am reaching out to request that the Council approve Councilmember Harrison and Taplin's important legislation to make our streets safer citywide for pedestrians, bicyclists, and transit riders, including the neighborhood where a child was struck by a hit-and-run driver on Halloween night.

The family of the victim has already collected more than 16,000 signatures to (1) immediately upgrade street safety in their neighborhood and (2) increase traffic calming citywide.

I strongly support Councilmember Harrison and Taplin's item to reallocate and use the Uber/Lyft tax revenue that was already budgeted in FY 2024 to improve safety near the hit-and-run crash, which would have no impact on this year's budget. I also ask that Council ADOPT an ongoing policy, prioritizing high serious injury and fatality corridors and intersections to allocate 50% of annual Uber/Lyft Tax revenues towards supplementing the City's tragically small traffic calming budget, and 50% to priority pedestrian, bike, and transit SAFETY improvements.

Is this in conformity with how the installations were pitched to the City of Berkeley before they were constructed?


How is the map supposed to be of any use when people can barely see it?

# Re: Berkeley People's Alliance Demand for the City to Cure and Correct, and Cease and Desist from, Egregious Brown Act Violations

Dear Mayor, Councilmembers, Madam City Attorney, and Madam City Manager:

This letter is to call your attention to what the Berkeley People's Alliance believes were substantial and serious violations of the Ralph M. Brown Act, which (1) may jeopardize the finality of the action taken, (2) may render all such actions taken by the Berkeley City Council and City of Berkeley as null and void, and (3) require the City to commit to cease and desist such violations in the future.

The nature of the violation is as follows: in its special meeting of November 21, 2023, the Berkeley Mayor: (1) invoked California Code, Government Code - GOV § 54957.9 et seq. with the intention of holding a non-open and non-public meeting without first attempting the removal of individuals who were allegedly willfully interrupting the meeting and clearing the room, (2) moved the session to an undisclosed room that was not posted on the agenda pursuant to the Brown Act in violation of GOV § 54956 et seq., (3) deprived members of the public from their Brown Act and First Amendment-protected rights to in-person public comment and an open meeting and held a last-minute teleconference meeting in violation of Gov § 54953 et seq., and (4) censored, abridged, and silenced members of the public from providing public comment through the Zoom platform in violation of 54954.3 et seq.

Furthermore, in its regular meeting of November 14, 2023 the Council adjourned unfinished business from the November 14, 2023 regular meeting as a special meeting in violation of Gov § 54955 et seq.

In the November 21, 2023 special meeting, the Berkeley City Council took action to approve various items. In so doing, the Berkeley City Council took "action" as defined in Govt. Code 54952.6 because a majority of the members took an actual vote when sitting as a body or entity, upon a motion, proposal, resolution, order or ordinance. As described below, the action was taken at a special meeting that did not comply with the requirements of the Brown Act and therefore all such actions taken at the November 21, 2023 special meeting are null and void.

In addition, this letter serves as a demand for an unconditional commitment by the City, added as part of an open session of a regular or special meeting as a separate item of business, to cease, desist from all such future violations of the Brown Act as described herein. It should be noted that each member of a legislative body who attends a meeting of that legislative body where action is taken in violation of any provision of the Brown Act, and where the member intends to deprive the public of information to which the member knows or has reason to know the public is entitled under the Brown Act, may be guilty of a misdemeanor.

#### 1. Violation of GOV § 54957.9

On November 21, 2023 the Mayor invoked GOV § 54957.9 without following the clearly defined procedures provided by the California State legislature. The act of rendering a once public meeting into a session closed to in-person participants is one of the gravest steps a public body can take.

That is why the legislature plainly requires that the officer or members conducting such a meeting must exhaust specific means to remove individuals who are willfully interrupting the meeting before moving to a closed format:

"In the event that any meeting is willfully interrupted by a group or groups of persons so as to render the orderly conduct of such meeting unfeasible and order cannot be restored by the removal of individuals who are willfully interrupting the meeting, the members of the legislative body conducting the meeting may order the meeting room cleared and continue in session." GOV § 54957.9 (emphasis added)

While the Berkeley People's Alliance does not in any way condone or support hypothetical measures to forcibly remove individuals who are allegedly willfully interrupting the meeting, it recognizes that the legislature intended as stated by the plain language of the statute that such removal is a prerequisite to holding a Council session without the in-person presence and observation of the public.

The dependent clause of the section of the statute states clearly: "In the event...order cannot be restored by the removal of individuals who are willfully interrupting the meeting...."

We note that multiple City staff and uniformed peace officers were in attendance, but that the Mayor did not issue any removal orders as required by the statute.

Previously on November 14, the meeting had ended when alleged disruptors used the public comment microphones without approval, and on November 21 the Mayor and City used undemocratic means to prevent a similar episode through deploying means to physically and audibly silence and exclude the public, but without following the applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

The alleged interruption on November 21 began within minutes of the meeting commencing. However, instead of moving to remove the alleged group or groups responsible for the interruption, the Mayor rushed through the consent and action calendar in an uncharacteristically fast paced, substantially inaudible, and unexplained manner.

Typically, Council and public comments on the consent calendar take many minutes if not hours. Action items take hours more. However, this was not the case on November 21, 2023, where it appeared that the Mayor was determined to invoke GOV § 54957.9 ahead of the item he personally deemed worthy of extensive and detailed public comment—without the public in attendance as required by the Brown Act pursuant to § 54953 et seq.

After hastily dispensing with the consent calendar, the Mayor subsequently sped through two items on the action calendar (items 10 and 11) without asking for the disruptive individual to come to order, or to be removed. It was only when the Mayor guided the Council to item 12 (immediately preceding item 13) some four to five minutes into the meeting and alleged disruption that he noted the individual was out of order.

He thereupon read from a prepared script stating that:

"Willful disruptions of the conduct of this meeting will not be tolerated. If disruptions continue the Council will take action to restore order and may include removal of disruptive persons or reconvening this meeting at a different location." (emphasis added)

Therein the Mayor clearly acknowledged the requirements of GOV § 54957.9, yet granted himself extraordinary powers not codified in state law to move the public meeting to an undisclosed location without the public in attendance.

### Next, the Mayor stated:

"the Council will now take a ten minute recess and reconvene at that time when we are able to restore order. Then we will proceed to the rest of the meeting." (emphasis added)

During the recess, the City Manager is seen whispering with the Mayor. Shortly thereafter the Mayor, Councilmembers, the City Manager were seen packing up their belongings and retreating to an undisclosed location external to the main School Board room, suggesting they did not intend to permanently return to the chamber.

It should be stressed that the Mayor never uttered a phrase or order to the effect that interruptive individuals *would* be removed, opting instead for "may." In

addition, he foreshadowed the ultimate outcome of the meeting: a closed, or non-public, and non-open meeting in an undisclosed location.

Nothing in the Brown Act empowers officers of public meetings to change meeting locations on a whim. In fact, as described in detail in the following sections, such behavior is clearly prohibited.

Nevertheless, following a brief recess, the Mayor announced twelve minutes into the meeting that he decided to exclude members of the public physically present in the location noticed on the Council Meeting agenda. In doing so, and before retreating and leading the Council to an undisclosed location, he invoked GOV § 54957.9 without attempting to remove allegedly disorderly individuals:

"Okay, because the Council cannot conduct business of this meeting due to the continued disruption by members of the public in the audience who are yelling and chanting, and disrupting our meeting, this disruption has rendered the orderly conduct of the meeting unfeasible, and the *Council will proceed with the meeting without members of the public present in the location* in order to allow the orderly completion of the business as permitted by the Brown Act. So we are invoking the authority Government Code Section 54957.9. This meeting will also continue to broadcast via Zoom. Members of the press who have not participated in disruption will be allowed entry into the [new] meeting location by showing press identification to the City Clerk at the dais. In the meantime, the Council is in recess." (emphasis added)

Only a few minutes later, the Council reconvened in an undisclosed location through Zoom. The location was novel, i.e., not the same as the prior location included on the agenda.

From the new undisclosed location, the Mayor reconvened the extrajudicial meeting with the following justification for his impermissible actions:

"Unfortunately, um, members of the public have willfully disrupted the meetings and made it difficult for us to proceed with our business. I had issued multiple warnings to ask people to cease disrupting the meeting, um and, unfortunately, we are not able to proceed with our business in the City Council chambers. So under Government Code Section 54957.9 the Council has reconvened this meeting in a new location." (emphasis added)

Throughout the whole ordeal, the Mayor, City Manager, Clerk's Office and other City staff, including peace officers, never attempted to—as required by Gov § 54957.9 before moving to clear the room and continuing in session without the public—restore order by the removal of individuals who were allegedly willfully interrupting the meeting. This failure was despite representations ahead of the recess that the Mayor would seek to "restore order" pursuant to the Brown Act.

Furthermore, GOV § 54957.9 requires that only after attempts to remove allegedly disruptive individuals are exhausted, "members of the legislative body conducting the meeting may order the meeting room cleared and continue in session." The conjunction "and" means that continuing in closed session without the public is predicated on clearing the room. The Mayor nor Council ever ordered the chambers cleared of the public, and willfully did not continue in session in the same Council chambers as is provided for by GOV § 54957.9. Instead, they moved the meeting to an undisclosed location and as they themselves acknowledge for the record: "without members of the public present in the location."

The conduct of the Mayor and Council represents an egregious and deliberate violation of the Brown Act, the City's Open Meeting laws, and the public's First Amendment right to express their views to their elected representatives.

#### 2. Violation of GOV § 54956

In moving the meeting in real-time to an undisclosed location, the Mayor and Council flagrantly violated the noticing requirements of GOV § 54956:

"(a) A special meeting may be called at any time by the presiding officer of the legislative body of a local agency, or by a majority of the members of the legislative body, by delivering written notice to each member of the legislative body and to each local newspaper of general circulation and radio or television station requesting notice in writing and posting a notice on the local agency's Internet Web site, if the local agency has one. The notice shall be delivered personally or by any other means and shall be received at least 24 hours before the time of the meeting as specified in the notice. The call and notice shall specify the time and place of the special meeting and the business to be transacted or discussed."

The special meeting notice as posted by the Clerk listed "SCHOOL DISTRICT BOARD ROOM - 1231 ADDISON STREET, BERKELEY, CA 94702" as the in-person meeting location. If the Mayor and Council intended to meet in a location other than the main chamber of the School District Board Room, such as the break room or another location within 1231 Addison Street, or even exclusively on teleconference, and a special meeting was warranted, the Mayor and Council should have posted that location on the agenda at least 24 hours before the time of the meeting. Instead, the body met in an undisclosed location without members of the public present, and deprived them of their right to observe and provide in-person public comment as provided by the Brown Act.

As noted in the previous section, the Council did not attempt to remove allegedly disruptive members of the public and failed to clear the room. In the hypothetical case that the Mayor and Council resorted to exhaust efforts to remove allegedly disruptive members, and subsequently cleared the room, they were required to

"continue in session" in the present location as listed on the agenda: the main chamber of the School Board room.

# 3. Violation of GOV § 54953

In moving the meeting in real-time to an undisclosed location and explicitly prohibiting the public from observing or attending in person, the Mayor and Council flagrantly violated the meeting requirements of GOV § 54953:

"All meetings of the legislative body of a local agency shall be open and public, and all persons shall be permitted to attend any meeting of the legislative body of a local agency, except as otherwise provided in this chapter." GOV § 54953 (emphasis added)

Members of the public who attended the meeting in the public, or who wished to do so, were physically prevented both by Mayoral decree and by peace officers from participating in the meeting at the original location designated by the Clerk in the agenda. During the non-open and non-public portion of the meeting, the Mayor can be heard instructing the Clerk to disconnect the public Zoom feed connection to the School Board chamber, disconnecting in person attendees from watching and listening to the meeting on the provided audio and visual equipment in the chambers, and completely dispensing with any pretense that the Council was somehow meeting in the location as specified on the agenda.

The Mayor and Council also established an illegal last-minute teleconference meeting in violation of GOV § 54953. There is a critical distinction between a teleconference system provided to the public for public comment, and teleconference option for members of the Council to participate. The early pandemic teleconferencing provisions of the Brown Act are no longer in effect due to the suspension of the State and Local emergencies.

With respect to teleconferencing for Councilmembers, the Brown Act specifies that before a legislative body holds a teleconference meeting among the Council, they must properly notice the meeting, take steps that "protects the statutory and constitutional rights of the…public appearing before the legislative body of a local agency," and "allow members of the public to access the meeting…to address the body directly." The Mayor and Council failed to do so.

Rather, only one member of the body was properly authorized pursuant to the Broan Act to teleconference during the meeting. Both the Council's retreat into the undisclosed location on the pretenses of GOV § 54957.9, and using the Zoom platform on an ad hoc and last minute basis, plainly does not satisfy the strict teleconferencing and open meeting provisions of GOV § 54953.

#### 4. Violation of GOV § 54954.3

The First and Amendment and Brown Act provide members of the public with broad free speech and expression rights. Specifically, the Brown Act states:

(c) The legislative body of a local agency shall not prohibit public criticism of the policies, procedures, programs, or services of the agency, or of the acts or omissions of the legislative body.

After the Mayor and Council had inappropriately invoked GOV § 54957.9 and retreated to an undisclosed location "without members of the public present in the location," the Mayor proceeded to censor, abridge, and silence members of the public for providing public comment via the Zoom platform criticizing the City's policies, procedures, programs, acts, and omissions of the legislative body. Multiple members of the public called in to provide public comment during item #13, including to express their shock and dismay with the Mayor's unwarranted invocation of GOV § 54957.9 and ongoing policies and failure or omission to respond to public concerns.

At the arbitrary and capricious whim of the Mayor, he proceeded to cut off and mute public commenters with whom he disagreed. The Brown Act and the First Amendment explicitly provide for members of the public to address such issues during public comment periods regardless of the Mayor's arbitrary and capricious attempts to determine whether a comment is germane to the item before the Council.

#### 5. Violation of GOV § 54955

The Mayor and Council further violated the Brown Act in agendizing the body's unfinished business from the November 14, 2023 regular meeting as part of a special meeting scheduled for November 21, 2023. This act violates Gov § 54955, which specifies:

"When a regular or adjourned regular meeting is adjourned as provided in this section, the resulting adjourned regular meeting is a regular meeting for all purposes." Gov § 54955 (emphasis added)

At the meeting, the Mayor initially suggested that the adjourned regular meeting be continued to the next regular meeting. However, moments later, the Mayor capriciously changed his mind and moved to schedule a special meeting as part of a series of events that would disenfranchise the public from attending and providing public comment in person.

# **Relief Sought**

For the aforementioned reasons, the Berkeley People's Alliance demands that (1) the City acknowledge that the actions of its Council on November 21, 2023 are null and void, (2) the City properly reconsider these items as part of a regular meeting consistent with State law, and (3) the City unconditionally commit as part of an action calendar Council item pursuant to the Brown Act to cease and desist from future violations of the Brown Act as specified in this letter.





Dear Mayor Arreguín and Members of the Berkeley City Council,

The Sierra Club reaffirms to express its conceptual support for the Tenant Opportunity Purchase Act (TOPA). This is a policy that has been developed, over the course of several years, with significant community feedback—including that of the Sierra Club—and meticulous legal research, and it directly speaks to the needs of vulnerable Berkeley tenants.

When TOPA was first introduced, the San Francisco Bay Area was among the top most expensive places to live in the U.S., and, since then, the situation has only been exacerbated. The rapid rate of Bay Area home sales and high offers from investors has resulted in bidding wars that privilege cash offers and put buyers who use conventional financing at a disadvantage. These challenges place low- and moderate-income tenants, first-time homebuyers, and affordable housing developers such as community land trusts, at a severe disadvantage when trying to purchase property in the Bay Area. TOPA, is a policy tool uniquely equipped to level the playing field through rights for tenants and timelines that make it feasible for tenants and affordable housing developers to purchase.

As you know, the local Sierra Club has a history of supporting anti-displacement legislation as well as that which induces opportunities for first-time homeownership. TOPA is consistent with the national Sierra Club's Urban Infill Guidelines, particular this one: "Regulations and public incentives should expand housing choices in neighborhoods that offer access to educational and economic opportunity, particularly for residents who, because of race, ethnicity, and/or income, have historically been marginalized and displaced in land use decisions."<sup>2</sup>

We ask you today to commit to passing a meaningful tenant-centered policy that courageously and proactively levels the real estate playing field so that the preservation of affordable housing is not only a stated goal but also a lived reality.

Berkeley is one of just four California cities that does its own restaurant inspections, which are typically left to county health departments.

The article makes it clear that we should drop the exceptionalism and leave restaurant inspections to Alameda County.

The function is too small to have staffing redundancy, so a single departure is debilitating. You can't hire. The IT systems are complicated and so you're tying up those resources too.

Why be in a business you can't do well when a good alternative exists?

Neither the manager nor you are paying attention, so now the Auditor has to get involved. Literally any one of you could have queried the city data portal to find that businesses your constituents depend on in the most basic sense are not being inspected. You could have asked the Manager what the backlog is like for this (and any other!) function.

Instead, you're working on foreign policy and all kinds of other foolishness.

Your actions here are pretty clear: negotiate a transfer of scope to the county, get rid of the excess staff, free up funds to the core functions we can/must do well, dig deep into city operations to find out where else we are falling down. Block out any distractions. Repeat.

My name is Corinne Scown. I am a Berkeley Lab scientist and teach at UC Berkeley (my kids go to school in Berkeley as well). I'm also an expert in life-cycle assessment, waste management systems (in particular, organic waste), and the use of social cost of carbon -- something we routinely do in my group's research. Our waste management emissions results have been used in San Jose's citywide GHG inventory and we are currently collaborating with CalRecycle on a composting project.

I am troubled by the motivation behind Item 16. It seems to be a cynical attempt to place a disproportionate burden on new housing, while ignoring other larger contributors to Berkeley's emissions footprint. I also think it is not an effective way to address GHG emissions because:

- 1) The typical materials in construction & demolition waste are not the main contributors to GHG emissions from landfills -- food waste and other fast-degrading wastes degrade to methane before cells are capped off and the gas capture system is in place. That is not generally true for C&D waste. If you want to reduce emissions from waste management, send food and yard waste to compost. C&D waste is not a big problem.
- 2) Transportation is the single largest source of GHG emissions in California and anything that enables people to live closer to where they work, go to school, and play is likely the most cost effective strategy for reducing emissions. This item would take things in the opposite direction by hindering infill development and thus encouraging further sprawl to meet the state's housing needs.

Please vote no. This is a bad use of resources and a misguided strategy for reducing GHG emissions in Berkeley.

# Objection to Construction of Fence Encroaching on Public Right-of-Way

Dear Mayor Arreguin, Berkeley City Council, and Mr. Chen,

I am writing to formally object to constructing a fence at 930 Harrison Street that appears to encroach upon the public right-of-way. As a concerned Berkeley unhoused resident who has lived around this property for five years, I understand the need for public spaces to be managed effectively, but the recent construction of the fence appears to have negative consequences, particularly for our unhoused neighbors.

It is evident that the fence does not address the root causes of homelessness and, in fact, exacerbates the already challenging circumstances faced by unhoused Berkeleyans. By restricting access to public spaces, the fence only serves to displace people without providing any meaningful solutions to their plight.


I have observed that the construction of the fence violates the established regulations and guidelines governing the use of public right-of-way areas. This encroachment raises several concerns, including that A) Granting of the permit will be materially detrimental to the public interest, safety, health, and welfare or injurious to the other property, B) There are other reasonable methods of obtaining the desired results are available except as proposed by the applicant, and C) The applicant will NOT be substantially damaged by the refusal to grant the permit as requested.

To support my objection, I have outlined key points below:


1) Violation of Public Right-of-Way: The construction of the fence appears to encroach upon the public right-of-way, limiting access to spaces that are traditionally available for public use. I request a review of the relevant ordinances and regulations to ensure compliance with established

guidelines. The plans also considerably limit the width of the sidewalk in some areas to less than 6 feet as required by the municipal code BMC 16.18.080.


2) The applicant will NOT be substantially damaged: As noted in the Encroachment Application, the applicant noted that the entrances to his business were blocked, but this is untrue. Unhoused residents don't camp on any entrances, and they are all kept clear for business use.




12/08/23: Entrance of 930 Harrison Street (view from Harrison St)

- 3) Impact on Unhoused Berkeleyans: Rather than addressing the hardships faced by unhoused residents of this city, the fence seems to be a superficial attempt to push the problem elsewhere. This approach fails to acknowledge the underlying issues of homelessness and perpetuates a cycle of displacement without offering real solutions.
- **4) Community Input:** It is essential to involve the community in decisions that impact public spaces. As a concerned member of the Gilman community, I request the commenting period to be extended beyond December 8, to the lawful commenting period of two weeks for any projects that involve the encroachment of the public-right-away. (See <u>Encroachment Permit</u> guidelines)
- **5) Legal Implications:** Constructing a fence that encroaches on the public right-of-way may have legal implications and could be in violation of *Martin v. Boise*. The Homeless Response Team has not notified every unhoused resident living around the *930 Harrison Street* property about the construction project. About half of the residents living around this property struggle with serious mental health issues, and require accessible outreach from a behavioral health worker. To this date, this type of outreach has not been done.
- 6) Lack of Notice: The Homeless Response Team has posted public notices sporadically throughout the week in the area, but they have not personally spoken with every unhoused resident camping around the property. RV residents didn't receive a notice until the afternoon of Friday, December 8, which has caused confusion as these residents are also part of the encampment. When RV resident, Yesica Prado, asked questions about the notice to outreach worker, Okeya Vance, she responded with hostility and vague instructions on how to proceed. Overall, homeless outreach workers lack professionalism and compassion for the unhoused people that they serve. (See <u>Video of Outreach performed at the camp</u>)
- 7) Ineffectiveness: Restricting access to public spaces only serves to displace individuals temporarily, without offering any sustainable solutions or addressing the root causes of homelessness. Moreover, the fence does not deter unhoused individuals from camping on the sidewalk outside its confines, rendering it ineffective in achieving its intended purpose.
- **8) Community Alienation:** Erecting barriers in public spaces creates an atmosphere of division and alienation within our community. It is crucial to foster a sense of inclusivity and work collaboratively towards solutions that benefit everyone, housed and unhoused alike.

I propose that the City of Berkeley take the following actions:

- 1) Allocate supportive services to provide essential services such as shelters, mental health facilities, and substance abuse programs to address the underlying causes of homelessness and support our neighbors in need.
- 2) Engage with local homeless advocacy groups and service providers to better understand the needs of the unhoused population in our community.
- 3) Establish designated safe spaces for unhoused Berkeleyans, complete with necessary amenities and support services.

I kindly request that the Berkeley City Council and Public Works Engineering Department investigate this matter promptly and take appropriate action to remedy the situation. This may involve requiring the property owner to remove the encroaching structure entirely. Please add this appeal to the next council meeting on Tuesday, December 12, 2023.

I urge you Mayor Arreguin, Berkeley City Council, and Public Works Engineering Department to reconsider the construction of the fence and instead focus on implementing compassionate and effective solutions to address homelessness. Collaborative efforts with local organizations and stakeholders can lead to more sustainable and humane approaches.





The National Trust for Historic Preservation has called for the preservation of People's Park, pointing out that it is "nationally significant for its association with student protests and countercultural activities during the 1960s" and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

In a December 2023 letter to the People's Park Historic District Advocacy Group, the National Trust says, "(We wish) to express our support for the full exploration of all potential alternatives that result in the preservation of People's Park. The exploration of alternatives is a core protection provided to historic places by CEQA."

"For projects that are not dependent on a single location, such as the proposed construction of student housing, a robust alternatives analysis can often identify superior win-win solutions that allow both preservation and new construction. We hope that just such a solution can be identified that enables both the construction of new student housing in Berkeley and the preservation of People's Park," the letter continues.

In addition to its historical importance, People's Park is also a valuable piece of public open space in Berkeley's most densely populated neighborhood. Destroying the only piece of public open space in the South Campus area of Berkeley would have many negative impacts and would violate international, national, state and city standards for urban green space.

Bob Lalanne, former UC Berkeley Vice Chancellor for Real Estate (VCRE) notes that "People's Park was off the table for any development while we were completing a number of dormitory projects previous to me leaving my position in 2016. Many alternative campus-owned housing development sites have been available for decades and remain to this day. The VCRE issued a report to the Chancellor in 2015 and actually requested funds from campus leadership to remodel the park and were denied.

He continued, "We had looked into adjacent retail properties fronting on Telegraph Avenue, particularly the food retailers that back up to the Park to actually open the rear of their properties to the park for outdoor seating to enliven the Park even more. It is in part due to poor planning and the lack of execution of new student housing by campus for the past 20 years that housing did not keep up with enrollment growth and that the Park is targeted for destruction due to "housing shortage.""

The National Trust agrees. It supports the "full exploration of all alternatives that result in the preservation of People's Park." Like the People's Park Historic District Advocacy Group, the trust believes it is possible to have a win-win solution that includes "the construction of student housing and the preservation of People's Park."

The Washington D.C.-based trust, chartered by Congress in 1949, acts "to protect significant historic places and advocate for historical preservation as a fundamental value in programs and policies at all levels of government."



