CELEBRATING COMMUNITY COLLABORATION

Let's celebrate the amazing results of community collaboration! This past weekend, through deeply collaborative and caring partnerships, the community came together to bridge the digital divide, enjoy art and spoken word, clean up our coastline, and explore green(er) forms of transportation. In Downtown, Berkeley Central Library hosted a tech fair, in partnership with Tech Exchange and Comcast Internet Essentials, Black Girls Code, and Berkeley City College. Over 300 people attended the event, where 107 computers were given away, plus vouchers for 72 more. Just a few blocks away, there was an electric car and e-bike fair at the Farmers' Market at Civic Center Park. Adult attendees had a chance to learn about the newest electric and plug-in hybrid cars and test ride electric bikes, while children took advantage of a bounce house and art activities. For those too old for a bounce house, a hip hop and spoken word event was held at Grove Park in South Berkeley. Besides great music and spoken word, the 450 attendees enjoyed a breakdance competition, graffiti art show, and karaoke. At Aquatic Park, people of all ages were busy collecting trash (and data!). The annual Coastal Cleanup Day happens in communities all along the California coast. At this important event, 1,070 volunteers worked together to clean shores at sites in Berkeley, Albany, and Emeryville while collecting important data that can inform changes in laws and practices.