We, your constituents, have prepared a Resolution on your behalf - please see below. We call upon the Berkeley City Council to review the Resolution, make edits that are consistent with the spirit of our request, place the Resolution on the agenda as a time critical and urgency item, and please pass this Resolution. It is understood that the next public meeting is scheduled for November 28, but we encourage the council to schedule a special meeting sooner to pass this Resolution since it is an URGENCY ITEM. We'd also like to note that there are no direct financial implications since this is a Resolution. The following cities have also passed Resolutions for Ceasefire and Solidarity with Palestine as of November 16, 2023: Richmond, CA; Providence, RI; Cudahy, CA; and Easton, PA. We hope the City of Berkeley will follow suit in this moral leadership. Thank you for your attention and commitment to doing what is right for our community and the world. Cori Bush's Congressional Resolution Calling for An Immediate De-Escalation and Cease-Fire in Israel and Occupied Palestine WHEREAS, Israel's conflation of anti-Semitism with anti-Zionism and solidarity with Palestinians is recognized by legal scholars and human rights organizations, including Israel's B'Tselem, as a political tool to silence critics of Israel. It also creates fear among Jews, who are rightly alarmed by anti-Semitic words and actions due to the horrors of pogroms and the Holocaust in Europe; and WHEREAS, 1,200 Israelis have been killed by Hamas on October 7th and nearly 13,000 Palestinians have been killed by the state of Israel in this escalated conflict, including over 5,500 children (as of 11/19/2023) - the death toll increasing each day and includes Americans who have been killed; and WHEREAS, All human life is precious, and the targeting of civilians, no matter their faith or ethnicity, is a violation of international humanitarian law; and WHEREAS, We mourn the loss of all civilian lives lost on both sides from October 7, 2023, to the present and also throughout the decades of displacement, occupation, oppression, and blockade endured in Gaza, East Jerusalem, and the West Bank; and WHEREAS, In violation of international law, Israel has maintained 16 years of complete sea, air, and land siege on goods and travel, which had already created 42% unemployment, 84% reliance on international humanitarian aid, 41% undernourishment, 60% anemia among children, and innumerable deaths from curable diseases; WHEREAS, Israel's past bombings of Gaza, the main ones in 2009, 2012, and 2014 had already curtailed the ability to make a living by destroying agricultural plots, orchards, and chicken coops, destroyed the infrastructure, including desalination and wastewater treatment plants. And any attempts to rebuild it had been stifled by Israel

limiting access to electricity and fuel to no more than four continued hours per day; and WHEREAS, Prior to the current crisis, only 1% of Gazans had access to safe drinking water, leaving the population – half of whom are children – vulnerable to waterborne diseases, infections, and dehydration. WHEREAS, The World Health Organization states that in an emergency, every person needs between 7.5 to 20 liters of clean water, Gazans have now access to only 3 liters, and some people have been drinking highly saline and contaminated seawater, which has already resulted in cases of chickenpox, scabies, and diarrhea and could easily lead to the spread of cholera; and WHEREAS, There is a consensus among the human rights organizations and the UN that Israel has turned the Gaza Strip, which is one of the most densely populated places on Earth, into "the world's largest open-air prison", even prior to this conflict; and WHEREAS, Israel's actions had already endangered the health of Gazans and the environment, by causing sewage and solid waste to pile up on the streets and over 130,000 cubic meters of wastewater to be discharged daily into the Mediterranean Sea; and WHEREAS, Hundreds of thousands of lives are in imminent danger if a ceasefire is not achieved humanitarian aid is not delivered immediately; and WHEREAS, The humanitarian pauses and safe havens have been violated by Israeli; and WHEREAS, Collective punishment is considered a war crime under international law, and refers to a form of sanction imposed on persons or a group of persons in response to a crime committed by one of them or a member of the group; and WHEREAS, Israel's indiscriminate bombings of Gaza are a form of collective punishment, recognized as a war crime (Common Article 33 of the Fourth Geneva Convention and Article 4 of the Additional Protocol II) and also a violation of International Humanitarian Law, which requires observance of the principles of distinction (attacking only military targets) and proportionality (the anticipated military gains outweigh harm to civilians); and WHEREAS, Israel's shutting off all access to electricity, drinking water, food, and humanitarian aid is a form of collective punishment and constitutes a war crime under international law; and WHEREAS, Ethnic cleansing refers to the creation of an ethnically homogenous geographic area through the elimination of unwanted ethnic groups by deportation, forcible displacement, or genocide; and WHEREAS, Israel has engaged in an ethnic cleansing campaign by explicitly requiring two million Palestinians to leave Gaza immediately or risk being bombed in their homes and has intensified its unprovoked killing and forced displacement of Palestinians in the West Bank to uninhabitable areas; and WHEREAS, Israel has violated international law by not ending its military occupation of East Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Gaza, which began in 1967; and WHEREAS, The International Humanitarian Law holds an occupying force responsible for the safety and well-being of the inhabitants of the land it occupies, Israel has been settling the foreign nationals of Jewish descent on the occupied land, driving away Palestinians from their land through acts of terror, confining them to small incongruent areas, demolishing their homes, businesses, and orchards, etc.; and WHEREAS, The U.S. government holds immense diplomatic power to save Palestinian and Israeli lives but has refused to take serious action to do so; and WHEREAS, The state of Israel would not be able to maintain its military occupation of East Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Gaza without enormous military aid provided by the United States every year, thereby also depriving Americans of money for their own urgent needs; and WHEREAS, The 14.3 billion requested from the Biden Administration in October 2023 in addition to the 3.8 billion in military aid provided annually by the United States to Israel is derived from American taxpayer money. # 'Dire humanitarian crisis': Oakland passes Gaza cease-fire resolution

The Oakland City Council on Monday unanimously passed a resolution calling for a cease-fire in Gaza, and at the same time rejected a proposal to formally condemn Hamas - the militant group that governs the Gaza Strip and incited the current war by launching a surprise attack on Israel on Oct. 7.

At a special meeting Monday night, the Oakland City Council voted 8-0 to pass the resolution after hours of raucous public testimony. Oakland joins its neighbor to the north, Richmond, as the latest Bay Area city to call for an end to the violence.

Councilmember Carroll Fife — the resolution's sponsor — said she wanted the measure's focus to be on peace rather than condemnation. "In order for a lasting peace to occur, the shooting, the bombings, all of these things have to stop," Fife said. "People need food and access to water, that was the goal of this resolution. I want Jewish children to live as much as I want Palestinian children to live."

Still, Fife specifically said it was important for the council to recognize "the imbalance and disproportionate death" on the Palestinian side of the conflict. After Hamas' surprise attack — which Israeli authorities say left 1,400 people dead — Israel retaliated by pummeling Gaza with airstrikes. According to the Palestinian Health Ministry, the Palestinian death toll in Gaza now is nearly 15,000, with most of those killed being women and children.

The language of the Oakland resolution does stand out for its bluntness. While other city council debates on the issue have ended in chaos or stalemate, Oakland's produced strong, unambiguous language. "Gaza is in a dire humanitarian crisis that is getting worse with each passing day," the resolution proclaims, "with the only remaining hospitals running out of fuel and medical supplies, and over 1.5 million Palestinians facing displacement, homelessness, and starvation." It also specifically condemns "the recent rise of Antisemitic, Islamophobic, racist, homophobic, and xenophobic attacks in our city and across the nation."

Technically, the Oakland resolution was written in support of a Congressional House resolution calling for a cease-fire. That resolution, introduced in October, now has 34 signatures,

including from California Reps. Barbara Lee, Maxine Waters and Mark DeSaulnier. Oakland's resolution calls for copies of the document to be sent to several other high-ranking California officials, including Gov. Gavin Newsom and the state's two senators, Alex Padilla and Laphonza Butler.

The unanimous vote to approve the resolution came after hours of debate. The council had previously voted 6-2 to reject amendments sponsored by Councilmember Dan Kalb that would have added a formal condemnation of Hamas into the resolution. Kalb argued that a specific reference to the militant group was "not at all contrary" to supporting a cease-fire.

"Because the number of innocent residents killed in Gaza is so disproportionately high — that's an understatement, it's ridiculously, absurdly high — it cannot be downplayed, and therefore the desire and call for a cease-fire is logical, to say the least, in order to save lives," Kalb said. "... Likewise, downplaying — or worse yet, rationalizing — the Oct. 7 mass murder by Hamas as 'legitimate resistance' is sad, ridiculous and antithetical to promoting peace."

Other members of the council dismissed Kalb's amendments, saying the history of the conflict extends centuries. "If we were going to entertain putting those facts that you mentioned into this resolution, which I do not support, then we would also have to introduce the facts that this conflict did not start on Oct. 7," council President Nikki Fortunato Bas said to Kalb. "... It started hundreds of years ago."

Monday's meeting came after weeks of demonstrations throughout Oakland as well asSan Francisco. Earlier this month, hundreds of protesters calling for a cease-fire staged a sit-in at the Ronald V. Dellums Federal Building in Oakland, which led to multiple arrests.

Dear Berkeley City Council and respected government officials,

I am reaching out to you as a concerned citizen and proud American Jew who firmly believes in the fundamental values of democracy, wherein state and local governments hold a constitutional duty to safeguard public safety. As a refugee from the former Soviet Union, I have personally experienced the harsh realities of anti-Semitism. The current climate in the United States, particularly in California, leaves me deeply shocked and concerned for my family's future.

The extent of animosity directed towards our community is not only distressing but also appears to contravene the very principles that define American values. I attach to this email an impactful speech by Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, which provides a comprehensive context for the fears the American Jewish community is experiencing due to rising anti-Semitism. Additionally, the speech offers a nuanced yet fair historical background of Jewish people in the United States, Europe, and the Middle East (<a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=dleBosgap4U">https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=dleBosgap4U</a>). I urge you to consider the insights shared in this speech as we collectively strive to uphold the ideals that make our nation strong and inclusive for all its citizens.

On Tuesday, November 28, the Berkeley City Council faced substantial public pressure to revise the agenda and consider a "Cease Fire" resolution. Unfortunately, the meeting was marred by numerous participants resorting to scare tactics, intimidation, and disorderly conduct, which significantly contributed to the reluctance of many Jewish citizens to attend in person. Personally, I participated in the Zoom call from 6:30 pm to 11:50 pm, witnessing a troubling display of disrespect towards the council and its decisions.

The sheer volume of disrespectful comments and the evident hostility towards the Jewish community during the meeting were profoundly challenging to witness. I commend you for your resilience and refusal to yield to bigotry and unjustifiable behaviors and **I express my heartfelt gratitude!** It is crucial to stand firm against such tactics to preserve a fair and inclusive civic discourse.

The narrative Israel commits genocide is a false and anti-Semitic statement. Hamas fires deadly rockets from schools, hospitals, and densely populated areas knowing that Israel, like any democracy, would have to take whatever military action was necessary to stop the rockets. Hamas also knew the media would broadcast the dead Palestinian children, which Hamas uses as human shields, around the world to cause outrage directed at Israel for the cause of their deaths. President Biden, on behalf of The United States of America, unequivocally condemned the appalling assault against Israel by Hamas terrorists from Gaza on October 7.

Furthermore, despite Hamas' blatant disregard for the lives of the civilians around them, the Palestinian population has increased from 954,898 to 4,654,421 since 1967. This false, antisemitic rhetoric falls short of our American value system and has no place in bringing safety to citizens of the city of Berkeley.

The Berkeley City Council is under pressure for future meetings with a vicious resolution that takes the position of solidarity with Hamas terrorists and characterizes Israel's attempts to rescue the hostages and liberate the Gazan people as a "genocide." This is a foul affront to the victims of the October 7th massacre. Furthermore, expressing ghastly support for Hamas, who openly murdered, raped, and kidnapped citizens from 25 countries, does not lead us to peace of any kind.

This type of resolution, which falsely claims to support the Palestinian people, achieves the opposite outcome because the BDS movement severely weakens the Palestinian economy and imposes hardships on the Palestinian people. In a 2016 article, Bassam Eid, human rights activist and commentator on Palestinian domestic affairs, explained that the objectives of BDS activists abroad would actually increase economic hardships for the Palestinians in Judea, Samaria and Gaza. BDS leader Omar Barghouti, has expressed support for terrorism, promoted anti-Semitic conspiracy theories and regularly demonizes Israel. He opposes the Jewish right to self-determination and Israel's existence, openly calling for its destruction as a Jewish State.

As Hamas and its supporters attempt to manipulate public perception by portraying Israel as uniquely "illegitimate," we strongly urge the Berkeley City Council to refrain from entertaining this anti-Semitic resolution in future meetings. Dear Mayor and City Council members,

My name is Rachel and have been a resident of Berkeley since 2016 with my husband and three children. We relocated to Berkeley to live in a city that prides itself on embracing all people and is home to an incredibly accepting and thriving Jewish community. Our kids have been so incredibly fortunate to grow up in Berkeley where they have felt safe to be Jewish without a moment of hesitation to wear Jewish stars and talk about their religion with friends and neighbors in our community.

We have been protecting them from the news about the 400% increase in antisemitic incidents in this country since Oct 7, the horrendous rhetoric in the local protests and on UCB campus so they are still not scared to be Jewish and my 12-year-old son is still not scared to roam freely with his friends wearing kippas at the parks in Berkeley after Shabbat services.

However, amid the rise in antisemitism since Oct 7, I'm not sure how long this window of freedom will be open, particularly if the City Council decides to make any kind of one-sided statement about the Israel/Gaza conflict as was the case in Oakland last night and in Richmond weeks ago that are being requested by the loudest voices, but not the vast majority of residents who just want the City to handle the numerous local issues (housing, state-of good repair, fire and life safety, etc.). While I've understood that Council is not considering a resolution like the other cities, statements can be just as divisive. These statements being requested will only incite more anti-Israel, antisemitic rhetoric and actions such as we're seeing at Berkeley High and King Middle School where at a walk out kids were shouting KKK and "F\*\*\* the Jews."

I highly urge you not to buckle to the pressure of folks that are showing up to meetings throwing money, screaming, making obscene one-sided comments and not letting Council conduct its business. I highly urge you not to make a statement on the current Israel-Hamas war.

Making any kind of statement on this conflict requires an incredibly in-depth knowledge of the middle east, the Jewish diaspora, the Holocaust, the programs and genocide committed on Jewish people throughout history. A statement would need to recognize the complexity and genesis of the conflict and how Palestinian terror organizations have been a huge obstacle to peace in the region. This isn't black and white - oppressed against oppressors, colonized against

colonizers. And any statement that delves into these sorts of issues must also include clear unequivocal condemnation of antisemitism - note that the Jewish population in the US is 2.4% and it receives over 60% of the religious-based hate crime (<a href="https://www.bbc.com/news/world-us-canada-67281042">https://www.bbc.com/news/world-us-canada-67281042</a>). If not, this teaching will only foster less understanding and more hate for the generations to come.

I'd also like to point out that one of the groups with a very loud voice is Jewish Voice for Peace (JVP), while vocal in Berkeley, does not represent the vast majority of Bay Area Jews (or the Jewish diaspora for that matter). A professional poll of Bay Area Jews conducted in 2022 found that: "The vast majority of survey participants (89%) agree that Israel has the right to exist as a Jewish and democratic state —a basic marker of Zionism" (p. 15). This data makes clear how unrepresentative JVP, an avowed anti-Zionist organization, is when it comes to how most Jews feel about Israel. JVP provides convenient cover to groups and organizations that seek Israel's destruction because they hold up their Jewishness. To be clear, there are always small fringes within any community that speak loudly and are at odds with the majority. The Council should not give any more deference to JVP's opinion on the Hamas-Israel war than they would Kanye West's opinion on the subject of Black Lives Matter. JVP and Kanye are both entitled to their perspectives, but that does not make them either representative or authoritative with regards to the perspectives of mainstream Jewish or African American communities.

We are at a critical juncture where our council member's decisions will influence whether our community becomes more divided, putting marginalized residents at increasing risk of hate crimes, or becomes more united. I appreciate that this council has not considered any resolutions on the Israel/Hamas war thus far, despite mounting pressure, and I urge you to continue to keep our community safe and productive by:

- 1) Continuing to focus on Berkeley-specific issues, not international issues.
- 2) Banning disruptive individuals from city council meetings.
- 3) Communicating with BUSD regarding the large increase in antisemitism our students are experiencing without consequences for perpetrators

Dear City Council Members and Mayor,

I greatly appreciate the balance you have established in the face of very challenging set of circumstances in the Middle East. I attended a school board meeting a few weeks ago and the tension was very high in that meeting. I can only image what the recent council meetings have been like. I very much agree that while we may have many disagreements about the situation, these resolutions will do nothing but fan the flames of hatred here at home. Please continue to chart the balanced course here.

On the issue of balance for some less weighty matters, I feel the council needs to be more balanced in its approach to offering transportation options to folks that live in the hills. First, I'm fully supportive of building new housing at the North Berkeley BART station, however, the number of parking spaces in the current plans is greatly reduced from the current number. I've tried to take the 65 and 67 service, but they do not start early enough for me to get to work on time. I understand that BART parking will need to be reduced, but some plans under consideration have no parking at all. I urge you to push for the maximum parking options.

Second, our children take the 65 and 67 buses to get to and from school every day, and now AC transit is looking to combine the two bus lines. We have already provided feedback to them. The AC transit sites are not clear in the options that they are fact merging the lines. Obviously, that will lead to more parents choosing to drive to drop their children off at school. Sure, we could get electric bikes and go up and down Spruce each day, but not everyone is willing to brave the narrow streets on a bike.

Finally, there is currently no bus service on the weekends to downtown, and no bus service at all that goes from the hills to the commercial streets Solano or Hopkins in the North Berkeley hills. The bike route plans for Hopkins look to take away additional parking from the street. Monterey Ave was recently repaved with wide bike lanes (yes unprotected), and has far less traffic than Hopkins. Why is that route not sufficient? These routes run parallel to each other. It is very unfortunate that this dispute has pushed the Hopkins plan out from the recent 5 year paving plan, as the street is in urgent need of repair.

Thank you for maintaining balance in your thought processes and decisions.

As a student of public health and social work, I believe it is necessary to put an immediate end to preventable deaths, injury, and psychological suffering for the people of Palestine.

I urge you NOT to consider any resolution on Israel or the current war there, including any statement that seeks to placate everyone with a stake in this issue. No matter how "fair and balanced" it is, however noble your aim, you will satisfy no one at best and sow more division, anger, and aggression at worst.

I'm a resident of District 5 and the father of 2 students at Berkeley High School. For the first time in my 18 years living in Berkeley, I've found some of the anti-Israel rhetoric here very disturbing, including much misinformation and bias my sons have experienced at their school. Anything that the City Council as a body states publicly will only perpetuate this climate by further empowering the vociferous and strident views that feed this negative, highly charged atmosphere of accusation and retribution.

I am a Jewish American who firmly opposes the policies of Israeli right-wing hardliners. I have even participated in protests against Netanyahu. I'm pained by the death of thousands of Gazans in the current war and by the treatment of Palestinians more broadly. However, I also firmly and unequivocally believe in the right of Israel to exist, with all its flaws and indecencies. These two sets of beliefs can be held at the same time, but to hear the public discourse now you'd think the concept of Israel as an independent state should be questioned as a matter of principle. This question was concluded with the establishment of Israel in 1948. Millions of Jews were born and live there. They are not "going back." I cannot overstate how threatening and appalling this agenda of undermining Jewish statehood is to Jews in this country and around the world

I'm not opposed to the City Council taking a stand on a political issue. I would question the timing and purpose of speaking on this one specific issue, though, especially if it fails to condemn the murderous rampage of Hamas, as other

recent city resolutions have done. The generic condemnation of "antisemitism and Islamophobia" satisfies no one. Such statements are particularly toothless without reference to Oct. 7, the biggest single act of antisemitism against Jews since World War II. Good Morning David,

As I said in my email "We are aware of this situation and are currently addressing it."

In my original response to you, I thought it important to reiterate our values and my ongoing commitment to our classrooms being safe, inclusive learning spaces for all students. The response was not necessarily to reiterate the importance of free speech, but rather a more detailed explanation of a board policy (BUSD <u>Policy 6144 Controversial Issues</u>) that has come up a lot in recent weeks.

My goal was to highlight important information that may not be interpreted in the policy on controversial issues. Specifically, engaging students in controversial topics must be done in a way that is aligned to those values noted in my email, and must foster the educational environment and experiences that I outlined. Furthermore, I wanted you to know that when these tenets are not followed and engagement is inappropriate and/or harmful, staff will investigate and follow up. Such is the case with this instance.

Again, the flag in the classroom (the matter that you called my attention to in your original email) is being addressed, directly.

I understand that you have filed a formal complaint with our Civil Rights and Compliance Office regarding this same matter as well. Per your request, the district investigator will be speaking with you prior to the completion of this formal investigation.

With regard to the social media post that you have noted in your response below, your partner also filed a formal complaint with our Civil Rights and Compliance Office regarding this same matter. There is an open investigation at the time of this communication. As this is both an active investigation and a personnel matter, I am not privy to provide any further detail. That said, as a complainant in the matter, you will receive a final investigation report. Please note that employee privacy laws prevent us from disclosing any corrective actions taken against the respondent to anyone besides the employee involved.

David, I take your concerns and issues raised very seriously. Thank you for the opportunity to follow up and further clarify my initial response.

While I appreciate your response and also agree that free speech and open dialog are important principles of our community, I don't think your response is sufficient given the context of Jessica's Arroyo's actions. In addition to the Palestinian flag, she has posted blatantly anti Israel and and anti semitic messages on her instagram. Please see the image attached.

Given the context and her views, I don't think this is a case where she is facilitating a balanced discussion - rather one where she is using her platform as a teacher to advance a one sided agenda which is clearly anti-Israel and guaranteed to be experienced as anti semitism by the Jewish community. As a Jewish person it feels personal, but putting that aside, I don't find it appropriate for any teacher in our school system to be advancing a personal agenda like this against any ethnic group, whether I am a member of it or not.

The district should intervene immediately, be it through ordering her to take down this flag, suspending her, or dismissing her. The course of action should be appropriate to the legal situation and respectful to Ms. Arroyo's rights and privileges as a BUSD employee. However, this is clear cut case where your response is not enough. The district should not speak in vague terms about actions that may or may not happen - it should have a moral compass and act with conviction to put an immediate stop to acts of hatred against our community.

Thank you for your email.

It is important to me that our classrooms and school are welcoming communities where all students need to feel safe, seen, valued, and heard. Furthermore, they must be reflective of our diverse students, responsive, and humanizing.

We appreciate your bringing this to our attention and sharing the ways in which you or your child have been impacted by this specific display. We are aware of this situation and are currently addressing it.

The ongoing conflict between Israel and Palestine is a deeply complex and sensitive issue. Berkeley has a long history of engaging in open dialogue about issues that are both complicated and complex, and supporting freedom of speech and expression. We understand engaging in controversial issues as a fundamental pillar of education. Our district believes that "students should have opportunities to discuss controversial issues which have political, religious, social, historical, or economic significance" (BUSD Policy 6144 Controversial Issues).

BUSD encourages educational programs that foster a nuanced understanding of the historical, cultural, and political factors contributing to this conflict or any other controversial topics. It is most important that the educational experiences and environment that we create emphasize the importance of empathy and open-mindedness, support the integration of diverse perspectives, foster students' critical thinking and evaluation, connect to content standards, and create spaces that are inclusive and respectful.

We have also taken significant actions to support our staff, holding the values mentioned above. The short term actions have included shared guidance and resources. We have provided our educators with resources for engaging in critical conversations that may arise in their classrooms in a manner that is age appropriate and supports the emotional well-being of all students, especially students who may feel particularly vulnerable. This included resources for challenging anti-semitism and islamophobia.

We are in the process of sharing additional resources and guidance for our educators including a framework for teaching controversial issues, more clarity on academic freedom and freedom of speech - what they are and what they are not, and continued opportunities to build their knowledge and support instructional practices. This is essential in response to the current events and aligned to our continued goal of ensuring Equity, Excellence, Enrichment and Engagement, making sure our educators have the skills, tools, and knowledge to do so across grade levels.

We are continually clarifying with our educators what is and is not appropriate ways for them to engage with our students. Any reported incidence of intolerance, inappropriate or harmful content in our classrooms are promptly investigated in accordance with District policies. In addition to the investigation process, any affected students will be offered supportive measures in order to ensure unhindered access to their education.

I hear your concerns and want to assure you of our commitment to keeping all of our students safe and making sure that our schools are inclusive and humanizing for all members of our diverse student body.

If the teacher responsible for this does not take immediate corrective action, I would expect disciplinary steps to be taken. I appreciate your attention to this important issue and look forward to your response.

WHEREAS, the City of Richmond stands in solidarity with the Palestinian people of Gaza, who are currently facing a campaign of ethnic cleansing and collective punishment by the state of Israel; and

WHEREAS, collective punishment is considered a war crime under international law, and refers to a form of sanction imposed on persons or a group of persons in response to a crime committed by one of them or a member of the group; and

WHEREAS, the state of Israel is engaging in collective punishment against the Palestinian people in Gaza in response to Hamas attacks on Israel; and

WHEREAS, this collective punishment of the Palestinian people includes shutting off all access to electricity, drinking water, food, and humanitarian aid; and

WHEREAS, the UN says approximately 2 million people in Gaza may soon run out of drinking water and all medical care; and

WHEREAS, ethnic cleaning refers to the creation of an ethnically homogenous geographic area through the elimination of unwanted ethnic groups by deportation, forcible displacement, or genocide; and

WHEREAS, Israel is now engaged in an ethnic cleansing campaign by explicitly requiring two million Palestinians to leave Gaza immediately or risk being bombed in their homes by the Israeli army; and

WHEREAS, the Gaza Strip, one of the most densely populated places on Earth, has been repeatedly referred to by human rights groups as "the world's largest open-air prison" even prior to this conflict; and

WHEREAS, Gaza is known as "the world's largest open-air prison" due to ongoing, unbearable living conditions imposed by the state of Israel, including a full air, land and sea blockade, enclosure of its borders by concrete walls and barbed wire fences, and the strict prohibition of Palestinians from leaving and entering the territory freely; and

WHEREAS, this blockade on Gaza has caused a 42% unemployment rate, while 84% of the population relies on humanitarian aid, 41% of Palestinians have too little food, 60% of Palestinian children are anemic, and the Gazan population cannot count on more than 2-4 hours of continuous electrical power a day; and

WHEREAS, prior to this current water shortage, only 1% of Gaza population has access to safe drinking water, leaving Gaza's population – half of whom are children – increasingly vulnerable to waterborne diseases, infections, and dehydration; and

WHEREAS, Israel has not allowed many common cancer diagnosis and treatment tools, including PET CT and radiotherapy, to enter Gaza since 2007; and

WHEREAS, pediatric cancer cases that are typically considered treatable are often fatal in the Gaza Strip, as a result of the lack of healthcare and restrictions on movement; and

WHEREAS, the state of Israel would not be able to maintain an apartheid regime without enormous military aid provided by the United States every year, thereby also depriving Americans of money for their own urgent needs; and

WHEREAS, 1,400 Israelis have been killed by Hamas on October 7th and nearly 6,000 Palestinians have been killed by the state of Israel in this escalated conflict; and

WHEREAS, we mourn the loss of all civilian lives lost on both sides from October 7th to the present and also throughout the decades of displacement, occupation, oppression and blockade endured in Gaza and the West Bank;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Richmond takes seriously the entreaty of "Never Again," and that the historical memory of the Holocaust means fighting ethnic cleansing and apartheid everywhere; and

Dear Council,

I hope you're recovering from the stressful events of this past Tuesday's meeting. I've been reflecting a lot about what happened and feel it's imperative for dialogue to happen. To preface, I'm not writing to convince you to adopt a ceasefire resolution.

Just some background on me-I am Catholic Palestinian American (although I don't practice), born here in California. My entire extended family is in diaspora, across 4 continents. My grandparents all survived the violent military attacks of the 1948 Nakba as children. My grandparents suffered and fought to make sure their grandchildren were born free. I've never been to my homeland. And with my freedom, I have a responsibility to use my voice and privilege to try to free others.

I was educated at UCLA in Psychology and got my M.Ed. there in Education. My program was focused on social justice and at the time was in the top 10 education programs in the country. I've been an educator for 8 years and work in the newcomer program at King, teaching ELD and supporting newcomers and EL students at the school. I have good standing in the school community as well as in the larger Palestinian American community in California.

I would like to meet with as many of you who are willing, regarding anti-Arab and anti-Palestinian intimidation and harassment that is alarmingly prevalent in Berkeley. I don't live in Berkeley, but I work in BUSD. I know that some of you may be familiar with a petition I wrote in mid-October. I feel that as the only Palestinian classroom teacher in the entire district, it is my obligation to speak up about the hate and intimidation that is raging through the community. I feel that all of the attacks against anyone who supports or teaches about Palestine are personal attacks against my ethnicity.

Teachers in the district who have been in the community for decades are now living in fear due to a group of parents who is claiming to fight for the safety of children, but is responsible for starting defamation campaigns. I'm not making assumptions-I know exactly who is behind all of this but I have no interest in defamation. I am only interested in trying to get through to you.

I can only hope that you find it in your hearts to just talk to me and listen to a different perspective. My experience over the last two months is one full of anguish, as it is for many. But for Palestinians, we are quite literally watching the daily mass murder and mass expulsion of our own people, and additionally face hatred and attacks here in the US. Every day, I feel like part of my soul is dying.

The hardest part of all this is the intense campaigns to silence people who are fighting so hard for justice and freedom, and unable to be heard by people who have the power to help.

I hope you will talk to me, and maybe one or two others who have something to share, and I look forward to your replies.

Dear Council Members,

I have been a resident of Berkeley almost consistently since 2009, and I am emailing you with great urgency. I am writing to you to urgently call for a ceasefire in Gaza and to support House Resolution 786: Calling for an immediate deescalation and cease-fire in Israel and occupied Palestine. This is a humanitarian crisis and I am appalled that my tax dollars are funding a literal genocide. As an Armenian-American who is a descendent of genocide survivors who were expelled from their ancestral lands, seeing the videos of innocent Palestinian civilians being marched miles out of their historic homeland in what is being called a "humanitarian corridor" but is, in actuality, a death march is incredibly triggering.

I have family in Gaza who were at the church in Northern Gaza that was bombed on October 19 that killed 18 Christian Palestinians. When I called my mom to ask her if that was the church they were sheltering at, do you know what she said to me? She told me, in one of the quietest voices I've ever heard from her, "That was the church. I don't know anything. I'm going to church to pray now." My relatives miraculously survived but how long will that last as they can only consume one piece of bread a day? How long will they live when there is barely any food and bombs reign down around them?

I'm writing to let you know that I am out of the fugue state that I have been living in for over a month. I'm done waiting around for massacre after massacre to stop. The City of Berkeley needs a ceasefire resolution now.

What's happening in Gaza is a genocide akin to the Armenian genocide---a genocide the entire world is watching and refusing to stop. Armenians are not just distant allies. We are the neighbors of the Palestinian people and on-the-ground witnesses to their suffering. Armenians have existed in Jerusalem since the 4th century AD. As I write this email, Armenians in Jerusalem are being threatened, harassed, and expelled from their homeland by armed settlers supported by Israeli police.

These images coming out of occupied Palestine are horrific and the rhetoric being used by the Israeli government to justify their indiscriminate carpet bombing is clearly genocidal and completely unacceptable. Over 20,000 dead. Over 37,000 injured. Over 1.7 million people displaced. I promise you that history will remember whether the City of Berkeley Council Members spoke up and supported a ceasefire. If you choose to remain silent, that decision will follow you the rest of your lives.

There is, in fact, still an opportunity to stand against genocide. I implore you to stand for justice. I implore you to stand for the City of Berkeley's principles. I implore you to recognize that we are all human beings, worthy of love, shelter, safety, and dignity, whether we live in Berkeley, California or Gaza City.

Please voice your support for this resolution and call for a ceasefire now!

I attended the Berkeley City Council meeting on November 28th, 2023 and was very disappointed by how you responded to community members calling for the Berkeley City Council to adopt a resolution calling for Ceasefire Now in Gaza. While I believe that the United States must go much further beyond simply calling for a ceasefire, and also call for an end to military aid to Israel and an end to the occupation of Palestine, calling for a ceasefire NOW is the absolute minimum we can do as residents of the United States and neighbors in Berkeley. I was shocked and disappointed by Mayor Jesse Arreguín's statement that day, asserting that calls for ceasefire resolutions impact communities negatively. I strongly disagree. Israel's long oppression of Palestinians must be condemned by its political allies, but to use that to justify Hamas' murderous attack on innocent civilians is to condone terrorism. Nothing justifies terrorism, and even terrorism does not justify depriving innocent Palestinian civilians of their safety, basic human rights, and humanitarian aid.

When intelligent, thoughtful people ignore decades of ardent, public opposition by progressive Jews of Israel's Palestinian policies, the lazy, irrational conflation of Jewishness with Israeli politics is an antisemite's dream come true.

We start with the simple truth that **we all live with things we may not ourselves have even lived through.** Whether our ancestors were victims, perpetrators, or survivors, and whether we know our families' specific stories or not, descendants carry their legacies. Our programs reach across the divides of time and circumstance to ensure that our ancestors' histories do not dictate our future. As descendants, we have the power to create a world where thoughtful reflection, critical thinking, and respectful dialogue are the norm.

It is absolutely surreal that, right now, I feel safer in Germany — where the politics of the 1930s and 1940s murdered many of my family and scarred those who fled — than I would in my "progressive" Berkeley home of nearly 30 years.

Lovers of humanity do not blame victims of terrorism for their losses. Lovers of humanity discern between terrorism and oppression, and come together to fight for justice and safety for all. Please do not support this inflammatory resolution. Please focus on deepening the dialogue across differences in Berkeley ... and pave Hopkins Street!

THIS Tuesday, November 28, the Berkeley City Council will vote on whether to pass the resolution, named "Berkeley for Palestine" - which alludes to seek a victory against the "normalization of Israel's occupation and genocide."

The narrative Israel commits genocide is a false and anti-Semitic statement. I just read that you are working on a resolution re: the war between Hamas and Israel. You are wading into a complex political reality from which there is no easy answer. Those clamoring for an immediate cease fire have an agenda that goes way beyond the call for the bombing to stop.

As you can see from my points below, the cease fire resolution that many are pressuring you to pass, is inadequate to address the real situation in the Middle East that includes Israel and Gaza. Israel is fighting an existential war. It is being attacked on 3 sides at this time, by Hezboilah, Hamas, and the Houthis. It is fighting for the survival of the Jewish State along with the survival of 20% of its population who are Arab Israelis.

Whatever resolution you come up with I hope it will NOT include a demand for a cease fire. Please don't cave to those who believe this war is a simple black and white event. Most of those pressuring you to put a cease fire in this resolution want you to do so, because they believe that Israel has no right to defend its citizens, has no right to live in peace next to Gaza, has no right to have its citizens and others returned to Israel from where they were so brutally kidnapped and has no right to get rid of those who committed the worst atrocity in the history of the Jews and since WWII.

What demands will you make on Hamas who has broken many cease fires including the last one along with many agreements it made such as its most recent promise to release 10 hostages.

If you do persist in creating a resolution, I hope you will include the following:

- \*We condemn Hamas' invasion of Israel and the atrocities it carried out by torturing, murdering and kidnapping Israeli citizens.
- \*We demand the immediate release of all the hostages.
- \*We Condemn Hamas which is supported by Iran, a sworn enemy of the United States, for vowing to commit many more atrocities and murder of Jews and vowing to destroy Israel.
- \*In light of the fact that Hamas has broken numerous cease fires, we will NOT urge a cease fire at this time.
- \*All countries have a right to defend their citizens as does Israel.
- \*We condemn Hamas for locating its military command centers underneath hospitals, schools, daycare centers, libraries and in doing so endangers the lives of Gazan residents.
- \*The United States government supports Israel's war in order to rid the Middle East of yet another ISIS type organization that seeks to murder all those who do not convert to Islam or be killed and to install a Caliphate in the Middle East. We commend the United State government for defending its only ally and the only democracy in the Middle East.
- \*We condemn the continued bombing of Israel by Hamas, Hezbollah and the Houthis and call for an immediate cease fire by these proxies of Iran.

My name is Lea Zalinskis and I am a Berkeley resident, raised in Berkeley from age 2.

My great-grandmother lived through three wars. She, my grandparents, and my uncle fled their homeland of Latvia during WWII, to live in refugee camps for 14 years. My father and 4 of his sisters were born in these camps as stateless citizens. Eventually placed in Michigan, they never returned home.

What was clearly severe PTSD from brutal oppression, bombings, soldiers murdering family members, losing their home and being separated from family and everything else they knew, has affected me and the rest of my family through the generations in ways I hope you'll never understand first hand. And it is not even a drop in the ocean compared to the endless atrocities visited upon the Palestinian people by the state of Israel, with the use of our tax dollars.

I am one of your many constituents who has shown up repeatedly to demand that Berkeley pass a resolution for a ceasefire in Gaza. I have watched our Palestinian community members stand before you, stating they have lost tens of family members in an instant, due to Israel's U.S.-funded genocide. I have watched Mayor Arreguín and the whole of the city council sit stone-faced and, without acknowledgement or sympathy, cut comments short, walk out on us to hold private meetings, and adjourn early, among other insulting, unusual actions.

The death toll in Gaza and in the West Bank continues to climb, and we are watching a genocide take place every day in real time. You'll know by now that 68% of Americans want a ceasefire. Dear Members of the Berkeley City Council,

Back long, long ago the League of Nations created the British Mandate for Palestine. After the Holocaust and WWII hat led to "...Jewish immigration to the region increased considerably, leading to tensions between Jews and the Arab majority population. The UN-approved 1947 partition plan triggered a civil war between these two peoples. The British terminated the Mandate on 14 May 1948, and Israel declared independence on the same day."

It was only in the last very few years that most of the Arab nations ceased to devote considerable official time and effort to the elimination of the State of Israel, and all of the people of the Jewish faith who live there. In other words, it's only recently that the attempt to kill all people who know what Torah is (aka Genocide), ceased to be an official policy of the governments of all the nations that surround Israel.

If you haven't read much ancient history lately it may help you to know that that region was the historic home to people of the Jewish faith, just as it is the home of the other two Abrahamic religions, Christianity and Islam. Yes, three of the most historic religions all trace back to "Abraham, a Hebrew patriarch, (who) is extensively mentioned in the religious scriptures of the Hebrew and Christian Bibles, and the Quran."

Here's a quick look at a bit of that history: "The history of ancient Israel and Judah begins in the Southern Levant region of Western Asia during the Late Bronze Age and Early Iron Age. The earliest known reference to "Israel" as a people or tribal confederation (see Israelites) is in the Memoptah Stele, an inscription from ancient Egypt that dates to about 1208 BCE, but the people group may be older. According to modern archaeology, ancient Israelite culture developed as an outgrowth from the pre-existing Canaanite civilization. Two related Israelite polities known as the Kingdom of Israel (Samaria) and the Kingdom of Judah had emerged in the region by Iron Age II.

According to the Hebrew Bible, a "United Monarchy" (consisting of Israel and Judah) existed as early as the 11th century BCE, under the reigns of Saul, David, and Solomon; the country later split into two kingdoms: Israel, containing the cities of Shechem and Samaria in the north, and Judah (containing Jerusalem and the Jewish Temple) in the south. The historicity of the United Monarchy is debated—as there are no archaeological remains of it that are accepted as consensus—but historians and archaeologists agree that Israel and Judah existed as separate kingdoms by c. 900 BCE<sup>[1]:169–195[2]</sup> and c. 850 BCE, <sup>[3]</sup> respectively. <sup>[4]"</sup>

While I have many disagreements with the current government of Israel, including how they are pursuing this new war, I know that most Israelis feel they are fighting for their lives, the lives of their children and grandchildren, and the right for their nation to survive. And I also believe that Hamas is less interested in the health and welfare of the Palestinian people than they are in their power, fame, and forturnes donated by Iran. They fully understood what the reaction of Israel would be to their secret attack on 10/7/2023.

Having been a distant witness to the founding of the State of Israel in 1948, the Suez War in 1956, the 1967 Six Day War, the 1967-1970 War of Attrition, and the 1973 Yom Kippur War, I've learned that this is an Extremely complex situation.

A Resolution by the City Council of Berkeley, or any other City in the United States, will not change this current war, nor have any effect on the foreign policy of the United States, much less reduce the religious tensions around the world.

Please respect that religious wars (for instance between Hindus and Muslims) are still a fact of life in the 21st century.

Please devote your time and effort to the health, education and safety of Berkeley residents as we elected you to do.

Dear Mayor Arreguin, Ms. Kesarwani and Members of the Berkeley City Council:

I am a resident of Berkeley's District 1, a consistent voter, and a Jew. I am writing because I understand that some members of the Council are considering introducing and adopting a resolution this Tuesday to call for a "ceasefire" in the Israel-Hamas war. I urge you not to do so.

First, calls for a "ceasefire" do not ring in the ears of most of your Jewish constituents as "pacifist" or even peaceful. They sound like support for Hamas's genocidal mission. Israel's war on Hamas has been accompanied by tragic suffering among the people living in Gaza. It is a tragedy. But, regardless of your views about the current Israeli government, the responsibility for this tragedy undeniably lies with Hamas. As you know, on October 7, 2023, Hamas terrorists murdered over 1,000 Jews living in Israel—including young children; elderly Holocaust survivors; mothers; daughters; sons; fathers; and a large number of teenagers and young adults, many the age of Berkeley High School and UC Berkeley students, who were attending a dance party. The terrorists also kidnapped over 200 people and committed unspeakable acts of sexual violence against Jewish women. This was not a one-off occurrence: Hamas, the governing body in Gaza, has always been committed to killing the Jews or expelling them from Israel, and a member of Hamas's political bureau recently confirmed that the October 7 pogrom was "just the first time," and that Hamas "will do it twice and three times" until Israel is "remove[d]." As a practical matter, calls for a "ceasefire," no matter how well-intentioned, constitute a demand that Israel simply let Hamas try to kill its Jewish citizens, without responding, until Hamas succeeds in its horrific mission.

Second; the Council ought not spend its limited time and resources taking positions on foreign wars instead of working on the local problems it was elected to confront. But a City Council resolution would not merely be pointless and powerless—it would raise questions of antisemitism. In recent years numerous peoples in foreign lands have endured terrible misfortunes. To pick only a few instances involving Muslim victims, there is the ongoing deportation of Afghans by Pakistan; China's persecution of Uyghurs in Xinjiang; Saudi Arabia's killing of hundreds of thousands of Yemenis; Bashar al-Assad's murder of hundreds of thousands of his own people, including Palestinians, during the Syrian civil war; and on and on. As far as I can tell, the City Council has not expressed a view on any of these atrocities. In the context of thousands of years of scapegoating and repression of Jews around the world, and spiking antisemitism worldwide and here in the United States, it would be deeply unsettling if the Berkeley City Council were to pick as the single foreign conflict on which it decided to take a position the one that permitted it to point an accusing finger at the Jewish homeland.

Third, I am troubled that you might consider one or more resolutions that were never on the City Council's agenda. There is certainly no exigency in the adoption a non-binding resolution, so there is no basis to act without proper notice under California's Government Code. I struggle to understand why anyone would think it is worth flouting democratic norms -- indeed, legal requirements -- to take such an inflammatory but ultimately ineffectual action. I deeply hope you will not do so.

This is an issue about which I feel strongly. I will be watching.

Mr. Mayor and Councilmembers,

You were elected to focus on policy for making life better for Berkeleyans within a local context.

While international events can understandably elicit strong emotions, local proceedings are no place to consider ineffectual foreign policy resolutions.

*I would urge you to follow San Jose's lead and pass a restriction on such resolutions.* (Mercury News article here: <a href="https://www.mercurynews.com/2023/12/06/policy-prohibits-san-jose-from-passing-israel-hamas-resolution-mayor-says/">https://www.mercurynews.com/2023/12/06/policy-prohibits-san-jose-from-passing-israel-hamas-resolution-mayor-says/</a>)

I would not extend this restriction to other city business. I would not want the City of Berkeley to be doing business with recognized international pariah, rogue or terrorist regimes, and I believe it's well within your local policy responsibility to direct the city manager on such matters.

For instance, the City of Berkeley acted to suspend/rescind Sister City status with two Russian cities after the unprovoked and illegal Russian aggression against Ukraine. If they do not, then focusing on such matters took you away from your primary responsibilities.

Really? How about the Consent Calendar resolution on the Fukushima action earlier this year, on which the scientific community had reached consensus that it was safe? Why did you spend time on this?

I believe you should avoid all such resolutions, not just those "that have the potential to divide, frighten, or harm people in Berkeley." Why stop there; what's the point of this qualification? Why not prohibit all such resolutions on international issues that do not have practical impacts, since they distract you from significant. and I'm sorry to say, in many cases, unfulfilled local responsibilities?

I would argue your colleague's standard is too broad in one respect, however: It is abundantly clear that federal and state action, which is "beyond Berkeley's borders," can significantly impact the well-being of Berkeleyans.

Again, please agendized action to follow San Jose's lead, keeping all of the above in mind.

Mayor Arreguin and Members of the Berkeley City Council:

As a Berkeley resident for over 49 years, I ask, indeed implore, the City Council to <u>not</u> consider or adopt any resolutions regarding the current events in the Middle East.

Almost all Berkeley residents are dismayed and horrified by the Israel-Gaza war.

There is no question that many action of successive Israeli governments contributed to the present situation of despair, hopelessness, and limitation of basic human rights confronted by Palestinians in both Gaza and the West Bank.

Nevertheless, there is no possible justification for the horrendous acts of torture, murder, and rape committed as explicitly directed by Hamas on Oct. 7 in Israel.

Israel's response was inevitable, as would be the case for any nation so attacked.

Nevertheless, the widespread civilian deaths, injuries, disruptions, and severe deprivations in Gaza are equally unsupportable to the extent that they could possibly have been minimized and were not.

The pain of these events caused to Americans of almost all political persuasions, and to Jews, Muslims, Christians, and even atheists, alike, is undeniable. That certainly applies to the vast majority of Berkeley residents.

This has also led to a verifiable increase in antisemitic and Islamophobic incidents not only in Berkeley, but worldwide.

However, resolutions of sympathy with either Palestinians or Israelis, or with Jews or Muslims, are not appropriate actions for a city council of a town thousands of miles away.

First, the solutions to the Middle East conflict, whatever they may be, are both complex and elusive. The Berkeley City Council is in no place to offer such realistic solutions that could possibly have any significant or salutary effect on the conflict.

Second, there is probably not a single statement I have made above that would garner the support of most Berkeley residents. We are not united on whom we support, or whom to condemn. Most residents would disagree with some of my statements above, and conversely most would find those they agree with as far too weak and unnecessarily conciliatory. I do not see any possibility that any resolution passed by the Council would fare any better. Even the most balanced and neutral statement possible would not garner the support of a majority of Berkeley's residents. Any resolution undertaken by the Council would only further inflame emotions and disagreements, divide our citizenry, and alienate the council further from its constituents, no matter what that resolution says. It would be positively counterproductive.

Third, foreign affairs are not the business of U.S. city councils. Devoting time and energy to international conflicts merely distracts the council and its staff from its proper attention to the affairs of the city.

Finally, taking action on items not on the agenda nor given public notice except under dire emergency violates CA GOV § 54954.2(b), while the conditions for an emergency situation delineated in CA GOV § 54956.5 have not been met. Therefore such action by the Berkeley City Council would be illegal.

For these reasons, I ask, indeed implore, City Council Members to reject consideration of any last-minute resolutions regarding events in the Middle East and their repercussions here, and instead to concentrate on the proper business of the city for which they were elected.

Dear City Council members,

# Statement by the United Nations Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, Lynn Hastings, on International Human Rights Day

10 Dec 2023

Today could have been a celebration of the 75th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, born from the atrocities of two world wars. Instead, human rights are assaulted in Israel and the Occupied Palestinian Territory. The violations perpetrated on both populations will bring neither peace nor security to either of these nations.

In Israel, the killings, sexual violence and kidnappings by Hamas and other Palestinian armed groups on 7 October traumatized an entire nation. Elderly, disabled, and children have not been spared. Non-state armed actors have obligations under international law, too. Perpetrators must be held accountable. All hostages should be released unconditionally but in the interim, access should be granted so their conditions can be verified.

In Gaza, the response from Israel has been disproportionate. The air strikes against civilians and civilian infrastructure such as hospitals, schools, and UN facilities and the repeated displacement of the civilian population cannot be justified. Nor can the siege, depriving the entire Gaza population of food, water, health care and hygiene. We are now seeing reports of men and boys, from the age of 15 and older, rounded up in Gaza, stripped to their undergarments, blindfold, and taken somewhere unknown. Access to all detainees and prisoners should be granted to verify their conditions.

This crisis is not about the number of trucks going into Gaza. Israel has the obligation as the occupying power to ensure that sufficient hygiene and public health standards as well as the provision of food and medical care are available to the population under occupation. Israel must allow the humanitarian community to deliver aid safely inside and throughout Gaza.

This crisis is also not about safe zones. A unilateral declaration by an occupying power that patches of land where there is no infrastructure, food, water, health care, or hygiene are "safe zones" does not mean they are safe. This is especially true when there is no guarantee of freedom of movement nor for the humanitarian community to deliver wherever there is need.

A ceasefire – the terms of which must be consulted with humanitarians and human rights defenders – is needed.

In the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, unprecedented levels of Israeli state and settler violence against Palestinians, their displacement, movement restrictions, arbitrary detention and ill-treatment, have been reported in 2023 and compound the already discriminatory and coercive environment. 265 of the 464 Palestinians killed in the West Bank in 2023 were killed since 7 October; at least three killed were disabled. And at least 1,000 people have been forcibly displaced from their land citing settler violence and the inability to access their land.

Civil society organizations in Palestine and Israel who fight daily to protect human rights are needed now more than ever. Instead, they are under attack. They must be protected by all of us.

In 2023, I should not have to issue such a statement. It is as if we have learned nothing in the past 75 years.

Dear Member of the Berkeley City Council,

I am writing to encourage you to not vote on issues related to the Middle East. It is outside the purview of Berkeley to know enough, let alone make decisions, about events that are distant, complex, and involve many actors and factors. Please focus on our problems here!

I am a Berkeley resident who has made 20 trips to Israel. During my first trips, I realized that the situation is far more complex than I - and most people - know or realize, and that the aggressor/oppressed narrative was a false and gross oversimplification. It was not until my 11th trip that I felt I knew enough to have an opinion.

During these trips, I talked to as many people as possible and tried to see for myself what was going on. So, for example:

Arab Israelis (Arabs who have, and want, Israeli nationality) attended the same courses as I did in Jerusalem. They are fully part of Israeli society; there is no apartheid. In fact, recent polls have shown an increase in them feeling more Israeli than

Palestinians (those Arabs who do not have, or want, Israeli nationality) in Jericho (and elsewhere) told me that they liked Israel and wanted to live in or with Israel. But they were afraid to speak out because of terrorists (such as Hamas).

A Sbarro pizza place in Jerusalem was bombed. I used to go there once a week, and had I been there at the wrong time, I would not be writing this letter. It was known as a place where Arabs and Jews worked together, in cooperation with each other. It was widely assumed that this venue was chosen by the terrorists for that reason.

I saw in Hebron (burial place of the Patriarchs and Matriarchs) how some Palestinians use their children to wage war (sending them into the street to throw Molotov cocktails at Israelis), for the benefit of the press. If Israelis do nothing they get killed. If they defend themselves, they are seen as child killers (please see the attached story).

The Middle East is far too distant and complicated for the Berkeley Council to weigh in on.

Please have the Berkeley Council stick to city business!

#### Hebron

When I look at the events - and the press - in recent weeks, I am reminded of a situation in Israel I witnessed some years ago, in the city of Hebron. Hebron, less than an hour from Jerusalem, is the burial place of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, of Sarah, Rebecca, and Leah.

It is a holy site for both Jews and Muslims, and its name come from the Hebrew word, Chaver, which means friend. If only its holiness and its name would mean real peace! Instead, it is, and has been, a political hotspot for many years. At the time of one of my visits to Jerusalem, the conflict was once again flaring up.

I asked a friend of mine - a journalist - what was happening there, and he told me to get in his car. I got in, and then asked where we were going.

"Hebron".

I got very quiet. But my heart raced, as he drove me past the usual barricades, to "where the action was". We arrived at an army checkpoint, at the bottom of a quiet street, about two blocks long. The street was empty and tranquil.

Camera crews from various Western countries began to arrive on the scene. They exchanged some casual remarks between themselves. One congratulated another on the photo he had taken the week before of an Israeli soldier being blown up, and also congratulating him for the handsome price this photo had obtained. The reporters continued to prepare, coifing their hair - in order to appear good on television. I realized - Lesson #1 - they had been notified beforehand that something would happen. Whatever was going to happen was planned, orchestrated - for the press. This was not a spontaneous protest.

And I also realized - Lesson #2 - that they were profiting from the conflict. They were not neutral. They were happy to show up and broadcast whatever would happen - and do what it took to transform this into a money making day.

And then, things began to happen.

At the top of the previously quiet street, someone set a tire on fire, and sent it rolling down towards the checkpoint. It rolled and rolled down, and then fell over, billowing smoke and flame. This diminished visibility, and created a great backdrop for the television cameras; this little street now looked like it was the center of a war zone.

Then kids began to come into the street, from the houses on both sides. They would throw Molotov cocktails at the Israeli position before disappearing again. I would guess they were about 11 years of age. I thought, wow, for them this is a chance to be a national hero, be on television, perhaps even be a martyr, instead of spending another boring day in school. Not an opportunity most kids would miss.

And the adults? It could not be coincidence that adults were absent. Nor could it be a coincidence that the kids all came out around the same time. This was planned. This was intended. Lesson #3 - they use their kids - for their war, for their propaganda.

And Lesson #4 - This was brilliant. The Palestinians are not dumb. What could the Israelis do? If they did nothing, they would be killed or wounded. If they answered - even with rubber bullets - the press would show them as oppressors, as murderers - of kids. It was a no-win situation for Israel, and the Palestinians would win whatever happened.

This all occurred within two blocks within Hebron. It almost seemed like a local turf war. Yet the view that the press gave, and that the world

received, was that Hebron was ablaze and filled with violence. The press was magnifying and distorting the situation. If the press were not there, I wondered if it any of this would happen, and wondered if there might actually be chances for peace.

When I see the news today, I know that the Palestinians (in this case, the terrorist group Hamas) have gotten even better at this game. In almost every conflict, the Palestinians score public relations points - even when Israel goes to great lengths to minimize civilian casualties. For Hamas - to begin a conflict is to win.

And, Lesson #5, I am also aware, that, left to their own devices - these two peoples might find a way to live together. A new team of Israeli soldiers arrived. As the new team took up their positions, some of the the other would go into the Arab kiosk – a few feet away and still open – to buy a snack from the Arab shopkeeper. I watched as a soldier opened his bag of chips.

Please let me know the municipal code governing the Rent Board that allows it. It's not their purview or mandate - it's taxation with wrongful representation. Illegal. I anticipate the announcement of your correction.

IV. A sincere question: Who is served from resolutions on matters outside of our city? How have they helped? What are the costs? It appears that the only benefit is to public image for a very few number of individuals.

I have lived and worked in Berkeley for over 46 years. The decay in the city's infrastructure, financial health, environment and discourse is apparent and painful: Statements about accomplishments during your tenures ignore but cannot deny this reality.

Dear Councilmembers,

I am writing to call upon the longstanding spirit of activism and social justice that breathes in the heart of Berkeley, urging you to draft and pass a formal resolution in solidarity with Palestinians in Gaza, who are being subject to ethnic cleansing and genocide by the Israeli state backed by the United States. This resolution should:

- 1- Demand an immediate CEASEFIRE.
- 2- Demand immediate safe passage for substantial humanitarian aid to Gazans who have little to no food, water, fuel or medical supplies to save the almost 20,000 Palestinians injured (at the time of this writing);
- 3- Call for an immediate end to all existing and any future U.S. military aid and support to Israel; US taxpayer dollars that go to Israel in the form of \$3.8 billion in military "aid" per year are being used to further harm and kill Palestinians.
- 4 Call for an end to Israeli apartheid, the siege, the occupation and blockade of Palestinian land by Israeli military forces; and the systematic harassment of the Palestinian people, including stealing of land, burning of farms, and regular arrests of ordinary civilians.
- 5 Call for the immediate release of the approximately 3000 Palestinians who have been arrested in Israel (about 1500 people), including in Jerusalem, and the West Bank (another 1500 people) since Oct. 7th and the approximately 220 Israeli hostages held by Hamas.

Already, over 8000 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli airstrikes, with more than half of these being women and children. The numbers of displaced Palestinians with no homes to return to, could be as high as half a million people.

Berkeley, with its illustrious legacy of pioneering social justice movements, holds a responsibility to be at the vanguard of national calls for justice. Berkeley has been the crucible where powerful movements were forged; from the Free Speech Movement of the 1960s, to being one of the first cities in the US to divest from companies doing business with the apartheid regime in South Africa. These histories reflect our enduring commitment to global justice and liberation, and advocacy for the voiceless and oppressed.

On Tuesday, October 24, our neighbors at the Richmond City Council exemplified moral leadership by passing a resolution standing against genocide in Gaza, making it the first U.S. city to stand on the right side of history on this critical issue. Inspired by their boldness, it is imperative that Berkeley continues its anti-apartheid and anti settler colonialism legacy by standing against the shadows of genocidal apartheid regimes.

Dear Councilmembers and Mayor,

While it is disappointing that our city has somehow managed to wait more than two months after the initial carpet bombing of Gaza to consider calling for a ceasefire, it is better to do so now than not at all. While the October attack by Hamas against Israeli military personnel and civilians resulted in terrible loss of life, the solution to such acts of violence is not exponentially more violence.

To those council members who oppose calling for a ceasefire, what do you propose? Shall we ignore the devastation and the toll that this conflict is having on people in Berkeley as well as in Gaza? Shall we simply ignore the gross mass murder of thousands of women and children and non-combatants? Ignore the utter decimation of the infrastructure and residential capacity of Gaza itself? When the US representative vetoed the UN resolution calling for a ceasefire, they claimed that it would "only benefit Hamas" as if the 2.3 million Gazans who are starving and being bombed are a mere detail and the "benefit" they would experience from a cessation of conflict an afterthought.

I don't know how you can turn away. I can't imagine how any council member could say this matter is not urgent. I can't imagine how any council member could turn their back on Berkeley's proud history of taking positions on international issues that have local impact. If a person is so conflict averse that they are unable to address the issues of our day, then perhaps municipal leadership is not the right place for them. Leadership REQUIRES the willingness to address controversy. A real leader would take risks in pursuit of peace.

And while my partner and so many of my Jewish friends enjoy Hanukkah, they also appreciate that their ability to gather with their friends and families is something that is being denied to millions of Palestinians. How many Gazans will die while council members enjoy "gathering with their children and families"?

This is not a time to position yourselves politically and to use the tragedy in Gaza to advance your political careers. It is the time to stand on the side of peace and justice.

Dear Member of the Berkeley City Council,

I am writing to encourage you to not vote on issues related to the Middle East. I recognize there are many hurt people around these issues. However, I think it is outside the purview of Berkeley to know enough, let alone make decisions, about events that are distance, complex, and involve many actors and factors.

I am a Berkeley resident who has made 20 trips to Israel. During my first trips, I realized that the situation is far more complex than I - and most people - know or realize, and that the aggressor/oppressed narrative was a false and gross oversimplification. It was not until my 11th trip that I felt I knew enough to have an opinion.

During these trips, I talked to as many people as possible and tried to see for myself what was going on. So, for example:

Arab Israelis (Arabs who have, and want, Israeli nationality) attended the same courses as I did in Jerusalem. They are fully part of Israeli society; there is no apartheid. In fact, recent polls have shown an increase in them feeling more Israeli than

Palestinians (those Arabs who do not have, or want, Israeli nationality) in Jericho (and elsewhere) told me that they liked Israel and wanted to live in or with Israel. But they were afraid to speak out because of terrorists (such as Hamas).

A Sbarro pizza place in Jerusalem was bombed. I used to go there once a week, and had I been there at the wrong time, I would not be writing this letter. It was known as a place where Arabs and Jews worked together, in cooperation with each other. It was widely assumed that this venue was chosen by the terrorists for that reason.

I saw in Hebron (burial place of the Patriarchs and Matriarchs) how some Palestinians use their children to wage war (sending them into the street to throw Molotov cocktails at Israelis), for the benefit of the press. If Israelis do nothing they get killed. If they defend themselves, they are seen as child killers (please see the attached story).

The Middle East is far too distant and complicated for the Berkeley Council to weigh in on.

Please have the Berkeley Council stick to city business!

#### Hebron

When I look at the events - and the press - in recent weeks, I am reminded of a situation in Israel I witnessed some years ago, in the city of Hebron. Hebron, less than an hour from Jerusalem, is the burial place of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, of Sarah, Rebecca, and Leah.

It is a holy site for both Jews and Muslims, and its name come from the Hebrew word, Chaver, which means friend. If only its holiness and its name would mean real peace! Instead, it is, and has been, a political hotspot for many years. At the time of one of my visits to Jerusalem, the conflict was once again flaring up.

I asked a friend of mine - a journalist - what was happening there, and he told me to get in his car. I got in, and then asked where we were going.

"Hebron".

I got very quiet. But my heart raced, as he drove me past the usual barricades, to "where the action was". We arrived at an army checkpoint, at the bottom of a quiet street, about two blocks long. The street was empty and tranquil.

Camera crews from various Western countries began to arrive on the scene. They exchanged some casual remarks between themselves. One congratulated another on the photo he had taken the week before of an Israeli soldier being blown up, and also congratulating him for the handsome price this photo had obtained. The reporters continued to prepare, coifing their hair - in order to appear good on television. I realized - Lesson #1 - they had been notified beforehand that something would happen. Whatever was going to happen was planned, orchestrated - for the press. This was not a spontaneous protest.

And I also realized - Lesson #2 - that they were profiting from the conflict. They were not neutral. They were happy to show up and broadcast whatever would happen - and do what it took to transform this into a money making day.

And then, things began to happen.

At the top of the previously quiet street, someone set a tire on fire, and sent it rolling down towards the checkpoint. It rolled and rolled down, and then fell over, billowing smoke and flame. This diminished visibility, and created a great backdrop for the television cameras; this little street now looked like it was the center of a war zone.

Then kids began to come into the street, from the houses on both sides. They would throw Molotov cocktails at the Israeli position before disappearing again. I would guess they were about 11 years of age. I thought, wow, for them this is a chance to be a national hero, be on television, perhaps even be a martyr, instead of spending another boring day in school. Not an opportunity most kids would miss.

And the adults? It could not be coincidence that adults were absent. Nor could it be a coincidence that the kids all came out around the same time. This was planned. This was intended. Lesson #3 - they use their kids - for their war, for their propaganda.

And Lesson #4 - This was brilliant. The Palestinians are not dumb. What could the Israelis do? If they did nothing, they would be killed or wounded. If they answered - even with rubber bullets - the press would show them as oppressors, as murderers - of kids. It was a no-win situation for Israel, and the Palestinians would win whatever happened.

This all occurred within two blocks within Hebron. It almost seemed like a local turf war. Yet the view that the press gave, and that the world

received, was that Hebron was ablaze and filled with violence. The press was magnifying and distorting the situation. If the press were not there, I wondered if it any of this would happen, and wondered if there might actually be chances for peace.

When I see the news today, I know that the Palestinians (in this case, the terrorist group Hamas) have gotten even better at this game. In almost every conflict, the Palestinians score public relations points - even when Israel goes to great lengths to minimize civilian casualties. For Hamas - to begin a conflict is to win.

And, Lesson #5, I am also aware, that, left to their own devices - these two peoples might find a way to live together. A new team of Israeli soldiers arrived. As the new team took up their positions, some of the the other would go into the Arab kiosk – a few feet away and still open – to buy a snack from the Arab shopkeeper. I watched as a soldier opened his bag of chips.

Please, let all our Berkeley people, Muslims, Christians, Jews, Arab, Israeli, Gazan, go to work, to school, and freely observe their holidays in peace this Tuesday, if not every Tuesday.

If people want to work towards peace and support those suffering, there are countless ways to do that, but not with local City Council resolutions which only creates divisions and brings more pain locally to its residents.

On November 28, the Berkeley City Council is set to be presented with a vicious resolution that takes the position of solidarity with Hamas terrorists and characterizes Israel's attempts to rescue the hostages and liberate the Gazan people as a "genocide." This is a foul affront to the victims of the October 7th massacre. Furthermore, expressing ghastly support for Hamas, who openly murdered, raped, and kidnapped citizens from 25 countries, does not lead us to peace of any kind.

Dear Mayor & City Council,

I hope this message finds you all safe and at peace. I am a resident and voter in District 2 and husband to another D2 voter. I urge you to support Councilmember Bartlett's ceasefire resolution with one material modification. I ask that the resolution be amended with a demand that no further aid of any kind be provided to Israel, a nuclear power with one of the most advanced militaries in the world. Those billions of dollars that flow without condition from our pockets to the Israeli war machine should instead be used to provide Americans with universal healthcare and free or low-cost higher education or provided to state and local governments to house people or to improve our infrastructure and services. It's unacceptable that the United States continues to fund the oppression of black and brown people worldwide while simultaneously claiming poverty when it comes to addressing the needs of people at home.

I also respectfully **implore you not to support** the one-sided resolution submitted by Councilmember Taplin. While it centers and repeatedly highlights the atrocities carried out on October 7, it only trivially references the horrendous violence Israel has carried out in Gaza since then -- including the murder of almost 18k civilians in Gaza, 70% of whom were women & children, and the displacement of around 85% of Gazans -- which have been 100% enabled by the US.

Furthermore, CM Taplin's resolution makes no mention of the atrocities being carried out against Palestinians in areas where Hamas does not govern, including the occupied West Bank, East Jerusalem, and Israel itself. These atrocities include, but certainly are not limited to, the murder of hundreds of civilians by the IDF and settlers, the eviction and displacement of hundreds of Palestinians from their homes by Israeli actors, the unconscionable siege of and attacks on hospitals and healthcare facilities, the rounding up of military detention of hundreds of Palestinians without due process, etc. Moreover, CM Taplin's resolution perpetuates a misunderstanding of international law, under which an occupying power like Israel does not have a right to self-defense in and against the land it occupies, including the occupied West Bank and Gaza.

Perhaps, most importantly -- while centering on October 7, condemning Hamas, and referring to the Israeli hostages taken -- the resolution does nothing to acknowledge the historic oppression of Palestinians by Israel and the former British empire, which dates back to the early 20th century and at least as far back as 1947/1948. Without even an acknowledgment -- at the very least -- of the murder of 10K+ Palestinians and mass displacement of 700k - 800k Palestinians in 1947 and 1948 by Zionist militias and Israeli forces and the subsequent history of Israeli military governance, land seizures, occupation & siege, apartheid, and arrest and imprisonment of over 800,000 Palestinians (oftentimes children) in the occupied West Bank & East Jerusalem since 1967 (oftentimes held without charge or due process and subject to torture), it deludes readers into believing that October 7, 2023, was the first date on which a conflict arose between Palestinians and Israelis and that Hamas was the sole cause of the conflict, i.e., Israeli is nothing but an innocent victim. This simplistic narrative is inaccurate, irresponsible, and intellectually disingenuous narrative and will not bring us any closer to securing the safety and liberty of Palestinians and Israelis, which CM Taplin appears to support. \*\*\* Please note that many of these same criticisms apply to CM Robinson's proferred resolution as well.

While we all live in and love the United States -- a country founded on settler colonialism, genocide, and slavery -- we acknowledge its shameful origin story. The same standard should be applied to any nation that receives billions of dollars a year from the US working class. Unless, at the very least, CM Taplin's and Robinson's resolutions incorporate an

equally full-throated condemnation of the US state & security establishment, the IDF, Israeli settlers, and Israeli politicians, all of whom have played -- and continue to play -- a major hand in enabling the human rights violations, oppression, and insecurity that continues to pervade the region, there should be no place for condemnations in a ceasefire resolution. **Subject:** Pass a Resolution Calling for a Permanent Ceasefire in Gaza

Dear Mayor and Council Members,

I am a Berkeley resident and I am writing to urge you to pass a formal resolution that calls for a permanent ceasefire in Gaza.

Berkeley has historically been on the forefront of anti-war, civil rights and human rights movements. Berkeley bravely led the charge to divest from apartheid South Africa. Refusing to call for a ceasefire is a stain on Berkeley's history and community.

Israel's bombardment of Gaza since October 7, 2023 has now killed over 15,000 Palestinians and over 5,000 of them are children. Israel has broken many international laws, including preventing the entry of food, water, fuel, and humanitarian aid into Gaza. Israel has also forced over 1.7 million people from their homes in an act of ethnic cleansing, as defined by the United Nations. The United Nations and human rights organizations and leaders around the world have called for an immediate ceasefire and unrestricted humanitarian aid to the people of Gaza, citing numerous violations of international law. But our own national leaders have not, and are instead offering unrestricted, unconditional military aid to Israel as it completely destroys an entire civilization in Gaza. I urge you to take a simple step to pressure national leaders to stop supporting this war.

We, your constituents, demand our local elected officials to exercise their power to influence our state representatives and senators to call for a permanent ceasefire. Every single American is complicit in the ethnic cleansing of Palestinians while we remain silent and allow our taxes to be used to fund the extermination of the Palestinians. This issue WILL determine elections next November, as the people will refuse to vote for anyone who stays silent when our government commits genocide.

The last time I recall the City of Berkeley ignoring the widespread calls to end militarism was when the City Council refused to end its support for Urban Shield, a program that offered international training opportunities between Israel's military and local police units. After hours of public comment across a wide spectrum of civil society calling for an end to Urban Shield, and immediately after Mayor Arreguin fled the meeting while continuing to support this military program, Berkeley police officers unleashed violence upon public commenters. That was a shameful day in the City Council's history, and one that should be a lesson to those members of the City Council that feel pressured by the Mayor to not support the Ceasefire resolution now.

I have also been to Palestine and spoken to a mother whose child was burned alive by Israeli settlers. I have seen another child be tried at a Military Court on trumped up charges (all Palestinians in the occupied territories are tried in military court, and military courts have a 99+% conviction rate). I have visited villages without access to water and electricity because the state of Israel does not recognize them as an indigenous people living on indigenous land. I've seen two separate roadway systems - one for Israelis and one for occupied Palestinians. I've gone through checkpoints and spoken to families of prisoners who have to travel hours to go a short distance to visit their loved ones in prison because of how many checkpoints are along the way. I sat at a community center in Jerusalem next to a table filled with shells of weapons that had been used against the community, and these shells had "Made in USA" stamped on them.

Every Palestinian I met asked me to pressure the US government to end US military aid to Israel because they saw with striking clarity that US aid enables a system of Israeli apartheid. It is the US government's continued support that provides the current extremist government of Israel with the confidence to inflict collective punishment and mass death upon the population of Gaza.

I understand the desire to protect the City of Berkeley from unnecessary divisions, but I cannot in good conscience ignore what I saw and the people who I met that asked me to stand up for their basic human rights. What other time is there to take a stand than a time of unrelenting violence against an entire people? My hope is that your conscience will not allow you to turn a blind eye either.

The people of Berkeley have made our message clear in the past several city council meetings and through hundreds of emails. The following cities have also passed Resolutions for Ceasefire and Solidarity with Palestine: Oakland, CA; Richmond, CA; Providence, RI; Cudahy, CA; Seattle, WA; and Easton, PA.

As a City Council Member, I encourage you to lean into courageous leadership and take action to demand the collective punishment of the Palestinian people in Gaza come to an immediate end. This is a violation of international law and a crime against humanity. Please do not let fear of retaliation get in the way of saving lives.

To understand more, I recommend reading this beautiful and informative essay written so eloquently by Dana Lawrence Gillis, Adrienne Kane Lawrence and Les Lawrence.

Thank you for taking the time to read and respond to my message. I am relieved that you felt it worthy of the thorough and thoughtful reply you composed.

I reached out because I did not want to believe that you truly meant to express the hateful political rhetoric you've chosen to share, including and starting with content that calls the events of 10/7 "Israeli atrocity propaganda." After reading your reply, it is clear to me that your heart is in the right place and your intentions are honorable, as I would hope and expect them to be. What you are missing is the context of complete factual history.

I understand what you believe to be the facts you're dealing with, and while your own personal history may shape your deep understanding of relevant issues, the narrative you follow often omits or inverts history and projects onus onto the wrong group of people. I greatly value the opportunity to dialogue with you, to address some of the assumptions that you've made and the conclusions that you've drawn.

Whether or not you choose to consider anything I say, I hope you are able to see that this particular situation is not another "Oppressor vs. Oppressed" story the way you understand it to be.

You say you know what colonization is, and you pose the question, "What would you call the forced displacement and dispossession of the native inhabitants of a land?" My answer is that, like you, I call it my own people's history. Jewish people are in fact a single ethnic group comprised of various displaced homelands due to centuries of violence against them and exile. I may be a "white" person of "European descent who grew up on Chicago's North Shore," but all of my grandparents ended up on American soil only because they had to escape the pogroms of Eastern Europe.

But even before that my ancestors were oppressed, murdered and displaced for centuries. You can trace all of them- and almost all

Jews- back to one single location: Judea, our indigenous homeland. The proof of this fact is contained within the bible and roughly 3k years of history, the beginning of which

predates both Christianity and Islam, the latter by 1200 years. There is historical, archaeological, and cultural evidence that Israel was the birthplace of the religion, ethnicity and culture of the Jewish people. In fact, Israel is the only country in the world that bears the same name, speaks the same language, upholds the same faith, and inhabits the same land as it did 3k years ago.

This is an important fact to note, because being Jewish doesn't just mean you share the Jewish faith. Jews are an ethnic group who come from the land of Israel. In fact, on Israeli ID cards, "nationality"

isn't even listed as "Israeli" but as "Jewish." Most Jews I know aren't even very religious; but the Jewish culture and traditions that unite us are deeply rooted in our ancestry and our ancient homeland.

Just as Muslims pray facing Mecca in Saudi Arabia, Jews pray facing Jerusalem in Israel.

You refer to the libel and dismissal of indigenous peoples and First Nations around the world as the "language of colonization," and claim that this is exactly what was perpetuated against, for example, your ancestors throughout the British Empire and Black people in America. I know this to be true, because this also describes Jewish history.

As you may know, the Jews are considered to be amongst the most persecuted people in history, and to this day- NOW more than ever, even though just a few weeks ago we mistakenly still believed that we had comfortably evolved beyond this history of dehumanization and the nightmare reality of the Holocaust that took place only 80 years ago- the Jews are being targeted worldwide in the most blatant and disturbing public outpouring of open Antisemitism since WWII. This fact is supported by the most recent FBI hate crime statistics. But this is just a continuation of the historical patterns we have witnessed time and again since the beginning of documented Jewish existence in the 2nd millennium BCE.

From ~700 BCE until the 20th century, the land of Israel was colonized by empire after empire who oppressed and exiled Jews. Israel was subject to imperial rule for centuries which forced Jews out into other parts of the world. Of particular note in that time was the Arab-Islamic Empire, the beginning of which was marked by Muhammad and early Muslims brutally conquering the entire Middle East, North Africa and Central Asia, killing, expelling, and oppressing ancient Jewish tribes in pursuit of power; some say this was the true beginning of the centuries-old "Arab-Jewish conflict." More recently in 1929, there were riots against the native Jewish community in the British Mandate of Palestine, during which over 100 Jews were massacred- raped, tortured, stabbed, hung, burned alive, sexually mutilated (sound familiar?). This is just another example in a very long list of well-documented attempts that have been made throughout history to annihilate the Jewish people, including Arab pogroms against the Jews in the Middle East in 1066, 1465, 1785, 1805, 1915, 1830, 1864-1880, 1912, 1934 and 1941, The Hebron Massacres of 1517, 1834 and 1929, and the Arab Riots of the 1920s, just to name a few.

It wasn't until the end of the British Empire in 1948 when modern-day Israel was established as a state- effectively decolonizing the land for the first time in centuries-

that the Jews finally "got their land back," and once-exiled generations finally regained their ancestral homeland. Israelis are not settlers, as one cannot be a settler in the land where their ancestors came from.

To illuminate this concept we can look at the history of language, which is inextricably tied to the history of colonialism, occupation, historic revisionism and indigenous erasure. Here are the stats that speak for themselves: 67 English speaking countries, 29 French speaking countries, 25 Arabic speaking countries, 20 Spanish speaking countries, and only 1 Hebrew speaking country. Regarding faith, Judaism is the only religion that has never sought to convert nonbelievers. Any converts to Judaism must do so of their own volition. As such, most natural born Jews' ancestry can be traced all the way back to our origin in Judea.

What does this all prove? It proves that Israel is not a colonial state, as they have never imposed their language or religion on anyone. This includes the Palestinians. In modern times, the Jewish faith varies as much as our lineage over centuries of displacement and colonization, but we are all bound by enduring cultural ties and bloodlines that date back to the origin of our recorded history. So while I may not be able to "speak on behalf"

of an Indian Jew, a Ugandan Jew (though there's a divergent tribe conversion under British rule story there), or Baghdadi Jew (if there are any amongst the ~4 left in Iraq from the pre-1948 total numbering ~150,000), I can still speak UP for them as members of the same genealogical Jewish diaspora.

On the other hand, as you said, your Christian faith is a product of the historical colonization of your ancestors; and you do not have shared lineage or cultural ties with white Christians from rural Mississippi, South Korea or Nigeria. This makes sense because Christianity is a religion and not an ethnic group. Do you see the difference? I do not see the Palestinian right to sovereignty and self-determination as a "subversive call to harm" Jews. I, along with most Jews and Israelis, believe this to be a fundamental right of all peace-loving humans on this earth, including the Palestinians. Most would agree this is not a racist concept; it is a basic human right that transcends race, sex, nationality, ethnicity, language, religion, or any other status.

For Jewish people, this right to sovereignty and self-determination is called "Zionism," because Jews are indigenous to Zion and the land of Israel. Similarly, the Jewish right to sovereignty and self-determination is not a subversive call to harm Palestinians, or anyone else living in the land of Israel. Zionism is not racism; it is our basic human right.

You say you refuse to accept that the Palestinians "did this to themselves," and rightly so: they had help from decades of corrupt leaders and pervasive Radical Islamic Fundamentalist groups who consistently prioritize violent and destructive Jihadism over the basic needs of their people. They have long been rejected and abandoned, first by the Muslim caliphate as the only remaining group to not be given their own state, and then by their modern sovereign sister nations in their refusal to accept or absorb them. Don't you think it's bizarre that not even one of the 22 surrounding Arab nations or 57 Muslim countries has stepped forward to provide even temporary safe haven for Gazan civilians since the war began? Not even Jordan, the land of which is comprised

of over 75% of what was the British Mandate of Palestine, and whose population is over 80% Palestinian. Even the PM of Egypt in response to pressure to admit Palestinian refugees said he "remained committed to protecting his people's land and sovereignty regardless of the cost," and that he was "prepared to sacrifice millions of lives (Palestinian) to ensure that no one encroaches on their territory." (quote from the WSJ) The sad reality is that the Palestinians are more valuable to them as pawns of the "greater struggle" with Western civilization and Democratic ideologies, exploited as victims of neglect in their manipulated ongoing war against the Jews and Israel, born to be Martyrs for "the cause." Sadly, this last notion of martyrdom is deeply ingrained in Palestinian culture.

Since 2007 Hamas has been central to the humanitarian crisis of the Palestinian people in Gaza, but it didn't start with them. It was in fact the fundamentalist Muslim Brotherhood- which existed before Israel even became a state, whose goal it is to reestablish the caliphate and abolish individual Muslim nation states, and who have killed more Muslims than anyone in history- who continued this ideology of rejectionism amongst the Palestinians in Gaza. Hamas is actually just the imperialist Muslim Brotherhood re-branded.

And they have not acted alone: we can also blame Qatar and Turkey, where the billionaire leaders of Hamas unabashedly live their extravagant lifestyles while their own people- for whom they openly claim no responsibility- live in poverty, forced to scrounge for food and water. We can blame the Islamic Republic of Iran, who funds Hamas and other militant terror organizations in Gaza and throughout the Middle East. They don't want freedom for Palestinians; they want terror and destabilization.

Together, they have actively suppressed the Palestinians' humanity and right to life, not just in Gaza but in the entire region.

Did you know that the Palestinians in Israel have been offered their own land at least a dozen times since before Israel even became a state? In fact, the British Empire's Peel Commission Plan of 1937 offered the Arabs 80% of the land while Israel was only to get about 20%. Israel accepted it, but the Arabs rejected it, because they wanted it all to themselves, no Jews allowed.

Between 1939 and 1947 there were various iterations of a "one state solution" proposed, with an Arab majority state in all of the territory encompassing the British Mandate, on the condition that the Jews already residing in the territory were absorbed as equal citizens. But the Arabs rejected all of them, because they wanted it all to themselves, no Jews allowed.

As with every single proposal since, Israel accepted the deal and the Arabs rejected it. Why? Because they refuse to let go of a false narrative that purports the Jews stole their land, and the only way to get it back is through Jihad until the entire land is Jewfree. Their real problem has never been with the partition of land; their real problem is with the Jews in it.

This is what "From the River to the Sea, Palestine will be free" is meant to express: not free from occupation or oppression, but free from Jews. The phrase originated with the PLO in the 60s, was subsequently used by various Palestinian terror groups, and is part of the current Hamas charter which specifically calls for the murder or ethnic

cleansing of all Jews. So YOU may not intend to communicate this in your use of the expression, but you can't separate it from what it truly means; and to use it not only perpetuates a dangerous ideology of hate for the blood that runs through my veins, but also incites others to the same.

The reality is that the Palestinian people are victims of their own leaders' refusal to accept anything less than the total annihilation of the Jews in Israel. This stolen land narrative has been passed down from generation to generation, despite the fact that they have been

given- and subsequently rejected- several opportunities for sovereignty and selfdetermination, and in spite of the fact that 3/4 of the land that was originally designated as the Mandate of Palestine resides in Jordan.

The result is a generations-deep nation of people who identify as dispossessed refugees, even though at least two-thirds of the Palestinians in Israel were born there and have lived there their entire lives. They pass their refugee status on to their children as they continue to wait for all the Jews to be slaughtered so they can one day return to the land they believe is rightly theirs and theirs alone. This status will never change until they and their ruling organizations collectively shift their focus to supporting their own right to life more than their sworn religious mission to martyr themselves and kill Jews in the name of Allah.

I do not hold the Palestinian people responsible for the actions of their terrorist rulers, nor have I / do I / would I ever hold any nation responsible for the actions of their governing bodies; and as Americans with our own sordid history, we should be able to recognize this kind of hypocrisy from a million miles away. I do not believe- nor would I ever imply- that Palestinians are "collectively a dishonest people who chose self-destruction over life and cannot be trusted to make good decisions."

However, according to the most recent poll conducted by the Palestinian Center for Policy and Survey Research, 75% of Palestinians in Gaza and 83% in the West Bank support Hamas' actions- specifically the formation of armed groups to murder Jews and eliminate Israel, and only 13% oppose it. I am hopeful that these polls are inaccurate, as freedom of expression amongst the Palestinians under Hamas is nonexistent; and many may say they support the cause for reasons of self-preservation, or figures may be manipulated by the powers that be, who are not trustworthy sources. It has been documented, however, that hundreds of Gazan residents- including women and children as young as 10- joined Hamas in the 10/7 massacre.

Additionally, it is indisputable fact that Palestinian children have been indoctrinated for generations with hate for Jews and Israel, as evidenced in part by UNRWA literature and curriculum found in Palestinian schools throughout many decades. From the earliest ages they are encouraged to take up arms and incite violence against Jews and Israel in the name of Allah.

I have seen interviews with those who say, "life means nothing," that becoming a Shahid is the highest honor, that they "cry out in joy and celebrate" when someone-even a child- becomes a martyr. One Palestinian woman explains, "This is why we have suicide bombers"

(direct quote). This is a death-centered and violent religious fanaticism enabled by corruptive power.

Devastatingly, it is more difficult to decouple the terrorist organizations from the majority of their people who largely embody the same violent ideology. We just can't see or hear it as clearly as we should, because Western voices who think they understand the Palestinian cause are too busy drowning out Palestinian voices in order to impose their own beliefs onto them. But decades of media demonstrate otherwise. I do believe that there have been and currently are many Palestinians (who likely comprise that last 13%) who reject this ideology of hate, who denounce this evil mission of martyrdom via acts of violence against Jews, who prefer economic development over war. But those voices aren't being heard either.

From the interviews I've listened to, those who reject and denounce live in silence and fear of being jailed or tortured by their militant oppressors, or they do whatever they can to escape (like the Hamas co-founder's son Mosab Hassan Yousef, whose video I sent to you).

Or, they are labeled as traitors or infidels and murdered (like the two Palestinians who were publicly executed just last week after being targeted as collaborators with Israel, their bodies hung from electricity poles then dismembered and thrown in the trash, as the civilian crowd cheered and recorded it on their phones like they were at a rock concert).

I seek out as many of these dissenting Palestinian, Arab and Muslim voices as I can find, and I would encourage you to do the same. Here are some to check out, if you're interested: @mosabhasanyosef- Palestinian from Gaza, @realbassemeid- Palestinian from the West Bank,

@aziz0nomics- British Palestinian, @realsarahidan- Iraqi Muslim,

@yosephhaddad- Israeli Arab, @imamofpeace- Iranian Australian The fact that you've heard Palestinians explain their aspirations to reclaim their ancestral homeland does not negate the fact that what they call their ancestral homeland also happens to be the ancestral homeland of the Jews. Actually, it wasn't until almost 2k years after the establishment of the Kingdom of Israel that they arrived in the area through expansion and conquests.

But even though Jews were living in the Land of Israel before Christianity and Islam even existed, Israel and the Jews have always supported the Palestinian Arab right to their own land, which is why they have agreed to every land proposal that has ever been made.

Don't you think that if it were truly just about land, Palestinian leaders would have accepted at least one of the many deals offered over the last century that would have given them their own state? The truth is that for them it has never been about land, peace or freedom.

Hamas media consultant Taher El-Nounou even said "I hope that the state of war with Israel will become permanent on all the borders."

This is about Imperialism via Radical Jihad- which is, in fact, a death mandate for the Jewish people.

They have uncovered forensic evidence from 10/7 that proves Gazans working in Israel enabled the attacks by providing intimate knowledge of the communities targeted, detailed maps and building layouts.

Stories are now coming out of Palestinian teachers, doctors and UNRWA staff who held hostages, one locked in an attic for 50 days with minimal provisions and no medical care, by a Palestinian father of 10 children.

Even just a few days ago, while the ceasefire was still supposedly in effect, Hamas called for an escalation, and two Palestinian "civilians" who were released from Israeli jail where they were imprisoned for terror activity used their newly regained freedom to shoot innocent civilians at a bus stop in Jerusalem, killing 3 people including a 24yo pregnant teacher and injuring 8 others, 5 of whom are in critical condition. The violence will never stop as long as it is their holy mission to kill Jews.

To address your comparison, historically there is no equivalence between the Palestinians and the Native Americans. Firstly because Jews are not colonizers as the Brits were (they were in fact the indigenous population as the Native Americans were), but also because as far as I know, Native Americans do not have a publicly-known charter that openly and specifically calls for death to American settlers, nor do they indoctrinate their children with a universal call to arms, violence and death against Americans in the name of their gods (as Hamas does).

In fact, when Israel became a state in 1948 and until 1967, they declared that anyone who wanted to stay in the land would automatically become Israeli citizens. In their 1948 Declaration of Independence, they wrote that Israel would "ensure complete equality of social and political rights to all its inhabitants, irrespective of religion, race or sex." (Does this sound like supremacy to you?) Some Arabs stayed, and some followed orders to flee to the Gaza Strip (which at the time belonged to Egypt) and West Bank (which belonged to Jordan), in addition to refugee camps in Lebanon, Syria and Jordan, where they were told to stay temporarily until they could annihilate Israel and eventually move back. In fact, the day after the partition vote in 1947, less than 3 years after the Holocaust, Palestinian Arab leaders expressed their intention to do so in no uncertain terms, publishing a leaflet proclaiming "The Arabs have taken into their own hands the Final Solution of the Jewish Problem. The problem will be solved only in blood and fire. The Jews will soon be driven out."

Hundreds of thousands of both Arabs and Jews were displaced in this time period, but it is documented that neighboring Arab countries were preparing for an invasion before even a single Palestinian Arab was displaced; the only reason they didn't invade sooner was because the British were still in charge. By this time the Palestinian Nakba had already started, and 300k Arabs, including the families of Palestinian Arab leadership at the time, left of their own volition because they had the means to do so. At the same time, 40k Jews were expelled from the West Bank (then known as Judea and Samaria), East Jerusalem and the Gaza Strip, in addition to 850k from neighboring Arab countries.

In 1967 they tried to annihilate Israel yet again; but as with every other time, they failed, and Israel captured Gaza and the West Bank.

Lebanon, Syria and Jordan do still exist, and many Palestinians there are still denied citizenship and subject to inhumane living conditions, apartheid and oppression. As soon as Israel pulled out of Gaza, the first thing the people did was to destroy the Israeli infrastructure they left behind. Then, when given the chance to elect their own leaders in 2007, Hamas came into power, thanks in part to the coup they staged to remove or murder any Palestinians who were in favor of a two-state solution. The first thing Hamas did after coming into power was to amass weapons and attack Israel, again. It was because of this that Egypt and Israel BOTH attempted to lawfully control the border by building a wall that would restrict the flow of weapons and attempt to stifle the incessant terror attacks. This was not, as you put it, an "inhumane blockade"

meant to turn Gaza into an "open-air prison." In fact, they were allowed and encouraged to leave in order to go into Israel for work.

Are you aware of the fact that prior to 10/7 over 17k Gazans crossed the border into Israel daily to earn income? Do you know that in the years since the border wall was erected, Israel has provided humanitarian aid weekly, and has actually done more to provide Gazans with food, water and electricity than any other entity INCLUDING THEIR OWN LEADERS, even though it was not their responsibility to do so? Hamas leader Khalil al-Hayya even said that "Hamas' goal is not to run Gaza or to bring it water and electricity and such. This battle does not seek to improve the situation in Gaza."

Despite all of this, since 2005 Hamas has never stopped firing rockets and mortar shells at Israel, continuously and deliberately into civilian areas. My friend's mom's house in Ashkelon took a direct hit, even though the closest military base is over 10 miles away. The attacks and assaults are constant and have continued to this day. In 1948 the US was actually not supportive of Israel, and it led an international arms embargo against them that year. Regardless, as history tells, Israel was established as the only Western Democratic nation in the Middle East and ultimately became the US' biggest ally.

The primary reason why they've been the biggest recipient of US foreign aid since this time has been to guarantee US economic interests (unsurprisingly) in a region marked by terrorist organizations and Fundamental Islamist insurgency. The US and Israel have common strategic goals for the Middle East, and a shared commitment to Democratic values.

And in 2023, at 75 years old, Israel is the most amazing little Middle Eastern oasis of Western Democratic Values, Freedom, Love, and Possibility, not just for Jews, but for all who live there. I have been there 5 times since 1985, most recently just this past July for my nephew's bar mitzvah. I have blood relatives and many friends who live there, and my brother and I also both lived there for a period of time in the 90s. It is filled with wonderful, caring, passionate people, just like you and me, who want nothing but to live their lives in peace, but will sacrifice themselves in a heartbeat to protect their nation. Have you ever been? Do you have your own stories to tell that paint a different picture?

Most of the US funding that goes to Israel is allocated to the military for security reasons, because Israel has always had to protect itself from its surrounding neighbors, all of whom have sworn or openly tried to destroy Israel since the day it was established (quite literally- Israel was attacked by 7 Arab armies from surrounding countries on the day after it declared independence).

However, the US also funds Islamic groups and mosques who have praised terrorists and called for the destruction of Israel (as reported by the Washington Free Beacon). I do not consent to my tax dollars supporting terror, or the annihilation of my people or our indigenous homeland. I don't believe that the extermination of any group of people means flourishing for anyone else; though depressingly recent events prove that there is a shocking percentage of people in this world who apparently do believe this where the Jews are concerned.

Hamas leaders have repeatedly said in no uncertain terms that they will repeat the events of 10/7 over and over again, "1 million times if necessary," until they "end the occupation" of not just Gaza but all of Israel (i.e. remove all the Jews)- and that the West is next.

It's not a secret, and nothing has been lost in translation. Israel would not continue to exist if not for the IDF, and the reason their military is so advanced is precisely because of this long history with Arab nations, which has forced them to become experts in survival.

Did you know that the reason Hamas has a seemingly endless supply of rockets is because it dug up Gaza's water pipes to build them? They would rather kill Jews than provide fresh water to their own people.

Did you know that even after Israel cut off fuel and electricity provisions in order to restrict Hamas' access, Hamas has had everything they needed to keep operating? They would rather preserve themselves at the expense of their people to maintain Gaza as a military launchpad against Israel than to develop it for the benefit of its inhabitants.

The UNRWA's annual budget alone is more than 1.5 billion, but Hamas steals the aid designated for the Palestinian people that comes in for their own military operations, including billions of dollars to buy weapons and build underground terror tunnels so they can wage war from underneath and behind the innocent civilians they are supposed to govern and protect. And it would be remiss of me not to mention the suspicious combined net worth of their top 3 leaders, which is estimated to be ~\$11 billion. Can you explain why their people lack basic essential provisions when their leaders are billionaires?

Israel has bomb shelters on almost every corner and safe rooms in almost every house because they are constantly under attack; but in 20 years the attackers have not built even one bomb shelter for their own people. Why? Because they know Israel will retaliate to defend themselves, which will allow them to martyr their own people to advance their cause of inciting hatred for those they hate most (Israel), all the while blaming them for it. But those who understand this know who the real enemy is, and it is not Israel.

Some Jews and Israelis I know openly criticize existing government policies. Even so, you say you do not believe the Israeli government or military speaks for all Jewish people. In spite of this, you call the horrific massacre on 10/7 RESISTANCE. Even if you believe that the Palestinians' true oppressors are the Israeli government and not their own leaders, how can you justify such an indiscriminate attack on innocent civilians who have nothing to do with the government?

Do you honestly believe that stealing children and babies from their beds, decapitating, dismembering, disfiguring, raping, torturing or burning alive innocent civilians in their homes and in front of their loved ones constitutes LIBERATION? How does any of this "free Palestine?"

Or worse: Do you deny- as some of the propaganda you've shared expresses- that the events of 10/7 ever even took place? Or that it was Israel who massacred its own people?

I realize that most of what I've explained here reverses victim and offender as per the narratives you've been exposed to, and for this reason it may be hard for you to believe. This is what Radical Islamists want in order to turn the world against Israel and Jews to further their Pan-Islamist goals, and they are succeeding. The information war on Israel is decades old, and their infiltration of our educational systems and public media is a horrifying reality that was laid out in a detailed multiphase plan and initiated long ago. One needs only to follow the money to see that this is true.

Iran, who is the funding entity behind Hamas, serves every narrative while stoking Antisemitic sentiment amongst those driven by "social justice." China's territorial claims over Taiwan are advanced by US destabilization, which they are masterfully accomplishing via TikTok.

Russia revels in our distraction from their genocide in Ukraine, where they have kidnapped over 50k children for purposes of indoctrination, and the horrors of whose <true> occupation (in the legal sense of the

word) are well-documented. The deceptions run rampant and deep. I can only encourage you to look back into history and prove me wrong; I am happy to address any of your doubts.

Israel could have bombed all of Gaza and ended this war on 10/8 without ever setting foot on the ground, but they did not because they purposely don't target civilians (unlike Hamas, who purposely targets civilians and hides behind their own). Instead, they risk their own lives in attempts to minimize civilian casualties.

The IDF have strict wartime humanitarian law, and those who violate it are jailed. They go to the furthest lengths they can to warn innocent civilians of incoming action and give them time and assistance to get out. Hamas shoots them on the road if they try to leave and orders them to stay. This has been documented via video and from the mouths of Gazans trying to escape.

Every single death is on Hamas. They waged this war and are murderous monsters. They are not just the enemy of Israel, but the enemy of their own people. They value Jewish death over Palestinian life. The Palestinians need to be freed from Hamas. None of this is to say that any part of this war is justified. In my opinion, bloodshed NEVER is. Every death is horrific. The loss of every life is tragic and unforgivable.

Starting with the barbaric events of 10/7. Hamas doesn't afford its people even an ounce of humanity in the way it operates, and it has no intention to. Both Palestinians and Israelis deserve safety, freedom and dignity. Hamas is the real enemy, of both Israel and the innocent civilians of Gaza, and they must be stopped. Ironically, when Israel succeeds in doing so, it is in fact they who will "free Palestine," in the truest sense of the word.

So in this war between the terrorist death-worshipping organization that is Hamas vs. the life-loving people of Israel and the innocent Palestinians who aspire to have their own land and their own lives, it DOES simply come down to Good vs. Evil. And it's not just a war between our innocent civilians and Hamas- as Israeli President Isaac Herzog said, "It is a war between those who adhere to the norms of humanity and those practicing a barbarism that has no place in the modern world."

We must free Gaza from Hamas, just as we must free Afghanistan from the Taliban, just as we must free Lebanon from Hezbollah, just as we must free Iran, Iraq, Syria and Pakistan from the Radical Islamic Regime, as this is just the beginning for Pan-Islamic Imperialists.

Hamas commander Mahmoud Al-Zahar is quoted as saying that "Israel is only the first target. The entire planet will be under our rule." If Hamas is allowed to stay in power and isn't completely eradicated, the entire Western world's freedom is at stake, including mine, yours and our precious families'.

Dear Mayor Arreguin, Ms Kesarwani and members of the city council,

I reached out to you in late November requesting and again thank you for not bringing a ceasefire resolution to the city council agenda, in fear that it would cause more divisiveness and anti semitism to the residents of Berkeley, without actually impacting the war itself. Although that is not the subject of this email it is directly related to it.

I grew up in Berkeley, my mother still lives in the house that I grew up in. I am a Berkeley High graduate as well as my two brothers. I am a nurse at Alta Bates, a homeowner in District 1 and I am a dual American - Israeli citizen along with my husband and our two sons.

In my 18 years of growing up here and in the past eight years since I have returned and lived in Berkeley with my Israeli husband and children, I, nor any members of my family have experienced personal harassment or verbal or physical attacks on us as Jews or Israelis.

Unfortunately, this has now changed.

I am writing to let you know about two separate Anti Semitic / anti-Israeli incidents in North Berkeley this past week that my family and I personally experienced.

I would go as far to say they were blatant harassment. Two incidents in One week!

The first incident occurred on 12/2 Saturday morning, the Jewish Sabbath, on our way walking from our house to a bar mitzvah at synagogue Netivot Shalom on University Ave. As we were walking across university from the alone greenway a man very aggressively yelled out at us. It took a moment to make sense of what he was saying and to realize that his yelling was clearly directed at us. My husband and two sons were wearing Kippas on their heads. He angrily yelled at us that Hitler should have killed us all, Fuck you, that we should go back to Europe and that we are causing genocide and Cease fire now! He continued to yell while he walked down University and we walked into the parking lot of the Berkeley School that is shared with Netivot Shalom. My husband and I were angry of course and I had to convince my husband not to going back and confront him. It felt very unsafe to go from that experience straight into a Bar Mitzvah with many jews in a confined space, regardless of security measures.

The second incident was early this morning 12/7, while my husband and son were walking up Virginia St. towards the North Berkeley Bart station where my son catches the bus to Oakland Hebrew Day School along with many other local jewish children. They were speaking Hebrew and a man near them yelled at them and called them Nazis and continued to use profanity and aggressively talk about PM Netanyahu. My son was scared and ran ahead to the bus stop and my husband chose to not engage in order not to upset my son further. Once again, this incident happened while on the way to a larger group of Jewish families.

Im am sharing this as a concerned mother, resident, jew, American and Israeli. I urge you to take these harassments very seriously as unfortunately I believe there will be many more. I urge you to continue to commit to the safety and well being of the Jewish and Israeli community and I urge you to work with our community leaders in matters or security and local actions that can be made to decrease antisemitism as well

as islamophobia and I plead with you that you continue to not bring forth a resolution to the Agenda. Doing so will cause more hatred, division and violence to our community, and will not impact the Israel/Hamas war. Along with the council members I have cc'd Rabbi Chai Levy of Congregation Netivot Shalom and Rabbi Yonatan Cohen of Congregation Beth Israel.

I am emailing on the absolute need for a ceasefire in Gaza and to support House Resolution 786: Calling for an immediate deescalation and cease-fire in Israel and occupied Palestine. As an Armenian-American who is a descendent of genocide survivors who were expelled from their ancestral lands, seeing the videos of Palestinian civilians being forced on a death march out of their historic homeland is an affront to humanity, an affront to justice, and an affront to the values that City of Berkeley claims to espouse. We must use our words clearly: the described "humanitarian corridor" is a death march; the "evacuation" is forced transfer of a besieiged population; and the Israeli "expanding offensive" is a genocide. The calls from Israeli leaders to resettle Palestinians in Gaza to other countries is a call to strip Palestinians of their right under international law to return to their homes in historic Palestine/modern-day Israel. The majority of the Palestinians in Gaza are already refugees from the 1948 Nakba, when over 750,000 indigenous Palestinians were ethnically cleansed from their homeland to establish modern-day Israel.

There are now over 1.8 million Palestinians displaced in Gaza. According to the youth-led, independent, nonprofit organization Euro-Med Human Rights Monitor, there are at least 61,700 completely destroyed housing units, and 169,550 partially destroyed housing units as of December 5, 2023. The UN Special Rapporteur on the right to adequate housing, Balakrishnan Rajagopal, has used the term "domicide" to refer to the systematic or widespread attacks on housing and civilian infrastructure. Rendering an entire city, like Gaza City, uninhabitable for civilians is domicide, and this is a crime against humanity. This is not solely confined to Gaza City or the Gaza Strip. As I write this email, Armenians in Jerusalem's historic Armenian Quarter -- where the world's oldest Armenian diaspora community has resided since the 4th century -- are being threatened, harassed, and expelled by armed Israeli settlers supported by Israeli police. As I write this email, armed Israeli settlers continue to systematically drive out Palestinian communities and villages in the West Bank as they have for decades.

The US-funded Israeli genocide in Palestine is modeling new ways that technology, international political inaction, systemic racism, and settler colonialism are depriving human beings of their homes and their lives. Berkeley City Council must clearly state their support for a ceasefire or their silence will be understood as support for genocide and domicide. Berkeley City Council must clearly state their support for a ceasefire or their silence will be understood as support for racialized dispossession of land, displacement from home, and exclusion from access to safety and stability. Silence, at this pivotal moment, is not an option. Now is the time to affirm Berkeley City Council's commitment to Berkeley's values of justice, free speech, and human rights. Now is the time for the City of Berkeley to affirm their support for a ceasefire loudly and clearly.

# The Rape of the Israeli Women

Hamas's crimes on Oct. 7 were deliberate and systematic. Why has the left been disbelieving, silent or equivocal?

At first I didn't understand. Among Hamas's crimes of 10/7: little children and babies murdered, some burned to death; children forced to watch parents chased, beaten and shot. Old couples murdered in their homes; families who'd taken refuge in safe rooms burned out and killed. Hamas attempted to behead a kibbutz worker, and killed old women standing at a bus stop. Women were abused—raped, it seemed certain. But I didn't understand why, from day one, the last received such emphasis. Defenders of Hamas kept demanding proof and claiming there was no evidence. It was as if they were saying: *Sure we behead people and kill infants but raping someone, that's crossing a line!* 

But now I understand what was done. It was grim and dreadful, but it was also systematic and deliberate. And since there's going to be a lot of 10/7 trutherism—there already is—we have to be clear about what happened.

In the days after the attack, chaos reigned in the attack areas. At least 1,200 people had been murdered, their bodies scattered through kibbutzim and on the site of the Nova music festival. The crime scene was huge; the priority was identifying the dead and informing their families. Documentation of crimes was incomplete, forensic evidence not always recorded, evidence perishable. The testimony of witnesses, body collectors and morgue workers came in unevenly. It has built and is becoming comprehensive.

A stunning report appeared last weekend in London's Sunday Times, by reporter Christina Lamb. Bar Yuval-Shani, a 58-year-old psychotherapist treating the families of victims, told Ms. Lamb she has been told by several witnesses of rape at the music festival. A police commander told Ms. Lamb, "It's clear now that sexual crimes were part of the planning, and the purpose was to terrify and humiliate people." Ms. Lamb quotes Yoni Saadon, 39, a father of four and shift manager in a foundry who was at the music festival. He said he hid as a young woman was raped, and saw Hamas fighters capture another young woman near a car. "She was fighting back, not allowing them to strip her. They threw her to the ground and one of the terrorists took a shovel and beheaded her."

"We didn't understand at first," Ms. Lamb quoted Cochav Elkayam-Levy, a Hebrew University expert on international law, who heads a commission into the Hamas crimes. She said survivors arriving at hospitals weren't asked about sexual abuse or given rape kits, but those who volunteered to collect bodies started reporting that many of the women were naked and bleeding from the genitals. The commander of a unit of a volunteer religious organization that collected the remains of the dead told Ms. Lamb they collected 1,000 bodies in 10 days from the festival site and the kibbutzim. "No one saw more than us. . . . It seemed their mission was to rape as many as possible."

Israel Defense Forces sources told the paper that Hamas fighters caught in Gaza reported in police interrogations that they had been instructed by superiors to "dirty" and "whore" the women.

A few days after the Sunday Times report came one on the mounting evidence of violent sexual abuse from BBC correspondent Lucy Williamson. Several of those involved in collecting and identifying the bodies of the dead told the BBC that they had seen "multiple signs of sexual assault, including broken pelvises, bruises, cuts and tears, and that the victims ranged from children and teenagers to pensioners." Video testimony of an eyewitness to the music festival, shown to journalists by Israeli police, "detailed the gang rape, mutilation and execution of one victim." The BBC saw "videos of naked and bloodied women filmed by Hamas on the day of the attack."

The gallant gents of Hamas were filming their own war crimes.

Israeli police have privately shown journalists filmed testimony of a woman at the music festival. She describes Hamas fighters gang-raping a woman and then mutilating her. The last of her attackers shot her in the head. She said the men cut off parts of the woman's body during the rape.

Dear Councilmember,

I hope this finds you well. My name is Amodini Choudhary; I am a student at UC Berkeley and a resident of District 4, emailing with respect to current affairs in Israel and Gaza. As a resident of Berkeley and a student at a university central to the city, I am deeply concerned with the role that our City Council-members play in reassuring their constituents and promoting safety, inclusion, wellbeing, and a recognition of what is happening in Israel and Palestine.

I want to start by addressing something that struck me from the December 5, 2023 Berkeley City Council meeting, which this council decided to adjourn prior to hearing public opinion for the second time in a row:

There was one individual, a Jewish mother, who spoke up about feeling unsafe in the environment of that meeting and in her community. Consider her religious identity: she expressed that her child is being threatened in school and feels unsafe. The Palestinian-supporting majority crowd booed her. I wish we had heard more of her comments. Do not get me wrong: I believe in the Palestinian resistance and believe vehemently that the occupation must go.

The comment of this Jewish speaker, who is brave for having said her piece in a loud room full of hurt people who strongly oppose her view, points strikingly to the fact that the silence of authorities on the matter hurts communities both Jewish and Palestinian. (Notice the intrinsic disparity in a conflict between a religion and an ethnic group. Pay attention to this. Understand how it affects the argument.) Central to Israeli rhetoric—which so many in authority are echoing, especially in their silence (it is empty space which creates an echo chamber)—is the conflation of zionism and semitism. This is something that even the Dean of Berkeley Law has said explicitly and taken pride in. Yet, when a fascist and occupying regime that kills thousands of innocents and uproots a culture and a people is itself rooted in zionism, then the violence and injustice falls on the shoulders of the religion that is associated. Palestinian rhetoric which seeks to distinguish Semitism from Zionism does so in an effort to respect Judaism and uphold the values of Semitism, to not allow it to justify the murdering of a people and gutting of a culture. We seek to honour the non-violence and harmony of the Jewish. Remember: weaponizing a religion only goes so far before its institutions become distorted.

By pushing for a ceasefire resolution that recognises Semitism as separate from Zionism, pinpointing exactly a violence to settler colonial ideologies and not a religion, everyday Jewish people can navigate their spaces with faith in their institutions, and faith that the weaponization of their religion is not being accepted by authorities meant to represent the interests of those very Jewish constituents. This is precisely why Jewish constituents of yours are expressing their unwavering support of a ceasefire resolution, meeting after meeting. I implore you to listen.

Passing a resolution for permanent ceasefire supports communities beyond the Arab, Muslim, and Palestinian communities. It vouches for Semite, Jewish safety by recognising the core values of a faith as distinct from the violence caused by its weaponization as justification for a separate, Zionist, ideology. Pass a ceasefire resolution so that the children of Jewish mothers can go to school safely because they know that Zionism is not Semitism and that their communities have called for an end to the atrocities. Be the reason that kid can say "actually, Berkeley does not support this. Not in the name of my faith." Truly, truly, seek to serve all the communities that fall within your constituency. If you do the right thing, that mother will not feel scared or alone in this environment.

Recall elementary lessons on bystander intervention. Do you need a reminder from a harm reduction office? Silence is complacency. Do not mistake your authority for objectivity. Seek to use it for the benefit of your people. Allow Berkeley to lead change, to uphold its legacy without the burden of hypocrisy. You have seen us on our knees, begging. You have seen us on our feet, yelling. You have seen us in our seats, representing. You have seen pictures of our dead. You have heard the cries of *humans* who should not have to appeal this way to remind you of your moral, democratic, and representative duty the moment you take a seat in the chair you occupy. If this is a democracy, prove it. Find your humanity. Then, hold it up next to the videos of dying Palestinian people. Does that humanity waver? Question who you are if it does. Then find it again, hold it steadfast, and pass a resolution for ceasefire anyways.

God knows that Palestinian people are grieving publicly for your benefit. If our faith justified the weaponization of our grief the way Zionists justify weaponizing Judaism, the conversation would be a different one. It is your privilege to not find yourselves on this side of the table.

The time for a ceasefire resolution is now.

Dear City of Berkeley Council Members,

I am a resident of District 5 in Berkeley and Sophie Hahn is my Councilmember. I greatly appreciate that the Mayor and City Council have been able to keep the politics of the Israel-Hamas war out of Berkeley politics. The **history** of Israel, Palestine, and the entire Middle East is complicated. So complicated that without appropriate and unbiased information, it is easy to become anti-semitic, islamophobic, anti-Israel and/or anti-Arab.

I highly recommend that the Council **not pass** a Ceasefire Resolution concerning the war in Gaza. Or if you decide to pass such a resolution that it not one-sided and divisive, and place the blame for the current conflict where it belongs - on Hamas. My reasons are as follows:

- i) The City Council does not have unlimited time, resources, and stamina to deal with the multiple critical issues in Berkley [crime, homelessness, housing issues, infrastructure repair, all forms of hate (racism, anti-semitism, islamophobia), and public health, to name a few], so I believe concentrating your efforts on these regional issues would be more beneficial use of your valuable than officially commenting on the Israel-Gaza conflict.
- ii) If the Berkeley City Council passes a ceasefire resolution, many people will assume (without ever reading it) that it agrees with unbalanced ones passed by other cities, which I believe will only inflame and re-traumatize our impacted communities.
- iii) In 2005, Israel withdrew all Israel citizens and military personal from Gaza, leaving the Palestinians in Gaza to determine their own destiny. Soon after, Hamas (which is an internationally recognized terrorist organization) gained control of Gaza, and several military conflicts between Israel and Gaza ensued. There have been many ceasefires (six I believe), all of which were broken by Hamas. So I believe another ceasefire would only defend Hamas and let it regain its strength to attack Israel again. Both Palestinians and Israelis (Jews and Arab citizens) deserve a chance to determine their destiny without the interference of Hamas.
- iv) Berkeley residents can directly contact their elected officials (President, Vice-President, and US Congress members) that determine international policy to express their opinions.
- v) Prior to resolutions being considered at City Council Meetings, their complete text should be available to Berkeley residents via official City of Berkeley avenues
- vi) I agree with the following Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) recommended letter:
- "I am a Berkeley resident deeply concerned that the City Council may consider a divisive resolution about the Israel-Hamas War. The antisemitic comments and actions, violent rhetoric, and amplification of conspiracy theories that have plagued past meetings have no place in Berkeley. "

This resolution should:

- 1- Demand an immediate CEASEFIRE.
- 2- Demand immediate safe passage for humanitarian aid to Gazans who have little to no food, water, fuel or medical supplies to save the 20,000+ Palestinians injured
- 3- Call for an end to Israeli apartheid, the occupation and blockage of Palestinian land by Israeli military forces;

The following words are taken from the Berkeley City Website, "This nine-member body makes decisions about *local laws and policies* for the city using input from the community." What is occuring in the Middle East is not under your job description to fix. It is my understanding that the Berkeley City Council may be discussing and voting on a proposed resolution about the Israel-Hamas War at the next Council meeting on 12/12. I urge you <u>not</u> to consider or pass any resolutions on this matter. The Berkeley City Council website states the following about the City Council, "This nine-member body makes decisions about *local laws and policies* (italics are my own) for the city using input from the community...The Mayor issues proclamations, the City Council receives off-agenda memos from the City Manager, and the City Council comments on *state and national legislation* (italics are my own). "Based on this mission statement, I believe it is beyond the scope of the City Council's duties to issue a resolution on the Israel-Hamas War.

I have lived in Berkeley for close to 45 years, and I absolutely love our city. I have experienced Berkeley as a community that ideologically embraces peace, tolerance, and acceptance, values I hold dearly. Although I, like so many others, am horrified and heartbroken by the loss of innocent lives in Israel and Gaza, my concern is that a resolution on the Israel-Hamas War will further inflame tensions and increase a division that already has begun in our community. Dear Mayor and Members of the City Council,

I am a District 4 resident and have worked for the last five years in District 1. I write again to urge you to pass a resolution calling for an immediate and permanent ceasefire in Gaza. Berkeley was not silent on South African apartheid, and this Council was not silent on war in Ukraine. Berkeley's failure to speak out against injustice in Gaza and the West Bank calls into question our willingness to speak out against injustice anywhere. Please draft, with community support, a resolution calling for ceasefire, and call a special meeting as soon as possible to pass it.

I hope you have read the Washington Post's <u>recent reporting</u> that more than 22,000 of the bombs Israel dropped on Gaza in the first six weeks of fighting were supplied by the United States -- a rate of 155 American bombs per square mile. If located in Gaza, Berkeley's 10.5 square miles of homes, schools, shops, medical clinics, community centers, and places of worship would have been flattened by 1,625 American bombs in those six weeks alone. In the same period of time, the United States sent an additional 15,000 bombs to Israel. And just days ago, the United States was the sole vote against a United Nations resolution calling for a humanitarian ceasefire.

Over 24,000 people in Gaza have been killed or are presumed dead. More than 9,000 were children, and an estimated 92% were civilians. Almost 50,000 people have been physically injured, and 1.8 million people have been displaced. Many thousands more are expected to die from treatable injury and illnesses spreading due to the absence of basic hygiene and medical infrastructure. The United Nations has said that people in Gaza face the immediate possibility of starvation.

We cannot continue to be complicit with our country's uncritical support for an Israeli military that is willing to accept a 92% civilian casualty rate as the price of doing business. Calling for a ceasefire is the most moderate and uncontroversial action that local government can take. And it is necessary -- both to communicate to the federal government, which has the power to change the conditions in Gaza, Israel, and the West Bank, that the violence of the last 66 days cannot continue, and to show the members of our community mourning generations of their family that they matter.

These debates are tearing apart our lovely Berkeley community and I urge you to take a stand for cohesiveness at home versus voting for a one-sided resolution because of a vocal subset of Berkeley.

Dear Mayor Arreguin and City Councilmembers,

As a longtime Berkeley resident of District 1, I am writing to thank you for not addressing the conflict between Israel and Hamas, and to strongly encourage you to continue to steer clear of this difficult and divisive topic. I have lived in Berkeley for nearly 19 years. As an observant Jew, I wear a kippah at all times, so I am visibly and identifiably Jewish. Because of that, I am a target whenever people are angry at Israel. I have experienced several antisemitic incidents over the years, including on the streets of Berkeley, such as being yelled at for supposedly "murdering Palestinians" or being called a "f\*\*\*ing kike" (both occurred within a few blocks of where I lived in Berkeley at the time), for no reason other than because someone saw the kippah on my head. These incidents tend to happen more frequently at times like these, when the Middle East conflict is especially intense. Friends and neighbors of ours who are also identifiably Jewish were called Nazis twice in the past week.

However well intentioned, resolutions addressing this topic will not have any impact on the direct parties to the conflict halfway across the world. But they will enflame and divide those of us who live together in this community and share this city. Based on my own personal experience, I can assure you that the only practical impact from debating and passing (or not passing) a resolution on this issue is that I am more likely to get yelled at, or assaulted, on the streets of Berkeley tomorrow or the day after.

Thank you for maintaining your focus on the many important local issues that need addressing.

The event was attended by members of Congregation Beth Israel, Beth El, Netivot Shalom, Berkeley JCC, Berkeley Hillel, Chochmat Halev, and Urban Adamah. A group of people representing a very wide and diverse community of Jewish identity in Berkeley.

At this time I wanted to urge you to reject ANY resolution pertaining to the war between Israel and Hamas. Please stand firmly against the voices of division and hate that threaten our city, our streets, our communities, and our members.

I will not be attending the meeting in person because I am afraid. I am afraid of what I have seen at previous meetings not only in Berkeley, but also in our neighbor to the South, Oakland, or Richmond to the North, and other cities that have had very forceful people show up in support of Hamas. I am also worried for my children, who are Berkeley born and raised, if something happened to me while I was there speaking my truth, representing my community and exercising my constitutional rights. I live and work in Berkeley and have for more than 10 years. I.AM.AFRAID.

Especially at this time, I urge you to make clear to our entire city PRIOR to Tuesday's meeting, that you will not discuss matters pertaining to our local Jewish community, and that will have direct impact on Jews living in our city, during the holiday of Hanukkah, denying us the ability to celebrate our holiday in Berkeley in peace.

I urge all council members to pull their resolutions ahead of Tuesday's meetings and to inform the public as soon as possible: Resolutions impact Jews, Israelis, Muslims, and Palestinians living in our local communities the most, and members of these populations deserve to be in the room without impediments.

Finally, the rabbis, administrators, and educators of the organizations mentioned above, represent the largest segments of Berkeley's Jewish community. Please take the time to reach out to each of them collectively and individually. We, Jewish people, represent a significant constituency of this beloved city. Dear council members and Mayor,

I'm a Berkeley resident (District 5), born at Alta Bates hospital. I have Jewish family in Israel: two half siblings and their children, an aunt and uncle and 5 cousins, and my sister and her family who are dual citizens. I want to state clearly and unambiguously that the indiscriminate slaughter of Palestinian children does not make them, or me, safe. As a Jew and because I am Jewish, and as a human and because I am human: represent the humanity of your constituents by standing in solidarity with the global demand for a ceasefire in Gaza. Enough is enough. The single greatest threat to Jews here and abroad are the genocidal acts of a rogue state that has the audacity to invoke our faith and our persecution.

I have experienced very real antisemitism: when my family moved to North Carolina for work during my grade school years, I was relentlessly bullied for being a "Jewish witch" and eventually had to be homeschooled. My family's house was later spray painted with swastikas. As with the vast majority of antisemitic hate crime incidents in the US, these acts were perpetrated by white supremacists—the very same groups who torment and kill Arab and Muslim Americans, like the three Palestinian students who were shot in Vermont two weeks ago. One of the greatest joys I've experienced as an adult back in Berkeley has been finding Jewish community again, and more so now than ever among the broad and diverse Jews standing together to demand an end to this senseless and depraved violence.

What makes me unsafe now is the absurd and utterly false conflation of my Jewish identity with Zionism and the Israeli government, and the exploitation of legitimate fear and pain to silence what should be the least controversial plea: stop killing children. What makes me unsafe is relentless harassment by Israel's defenders in Berkeley and beyond, who have called me a "terrorist," a "Shiksa c\*nt," a "Jihadist," a "traitor," a "fake Jew" -- all for nothing more than saying I'm a Jew who supports a ceasefire. I have been told "I hope you get raped by Hamas" more times than I can count-- a particularly cruel irony given that my dear Israeli friend was raped by IDF soldiers during her training. Sexual violence is never ok; threatening and leveraging it to justify further violence-- including sexual violence! -- is appalling and sickening.

I shouldn't be surprised by any of this. I was heavily indoctrinated by Israeli propaganda throughout my Jewish upbringing. At my Jewish summer camp, we sang the Israeli national anthem every morning and were taught that the founding of Israel was the miracle of "a land without a people for a people without a land." It was all incredibly confusing for me, even as someone with family in Israel. On my Birthright trip, someone mentioned "occupied territory" and was quickly corrected "there's no such thing as occupied territory, it is all Israel." There was no secrecy around the aim of the program: "See, don't you want to make Aliyah [emigrate to Israel] and have your Jewish babies here?" I did not learn about the Nakba until I was thirty years old.

What really makes me unsafe? Seeing my neighbors and my government turn a blind eye to genocide. Witnessing the dehumanization and demonization my Muslim and Palestinian friends and colleagues face \*daily\*. A Berkeley City College professor has been publicly insinuating that more than 75% of Gaza residents are not civilians. Imagine hearing that as a Palestinian student in Berkeley. Imagine realizing that "Berkeley Stands United Against Hate" doesn't actually

apply to you in a country that has committed billions of dollars to the destruction of your people.

Dear Berkeley City Council,

Thank you for having the courage to carefully consider the context of the conflict in Israel and the ramifications locally of a resolution. The easy way out would certainly be to cave to the pressure, to the flawed comparisons to other conflicts, and to have the same knee jerk reaction to condemn Israel as so many have. The stories and images are certainly horrific. My heart breaks for the death and suffering of so many innocent civilians in Gaza. It is hard to imagine how Israel's current actions could lead to peace. But it is even harder to imagine Palestinians ever enjoying lasting peace while under the heel of the brutal Hamas dictatorship, whose stated mission is the destruction of the State of Israel.

Understanding history is key to finding a solution. There was a thriving Jewish State in Israel long before Islam or Palestinian society even existed. Sadly, the Jews of Israel were butchered and driven from their land by many conquerors including Greeks, Romans, Crusaders, Ottomans and Turks. Around 1900 Jews from Eastern Europe, who were suffering from mass rapes, kidnappings, and murders at the hands of the Cossacks, began to return to their homeland. At the time, Palestine was an inhospitable land and very sparsely populated by small groups of Arabs and Jews. The returning Jews were incredibly industrious, draining swamps, building irrigation systems and other infrastructure, and the desert began to bloom. Many Arabs from Egypt, Yemen, and elsewhere moved to Palestine to partake in this resurgence.

In the wake of the Holocaust, the UN granted the Jews in Palestine the right to self-determination. The surrounding Arab countries, who already controlled 99% of the Middle East, immediately attacked Israel from all sides, determined to drive the Jews from the last 1%. The Arabs in Palestine sided with their Arab brothers. Miraculously the Jews survived (only to be attacked again in 1956, 1967, 1973, etc). The Arab countries expelled all their Jews, who were gladly accepted by Israel. To improve its chances of survival, Israel tried to expel some of the Arabs within their midst to the neighboring countries from which many Arabs had just recently emigrated. The Arab countries would not allow them. Instead, they were herded into the West Bank and Gaza. Arab leaders could have solved the Arab-Israeli conflict long ago, by simply allowing their Arab brothers to return, but it has never served their interests to do so. Allowing the conflict to fester allows the Jews to serve as the scapegoats, a common enemy, and to distract the Arab people from their brutal and corrupt dictatorships. Egypt could end the suffering in Gaza today, but they still refuse to allow in any Palestinians.

Lack of courageous Arab leadership has plagued the peace process. One outlier who dared make peace was Anwar Sadat, who was quickly rewarded with 1/3 of all land owned by Israel, billions in US aid and Israeli commerce, and assassination by anti-peace fanatics. Despite the wars and thousands of terrorist attacks, courageous Israeli leaders, including Yitzhak Rabin and Ehud Barak, have repeatedly offered what were internationally agreed to be very generous terms for a two-state solution in the West Bank, Gaza and East Jerusalem. But there was no courage on the other side, certainly not from Yasir Arafat. Most Palestinians want peace and do not support terror, but violent, fanatic factions have seized control, squelched the majority, and fostered terrorism.

18 years ago, Israel withdrew from Gaza. There was no occupation. There was a ceasefire. Aid and resources poured into Gaza. Much of it came from Israel in the form of electricity, water, food, fuel, technology, and jobs in Gaza and Israel (despite near constant terrorism). Instead of using the resources to build a brighter future for Gazans, Hamas

funneled them into its war machine. Hamas has broken the ceasefire many times since 2005 with unprovoked attacks culminating with the horrific massacres of October 7<sup>th</sup>. Israelis feel they have no choice left but to free Palestine from Hamas and hope that someday a courageous Palestinian leader will be able to break the stranglehold of the fanatics and make peace.

Dear City Council,

The beauty of Berekeley is the way it makes all members of the community – ethnic, religious, and racial – feel welcome, as part of a single community.

We would hate to see geopolitics unnecessarily fragment our civic community and our unity as a city. The issues surrounding the war between Israel and Hamas have absolutely no bearing on local governance. We feel it is out of place for our city, or any city, to take a stance on issues so deeply felt by many in our city, yet so divergently felt.

A partisan proclamation making demands of Israel would deeply and needlessly alienate most Jews who live in the city. The Jewish Community has not sought the city's endorsement of Israel's legitimate goal of defeating Hamas after the horrors committed by the rape-torture-death squads on October 7th, who performed unspeakable acts of brutality against innocent babies, children, women, and men. Not to exclude kidnapping. Hamas specifically targeted the most vulnerable, Left-leaning kibbutzim who advocated for Palestinian welfare and peace and young people at the Nova Peace Festival. These horrors tear at the heart of every Jew.

Senator Chuck Schumer recently eloquently explained from the Senate Floor the feelings most Jews have to these events, particularly in light of our past similar experiences as victims of death squads and concentration camps.

Our own grandmother, grandfather and great-grandmothers were Holocaust survivors, most of their families wiped out by the Nazis. Contemplating what Hamas did on October 7th is for us not a matter of political or academic debate ... it is deeply personal. We know people whose family members were slaughtered by Hamas. We strongly feel that this cannot be allowed to happen again.

Many people in the Berkeley community, Jews and non-Jews, support Israel in this.

We understand that some members of our community may feel differently. As is their right. Some members of the City Government might have their own personal geopolitical views regarding this war, some supporting Israel's right of self-defense against Hamas, some preferring a permanent ceasefire that would leave Hamas in place. We imagine most residents of Berkeley believe Israel has the right to exist but there are no doubt some who feel it does not. No matter the views of any individual member of our community or any segment of our community, we urge the city not to issue a proclamation regarding this matter, as doing so would only divide our city.

The fact that this question is even coming up is disturbing on another level. There are many military and ethnic conflicts taking place globally at this very moment, and that have taken place in recent years, and in each and every of those instances the City of Berkeley has not been pressured, nor did it feel the need, to issue proclamations making policy pronouncements or supporting this or that side. The fact that only here, where Israel is involved, is this being contemplated is itself deeply troubling. Such targeting of Israel, and no other country, frankly, raises serious ethical questions.

Antisemitism has exploded in our country after October 7th. The FBI has declared this to be the case based on its own statistics. The Anti-Defamation League has also expressed alarm. Emotionally intense protests and statements against Israel and for Hamas have very easily, almost naturally, bled over into antisemitic harassment and attacks against Jews, Jewish establishments, and institutions. Including assaults in our city against Jewish individuals with potentially deadly or crippling consequences had they been successful. We believe Jews are feeling more unsafe now than they ever have in the United States. A city proclamation critical of Israel, making demands for a permanent ceasefire before Hamas is defeated, no matter how worded inevitably portraying Israel in a negative light, bears a significant risk of inflaming further harassment and hate crimes against members of our Jewish Community.

There is no need for this. The City of Berkeley does not conduct foreign policy for the United States of America. This responsibility rests with the State Department, the Department of Defense, the House and Senate and the White House. Honestly, our city should focus more on unifying our community, not dividing it. This is how we, and all Jewish residents, have always experienced our wonderful city, with our City Government leading by example, respecting everyone. Working together with all the members of our beautifully diverse community to achieve common goals. We urge you to remain true to this mission. To foster an atmosphere of peace, tolerance, and mutual respect for all segments of our community, as you have always done in the past.

Dear Councilmember Kesarwani, Mayor Arreguin, and other council members,

I live with my family in District 1. Last night I sat in dread while my husband and many friends from the Jewish community attended your meeting. I worried the whole time for their safety. A friend who arrived on her own said it was scary getting into the room and she was shaking for much of the meeting because of the menacing behavior and words of the anti-Israel crowd.

My husband shared updates and videos with me as the meeting progressed and I was afraid for him and these friends because of the aggression and hostility from the other people in the room. Some yelled towards our group that they were the "pro genocide people". I saw clips of community members speaking and being rudely interrupted while they spoke and jeered and interrupted our community members the second the buzzer rang. By contrast, our community sat quietly and respectfully while they spoke and even when the buzzer rang and they kept talking.

It felt shameful watching the constant disruptions and incivility that prevented the Council from doing its business.

I am grateful to Mayor Arreguin and the council for not caving to the bullying and harassment you all have experienced as a group and individually to weigh in on this horrible situation. There are strong emotions that many of us but that should never result in bullying, uncivil behavior to one another. Basic decency is not too much to ask of all Berkeley inhabitants. Thank you to Mayor Arreguin for continuing to call for the disrupters to be quiet and let our community have their turn to talk.

My husband spoke last night and said what I feel which is that passing a resolution on the war between Israel and Hamas will have zero impact on the parties abroad and will only worsen hostility towards the Jewish community here in Berkeley. We are already subjected to vicious antisemitislc verbal attacks and vandalism. As visibly identifiable Jews, we walk in fear and I dread the day someone yells at us as they did our friend, Mikelle, who shared the awful things that were yelled at her family on their way to synagogue. Our sense of safety has been really shaken and it is a terrible feeling as parents to worry what our children may hear horrid things like that wr are Nazis, and be afraid walking around Berkeley.

Please stay strong and do what you have been doing and what is the mandate of municipal government — focusing on essential city business that serves the city and brings people together, united against hate.

I'd like to humbly ask that you consider cutting the mic when time is up. It feels sad that the anti-Israel people as a whole don't behave with basic courtesy when members of our community speak and wrap remarks, but it also feels really wrong that they consistently take and receive more time. Perhaps having the mic cut off will level the playing field so all voices have the same opportunities to comment. It shouldn't come to this, but alas we seem to be at a place where many people aren't showing basic decency and civility to their fellow citizens. As my husband was leaving the meeting last night someone screamed at him that he was a "white colonialist". Fortunately he made it home deeply unsettled by the experience of the meeting but physically unscathed.

was played at the Oakland City Council: \( \) have time to read: "My dear friend Negeene Mosaed kindly asked me to deliver some remarks on Malcolm X's real, as opposed to made up, views on Palestine and the Zionist colonial settler regime, as he described Israel. I wrote them to deliver at the Berkeley City Council on Nov. 28, but I ended up not doing so because I wasn't feeling well that nite. "However, even if I'd been feeling better, I probably wouldn't have been able to deliver my remarks because the Berkeley city manager, the mayor and the city council engaged in yet another one of their cowardly, possibly illegal subterfuges. "They again conspired to avoid engaging in an open public discussion of a demand by a significant element of their constituents for their city to call for a ceasefire in the latest iteration of Zionist Israel's 75-year-old war against the Palestinian people. "But before I read those remarks, I wanted to say something to our Palestinian sisters and brothers. Because of my parents' divorce, I was blessed to grow up here in Berkeley, where my Dad lived, and Detroit, where my Mom lived. As some of you know, Detroit is near Dearborn, which, along with Hamtramck, has the largest population of Arabs and Muslims outside of the Arab and Muslim worlds in the East. "So I grew up with Palestinians and I was aware early on of the special bond between our peoples, which makes sense. They were forced from their historic lands and our ancestors were stolen from ours. They're scattered to the four winds in a global diaspora, where they're often seen and treated as strangers. Worse, their lives are not as valued as the people who they live amongst. That, of course, is our experience, too. "Finally, for 75 years, they've yearned for national restoration and self-determination, the right to return to their ancestral lands and the God-given right to chart their

own course in this world. "While most African Americans no longer desire to return to the shores from which our ancestors were ripped five centuries ago, we, too, deeply crave the right to live our lives according to our own lights instead of having our destinies dwarfed, distorted and thwarted by those who are arrogant enough to consider themselves our superiors. "The most striking example of our affinity, which most 'white' people know nothing about, occurred when I was a student at Howard University in Washington, D.C. On June 30, 1982, I went to Cramton Auditorium to hear Ahmed Sékou Touré, the president of the West African nation of Guinea, who was then a hero of many Africa-conscious Western 'black' people. "Before he spoke, a number of dignitaries were recognized. Among them was Zehdi Terzi, the United Nations observer of the Palestine Liberation Organization, or PLO, which, at that time, was nothing like the tamed, collaborationist group that it has become as the lead group in the Palestinian Authority in the West Bank. Instead, it was looked upon as a militant national liberation movement. "Most of the students were familiar with Terzi because, in 1979, a meeting between him and Andrew Young, a former aide of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who was then the first 'black' U.S. ambassador to the UN, compelled Young to resign his position. "Still, I wasn't prepared for his reception. As soon as the moderator identified Terzi's organization, some 1,500 'black' students, as a body, began chanting, clapping and stomping, 'PLO! PLO! PLO! Their demonstration of support literally shook Cramton Auditorium. "Startled, I focused on Terzi to see what his reaction was. A grin spread across his handsome face and he beamed. It was apparent that he was already familiar with this response from African Americans. More than anything else, this taught me that Palestinians and African Americans are not only allies and comrades, but, more fundamentally, we're family. However, sadly, as our people say, 'not all kinfolk are skinfolk.' For example, African American politicians who are having their pockets filled with Zionist money are NOT your family. "'Black' politicians who usually act like cardboard cutouts, but have suddenly become eloquent in defense of not discussing, much less voting on, a ceasefire resolution because their speeches, news releases and even their Tweets are being drafted by their Zionists paymasters are NOT your family. "As 'black' folks say, 'Don't get confused.' But most of us ARE your family and I'm honored to have been given this opportunity to tell you so."

# PRESS RELEASE Davis City Council unanimously calls for an immediate ceasefire in Gaza

Contact: Yolo for Palestinian Justice Yolo4Palestinian Justice@gmail.com (December 13 2023, Davis) On December 12, the Davis City Council unanimously adopted a resolution calling for an immediate ceasefire in Gaza, joining the growing majority of people in the US and worldwide who demand that the bombing in Gaza must stop and that Palestinian and Israeli life must be protected. The resolution will add to the growing pressure on US Congress and the Biden administration to use its political, financial and military leverage to pressure Israel to end the horrifying civilian casualties in Gaza.

The resolution also calls for immediate diplomatic efforts to achieve a just and lasting peace and resolution of the decades long conflict; the unconditional release of all hostages - including both Israeli and Palestinian hostages - the immediate delivery of humanitarian aid, food, water, electricity, and medical supplies to Gaza; and that all parties adhere to international law. It also committed to sharing the City Council's demands with the community's state and federal representatives who have yet to call for a ceasefire (Cecilia Aguiar-Curry, State Senator Bill Dodd, Governor of California Gavin Newsom, US Representative Mike Thompson, US Senator Laphonza Butler, US Senator Alex Padilla, US President Joe Biden, and US Vice President Kamala Harris).

Prior to the meeting, on December 9, the City Council had published a draft resolution that many residents felt was inadequate, leading to a wave of public comments calling for it to be strengthened. Immediately before the City Council meeting, members of the Davis Jewish community hosted a Hanukkah menorah lighting outside of the chambers supporting a permanent and immediate ceasefire. The subsequent council discussion on the resolution lasted to nearly midnight with 450 public comments, emails and call ins, overwhelmingly in support of an immediate and permanent ceasefire. Community members from diverse religious and ethnic backgrounds, and all walks of life - including students, elders, faith leaders, medical professionals, lawyers, professors and a former city mayor - addressed the council. University of California Davis (UCD) Professor Emerita Suad Joseph concluded the round of public comment asking the City Council to "think of your children, think of your grandchildren. What will they say about the moral position that you take [tonight]?"

In response, the council members agreed unanimously to strengthen the resolution with a specific call for an immediate ceasefire. Vice Chair Josh Chapman noted his sadness at the pain and grief the crisis caused many residents of Davis with differing views on how it could be resolved, but stated that he did not believe such difficulty means the City should put its head in the sand and not declare its position. City Councilmember Donna Neville advocated for a demand for a ceasefire saying, "This is a humanitarian issue, it is about the need to stop the

violence and work towards a lasting and peaceful solution in the region. We have the moral imagination to make that happen."

Responding to the City's resolution, Palestinian American and Davis resident Deema Tamimi said: "I am so proud of Davis. The people of this city came out and showed their commitment for peace and love with a resounding call for a ceasefire. People were heard, no matter where they stood on the issue, and for me and for others, the ability to voice our opinions and tell our stories freely was a step towards healing. It gives me hope that there is a possibility for peace in Israel and Palestine. Violence is not the path. I am hopeful more and more cities will pass Ceasefire resolutions to ensure that our state and federal government know that the people want an end to this violence. If our state and federal leaders can't heed the call from the UN and human rights organizations, then it is our job at the local level to pressure them."

UCD Jewish Studies Professor Seth Sanders shared, "According to the scripture we read at the beginning of Hanukkah, when asked what the Menorah means, the angel says "Not by might, nor by power, but by My spirit." Tonight we found that the Davis community is on the same page here, sharing the same commitment to the supreme value we term in Hebrew pikuach nefesh, protecting human life. So many members of the Jewish community turned out last night in solidarity with our beloved neighbors to call for an immediate ceasefire, mourn the dead in Israel and Palestine, and work for a lasting and just peace for all."

One UCD graduate student added "More and more cities and communities across California, the US, and the world are calling for a ceasefire, reflecting the anger and grief felt by people of conscience everywhere over Israel's ongoing genocide in Gaza, that is being carried out with US funding, arms, diplomatic cover, and unconditional support by the Biden administration. At least 60% of the US public support a ceasefire. Yet our voices are not heard or reflected by our politicians, including Congressman Mike Thompson and Senators Alex Padilla and Laphonza Butler. We urge them to join the call for a ceasefire."

Prior to the effort to have the City of Davis adopt a ceasefire resolution, a group of Yolo County residents had come together to press their local congressman, Mike Thompson, to support the congressional call for a ceasefire (H.Res. 786). Constituents have been holding weekly vigils outside his Woodland office and had met with the Congressman in person at his Napa office in November. They shared stories of personal losses and expressed humanitarian arguments with the Congressman. He agreed with the need to protect civilian life, but has so far refused to call for a ceasefire or offer any concrete steps he would take to protect Palestinian lives. Annie Temple, a longtime Jewish resident of Davis said,"I feel proud of Davis and the Jewish community today. We stood on the right side of history, just as we did being the first city to call for the end to the South African Apartheid regime in 1978. This is a call to our state and national leaders that the tide of public opinion in the US has turned and it is time their policies and actions reflected it —we need a ceasefire and we need it now."

Dear Council Members,

This is a letter I sent to our Mayor and to Councilwoman Hahn, after their statements opposing resolutions. You may or may not agree with them, but, I thank you collectively, and request your help now and in the future to make Berkeley a safe place for everyone, and for the record, this is my sentiment and request to all of you who serve our community, and may I take this opportunity to thank you for your tireless service.

Thank you for your courageous statement opposing resolutions, taking a stand on the war in Gaza.

I am a Berkeley native, and I spent many years living in Jerusalem, where our six children were born, and who are American citizens, as well. I returned to Berkeley some years ago to care for my aging Mom, and I worked for years at Berkeley City College, placing students in internships.

I now work at an after school program at the JCC.

We are orthodox Jews, and I find I no longer feel safe wearing a head scarf, and my husband doesn't feel safe wearing a yarmulke. Instead, we wear either ski or baseball caps. I had to get rid of the Shalom doormat at our front door, for fear of violence, but I will not take down our mezuzahs. I go to work and return home, spending as little time as possible in public areas.

I recently sent a notice I saw at a bus stop, written in Arabic, to the BPD, as it was a hate message. meant for the eyes of only those who understood the language. BPD responded, and it is on their radar.

This is unacceptable. My father, who ran emergency services at the then, Herrick Memorial Hospital, and was on staff at four other area hospitals, led the fight for his colleagues of color to be on staff at those institutions, something that was not the case in the mid 50's, when our family came here from Chicago.

From Which River to Which Sea?
College students don't know, yet they agree with the slogan.

When college students who sympathize with Palestinians chant "From the river to the sea," do they know what they're talking about? I hired a survey firm to poll 250 students from a variety of backgrounds across the U.S. Most said they supported the chant, some enthusiastically so (32.8%) and others to a lesser extent (53.2%). But only 47% of the students who embrace the slogan were able to name the river and the sea. Some of the alternative answers were the Nile and the Euphrates, the Caribbean, the Dead Sea (which is a lake) and the Atlantic. Less than a quarter of these students knew who Yasser Arafat was (12 of them, or more than 10%, thought he was the first prime minister of Israel). Asked in what decade Israelis and Palestinians had signed the Oslo Accords, more than a quarter of the chant's supporters claimed that no such peace agreements had ever been signed. There's no shame in being ignorant, unless one is screaming for the extermination of millions.

Would learning basic political facts about the conflict moderate students' opinions? A Latino engineering student from a southern university reported "definitely" supporting "from the river to the sea" because "Palestinians and Israelis should live in two separate countries, side by side." Shown on a map of the region that a Palestinian state would stretch from the Jordan River to the Mediterranean Sea, leaving no room for Israel, he downgraded his enthusiasm for the mantra to "probably not." Of the 80 students who saw the map, 75% similarly changed their view.

An art student from a liberal arts college in New England "probably" supported the slogan because "Palestinians and Israelis should live together in one state." But when informed of recent polls in which most Palestinians and Israelis rejected the one-state solution, this student lost his enthusiasm. So did 41% of students in that group.

A third group of students claimed the chant called for a Palestine to replace Israel. Sixty percent of those students reduced their support for the slogan when they learned it would entail the subjugation, expulsion or annihilation of seven million Jewish and two million Arab Israelis. Yet another 14% of students reconsidered their stance when they read that many American Jews considered the chant to be threatening, even racist. (This argument had a weaker effect on students who self-identified as progressive, despite their alleged sensitivity to offensive speech.)

In all, after learning a handful of basic facts about the Middle East, 67.8% of students went from supporting "from the river to sea" to rejecting the mantra. These students had never seen a map of the Mideast and knew little about the region's geography, history or demography. Those who hope to encourage extremism depend on the political ignorance of their audiences. It is time for good teachers to join the fray and combat bias with education.

Hi,

My name is Chris and I am a Berkeley resident in District 1.

I am once again writing to demand that Berkeley City Council pass a ceasefire resolution calling for 1) a total and permanent ceasefire, 2) FULL humanitarian aid allowed to enter Gaza, 3) an end to Israel's siege on Gaza and violence in the West Bank, and 4) no more weapons or funding to the Israeli military.

Just yesterday, the United Nations World Food Programme reported that HALF of Gaza's population of 2.3 million people are starving due to the Israeli Army's total siege of Gaza.

The genocide in Gaza is directly connected to Berkeley because (1) Berkeley tax dollars are paying for the bombs and military equipment that the US government provides to the Israeli army to make this genocide possible, (2) Palestinian community members in Berkeley have lost and continue to lose family, friends, and others in Palestine who are killed by the bombs and military equipment our tax dollars are paying for, and (3) the dehumanization of Palestinians that this genocide requires is harming Palestinian folks in Berkeley, as well as the broader Arab and Muslim communities.

I am a graduate student and resident of Berkeley, and I am writing to urge you to pass a formal resolution that calls for an immediate and permanent ceasefire in Gaza. We want you to pass either the People's Resolution or Councilmember Ben Bartlett's resolution with NO amendments. We want you to schedule a special meeting with members of the Palestinian community in Berkeley to determine the resolution that aligns most with their priorities.

Several council members have revealed their allegiance to special interest groups, and have not shown good faith. Many of you have neglected to meet with the Berkeley community's diverse voices who have been demanding a ceasefire. Instead, you are advocating against a ceasefire resolution and running away from us during city council meetings. You need to listen to us, not ignore us.

Berkeley has historically been on the forefront of anti-war, civil rights and human rights movements. Berkeley bravely led the charge to divest from apartheid South Africa. Refusing to call for a ceasefire or trying to pass a resolution that is aligned with a genocidal government is a stain on Berkeley's progressive history.

Israel has broken many international laws, including preventing the entry of food, water, fuel, and humanitarian aid into Gaza. Israel has also forced over 1.7 million people from their homes in an act of ethnic cleansing, as defined by the United Nations.

The dehumanization of Palestinians and extreme escalation in violence is no doubt the final stage of genocide. The United Nations and human rights organizations and leaders around the world have called for an immediate ceasefire and unrestricted humanitarian aid to the people of Gaza, citing numerous violations of international law. But our own national leaders have not, and are instead offering MORE unconditional military aid to Israel as it completely destroys Gaza.

We, your constituents, demand our local elected officials to exercise their power to influence our state representatives and senators to call for a permanent ceasefire. Our heads of state are ignoring our demands, so we need your help to amplify our voices. We cannot stay silent while our taxes fund the extermination of the Palestinians. This issue WILL determine elections next November, as the people will refuse to vote for anyone who stays silent when our government commits genocide.

We, the people of Berkeley, have sent you hundreds of emails with text of a resolution drafted by your constituents. The following cities have also passed Resolutions for Ceasefire and Solidarity with Palestine as of November 29, 2023: Oakland, CA; Richmond, CA; Providence, RI; Cudahy, CA; Seattle, WA; and Easton, PA.

Dear Berkeley City Council,

I thank you again for doing your best to contain a persistently hostile environment at the city council meeting last night. It pains me to continue seeing my elected officials harassed, called names, and bullied. Rest assured, the majority of Berkeley does *not* feel this way, but our voices are being drowned in a sea of hate.

I spoke briefly in person last night, amidst boos, on behalf of my son and other Jews in Berkeley, for whom the bullying, name-calling, and property theft during meetings jeopardizes their physical and emotional safety. Many of us, still mourning the deaths of friends and family in an ongoing war, cannot hold the weight of grieving and being attacked in our Berkeley community simultaneously. It is too much.

One of the most ironic moments occurred during my speech, in which protestors yelled "white supremacist" at me when I shared that my Jewish kids feel unsafe in BUSD, for they made a very un-Berkeley assumption that my kids (and Jews, for that matter) are all white. So what does it feel like to be a Black Jewish kid in Berkeley right now? My son initially shrugged and told me he felt "ok, I guess" at Berkeley High, despite the rising incidents of antisemitism, because "well, I'm Black...so nobody thinks I'm Jewish...." While using one marginalized status to protect another is too much to unpack in one e-mail, my son has more recently begun intentionally censoring himself to avoid harassment (including leaving his Jewish heritage out of his ancestry project for his ethnic studies class)...students who did share their Jewish identities in their projects were harassed and their assignments were vandalized with "Free Palestine!" written all over them.

# \*\*Action Item\*\*

I am asking this council to focus its energy on its <u>LOCAL</u> Jewish and Palestinian residents with family in <u>Israel/Gaza</u> instead of drafting a resolution on the war. I ask this council to instead organize an apolitical "solidarity in grief" round table discussion and meal, catered by our local Palestinian and Jewish restaurants. An invitational unity event, an event truly "United Against Hate" is what Berkeley *really* needs right now, as drafting a resolution would say that <u>this council condones hate speech, harassment, and theft</u> as an acceptable way to bully elected officials into adopting hateful groupthink. Cowering to bullying will further divide the Berkeley community, making *all* residents unsafe. Furthermore, it will embolden groups to continue using harassment as an effective tool to attack the city council during every future controversial issue. Stand strong, stand in peace, and keep this hate out of Berkeley. Thank You!

I have included pictures of myself and oldest son, Ezra, praying at the Western Wall (the sole remnant of our desecrated temple) in Jerusalem as a toddler, making Bedouin coffee with our friends on the Gaza border, and in present day in his full Bar Mitzvah attire. One of our core Jewish values, "Tikkun Olam, מִיקון עוֹלָם" translates our commitment to "repairing of the world." Peace is possible.

Dear Councilmembers--

I am a resident of Berkeley with three young children. I moved here so we could raise our kids in an inclusive, progressive, tolerant and liberal environment.

My heart breaks for all of the pain and suffering in Gaza, the West Bank, and in Israel. War is terrible, and social media it feels vital and ever-present. I understand that many of my neighbors want to do something about it. But passing resolutions in our city council will not save innocent lives, rescue hostages or end this war. But it will cause real harm to the already fraying fabric of our diverse community.

A month ago I never imagined that my lifelong commitment to a vibrant, tolerant, liberal-democratic Israel--my mother's home--would cause me to be banned from one of my favorite restaurants in Berkeley, would lead to confrontations with masked protesters with no personal connection to Palestine or Israel on campus and at the north berkeley BART, would make us reconsider whether our children will be safe from implicit and explicit anti-semitism in BUSD. I'm shattered to see how seamlessly and casually Anti-Israel rhetoric crosses into Anti-Jewish feeling at protests and in schools.

I realize that those agitating for the council to "take a side" are loud and they are passionate. But please, please listen to your constituents who are busy working and putting our kids to sleep and cannot attend council meetings. We may not be able to match the volume of the "Pro-Palestine" faction but we are no less passionate, and we are tremendously worried about deepening the divisions in our home. And please remember that just as Anti-Palestine rhetoric easily bleeds into Islamophobia, Anti-Israel rhetoric bleeds into anti-semitism. Both must be recognized as harmful.

I am once again writing to demand that Berkeley City Council pass a ceasefire resolution calling for 1) a total and permanent ceasefire, 2) FULL humanitarian aid allowed to enter Gaza, 3) an end to Israel's siege on Gaza and violence in the West Bank, and 4) no more weapons or funding to the Israeli military.

20,000 Palestinians have been killed including 10,000 children and 50,000 more have been injured. 85% of Gazans - 2 MILLION people - have been displaced from their homes and are living in tents or worse as winter descends and rain floods the streets. The UN, WHO, and human rights organizations are warning that Gazans are at dire risk of dying of starvation, thirst, and disease because of the Israeli total siege on food, water, medical aid, fuel, and electricity in the Gaza strip. Recently we have seen the Israeli army mass kidnap Palestinian civilians, strip them to their underwear, and march them to massive ditches in Gaza where they are forced to the ground for photoshoots. This is sexual abuse and humiliation as a tactic of war, which is a war crime.

The genocide in Gaza is DIRECTLY connected to Berkeley because (1) Berkeley taxpayer dollars are literally paying for the bombs and military equipment that the US government provides to the Israeli army to perpetrate this genocide and (2) the dehumanization of Palestinians that this genocide requires is harming folks in our Berkeley community and in the United States more broadly.

The BARE MINIMUM we can do as a Berkeley community is to pass a ceasefire resolution. We have a moral and political responsibility to do so.

Dear Berkeley Mayor and City council,

We are a collective of teachers in the Bay Area who are working hard to support teachers as they struggle to meet the moment. Many might question the practicality of a resolution that calls for our federal government's action on an international issue, but as educators, we can see clear as day that this issue impacts everyone here in the United States.

- 1) Our students are watching a genocide, as described by the United Nations and international human rights groups, on social media. Our young people need support and guidance, and they often turn to their teachers to help them process difficult and complex topics. However, educators around the country are being muzzled. We are experiencing extreme censorship and intimidation. Two teachers in LA have already been put on leave for teaching their students about Palestine and reading a simple story called "Sitti's Bird" and discussing what humans need to be able to live. Teachers here in the Bay Area have been doxxed, and their private social media posts are being used in complaints with the school district. The JCRC is putting political pressure on elected officials in school districts to prevent districts from being able to simply teach about the history of Palestine and Israel.
- 2) Teachers are trained professionals. We are trained in critical media literacy, in critical thinking, and we know how to teach delicate issues (generally). This particular issue is only made complex because of the intense backlash that educators are receiving for simply talking about the issue of Palestine and especially for expressing any support for the Palestinian people. The Bay Area has a long history of taking the lead on progressive movements, especially anti-war movements, and our educators are on the fore-front of support children as they navigate such a complex world. We deserve to be able to do with work without fear.
- 3) The US plays a unique role in the Israel-Palestine issue. Our country's leadership and policies directly enable the wide-spread oppression of the Palestinian people. Rather than investing in public education, our government spends \$3.8 billion per year to support Israel's military occupation of the Palestinians. Educators in this country are underpaid and mistreated. We often spend our own money to buy supplies for our classrooms and we have to beg for funding using online fundraisers. Educators are doing what we can to teach children as whole human beings, and in the process, we are asked to fill many gaps that exist in public schools due to a severe lack of funding.

The strongest possible resolution would address the role of the United States and would demand the following:

- 1) An immediate and permanent ceasefire
- 2) Immediate and massive humanitarian aid to the Palestinian people
- 3) An immediate end to settler violence in the West Bank
- 4) Condemnation of antisemitism, islamaphobia, racism, xenophobia and all forms of hateful, identity based rhetoric and actions

- 5) Condemnation of the widespread attacks, intimidation, and threats in the US against pro-Palestinian voices, including public officials and the general labor force
- 6) Berkeley's full divestment from Israel for as long as it breaks international law
- 7) An immediate halt to US military aid to Israel and redirect funds to the needs of US citizens and residents, including public education, affordable housing, medical care, and more
- 8) Support for a ceasefire by state and federal officials
- 9) Diplomatic resolutions that address the root of the violence in Israel and Palestine, which is the unlawful occupation and systematic oppression of Palestinians

The question of Palestine is nothing new, and all elected officials have the moral responsibility to stand up for what is right. In taking this stand, you provide another layer of protection to Americans here who have been courageously fighting for Palestinian freedom. You provide support to educators across the Bay Area who can look to local leadership as they do the very tough work of engaging our young people in difficult but necessary work.

A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Berkeley, California Affirming the City's Support and Solidarity with the Palestinian People of Gaza and in line with Rep. Cori Bush's Congressional Resolution Calling for An Immediate De-Escalation and Cease-Fire in Israel and Occupied Palestine

WHEREAS, Israel's conflation of anti-Semitism with anti-Zionism and solidarity with Palestinians is recognized by legal scholars and human rights organizations, including Israel's B'Tselem, as a political tool to silence critics of Israel. It also creates fear among Jews, who are rightly alarmed by anti-Semitic words and actions due to the horrors of pogroms and the Holocaust in Europe; and

WHEREAS, 1,200 Israelis have been killed by Hamas on October 7th and nearly 13,000 Palestinians have been killed by the state of Israel in this escalated conflict, including over 5,500 children (as of 11/19/2023) - the death toll increasing each day and includes Americans who have been killed; and

WHEREAS, All human life is precious, and the targeting of civilians, no matter their faith or ethnicity, is a violation of international humanitarian law; and

WHEREAS, We mourn the loss of all civilian lives lost on both sides from October 7, 2023, to the present and also throughout the decades of displacement, occupation, oppression, and blockade endured in Gaza, East Jerusalem, and the West Bank; and

WHEREAS, In violation of international law, Israel has maintained 16 years of complete sea, air, and land siege on goods and travel, which had already created 42% unemployment, 84% reliance on international humanitarian aid, 41% undernourishment, 60% anemia among children, and innumerable deaths from curable diseases:

WHEREAS, Israel's past bombings of Gaza, the main ones in 2009, 2012, and 2014 had already curtailed the ability to make a living by destroying agricultural plots, orchards, and chicken coops, destroyed the infrastructure, including

desalination and wastewater treatment plants. And any attempts to rebuild it had been stifled by Israel limiting access to electricity and fuel to no more than four continued hours per day; and

WHEREAS, Prior to the current crisis, only 1% of Gazans had access to safe drinking water, leaving the population – half of whom are children –vulnerable to waterborne diseases, infections, and dehydration.

WHEREAS, The World Health Organization states that in an emergency, every person needs between 7.5 to 20 liters of clean water, Gazans have now access to only 3 liters, and some people have been drinking highly saline and contaminated seawater, which has already resulted in cases of chickenpox, scabies, and diarrhea and could easily lead to the spread of cholera; and

WHEREAS, There is a consensus among the human rights organizations and the UN that Israel has turned the Gaza Strip, which is one of the most densely populated places on Earth, into "the world's largest open-air prison", even prior to this conflict; and

WHEREAS, Israel's actions had already endangered the health of Gazans and the environment, by causing sewage and solid waste to pile up on the streets and over 130,000 cubic meters of wastewater to be discharged daily into the Mediterranean Sea; and

WHEREAS, Hundreds of thousands of lives are in imminent danger if a ceasefire is not achieved humanitarian aid is not delivered immediately; and

WHEREAS, The humanitarian pauses and safe havens have been violated by Israeli; and

WHEREAS, Collective punishment is considered a war crime under international law, and refers to a form of sanction imposed on persons or a group of persons in response to a crime committed by one of them or a member of the group; and

WHEREAS, Israel's indiscriminate bombings of Gaza are a form of collective punishment, recognized as a war crime (Common Article 33 of the Fourth Geneva Convention and Article 4 of the Additional Protocol II) and also a violation of International Humanitarian Law, which requires observance of the principles of distinction (attacking only military targets) and proportionality (the anticipated military gains outweigh harm to civilians); and

WHEREAS, Israel's shutting off all access to electricity, drinking water, food, and humanitarian aid is a form of collective punishment and constitutes a war crime under international law; and

WHEREAS, Ethnic cleansing refers to the creation of an ethnically homogenous geographic area through the elimination of unwanted ethnic groups by deportation, forcible displacement, or genocide; and

WHEREAS, Israel has engaged in an ethnic cleansing campaign by explicitly requiring two million Palestinians to leave Gaza immediately or risk being bombed in their homes and has intensified its unprovoked killing and forced displacement of Palestinians in the West Bank to uninhabitable areas; and

WHEREAS, Israel has violated international law by not ending its military occupation of East Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Gaza, which began in 1967; and

WHEREAS, The International Humanitarian Law holds an occupying force responsible for the safety and well-being of the inhabitants of the land it occupies, Israel has been settling the foreign nationals of Jewish descent on the occupied land, driving away Palestinians from their land through acts of terror, confining them to small incongruent areas, demolishing their homes, businesses, and orchards, etc.; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. government holds immense diplomatic power to save Palestinian and Israeli lives but has refused to take serious action to do so; and

WHEREAS, The state of Israel would not be able to maintain its military occupation of East Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Gaza without enormous military aid provided by the United States every year, thereby also depriving Americans of money for their own urgent needs; and

WHEREAS, The 14.3 billion requested from the Biden Administration in October 2023 in addition to the 3.8 billion in military aid provided annually by the United States to Israel is derived from American taxpayer money. However, a Reuters poll released on November 15, 2023, states that 68% of Americans agreed that "Israel should call a ceasefire and try to negotiate" demonstrating the majority of Americans do not support the continued military aid; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the City of Berkeley

- 1) Urges the Biden Administration to immediately call for and facilitate de-escalation and a ceasefire to urgently end the current violence; and
- 2) Calls upon the Biden administration to promptly send and facilitate the entry of humanitarian assistance to Gaza; and
- 3) Calls for the end of the Israeli siege on Gaza, the end of the blockade in Gaza, and the occupation of the West Bank; and
- 4) Demands that the Biden administration to immediately end all existing and future military aid to Israel in order to fund urgent needs in the United States such as homelessness, food insecurity, and education; and
- 5) Calls upon the immediate release of all the Palestinians who have been arrested in Israel, Jerusalem, and the West Bank since October 7, 2023; and
- 6) Calls upon the immediate release of the approximately 220 Israeli hostages held by Hamas.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City of Berkeley advocates for the dignity and safety of residents in every community, regardless of what crimes its leadership may commit, and that peaceful diplomacy is the only way to achieve this safety and dignity.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, The City of Berkeley stands in solidarity with the Palestinian people of Gaza, who are currently facing ethnic cleansing and collective punishment by the state of Israel; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City of Berkeley vows to combat antisemitism, islamophobia, and ethnonationalism in all its forms; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City of Berkeley rejects Israel's conflation of anti-Zionism and solidarity with Palestinian people with anti-Semitism for political gains; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City of Berkeley endorses the Congressional Resolution submitted by Representatives Cori Bush (MO-01), Rashida Tlaib (MI-12), André Carson (IN-07), Summer Lee (PA-12), and Delia C. Ramirez (IL-03), alongside Representatives Jamaal Bowman (NY-16), Bonnie Watson Coleman (NJ-12), Jesús "Chuy" García (IL-04), Jonathan Jackson (IL-01), Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez (NY-14), Ilhan Omar (MN-05), Ayanna Pressley (MA-07), and Nydia Velázquez (NY-07) and urges our Congressional Representative, Rep. Barbara Lee, and California's Congressional delegation to vote in support of the resolution.

Hi Berkeley City Council Members,

My name is Tal Garner. I am a proud Jewish Berkeley resident and have always prided myself on coming from a city that's so inclusive and diverse. I'm sending this email again because I really need you to see it, and I'm not sure how many people read my last one due to the Thanksgiving holiday.

My life has not been the same since October 7. Every day has been a reminder of the hatred toward Jews and toward Israel, and that people will believe anything as long as it's against Jewish people. It is shocking, sickening and sad. I am also half Israeli. I do not agree with the Israeli government, have attended many protests against Netenyahu, and would like to point out that *Israeli people do not equate the government*. Just as you would not want to be murdered for being American during Trump's term, I do not think there should be any justification for Israelis being murdered under Netenyahu's leadership. It is awful that so many people cannot understand that there must be a distinct separation made.

When Richmond (and now Alameda Country, and the city of Oakland) passed their Pro-Palestine resolution, MANY Jewish people felt unsupported and invisible due to the resolution using antisemitic remarks at a time where we are already scared to be who we are. These resolutions passed in other cities ignored the attack of October 7, and only focused on 'Freedom for Palestine', with no regard to the hostages still being kept in Gaza (now, over one month later) and with no regard to the slaughtering of innocent civilians in Israel. Even yesterday, at the Oakland city meeting, ONE council member asked for amendments to be added acknowledging the attack on Israel and he was rejected. Then, he begged for the word 'coexist' to be added, and people boo'ed him, saying they don't want Israel to exist. It is CLEAR that these resolutions are one-sided.

While a resolution calling for peace would and should be supported, resolutions that call for an immediate ceasefire with NO mention of **all** the hostages being released as a part of that ceasefire, and with NO mention of the October 7 attack on Israel, is only beneficial to Palestinian people. Of course, for people who want to ignore the root cause of this war, this is great. For those of us who are waiting and praying each day for the children in Israel to be given back to their families, it is extremely heartbreaking and disappointing that somehow the hostages are forgotten - perhaps because they were taken from Israel? It seems like nobody cares.

I am begging you to stand up against anti semitism. If you ever wondered how people could sit back during the Holocaust, I am letting you know that what you are doing now is what you would have done then. Would you have stood up against anti semitism, or stood with the Nazis with the excuse that they were fighting for their freedom? It is the same thing, it's just that we are now in 2023 instead of 1938. Hating Jews is a tale as old as time, and I urge Berkeley not to support it.

On November 28, there will be a Berkeley city council meeting in which many Pro Palestine people are asking to pass their resolution for 'Ceasefire and Solidarity with Palestine'. They use words such as "Israel's occupation" (Israel pulled ALL troops out of Gaza in 2005, so I'm curious what occupation they're referring to?) and using the term genocide, which is one-sided, unfair seeing as death is unfortunately inevitable during a time of war and still ignores the genocide against Israelis on October 7. Why is the attack of Oct 7 not mentioned once? Why are Pro Palestine people not acknowledging

that Palestinian lives would be better off without Hamas as their government? Why is this resolution not for peace, but rather only for standing with Palestine? If you cannot see that it is clearly only benefitting one group of people and supporting hatred toward the other, it seems our education system hasn't done its job and needs a closer look.

Hundreds of Israeli families live and work in Berkeley. We acknowledge and mourn the loss of Palestinian lives, however have yet to see Pro-Palestine rallies acknowledge and mourn our people who have been killed and are being held captive. When these resolutions are passed, they are not doing anything but dividing the community further. We are already scared to wear our star of David necklaces out in public, synagogues are in constant discussion of how to protect our members, and I was actually hushed in a store the other day for speaking Hebrew. This should not be acceptable.

If Berkeley wants to stand against hate, and REALLY stand against hate, I am asking you, again, not to pass a resolution that will only give one side the power and support to continue antisemitic behavior. These types of resolutions are not inclusive, but rather one-sided. While the resolution is disguised as being for 'solidarity with Palestine,' the timing in which they bring it to you is pretty obviously anti Israel, we can all agree, right? And while some may say that Israel deserved it for their "occupation", I personally do NOT think there is anything freedom-fighting about raping women, beheading children, and kidnapping innocent civilians who lived and worked peacefully close to the Gaza border. I also do not celebrate the murder of any innocent life, whether they are Palestinian or Jewish.

Please do the right thing and do not pass a one-sided resolution. A ceasefire MUST include all hostages being brought back to their families alive. Dear Mayor Arreguin, Ms. Hahn and council members,

I'm a Berkeley resident of 3 years (district 5), and a Bay Area resident of over 15 years. My kids are both very happy to be in a public BUSD elementary.

I have been so proud how both you and our school board have handled this conflict so far- and I am so sorry that your meetings and work have been disrupted repeatedly over these last few weeks. I did virtually attend the meeting a couple of weeks ago.

I am writing to share my very strong commitment that the Berkeley City Council should not take a public position in the current Israel-Hamas conflict. The current conflict is part of a deeply painful, complicated situation that has truly global agitants and implications. The fact that this issue has been the subject of so much media, dialogue, negotiation, and analysis by experts in the field who clearly cannot reach a consensus, means that any position taken by our humble City's institutions aligning with one side or the other would necessarily be reductionist and ignore people's truths.

Moreover, aligning, or even highlighting one side's position over the other will have an unnecessarily divisive impact on our diverse Berkeley Community. The City Council would effectively choose a side to overlook, gaslight, and marginalize. Second, although the Berkeley Council would have virtually no impact on the conflict itself, making a statement or taking a stand most certainly would divide, inflame, provoke and polarize your constituents here in Berkeley. Why would you do that? Have you noticed the rise in anti-Muslim and anti-Semitic incidents across the country? It would be, to put it mildly, irresponsible to fan the flames and make it more likely that we experience hateful incidents here in Berkeley.

l ask that you keep your energy focused on Berkeley -- on running the city -- and thank you for your service to our Berkeley community.

Dear Mayor and City Council members,

My name is Rachel and have been a resident of Berkeley since 2016 with my husband and three children. We relocated to Berkeley to live in a city that prides itself on embracing all people and is home to an incredibly accepting and thriving Jewish community. Our kids have been so incredibly fortunate to grow up in Berkeley where they have felt safe to be Jewish without a moment of hesitation to wear Jewish stars and talk about their religion with friends and neighbors in our community.

We have been protecting them from the news about the 400% increase in antisemitic incidents in this country since Oct 7, the horrendous rhetoric in the local protests and on UCB campus so they are still not scared to be Jewish and my 12-year-old son is still not scared to roam freely with his friends wearing kippas at the parks in Berkeley after Shabbat services.

However, amid the rise in antisemitism since Oct 7, I'm not sure how long this window of freedom will be open, particularly if the City Council decides to make any kind of one-sided statement about the Israel/Gaza conflict as was the case in Oakland last night and in Richmond weeks ago that are being requested by the loudest voices, but not the vast majority of residents who just want the City to handle the numerous local issues (housing, state-of good repair, fire and life safety, etc.). While I've understood that Council is not considering a resolution like the other cities, statements can be just as divisive. These statements being requested will only incite more anti-Israel, antisemitic rhetoric and actions such as we're seeing at Berkeley High and King Middle School where at a walk out kids were shouting KKK and "F\*\*\* the Jews."

I highly urge you not to buckle to the pressure of folks that are showing up to meetings throwing money, screaming, making obscene one-sided comments and not letting Council conduct its business. I highly urge you not to make a statement on the current Israel-Hamas war.

Making any kind of statement on this conflict requires an incredibly in-depth knowledge of the middle east, the Jewish diaspora, the Holocaust, the programs and genocide committed on Jewish people throughout history. A statement would need to recognize the complexity and genesis of the conflict and how Palestinian terror organizations have been a huge obstacle to peace in the region. This isn't black and white - oppressed against oppressors, colonized against colonizers. And any statement that delves into these sorts of issues must also include clear unequivocal condemnation of antisemitism - note that the Jewish population in the US is 2.4% and it receives over 60% of the religious-based hate crime (<a href="https://www.bbc.com/news/world-us-canada-67281042">https://www.bbc.com/news/world-us-canada-67281042</a>). If not, this teaching will only foster less understanding and more hate for the generations to come.

I'd also like to point out that one of the groups with a very loud voice is Jewish Voice for Peace (JVP), while vocal in Berkeley, does not represent the vast majority of Bay Area Jews (or the Jewish diaspora for that matter). A <u>professional poll</u> of Bay Area Jews conducted in 2022 found that: "The vast majority of survey participants (89%) agree that Israel has the right to exist as a Jewish and democratic state —a basic marker of Zionism" (p. 15). This data makes clear how unrepresentative JVP, an avowed anti-Zionist organization, is when it comes to how most Jews feel about Israel. JVP provides convenient cover to groups and organizations that seek Israel's destruction because they hold up

their Jewishness. To be clear, there are always small fringes within any community that speak loudly and are at odds with the majority. The Council should not give any more deference to JVP's opinion on the Hamas-Israel war than they would Kanye West's opinion on the subject of Black Lives Matter. JVP and Kanye are both entitled to their perspectives, but that does not make them either representative or authoritative with regards to the perspectives of mainstream Jewish or African American communities.

We are at a critical juncture where our council member's decisions will influence whether our community becomes more divided, putting marginalized residents at increasing risk of hate crimes, or becomes more united. I appreciate that this council has not considered any resolutions on the Israel/Hamas war thus far, despite mounting pressure, and I urge you to continue to keep our community safe and productive by:

- 1) Continuing to focus on Berkeley-specific issues, not international issues.
- 2) Banning disruptive individuals from city council meetings.
- 3) Communicating with BUSD regarding the large increase in antisemitism our students are experiencing without consequences for perpetrators

Dear Mayor Arreguin, Councilmember Hahn, and other members of the Berkeley City Council,

I urge you NOT to consider any resolution on Israel or the current war there, including any statement that seeks to placate everyone with a stake in this issue. No matter how "fair and balanced" it is, however noble your aim, you will satisfy no one at best and sow more division, anger, and aggression at worst.

I'm a resident of District 5 and the father of 2 students at Berkeley High School. For the first time in my 18 years living in Berkeley, I've found some of the anti-Israel rhetoric here very disturbing, including much misinformation and bias my sons have experienced at their school. Anything that the City Council as a body states publicly will only perpetuate this climate by further empowering the vociferous and strident views that feed this negative, highly charged atmosphere of accusation and retribution.

I am a Jewish American who firmly opposes the policies of Israeli right-wing hardliners. I have even participated in protests against Netanyahu. I'm pained by the death of thousands of Gazans in the current war and by the treatment of Palestinians more broadly. However, I also firmly and unequivocally believe in the right of Israel to exist, with all its flaws and indecencies. These two sets of beliefs can be held at the same time, but to hear the public discourse now you'd think the concept of Israel as an independent state should be questioned as a matter of principle. This question was concluded with the establishment of Israel in 1948. Millions of Jews were born and live there. They are not "going back." I cannot overstate how threatening and appalling this agenda of undermining Jewish statehood is to Jews in this country and around the world.

I'm not opposed to the City Council taking a stand on a political issue. I would guestion the timing and purpose of speaking on this one specific issue, though, especially if it fails to condemn the murderous rampage of Hamas, as other recent city resolutions have done. The generic condemnation of "antisemitism and Islamophobia" satisfies no one. Such statements are particularly toothless without reference to Oct. 7, the biggest single act of antisemitism against Jews since World War II. Rather, I fear any statement by the City Council will amplify the loudest and most divisive voices in our community, who spew distorted vitriol about Israel, its history, and its legitimate right to exist. Bowing to the demands of these voices will further alienate and endanger Jewish constituents, a minority that already feels unsafe and threatened by rising antisemitism, both subtle and overt, in our community.

Dear Berkeley City Council and respected government officials,

I am writing to you as a citizen who is very concerned about the safety and wellbeing of all the residents in Berkeley.

Since the passing of the Richmond resolution, which used dehumanizing antisemitic tropes, I have seen an increase in Jew-hatred in the east bay, with my own eyes. Businesses have been vandalized, synagogues have had to pay for expensive extra security, and Jews have been denied service at restaurants. Personally, I have received explicitly antisemitic messages with no provocation except for my mere existence as a Jew. We need this to stop. Please focus on the myriad local issues in Berkeley, instead of shifting the focus to a complex international conflict that cannot and will not be solved by passing a one-sided resolution.

As the various announcements on the upcoming meeting - one titled: Berkeley For Palestine" - and the comments during other cities' discussions on similar resolutions show, the call for a cease fire, is used as an opportunity to challenge the very existence of Israel.

Yesterday I listened to the public comments on Oakland's cease fire resolution. I sat and listened to more than four hours of anti-Israel rhetoric laced with lies, hate, bigotry, and plain ignorance.

Inflammatory terms such as genocide, apartheid, ethnic cleansing, colonialism, imperialism, and more, were repeated again and again, until accepted as truth.

There was nothing Israel wasn't blamed for, from homelessness, to the use of fossil fuel, to lack of asthma medicine in the pharmacy, and everything in between. It was pure Israel bashing. Just replace "Jews" for "Israel", and it reminds same hateful rhetoric eighty years ago.

And that is not such a far fetch association. Considering that there were, and presently there are, many conflicts throughout the world that claim lives of children many times over, and are much less complex than the Palestinians- Israel conflict, none eliciting such vehemence and hatred, none prompting resolution by this city council or others, one must asks whether the issue is really the cease fire in Gaza. Which brings me to the specific allegations being hurled at Israel.

SOME FACTS ON APARTHEID, GENOCIDE, and ETHNIC CLEANSING:

When we speak of ethnic cleaning, from a population of almost a million Jews in 10 Muslim countries before 1948, the population today has declined to less than 15,000!

On the other hand, the Arab citizens and permanent residents in Israel make up just over 20% of the country's population.

Speaking of genocide: The growth rate of the Arab population in Israel is 2.2%, while the growth rate of the Jewish population in Israel is 1.8%. And in Gaza and the West Bank the population growth rate is among the

highest in the world: 3.4 percent in the West Bank and 4.0 percent in Gaza. https://www.prb.org/resources/the-west-bank-and-gaza-a-population-profile/

On the other hand, the Hamas charter calls for straight out genocide of all Jews: "The Day of Judgment will not come about until Moslems fight Jews and kill them. Then, the Jews will hide behind rocks and trees, and the rocks and trees will cry out: 'O Moslem, there is a Jew hiding behind me, come and kill him." (Article 7)

Speaking of Apartheid: as of 2020, Arabs made up 17% of Israel's doctors, 24% of the nurses, and 48% of the pharmacists. An Arab is sitting on the Supreme Court of Israel, and there are many other judges in lower courts.

On the other hand, a Palestinian wishing to have a business in Kuwait, must take as partner a Kuwaiti, who does nothing, except shares the profits.

Clearly, if Israel is attempting to commit ethnic cleaning, genocide, and apartheid, it does it very inefficiently.

Most of those who opposed the Oakland resolution simply asked that it would also include a denunciation of the Hamas and the atrocities it committed on 10/7. That was vehemently rejected by those supporting the resolution. If peace in the Middle East is what everyone wants, why this modification, which gives some context to Israel's recent activities in Gaza, would draw such a fierce resistance. Aren't Israeli kids' lives matter too?

If we don't recognize the problem with Hamas in terms of initiating the violence, how are we to obtain peace with a resolution calling for a cease fire, when there was a cease fire in effect when the Hamas attacked on 10/7?

Sadly and alarmingly, it should be noted that many of the Oakland speakers denied that there was a massacre on 10/7, altogether. Some said it was Israel who killed its own citizens. Some exalted the Hamas as a freedom fighter organization. Some booed when the atrocities of the Hamas were mentioned. Still others said that if there was any killing, it was justified.

And the feeling of Deja Vu grew stronger and stronger.

I expect Berkeley will be no different, in rhetoric and emotions.

There seems to be an anti-Israel hysteria sweeping the nation. No doubt you are pressured to join in. It will be easy to join in. But should you? What will be achieved except more divisiveness, more hate, polarization, and an invitation to more groups to demand that the city make its own complex international agenda, the city's agenda.

And there is the equally important question, where does the city council get this mandate to speak for the people in Berkeley when nobody elected the council members because of their stance on Middle East peace.

I call on the Berkeley City Council to not call on any resolution of this kind. We all saw the violence at the council meeting. You have the privilege and the responsibility to keep all Berkeley residents and visitors safe.







As a Jew and because I am Jewish, and as a human and because I am human: represent the humanity of your constituents by standing in solidarity with the global demand for a ceasefire in Gaza. Enough is enough. The single greatest threat to Jews here and abroad are the genocidal acts of a rogue state that has the audacity to invoke our faith and our persecution.

I have experienced very real antisemitism: when my family moved to North Carolina for work during my grade school years, I was relentlessly bullied for being a "Jewish witch" and eventually had to be homeschooled. My family's house was later spray painted with swastikas. As with the vast majority of antisemitic hate crime incidents in the US, these acts were perpetrated by white supremacists-- the very same groups who torment and kill Arab and Muslim Americans, like the three Palestinian students who were shot in Vermont two weeks ago. One of the greatest joys I've experienced as an adult back in Berkeley has been finding Jewish community again, and more so now than ever among the broad and diverse Jews standing together to demand an end to this senseless and depraved violence.

What makes me unsafe now is the absurd and utterly false conflation of my Jewish identity with Zionism and the Israeli government, and the exploitation of legitimate fear and pain to silence what should be the least controversial plea: stop killing children. What makes me unsafe is relentless harassment by Israel's defenders in Berkeley and beyond, who have called me a "terrorist," a "Shiksa c\*nt," a "Jihadist," a "traitor," a "fake Jew" -- all for nothing more than saying I'm a Jew who supports a ceasefire. I have been told "I hope you get raped by Hamas" more times than I can count-- a particularly cruel irony given that my dear Israeli friend was raped by IDF soldiers during her training. Sexual violence is never ok; threatening and leveraging it to justify further violence-- including sexual violence! -- is appalling and sickening.

I shouldn't be surprised by any of this. I was heavily indoctrinated by Israeli propaganda throughout my Jewish upbringing. At my Jewish summer camp, we sang the Israeli national anthem every morning and were taught that the founding of Israel was the miracle of "a land without a people for a people without a land." It was all incredibly confusing for me, even as someone with family in Israel. On my Birthright trip, someone mentioned "occupied territory" and was quickly corrected "there's no such thing as occupied territory, it is all Israel." There was no secrecy around the aim of the program: "See, don't you want to make Aliyah [emigrate to Israel] and have your Jewish babies here?" I did not learn about the Nakba until I was thirty years old.

What really makes me unsafe? Seeing my neighbors and my government turn a blind eye to genocide. Witnessing the dehumanization and demonization my Muslim and Palestinian friends and colleagues face \*daily\*. A Berkeley City College professor has been publicly insinuating that more than 75% of Gaza residents are not civilians. Imagine hearing that as a Palestinian student in Berkeley. Imagine realizing that "Berkeley Stands United Against Hate" doesn't actually apply to you in a country that has committed billions of dollars to the destruction of your people.

Dear Councilmembers,

I am writing to call upon the longstanding spirit of activism and social justice that breathes in the heart of Berkeley, urging you to draft and pass a formal resolution in solidarity with Palestinians in Gaza, who are being subject to ethnic cleansing and genocide by the Israeli state backed by the United States. This resolution should:

- 1- Demand an immediate CEASEFIRE.
- 2- Demand immediate safe passage for substantial humanitarian aid to Gazans who have little to no food, water, fuel or medical supplies to save the almost 20,000 Palestinians injured (at the time of this writing);
- 3- Call for an immediate end to all existing and any future U.S. military aid and support to Israel; US taxpayer dollars that go to Israel in the form of \$3.8 billion in military "aid" per year are being used to further harm and kill Palestinians.
- 4 Call for an end to Israeli apartheid, the siege, the occupation and blockade of Palestinian land by Israeli military forces; and the systematic harassment of the Palestinian people, including stealing of land, burning of farms, and regular arrests of ordinary civilians.
- 5 Call for the immediate release of the approximately 3000 Palestinians who have been arrested in Israel (about 1500 people), including in Jerusalem, and the West Bank (another 1500 people) since Oct. 7th and the approximately 220 Israeli hostages held by Hamas.

Already, over 8000 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli airstrikes, with more than half of these being women and children. The numbers of displaced Palestinians with no homes to return to, could be as high as half a million people.

Berkeley, with its illustrious legacy of pioneering social justice movements, holds a responsibility to be at the vanguard of national calls for justice. Berkeley has been the crucible where powerful movements were forged; from the Free Speech Movement of the 1960s, to being one of the first cities in the US to divest from companies doing business with the apartheid regime in South Africa. These histories reflect our enduring

commitment to global justice and liberation, and advocacy for the voiceless and oppressed.

On Tuesday, October 24, our neighbors at the Richmond City Council exemplified moral leadership by passing a resolution standing against genocide in Gaza, making it the first U.S. city to stand on the right side of history on this critical issue. Inspired by their boldness, it is imperative that Berkeley continues its anti-apartheid and anti settler colonialism legacy by standing against the shadows of genocidal apartheid regimes.

Several council members have revealed their allegiance to special interest groups, and have not shown good faith. I am a resident of the city of Berkeley and I am writing to call upon the longstanding spirit of activism and social justice that breathes in the heart of Berkeley, urging you to pass a formal resolution in solidarity with Palestinians in Gaza, who are being subject to ethnic cleansing and genocide by the Israeli state backed by the United States. Within the greater context of the decades-long Israeli military occupation of the Palestinian people, and immediately following the October 7, 2023 attack by Hamas, the Israeli government declared "war" on Hamas. The IDF began indiscriminately bombing the Gaza strip, a 25 by 5-mile space dubbed "an open-air prison" that has been under complete blockade by Israel and the densely populated home of over 2.2 million Palestinian civilians, the majority of whom are refugees and descendants of refugees displaced from their Palestinian villages by Israel, and of whom over 47.5% are minors. As a result, the Israeli government has now been rightly accused of numerous war crimes by human rights groups and leaders of nations around the world. You have heard from countless members of Berkeley via Public Comment and email calling upon you, as the people's representatives, to pass this Resolution.

We, your constituents, have prepared a Resolution on your behalf - please see below. We call upon the Berkeley City Council to review the Resolution, make edits that are consistent with the spirit of our request, place the Resolution on the agenda as a time critical and urgency item, and please pass this Resolution. It is understood that the next public meeting is scheduled for November 28, but we encourage the council to schedule a special meeting sooner to pass this Resolution since it is an URGENCY ITEM. We'd also like to note that there are no direct financial implications since this is a Resolution.

The following cities have also passed Resolutions for Ceasefire and Solidarity with Palestine as of November 16, 2023: Richmond, CA; Providence, RI; Cudahy, CA; and Easton, PA. We hope the City of Berkeley will follow suit in this moral leadership.

Thank you for your attention and commitment to doing what is right for our community and the world.

A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Berkeley, California Affirming the City's Support and Solidarity with the Palestinian People of Gaza and in line with Rep. Cori Bush's Congressional Resolution Calling for An Immediate De-Escalation and Cease-Fire in Israel and Occupied Palestine

WHEREAS, Israel's conflation of anti-Semitism with anti-Zionism and solidarity with Palestinians is recognized by legal scholars and human rights organizations, including Israel's B'Tselem, as a political tool to silence

critics of Israel. It also creates fear among Jews, who are rightly alarmed by anti-Semitic words and actions due to the horrors of pogroms and the Holocaust in Europe; and

WHEREAS, 1,200 Israelis have been killed by Hamas on October 7th and nearly 13,000 Palestinians have been killed by the state of Israel in this escalated conflict, including over 5,500 children (as of 11/19/2023) - the death toll increasing each day and includes Americans who have been killed; and

WHEREAS, All human life is precious, and the targeting of civilians, no matter their faith or ethnicity, is a violation of international humanitarian law; and

WHEREAS, We mourn the loss of all civilian lives lost on both sides from October 7, 2023, to the present and also throughout the decades of displacement, occupation, oppression, and blockade endured in Gaza, East Jerusalem, and the West Bank; and

WHEREAS, In violation of international law, Israel has maintained 16 years of complete sea, air, and land siege on goods and travel, which had already created 42% unemployment, 84% reliance on international humanitarian aid, 41% undernourishment, 60% anemia among children, and innumerable deaths from curable diseases:

WHEREAS, Israel's past bombings of Gaza, the main ones in 2009, 2012, and 2014 had already curtailed the ability to make a living by destroying agricultural plots, orchards, and chicken coops, destroyed the infrastructure, including desalination and wastewater treatment plants. And any attempts to rebuild it had been stifled by Israel limiting access to electricity and fuel to no more than four continued hours per day; and

WHEREAS, Prior to the current crisis, only 1% of Gazans had access to safe drinking water, leaving the population – half of whom are children –vulnerable to waterborne diseases, infections, and dehydration.

WHEREAS, The World Health Organization states that in an emergency, every person needs between 7.5 to 20 liters of clean water, Gazans have now access to only 3 liters, and some people have been drinking highly saline and contaminated seawater, which has already resulted in cases of chickenpox, scabies, and diarrhea and could easily lead to the spread of cholera; and

WHEREAS, There is a consensus among the human rights organizations and the UN that Israel has turned the Gaza Strip, which is one of the most densely populated places on Earth, into "the world's largest open-air prison", even prior to this conflict; and

WHEREAS, Israel's actions had already endangered the health of Gazans and the environment, by causing sewage and solid waste to pile up on the streets and over 130,000 cubic meters of wastewater to be discharged daily into the Mediterranean Sea; and

WHEREAS, Hundreds of thousands of lives are in imminent danger if a ceasefire is not achieved humanitarian aid is not delivered immediately; and

WHEREAS, The humanitarian pauses and safe havens have been violated by Israeli; and

WHEREAS, Collective punishment is considered a war crime under international law, and refers to a form of sanction imposed on persons or a group of persons in response to a crime committed by one of them or a member of the group; and

WHEREAS, Israel's indiscriminate bombings of Gaza are a form of collective punishment, recognized as a war crime (Common Article 33 of the Fourth Geneva Convention and Article 4 of the Additional Protocol II) and also a violation of International Humanitarian Law, which requires observance of the principles of distinction (attacking only military targets) and proportionality (the anticipated military gains outweigh harm to civilians); and

WHEREAS, Israel's shutting off all access to electricity, drinking water, food, and humanitarian aid is a form of

collective punishment and constitutes a war crime under international law; and

WHEREAS, Ethnic cleansing refers to the creation of an ethnically homogenous geographic area through the elimination of unwanted ethnic groups by deportation, forcible displacement, or genocide; and

WHEREAS, Israel has engaged in an ethnic cleansing campaign by explicitly requiring two million Palestinians to leave Gaza immediately or risk being bombed in their homes and has intensified its unprovoked killing and forced displacement of Palestinians in the West Bank to uninhabitable areas; and

WHEREAS, Israel has violated international law by not ending its military occupation of East Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Gaza, which began in 1967; and

WHEREAS, The International Humanitarian Law holds an occupying force responsible for the safety and well-being of the inhabitants of the land it occupies, Israel has been settling the foreign nationals of Jewish descent on the occupied land, driving away Palestinians from their land through acts of terror, confining them to small incongruent areas, demolishing their homes, businesses, and orchards, etc.; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. government holds immense diplomatic power to save Palestinian and Israeli lives but has refused to take serious action to do so; and

WHEREAS, The state of Israel would not be able to maintain its military occupation of East Jerusalem, the West Bank, and Gaza without enormous military aid provided by the United States every year, thereby also depriving Americans of money for their own urgent needs; and

WHEREAS, The 14.3 billion requested from the Biden Administration in October 2023 in addition to the 3.8 billion in military aid provided annually by the United States to Israel is derived from American taxpayer money. However, a Reuters poll released on November 15, 2023, states that 68% of Americans agreed that "Israel should call a ceasefire and try to negotiate" demonstrating the majority of Americans do not support the continued military aid; and

#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the City of Berkeley

- 1) Urges the Biden Administration to immediately call for and facilitate de-escalation and a ceasefire to urgently end the current violence; and
- 2) Calls upon the Biden administration to promptly send and facilitate the entry of humanitarian assistance to Gaza: and
- 3) Calls for the end of the Israeli siege on Gaza, the end of the blockade in Gaza, and the occupation of the West Bank; and
- 4) Demands that the Biden administration to immediately end all existing and future military aid to Israel in order to fund urgent needs in the United States such as homelessness, food insecurity, and education; and
- 5) Calls upon the immediate release of all the Palestinians who have been arrested in Israel, Jerusalem, and the West Bank since October 7, 2023; and
- 6) Calls upon the immediate release of the approximately 220 Israeli hostages held by Hamas.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City of Berkeley advocates for the dignity and safety of residents in every community, regardless of what crimes its leadership may commit, and that peaceful diplomacy is the only way to achieve this safety and dignity.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, The City of Berkeley stands in solidarity with the Palestinian people of Gaza, who are currently facing ethnic cleansing and collective punishment by the state of Israel; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City of Berkeley vows to combat antisemitism, islamophobia, and ethnonationalism in all its forms; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City of Berkeley rejects Israel's conflation of anti-Zionism and solidarity with Palestinian people with anti-Semitism for political gains; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City of Berkeley endorses the Congressional Resolution submitted by Representatives Cori Bush (MO-01), Rashida Tlaib (MI-12), André Carson (IN-07), Summer Lee (PA-12), and Delia C. Dear Berkeley City Council and respected government officials,

I am writing to you as a concerned citizen and proud American that believes in the basic values of democracy whereby state and local governments have a constitutional duty to protect public safety.

THIS Tuesday, November 28, the Berkeley City Council will vote on whether to pass the resolution, named "Berkeley for Palestine" - which alludes to seek a victory against the "normalization of Israel's occupation and genocide."

The narrative Israel commits genocide is a false and anti-Semitic statement. Hamas fires deadly rockets from schools, hospitals, and densely populated areas knowing that Israel, like any democracy, would have to take whatever military action was necessary to stop the rockets. Hamas also knew the media would broadcast the dead Palestinian children, which Hamas uses as human shields, around the world to cause outrage directed at Israel for the cause of their deaths. President Biden, on behalf of The United States of America, unequivocally condemned the appalling assault against Israel by Hamas terrorists from Gaza on October 7.

Furthermore, despite Hamas' blatant disregard for the lives of the civilians around them, the Palestinian population has increased from 954,898 to 4,654,421 since 1967. This false, antisemitic rhetoric falls short of our American value system and has no place in bringing safety to citizens of the city of Berkeley.

On November 28, the Berkeley City Council is set to be presented with a vicious resolution that takes the position of solidarity with Hamas terrorists and characterizes Israel's attempts to rescue the hostages and liberate the Gazan people as a "genocide." This is a foul affront to the victims of the October 7th massacre. Furthermore, expressing ghastly support for Hamas, who openly murdered, raped, and kidnapped citizens from 25 countries, does not lead us to peace of any kind.

This type of resolution, which falsely claims to support the Palestinian people, achieves the opposite outcome because the BDS movement severely weakens the Palestinian economy and imposes hardships on the Palestinian people. In a 2016 article, Bassam Eid, human rights activist and commentator on Palestinian domestic affairs, explained that the objectives of BDS activists abroad would actually increase economic hardships for the Palestinians in Judea, Samaria and Gaza. BDS leader Omar Barghouti, has expressed support for terrorism, promoted anti-Semitic conspiracy theories and regularly demonizes Israel. He opposes the Jewish right to self-determination and Israel's existence, openly calling for its destruction as a Jewish State.

As Hamas and its supporters have waged a campaign to delude Americans into accepting their attempt to portray Israel as somehow uniquely "illegitimate" as a state, we call on the Berkeley City Council to vote NO on the November 28 resolution that is hateful and malicious, popularizing false claims that will only serve to inflame an already traumatic situation.
